Area Gets 1st Freeze

The first freeze of the season was experienced in the Friona area this week, following a strong cold front which swept through the area on Thursday.

Friday morning's low temperature was 26, the lowest of the fall season, apparently low enough to put an end to the growing season.

A low of 30 degrees had been seen on the morning of Sunday, October 19, but only a light frost was recorded that morning as the mercury dipped below the freezing point for just a short time.

The freeze should facilitate the harvest season, particularly the cotton, which was needing a freeze to kill the leaves in most instances.

The area's corn crop has been virtually completed, and most producers have reported a considerable drop in yield, due to the summer-long drought. Corn prices are considerably higher, but some doubt that the price hike will make up for the loss in yield as well as increased cost of production.

Contestants Hold Own In Contest

Contestants in the Friona Star's football predicting contest pretty well held their own during last weekend's schedule of games, although some of the games gave them a little trouble.

Ron Harkey remains in a tie for first place in the standings, after getting 15 games right for his week's effort.

Harkey had first place all to himself the previous week, but had to share the top spot with Steve Clark this week after Clark posted a score of 16. The top two contestants have scores of 114 in the race for grand prize.

Donita Martin gained a point on the lead, also posting a score of 16, for a total of 113. Mrs. Martin is now just a point back of the lead.

Jerry Hinkle, who was one point behind the leader a week earlier, slipped to a score of 14 and fell two points off the pace. Hinkle is tied with R.L. Blakely with a score of 112.

In the weekly contest, Todd Bandy emerged as the winner. He was one of three contestants to correctly pick 18 of the contest games.

Commissioners Have Routine Court Agenda

Mostly routine business was conducted by the Parmer County Commissioners at the regular meeting of the commissioners court on Monday, October 13.

A motion was passed to pay the annual mileage allowance to Georganna Robinett, District Court Reporter, in the amount of \$400.

Two boarding care bills for Dora Fields, a Parmer County foster child, were approved, totalling \$180.

A medical bill for John Maulding, another county foster child, in the amount of \$27.50, was approved.

A bill for gasoline for an indigent, to assist the person in keeping a doctor's appointment, was approved.

Judge Porter Roberts reported that he had been contacted about the possibility of the county giving financial aid to a lady from the Lazbuddie area who is in need of an operation. Commissioner Raymond McGehee is to check on the situation and report back to the court.

Approval was given for the county's participation in soil conservation work for the following people and amounts as shown: Darrell Mason, \$25; Jim Kassahn, \$150; Frank Hinkson, \$50; John L. Mitchell, \$25; Mike Miller, \$25; and

Robert Gallman, \$25.

County Treasurer Benna Felts presented the quarterly financial report. The report was unanimously approved, with the stipulation that the report be printed in the three county newspapers.

A request for right of way easement by General Telephone Company of the Southwest for installing underground cables near Friona was received and approved.

Hugh Young of the Five Area Telephone Cooperative met with the court asking for easements at several locations in the Lazbuddie area for installing underground cables. The request was granted.

Dorothy Quickel, District Clerk, met with the court to discuss the salary schedule for her deputy clerk. After much discussion, a motion was passed setting the deputy's salary equal to that of the county clerk's deputy, which is three-fifths that of a full time clerk, or \$415.36 per month and \$4,984.32 annually.

A communication from the PRPC on the Home Energy assistance program was discussed. Judge Roberts is to check further into this program and report back to the court.

Salvation Army--U.F. Beneficiary

(Editor's note: The following is the second in a series of articles dealing with the agencies which benefit from the Friona Area United Way annual drive. The United Way drive will kick off this year on November 10).

The Salvation Army assists people who are stranded, destitute, without funds, although money is never issued.

"Only material things which are needed are dispensed, and never such things as cigarettes, beer or candy. The Chief of Police is a committeeman, and often in case of doubt (if we think the person might be a freeloader), we send them to the police station with their story. Then, if it is valid, the purchase order is made for the items which are needed," says A.L. (Jake) Outland, Friona's chairman for the Salvation Army.

During the past year, the following cases were aided by the Salvation Army:

September 20, 1979: gas and oil were purchased to help a man find a job! Four persons involved, cost \$15.60.

October 22, 1979: groceries were purchased to tide a family over until payday. Four persons involved, cost \$30.00.

December 21, 1979: Christmas food baskets. Three families, considered destitute, were assisted. This involved 11 persons, total cost of \$41.08.

January 23, 1980: Medicine purchased for a woman, from Parmer County Community Hospital, as she was unable to pay. Two persons involved, cost of \$16.00.

