# 3,685 Bridges In Texas Less Than 26 Feet Wide

HOUSTON (AP) - U. S. Sen. tensify efforts to curb drunk Lloyd Bentsen, D-Tex., says there are 3,685 bridges under 26 feet wide on highways in

Bentsen, recently appointed chairman of the Senate Transportation Subcommittee, addressed the opening session Monday of the 34th annual Texas Safety Conference and Exposition.

He said legislation proposed by his subcommittee contains funding for a continuing program to replace narrow bridges and to eliminate hazards at rail-highway crossings and in-

"If we were to fix just the bridges 20 feet wide, it would take about 15 years, based on the current work rates and the impoundment of funds which is the policy of this administration," Bentsen said.

"In my bill, I have included \$100 million for bridge replacement. The administration testified against that provision. They said, in effect, we could not and should not afford to spend that kind of federal money. I submit we can't afford not to spend it, and I intend to see that this program survives."

# No Rationing Of Gasoline This Summer

WASHINGTON (AP) - No rationing of gasoline will be required this summer although supplies will be tight, says Deputy Treasury Secretary William

Gasoline inventories are about 5 per cent below those of last year, and spot shortages may develop in some areas of the nation, said Simon, No. 2 man in Treasury. But "this isn't what I would call a

He indicated in an interview Monday that the Nixon administration will move vigorously to prevent any serious shortage of gasoline.

But Simon said the administration does not need the gasoline-rationing authority the Senate wrote into a bill extending the Economic Stabilization Act for another year.

Cost of Living Council officials have said that if any spot shortages of gasoline develop in distribution this summer, it will not mean that any area is cut off from obtaining the fuel. But it might mean that one distributor in one area could run out, an official said.

The council has reimposed mandatory price controls on the oil industry, allowing major firms to raise prices by an average of 1 per cent companywide on most petroleum products without any questions asked by the government.

This could mean sharply higher prices for gasoline if a company wanted to use up all the pricing authority to hike gasoline costs and hold the line on its other petroleum prod-

# Bill To Change **Election Dates**

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas senators tentatively approved a bill today that would make the hottest mmer months also the hottest political season.

The measure advanced 21-9 on second reading. An attempt to suspend rules and take the measure up for final passage fell short of the 24 votes required, 20-10.

The proposal by Sen. Nelson Wolff, D:San Antonio, would move the date of party primary elections from May to August. Run-offs would be moved from June to September.

House members were scheduled to convene at 1 p.m., again taking up a bill provoding automatic three-year contracts for public school teachers, administrators and other educators who have passed a three year probationary period. The election and teacher proposals were debated Monday without any final action.

### Abreo Withdraws From City Race

Jim Abreo, one of 10 candidates for the April City Commission race, withdrew from the race this morning on his doctor's orders.

Abreo, a retired grocer, said he has been suffering a heart condition and is in ill health. He said he regrets having to withdraw but feels he must.

His name, however, will still remain on the ballot, according to City Secretary Robert Massengale.

(AP) - A federal marshal wounded in a major flareup of gunfire at the besieged village of Wounded Knee was reported in serious condition today.

Federal negotiators, meanwhile, said they were willing to talk with militant Indians in the village despite the shooting in-

U.S. Marshal Lloyd Grimm was hit by a single burst of gunfire from within the village ate Monday afternoon, according to Wayne Colburn, chief of the U.S. Marshals Service. Grimm, 56, is from Omaha,

Colburn said Grimm, who usually works in a command post area in nearby Pine Ridge, was at a roadblock manned by Marshals to obtain firsthand knowledge of the activities of American Indian Movement (AIM) leaders who pied the tiny hamlet for 28

days. The wounded marshal was taken to Fitzsimmons Army Medical Center in Aurora, Colo., after receiving a transfusion at Pine Ridge.

"His condition was reported serious, but not critical," Colburn said, adding that x-rays indicated the bullet missed the spinal cord and vital organs. The bullet which entered his chest left through his back.

Assistant Marshal William Hall said fire came from bunkers on the outskirts of Wounded Knee and from within the village. He said several occupants of the hamlet were moving between bunkers and that at one point Indians attempted to move toward federal positions.

While Mrs. Eldridge stays home cooking and sewing and caring for Kathy, 7, and Timothy, 12, Norman Eldridge, 44, works down the street as a mechanic on construction machinery. His salary fluctuates according to how much overtime he can get. NEVER EAT STEAK

Federal statistics put the cost as large as her living room of living in Portland on a par sofa, she can store large quanwith that of other metropolitan tities of sale products.

