New School Office Opens In Friona

The Parmer County Special Education Central Office has been relocated in Friona. The office has moved from the Friona High School to offices downtown at 104 W. 7th Street.

This office serves Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie. Programs

Details Given On School Bond Vote

The Friona Independent School District this week distributed a "voter information sheet" to every local student, explaining the upcoming \$1.4 million bond issue, scheduled for September 30.

Superintendent of Schools Tom B. Jarboe pointed out that the school's present bonded indebtedness amounts to \$1,176,372, and the present bonds pay out in 1989.

The present bonded indebtedness amounts to approximately 10 cents per \$100 evaluation on the school's tax rate. This figure would increase to roughly 19 cents should the bond issue pass.

The last bond issue passed for the school district was in 1964, for the Friona High School complex.

Of the buildings proposed for remodeling, the junior high building was originally constructed in 1931. It was remodelled following a fire in 1951. The west wing was added in 1957. Some minor changes were made in 1964.

The grade school building was

constructed in 1957. The north wing (third grade wing) was added in 1964. It also required some remodeling following a fire in 1973.

The primary building was constructed in 1954. Two restrooms were added on the south end of the building in 1964.

The cafeteria was constructed in 1951, and added to in 1957. The gym and auditorium were built in 1951.

Jarboe announced that an open house has been scheduled for Sunday, September 28, 2-4:30 p.m., on the school's "East campus," so the public may inspect the buildings tabbed for remodeling.

"Teachers will be on duty that afternoon in those buildings. We urge anyone interested in inspecting the building to come by. We will be glad

to answer all questions in regard to the proposed remodeling and bond issue," said Jarboe.

"Taxpayers are welcome to call me at any time, and I will be glad to answer their questions on the subject," Jarboe said.

The superintendent pointed out that the increase which would be brought about by the bond issue will not be reflected in school tax statements which will be distributed this fall.

There is an increase on those statements, but this will be for general maintenance purposes.

"We felt there might be some confusion, and wanted to point this out. The bond increase will not affect school taxes until the following year," he said.

Commissioners Have Routine Business

Mostly routine business was conducted at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday, September 8.

A motion was passed to pay the expenses for a court reporter from Lubbock in the amount of \$216 from a recent docket call.

District Attorney Jack Young and special investigator Dick Pylant met with the court to discuss assistance for Pylant's salary, which had previously been paid from state funds which have now been discontinued.

It was proposed that the investigator's salary be shared by Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties, according to population. Parmer County's share will be \$126.21 per month, beginning October 1, 1980. Motion was passed accordingly.

Payment of two small bills for boarding a county foster child, each in the amount of \$12, was approved.

Sheriff Charlie Lovelace met with the court, forwarding a request from the Farwell Volunteer Fire (Continued on Page 2)

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

50 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 22, 1930

When F.S. Truitt of the Truitt & Landrum Lumber Company, entered the office to begin the business of the day Tuesday morning, he was not long in learning that the office safe had been rifled during the night. When the safe was opened, it was found that the cash drawer had been forced open and its contents taken. The drawer contained a little over \$2.00 in cash and about \$10,000 worth of notes, but the notes were later found underneath the safe where the burglars had placed them.

45 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 23, 1935

Two engineers from the State Highway Engineer's office at Lubbock were here Thursday and Friday of last week checking up on the field notes of the former survey of State Highway No. 33, or that part of it that passes through Friona.

40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 23, 1940

Word was received here Tuesday morning to the effect that Jess M. Osborn, Muleshoe banker, and formerly cashier of the Friona State Bank, had been seriously hurt in a car wreck.

35 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 24, 1945

What was formerly known as the "Conoco" filling station, which has been closed almost ever since the war began, was reopened this week with

France Welch as owner. Deaton Brothers are the new proprietors of the Phillips Service Station on the highway after taking over the business last week from Sam Jones and Carroll Loflin.

30 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 17, 1950

W.L. Edelson, chairman of the Parmer County Water Conservation has called a meeting of all Parmer County taxpayers for this Friday night in the Bovina School gymnasium; the subject demanding immediate attention is the course this county will take in a proposed Underground Water Conservation District including Parmer County.