April 28, 1980: Pair of glasses bought for an older woman. Her old glasses had broken, and she was unable to buy new ones. Total cost of \$26.00.

Outland is glad to know of cases where people are in need, to see if they qualify for assistance from the Salvation Army.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1930

The concrete foundation was poured last week and material placed on the ground for the new Wicks Hatchery. As stated, the building will be 24 by 60 feet, frame and brick veneer. Furlong and Dilger are doing the work. The building will house a 53,000-egg incubator, making it one of the largest in this territory.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1935

Misses Lela and Ella Staley of Springfield, Missouri, were business visitors here last Saturday for a few hours, looking after their property interest in and adjoining town. The Misses Staley own the tract of land immediately adjoining the west side of town which has been cultivated by W. H. Foster for several years.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1940

All the public schools of Parmer County have been ordered closed for one day on Wednesday, October 16, by County Judge Lee Thompson, as the first official action taken in this county to facilitate the registration of men within the draft-age limits. All men between the ages of 21 and 36 will be required to register on the above date. This registration is the first step in selecting able-bodied men who are qualified for military training in the United States Army.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1945

The filling station building on Main Street that was owned and formerly operated by Sheets Brothers has been sold to the Friona Consumers Company.

During the severe rainy and chilling spell of weather that hit suddenly down upon the Friona territory and all of Parmer County last week, quite a number of our farmers and cattlemen suffered losses through the death of their cattle.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1950

Crop prospects of Parmer County are now tetering a fine balance, with distinct possibilities of either a record bumper crop or the other extreme—a meager one. Main factor in the outcome is unmistakably the danger of killing frost. With the cool, damp weather prevailing, all the grain is slow in maturing, necessitating a late frost for productive harvests.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 7, 1955

First bales of cotton have been delivered in the last week to the L&H Gin and the North Plains Gin Company, both of Friona. First area bale went to the Mills-Fleming Gin at Hub at an earlier (Sept. 9) date. Delivering the first bale in the city was Glynn Hughes, grown on the irrigated land of Jake Lamb northwest of Friona. Gin owner

Wright Williams paid a premium price of 50 cents per pound for the bale.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1960

Rev. W. G. (Bill) Burton of O'Donnell is the new pastor of the First Baptist Church in Friona. The Rev. Burton and his family moved to Friona last weekend and he brought his first message in the local church last Sunday.

Carroll Bennett and Tom Gee will represent the Friona chapter of the Future Farmers of America at the national convention in Kansas City next week.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1965

Two members of the Friona High School Future Farmers of America chapter, along with one sponsor, David T. McVey, will attend the national FFA Convention in Kansas City next week. Attending along with McVey will be Jimmy Taylor and Roger Nelson.

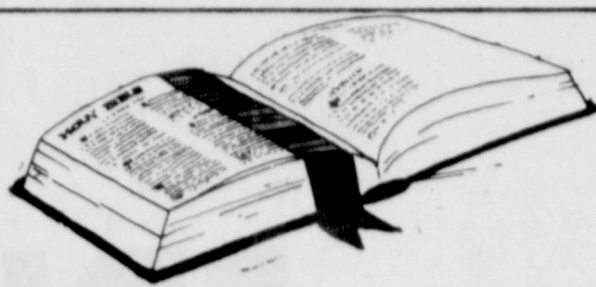
10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1970

The Friona City Council gave tentative approval for the annexation of a block and three lots of the Carson Estate property in the northern part of town.

Building permit activity in the city of Friona during September spurted to the second largest total for the calendar year, and revived possibilities of establishing an all-time record for the year's total.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1975

Parmer County Community Hospital has gained three needed pieces of equipment in recent weeks, thanks to gifts from the estate of Mrs. Bradley Crider Smith of Hereford, a longtime patient here, and from Progressive Study Club's Money Doll. Gifts from Mrs. Smith were a transport incubator and a ventilator for the hospital's cardiac room. The hospital also received a check from Progressive Study Club in the amount of \$307.80, the proceeds from the club's Money Doll drawing held during Maize Days. The Money Doll proceeds will go to purchase a photo therapy machine, which will be used to treat jaundiced infants born at the hospital.

Late Chieftain Rally Falls Short Vs DHS

Except for an ill-timed clip block by a member of the Friona Chieftains, the team would have broken into the win column and started their district schedule with a win at Dimmitt last Friday.

For some reason, one member of the team thought that Tony Jackson, who was just crossing the goal-line 40 yards upfield, needed a block. The yellow flag called back the 42-yard scoring play, and cost Friona the win in the 17-12 game.

Fans at the District 2-AAA opener actually saw two games for the price of one.