The family never eats steak, uses butter, or snacks on chocolate bars. But at every meal there's a variety of vegetables Betty has canned herself, lar. She says she has found a turkey or roasts bought during special sales, and homemade cakes and pies. The Eldridges rarely go out to restaurants or to the movies. But they do own their home and have two snowmobiles, a 1968 Chevrolet, a camper trailer, and a 24-foot

Betty goes shopping at the supermarket only once a week, on Thursday after the sales have been advertised in the local paper. She strolls down the aisles with a carefully drawn shopping list, adding up as she goes along, and carries no more than \$20 in her purse.



North opened the bidding with one diamond and South responded with one spade. When North raised to three spades-his holding revaluing to 18 points in support-South tested for slam by bidding four clubs.

Altho North's holding did not include many controlshe had only one ace and two kings-his values appeared to fit well, and he felt warranted in giving one push, particularly since his try could be made below the game level. He cue bid the ace of hearts, which was all that South needed to hear. He proceeded forthwith to

six spades. West opened his singleton diamond in the hope of obtaining a ruff, North played the jack and East won the trick with the queen. In order to retain control of the suit, East returned a small ond. Declarer ruffed with the jack of spades and West discarded a heart.

South played the age of spades and led a small one to the queen in an attempt to split out the trump suit. If the spades had divided twotwo, declarer would have been able to ruff out both of his losing hearts. When East showed out on the second round, complications set in.

There was not sufficient communications between his own hand and the dummy for South to ruff out both of his losing hearts, so he sought for an alternative plan. Presently he observed a way to exert pressure on East if the latter held the king of hearts in addition to the high diamonds. Trumps were temporarily abandoned and declarer proceeded to cash out his clubs. Fortunately for him, West followed to all four rounds. A heart was led to the ace and this was the position:





# Calculated Smokescreen

State Sen. William Moore of Bryan has introduced two bills in the Texas Senate that would require financial disclosures annually of all Texas newspapers, radio and television stations, and all other news gathering organizations and all their employes who gather news of state government.

Moore said he hopes to hold early public hearings on the bills. "I'm serious," he told newsmen. "Newsmen have this shield law now and have set themselves up as public officials ... I think they (financial disclosures) invade a man's privacy.

A House-approved bill that would protect newsmen's confidential sources, the so-called "shield" bill, is pending in a subcommittee of the Senate Jurisprudence Committee.

One of Moore's bills would require that a financial statement be filed each year by any "news organization . . . which disseminates information to the general public for a profit regarding the activities of state government." The bill would cover, but not be limited to, "newspapers, news magazines, and electronic broadcast mediums," it says.

It would require similar financial statements of all officers and employes of a "news organization" who make a salary of \$12,000 or more who have a "substantial interest" in the organization

Failure to file would carry a penalty of a fine up to \$1,000 and - or a jail sentence up to six

Moore's second bill would require similar financial statements annually of every newsman who is accredited to cover the Texas Senate and

## ITT's Effort

everyone persists in referring to the election of Allende as a purely "internal" matter. It was never any such thing, and if only Harold Geneen of ITT recognized the character of the Allende victory, why then Harold Geneen is a lot smarter than most of the senators who are interrogating officials from ITT and drinking deep draughts of sanctimony over ITT's offer to contribute one million dollars towards any government-sponsored plan to prevent the installation of Allende as president of Chile.

WE ARE TALKING about September of 1970. On Sept. 4 Allende won a plurality, which did not automically entitle him to be named president of Chile. That decision was for the parliament to make, at a scheduled session on Oct. 24. The question is whether ITT had a legitimate interest in adding its pressure to that of others to persuade the parliament to flame someone other than Allende or, better still, to call for a new election between Allende and Frei, which election, by the way, Frei would easily have won.

How can the Chilean outcome be said to have been purely an internal matter? The officers of ITT, having carefully observed the campaign of Salvador Allende and the promiscs he made, concluded that he would certainly proceed to nationalize the Telephone company. By Chilean everyone's reckoning the value of ITT's holdings was \$153 million dollars.

THE ITT PEOPLE were smart enough to anticipate that when Allende got around to nationalizing the telephone company he would offer for it a small fraction of its acknowledged value. That he would, in effect, confiscate the property. In due course, Allende offered 24 million dollars for the \$153 million dollar asset, proving the ITT officials to have been altogether accurate in their

We return to the question: in what sense is it an "internal" matter if A decides to steal the property of B? The fact that A is a country and B is merely a corporation says only that B is going to suffer considerable disadvantages in attempting to cope with A. It hardly says that B ought not to attempt to cope with A. ITT

It is by no means obvious why did not, as it happens, mount its own operation in Chile, attempting to persuade the parliament not to vote for Allende. It merely offered to contribute to any United States en-

terprise aimed at the same purpose. TO SUGGEST that foreign governments are not involved or should not be involved in wrestling for the favor of the majority in swing countries which are points of contact in the cold war is simply to beg the question: how is it that the Soviet Union and Castro Cuba were so interested in the election of Allende as to spend millions of dollars and commit entire communications industries to the end of electing him?