25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 19, 1955

Well over \$2,000 damage to two trucks was incurred Wednesday afternoon at the intersection collision at Hub. James Troy Westfall, 30, of Canyon, received a broken collar bone, only serious injury of the accident. His truck received some \$1200 damages. Westfall was going south on the Farm-Market Road 299, driving a semi-truck trailer. He was struck from the west by a 1954 Ford pickup, driven by Newman Lee Maynard, 44, of Elmendorf, Texas. Maynard received numerous lacerations to the scalp and face. Over \$1,000 damage was estimated to the pickup. Maynard was charged with failure to stop at the "stop sign"

on Highway 86, by investigating officers.

20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 18, 1960

Dan True, Channel 10's weather-caster in Amarillo, will serve as the master of ceremonies during the annual Maize Days Queen Contest, announced Deke Kendrick, chairman of the contest. In addition to this announcement, a deadline for those desiring to enter this year's contest has been slated for Saturday, August 27.

15 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 19, 1965

All regular classrooms are to be finished at the new high school building in time for the opening of school August 30, Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr stated this week. Certain parts of the high school complex, such as the auditorium, cafeteria and gymnasium will be ready for the opening of school, but will be completed as soon as possible after the opening of school.

For the third straight year, the Friona Star has been judged as prize-winner in the West Texas Press Association's "Better Newspaper" contest. At the association's annual convention at El Paso last weekend, the Star was awarded first place in the "general excellence" division. It marked the third time the Star has won this coveted award in as many tries for the honor.

10 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 20, 1970

Two Friona residents have been recent winners in the Amarillo Globe-News photography contest. Nelson Lewis was a winner the past Sunday, in the color photography division. Earlier, Dr. Bob Alexander had been a weekly winner, also in the color division.

5 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 31, 1975

Cleanup operations were going full speed near Summerfield Friday, following a massive derailment involving about 25 cars of an eastbound Santa Fe freight train. The derailment happened about 1:15 p.m. Thursday at the crossing at the Big Tex Elevator, just west of Cattle Town Feed Yard. The cars were strewn along a quarter-mile length of track.

C. Forrester Rites Held In Oklahoma

Funeral services for Christopher White Forrester, 36, were held Wednesday, September 17, at 10 a.m. in the Callaway-Smith-Cobb Funeral Home Chapel, Marlow, Oklahoma, with Rev. Larry Baker officiating. Burial was in the Marlow Cemetery.

Forrester died Saturday, September 13 in Oklahoma City at 11 p.m. following a pedestrian-truck accident.

Born September 30, 1943 in Louisville, Kentucky, he had lived in the Marlow, Oklahoma area most of his life. He was a farmer and welder and had recently moved to Okmulgee, Oklahoma from Bovina. He was enrolled at Okmulgee Tech.

Forrester had moved to Bovina from Friona. He was married to Angelia Perkins July 15, 1974 in Wichita Falls. He was a veteran of Viet Nam and a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Friona.

Survivors include his wife Angelia of the home in Okmulgee; one son, Michael Forrester; two daughters, Mechelle and Christy Anne, all of the home; and his mother, Eula Forrester of Marlow, Oklahoma.

Department that fire and ambulance calls be taken by the Sheriff's office, since it has 24-hour dispatchers. The request was approved.

The needs of two individuals having large hospital bills were brought to the court's attention. Judge Porter Roberts is to check into possible sources for assistance, as there appeared no possibility of the county paying the bills.

Approval was given of a \$25 payment to Steve Pearson for participation in soil conservation work.

Commissioners also approved a two-way radio for highway department maintenance foreman Weldon Moody's state car, in order to establish communications between his maintenance crews and the county dispatcher. This would enable the dispatcher to relay information to peace officers, fire or ambulance personnel.

A motion was made to pay a full-time salary to Dorothy Lovelace, who has been filling in for District Clerk Dorothy Quicquel, who recently suffered a broken leg.