Dimmitt dominated the first half, during which time Friona literally could not do a single thing right. The Bobcats took advantage of Friona errors to bolt to a 17-0 halftime lead--and it could have been worse.

But the Chieftains came out in the second half and were equally as dominant. And they would have won the game except for one or two other errors which slipped out.

Dimmitt scored in less than two minutes of the opening period, and quickly assumed a 7-0 lead.

Friona got the ball on an interception by Tony Jackson, and had it at the Dimmitt 30. Jackson returned the interception 50 yards.

But three plays up the middle gained only a yard for the Chieftains, and the team elected to try a long field goal, which would have measured 46 yards. That was the team's first big mistake of the game.

Dimmitt blocked the kick, and ran it back to the Friona 15, giving the

Bobcats excellent field position.

Six plays later, Dimmitt scored for a 14-0 lead, as 4:37 still remained in the opening quarter.

Friona suffered the embarrassment of four lost fumbles during the first half. Two of them came on successive possessions, and on Friona's first play from scrimmage each time.

Fortunately for the Chiefs, the turnovers never resulted in any points for Dimmitt, or they would have been in even more of a hole.

But the 'Cats took advantage of good field position to get what turned out to be the clincher--a 30-yard field goal with 21 seconds left in the half. That gave the Bobcats a 17-0 lead at halftime, and everything seemed secure.

Things looked even bleaker for Friona early in the second half. Quarterback Nelson Jackson, starting his second game due to an injury to Martin Mercado, was hurt on the second play of the half, and taken from the field in an ambulance.

Later in the quarter, Mercado, pressed into service by the injury to Jackson, threw a swing pass to fullback Jeff Landrum, who collected a couple of blocks along the line of scrimmage and then set sail up the west sideline.

Landrum proceeded to outrun the opposition, enroute to a 77-yard scoring play, Friona's longest of the season.

The Chiefs went for a fake kick and tried to run for two points, but Mercado was stopped just short of the goal-line. Friona had scored, though, for a 17-6 score at the 2:14

mark. On Friona's next series, Mercado threw a similar swing pass to Tony Jackson, who found himself in the open at about the Dimmitt 30 and waltzed in for an apparent touchdown, only to turn and find the yellow hankie back at about midfield, erasing what would have been his first season TD. This was on the final play of the third period.

But Friona's wasn't through. The teams exchanged fumbles, after which Friona drove 14 yards in four plays, with Mark Montoya getting the final three for the touchdown with 9:41 left in the game.

A pass try for points failed, but the score had become 17-12, and Friona definitely had the momentum.

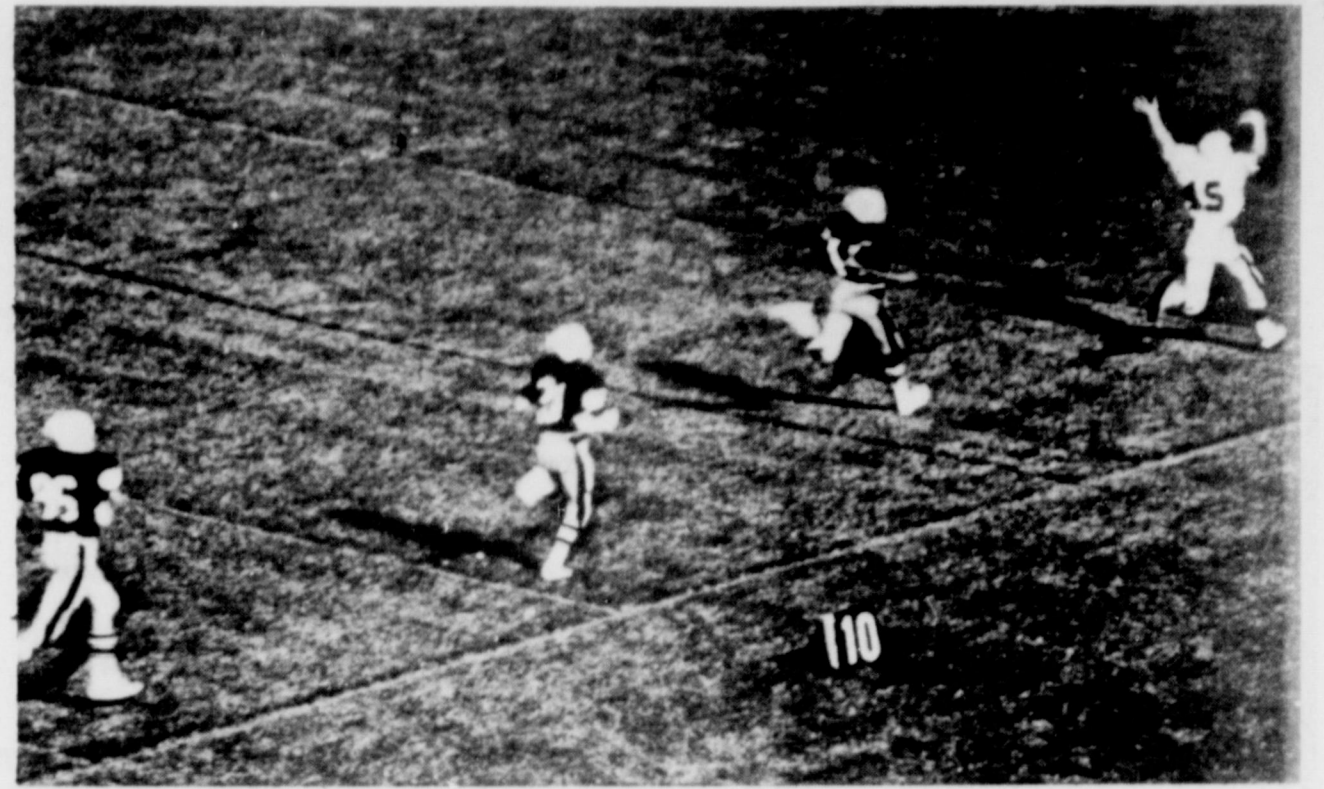
Friona got the ball again, and drove to the Dimmitt 25. The team had it third and two when a costly delay of game penalty set them back to the 30. This caused them to miss the first down when Montoya was stopped a yard shy on fourth down. This was another big play hurting the team's bid for a win.