Is it the new doctrine of the senators who are grilling ITT that the government of the United States has suddenly lost interest in the extent to which foreign powers attempt to manipulate South American govern-

WHAT PRESIDENT Allende finally did to ITT, was, very simply, to take over the operation of the telephone company without any compensation whatsover. Those who are anxious to make any point at the expense American business who say that ITT got what was coming to it in the light of its proffered intervention make a rather clumsy mistake. It was not until the spring of 1972 that Mr. Jack Anderson published the secret memoranda revealing ITT's offer of a million dollars to stop Allende. But it was in September, 1971, that Allende simply took over the Chilean telephone company, more or less without comment: a clean theft of \$153 million dollars. I do not believe that anyone who is a shareholder of ITT believes that that act by Dr. Allende is a purely internal affair. There is no internal right of any country to steal the goods of other people

I WISH THAT the spirit of ITT were more pervasive. I believe that governments should not be immune from punishment for acts of aggression against foreigners. If only American business had one-tenth the toughness and sense of solidarity its critic impute to it. Instead, more typically, business skulls about. hanging around the local YMCA trying to make public relations points.



## Isla Del Padre

## Around The Rim

Jo Bright

Islands have been lined with romance, adventure and exotic living from earliest history. In many a person's daydream there is, somewhere, an island - a place of enchantment unspoiled by the hand of man.

TEXANS HAVE a place that is pretty much like that. It's called Padre Island. On this isle are unique vegetation, unusual bird life and the majestic barrenness of the sand dunes

What stories are hidden in its dunes and along its white beaches?

Once trod by swashbuckling pirates, gold-seeking Spaniards and missionary priests, Padre has had a varied past. It's drama must be played against the background of its weather, for it was the ceaseless wind and waves that piled up off-shore bars and treated pirate and priest impartially.

THE LONG white island has been known by many names during 400 years of entrances and exits by Spanish explorers, French voyageurs, English sea dogs and adventurers of all nations. Early navigators in the Gulf sighted the white sand beach and traced "Isla Blanca" on parchment maps. A 17th century commander sailed by on a feast day and called the fringe of land "Isla de Corpus Christi". Later Spaniards charted it "Isla de Santiago". Parilla, a mid-eighteenth century explorer, named the bent finger of sand "Isla de las Malaguitas, either for the Indians he found fishing there or for the fiery little tobasco peppers.

PADRE NICOLAS Balli sought a haven on the island after obtaining title to it from King Charles IV of Spain. This gave rise to the 19th century title of "Isla del Padre," then "Padre's Island", and in the 20th century simplified to "Padre Island". One of the island's most dramatic moments in history was the "Flight of the Three Hundred" from the longbowed Karankawa Indians in 1553, shortly after Cortez conquered Mexico from the Aztecs.

A FLEET of 20 treasure ships put out from Vera Cruz with 2,000 people aboard under strange yellow skies. A hurricane roared in from the Caribbean. Whistling mountains of waves sucked down three galleons caught in the eye of the storm. Four ships on the hurricane rim sailed to safety, and three linged into Seville

half a year later. The whip of the storm lashed the bulk of the fleet back across the Gulf and flung them upon the beach of Padre. Three hundred of the passengers and crew lived to reach shore - only to be harrassed, pursued, robbed and finally murdered by the savage Karankawas.

EVEN THE beautiful Dona Juana Ponce de Leon, whose beauty had caused men to search for a Fountain of Perpetual Youth, crumpled without casket or grave on the Padre sands. Only two survived to tell of the fate of the 300. A Spanish monk, Fray Marcos, escaped across the laguna and was rescued on the banks of the Rio Grande. Hidalgo Francisco Vasquez made his way to one of the wrecked ships and camped there until a salvage fleet with divers from Yucatan came to recover the cargo. It was the greatest tgreasure hunt ever to be recorded on this coast, and it is said all but one of the ships was

A SERIOUS search for Gray's successor has not yet begun, ontrary to published reports that President Nixon has decided on Chief Jerry Wilson of the Washington, D. C., metropolitan police. Indeed, high presidential aides say flatly there is no chance of Wilson being named.

An experienced police officer such as Wilson is not being sought as the ultimate successor to J. Edgar Hoover. Rather, the job description talked about is a middle-level administration official (preferably with Justice Department experience) who, unlike Gray, has no connections with either the Watergate scandal or the Nixon political apparatus.

WHILE SOME Republican senators complain Mr. Nixon cruelly undercut Gray by restricting his testimony to the Senate Judiciary Committee, the White House feels he undercut himself by talking too much — believing Gray blundered by not seeking counsel from his superior, Atty. Gen. Richard Kleindienst, prior to the confirmation hearings.

What's more, the White House worries that Gray's deteriorating condition will get even worse if the Judiciary Committee begins to probe