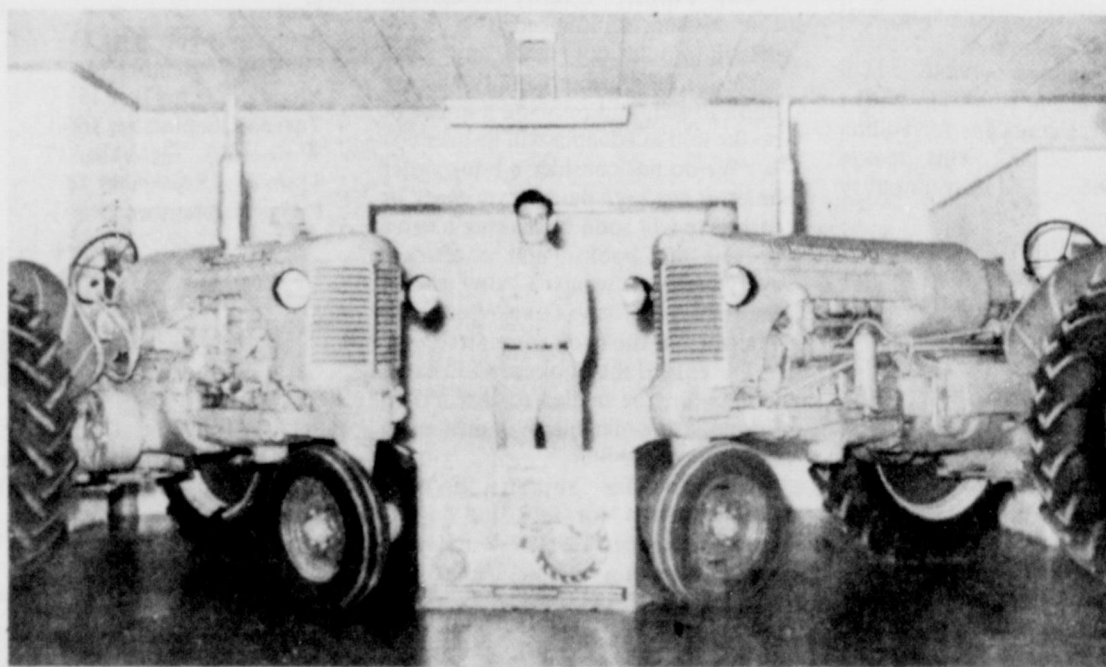

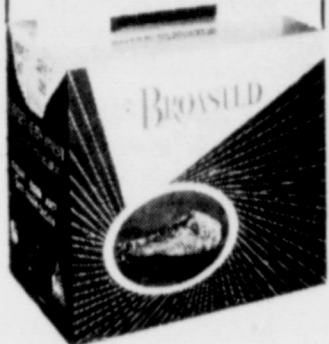

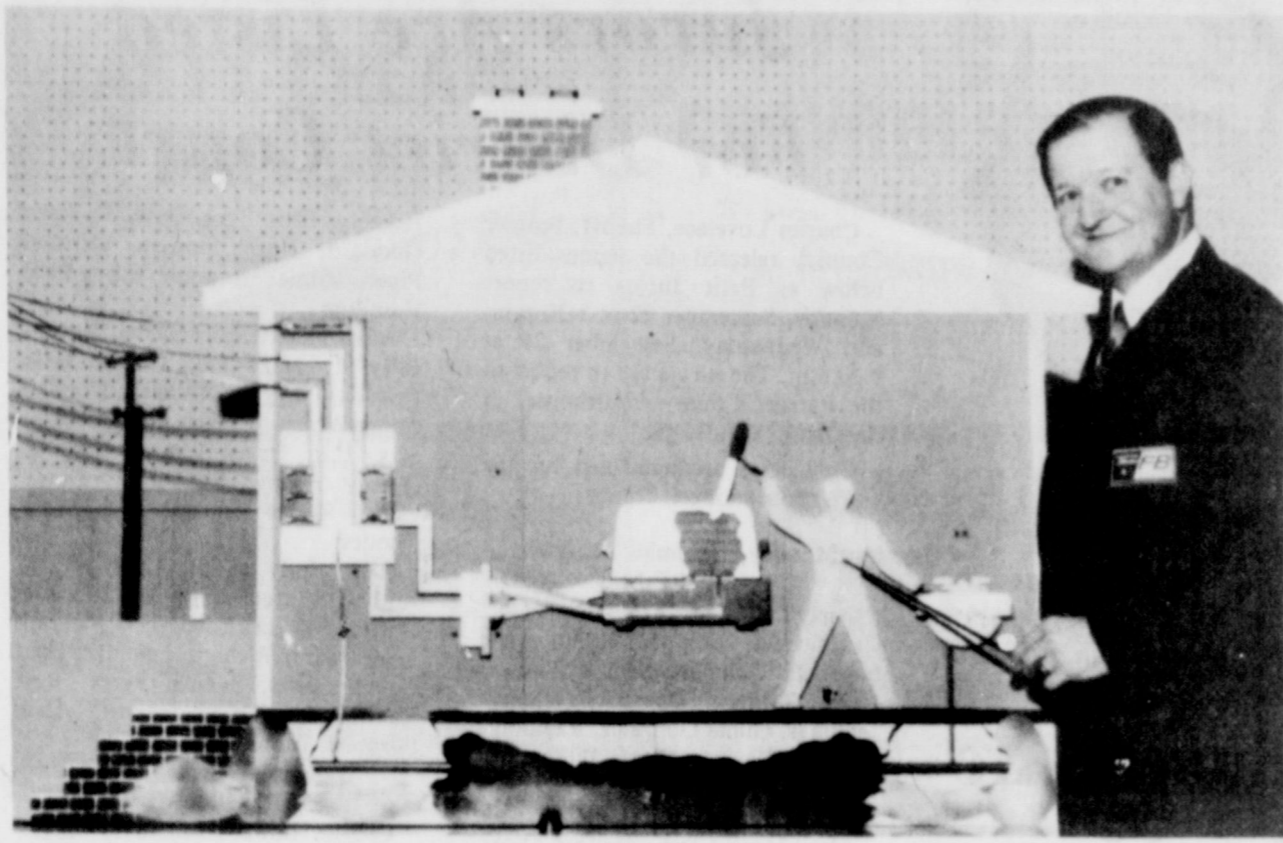

The Happy Homemaker

By June Floyd



With fall rapidly approaching, most homemakers will probably be baking more hot bread, waffles and pancakes. This week's column will be devoted to hints and recipes for these three.

To improve the fluffiness of any quick pancakes or waffles you make, even those from boxed mixes, try separating the whites and yolks of eggs called for and beating them separately.

Then, use the yolks as the recipe directs and when all ingredients have been added and mixed, beat the whites until they hold a peak and fold in gently just before baking.

Hot Cakes

- 1 cup flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil or melted shortening

Sift dry ingredients into mixing bowl. Mix egg yolk and milk and mix well. Add to dry ingredients. Add shortening or cooking oil.

Beat egg white stiffly. Fold into other mixture and drop on ungreased heavy griddle or in skillet. Turn when bubbles have formed on top side.

Makes eight small hot cakes.

Granddad's Pancakes

- 2 eggs
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 1 cup quick oats
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon molasses
- 3 tablespoons shortening

Mix egg yolks and buttermilk thoroughly. Add other ingredients, except egg whites, stirring after each addition.

Fold in beaten egg whites last. Bake on hot griddle.

The following recipe is super when used as a "prepare ahead of time" breakfast item when you're expecting company or just as a time saver for family breakfasts.

It keeps for several days if stored in the refrigerator in a covered container. I like a Tupperware bowl.

Yeast Waffle

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup Wesson oil
- 1 yeast cake or package
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 3 cups flour
- 1 pint warm milk

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Scald milk and let cool. Sift dry ingredients, add milk and yeast mixture, then well beaten eggs and oil.

Beat until batter is smooth. Keep in refrigerator and stir before using. This is better after two or three days.

Foolproof Dinner Rolls

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 2 cups warm water

Dissolve yeast in water in large mixing bowl. Mix with mixer. Then

add the above ingredients and mix with mixer.

To this mixture add 5 1/2 to 6 cups flour—a small amount at a time while mixing by hand. Cover dough and let double in bulk (dough will be sticky before and after rising).

Push down with spoon, cover again and place in refrigerator overnight. One and one half hours before baking, take portion as needed and using as little flour as possible.

Roll dough out and cut rolls with edge of glass. Place buttered rolls in buttered pan and let rise. Bake at 425 degrees 20-25 minutes or until golden brown.

Mixture will keep one week in refrigerator and can be used as needed. (The beauty of this recipe is that kneading isn't needed.)