Friona was making good yardage on sweep plays throughout the second half when Dimmitt simply could not stop the running plays. However, on the fourth-down play, the team ran inside, and failed to make the yardage.

Dimmitt managed to keep the team backed up with two of their best punts of the game in the closing moments, and Friona could not mount another threat.

After being held to only two first downs and a net of 43 yards in the first half, Friona dominated the second half, 147 yards to 125, and seven first downs to two.

It was a game Friona could have, and should have won, if they had executed as they had in most of their earlier games.

1. Please describe your training and experience that qualify you for this office.

2. What should be the role of the Texas Railroad Commission with respect to the national energy problem?

DAVID HUTZELMAN
Libertarian

1. Please describe your training and experience that qualify you for this office.

As a consumer I have enough experience in paying high transportation and energy bills to know that competition, not Railroad Commission regulations can lower these bills. I am an ex-Air Force officer with degrees from Kenyon College and Stanford University and have a professional knowledge on the energy industry.

2. What should be the role of the Texas Railroad Commission with respect to the national energy problem?

The Texas Railroad Commission should not have any further role in either our national or local energy problems. The Commission's past role is a major cause of our current crisis and for this reason the Commission should be abolished when its authority expires under the Texas Sunset Act in 1983.

Artificially high prices have been the result of past Commission policies restricting Texas oil production and limiting imports of cheaper foreign crude oil. The naturally independent and competitive spirit of Texas energy producers, not the Railroad Commission, is the key to abundant future energy at fair prices.

3. What are the three most urgent issues facing the Railroad Commission and how will you address them?

The only important issue facing the Railroad Commission is whether it should be allowed to continue its anti-consumer programs

or whether it should be abolished under the Texas Sunset Act. As of now the uses the money for programs to limit competition in the transportation and energy industries. This costs consumers hundreds of millions of dollars more each year in artificially high prices. To expand these programs the Commission is now requesting a 46% budget increase!

These problems can only be addressed by "sunsetting" the Texas Railroad Commission.

JAMES E. (JIM) NUGENT

1. Please describe your training and experience that qualify you for this office.

I have served nearly two years on the Commission and 18 years in the legislature, where I sponsored Texas' first ethics law for public officials, revision of criminal statutes and major funding bills for highways and education. I am a lawyer, engineer, and successful businessman.

3. What should be the role of the Texas Railroad Commission with respect to the national energy problem?

The energy crisis is real, it is sapping our national economy and making us the target of scheming of international madmen. Solutions will be found, but our immediate challenge is to produce efficiently the energy we have, conserve what we can and bridge the gap to new sources and technologies as rapidly as possible. The Railroad Commission will continue as an aggressive leader in each phase of this program by efficient management of our oil and gas reserves, promotion of lignite-coal, solar, geothermal, and in situ mining technologies. We must also play a leadership role in balancing developing federal energy regulation against our own.