VARIATION...Cinnamon Rolls
Roll out dough and spread with butter, cinnamon and sugar. Roll into jelly roll and cut into one inch slices. Place in buttered pan and let rise.

Bake at 400 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until brown.

Top with powdered sugar icing as soon as removed from the oven.

The Cart Before The Horse!
Putting the cart before the horse in the circus is hilarious. In spiritual things it is downright tragic!

Human nature is like a blotter—it picks up impressions but they are always backward. How often we live in reverse—wanting God to follow man—wanting the cart before the horse. 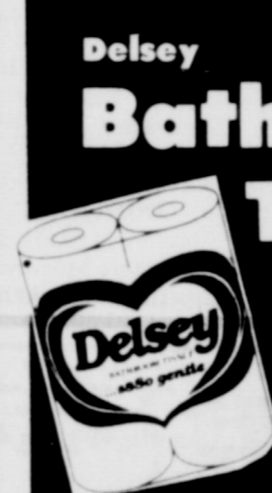

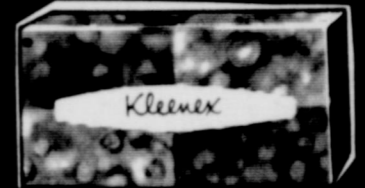

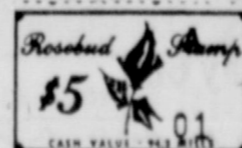

Chieftains Roped By Ranchers, 33-15

The Friona Chieftains had a close game going with Boys Ranch last Friday night, until the Ranchers came along and scored 21 unanswered points in the third quarter, and then coasted to a 33-15 win in the second season outing for both teams.

Friona even had the experience of leading in the game for most of the first half, thanks to some big plays.

The first big play was the opening kick return by Mark Montoya, who returned the kickoff out to the Chieftain 45, to give the team good field position. Then, Nelson Jackson took a late pitchout on the first offensive play for the Chiefs, and ran 19 yards to the Boys Ranch 36-yard-line.

A face mask penalty against the Ranchers a couple of plays later moved the ball to the BR 22, and then Jeff Landrum rambled 12 yards for a first down at the Ranchers' 11-yard-line.

Three plays gained only a net of three yards, so Montoya was called on to kick a field goal, and responded with a 25-yard kick that split the uprights, giving Friona a 3-0 lead with 7:17 left in the first period.

Boys Ranch came back to score in four plays. They covered 68 yards in two consecutive plays and kicked the point for a 7-3 lead with 5:45 left in the quarter.

Friona had another chance to score early in the second quarter. Boys Ranch had a high snap on a punting down, and the punter was tackled at the Ranchers' 24-yard-line.

However, the team couldn't take advantage, finding themselves still at the 24 on fourth down. Montoya came on to try another field goal, which would have been a 40-yarder. The kick was plenty long, but wide to the left.

Midway through the second quarter, defensive back Martin Mercado intercepted a Boys Ranch pass at about midfield, and ran it back to the Rancher 20-yard line, giving his team great field position.

Nelson Jackson picked up a first down with an 11-yard gain to the BR 10. On a third down and goal play, Mercado rolled out to the right, and won the race to the corner, on a two-

yard scoring play. The point-after kick was blocked, but Friona had taken the lead back at 9-7 with 5:12 left before halftime.

Late in the quarter, Boys Ranch put together a drive, the main play being a 36-yard pass play down to the Friona 16 with a minute left in the half. Kyle Humphrey kicked a field goal for the visitors with 18 seconds left on the clock to steal the halftime lead at 10-9. It was a 30-yard kick.

The Chieftains would just as soon forget the third quarter. If they could have skipped this period, they would have won the game.

The Ranchers took over following the kickoff at their own 20, but they didn't stay there long. Chris Rattan burst up the middle, and raced 80 yards for a touchdown. Humphrey's kick made the score 17-9. Only 20 seconds had elapsed in the quarter.

Boys Ranch drove 53 yards after recovering a Friona fumble, to add to their lead. Quarterback Mark Landers went the last two yards, and the kick made the score 24-9 at the 6:27 mark.

Late in the quarter, Friona had some more bad luck. Montoya got a high snap while attempting to punt, the Ranchers blocked the kick,