3. What are the three most urgent issues facing the Railroad Commission and how will you address them?

Texas consumers are unwitting victims of national policies designed to provide cheap energy to the Northeast. The railroads, coal-exporting states and others have used Texas for their own benefit. I will continue to oppose these out-of-state forays into Texas consumers' pocketbooks. I will hold gas utility profits to the minimum level sustainable under the law, while assisting small cities in rate proceedings with utility companies. I will continue my initiative to keep overweight trucks off our highways, saving millions in highway maintenance and automobile repairs.

I have practiced general civil law for 18 years; served two terms in the Texas Senate, gaining invaluable experience in law making; served as a District Judge and an Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, interpreting and applying the law.

2. What structural or administrative changes, if any, do you recommend for the Texas judicial system?

The changes most needed are ones which will decrease the costs and delay inherent in our judicial process while at the same time making it more accessible to all citizens. The establishment of neighborhood justice centers, where citizens may submit their disputes to trained, volunteer arbitrators without incurring expenses, would accomplish all three of these goals.

Second, the transcription of testimony should be employed from the current system involving typewriter to computerized stenotypes. This change would drastically decrease the time needed to prepare the appellate record which is the greatest cause of delay both in civil and criminal cases.

1. Please describe your training and experience that qualify you for this office.

Also, we must always strive to improve our judicial system's efficiency, while maintaining its essential fairness. I have tried to do so in my service on the Texas Supreme Court. We must remember that justice delayed may be justice denied.

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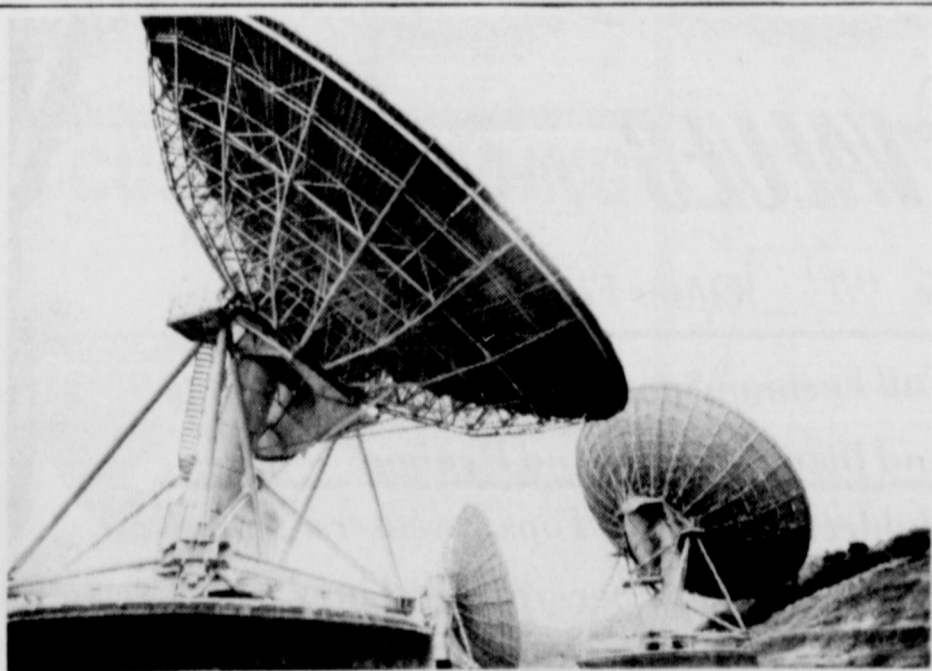



Postmaster Underscores Chain Letter Scheme

People throughout the country are practically giving their money away while breaking the law in illegal chain letter promotions, Postmaster Richard Wilson said recently.

The Postal Inspection Service, investigative branch of the U.S. Postal Service, has been warning people for years not to get involved in chain letter schemes. And while most individuals realize it's a foolish way to part with hard-earned dollars, there are some who seem to think the chance is worth it, according to the postmaster. "Of course, the chances of getting a return on the money invested are very slight, but even knowledge of the odds doesn't seem to deter many participants."

At first glance the well-conceived chain letter promotion may look promising, but a common

ingredient, probability, always works against the player. The postmaster said the Postal Inspection Service may not be able to eliminate all chain letters, but they are working to inform the public these things are nothing but simple fraud.

"The operators of these schemes usually control several names on the list," the postmaster said. "But it is a mathematical fact that only 12 out of every 100,000 purchasers would ever win. By the time the chain reaches the tenth name on the list, the entire population of the United States would be used up."

The postmaster also reminded the public that participation by mail in a lottery is usually a violation of Federal law, which could bring up to five years in prison, a \$1,000 fine, or both.
