Bset by adverse distribution and communication problems, South nevertheless managed to salvage his six spade contract by catching his opponent in an unusual squeeze.

North opened the bidding with one diamond and South responded with one spade. When North raised to three spades—his holding re-evaluating to 18 points in support—South tested for slam by bidding four clubs.

Altho North's holding did not include many controls—he had only one ace and two kings—his values appeared to fit well, and he felt warranted in giving one push, particularly since his try could be made below the game level. He cue bid the ace of hearts, which was all that South needed to hear. He proceeded forthwith to six spades.

West opened his singleton diamond in the hope of obtaining a ruff. North played the jack and East won the trick with the queen. In order to retain control of the suit, East returned a small diamond. Declarer ruffed with the jack of spades and

West discarded a heart.

South played the ace of spades and led a small one to the queen in an attempt to split out the trump suit. If the spades had divided two-two, declarer would have been able to ruff out both of his losing hearts. When East showed out on the second round, complications set in.

There was not sufficient communication between his own hand and the dummy for South to ruff out both of his losing hearts, so he sought for an alternative plan. Presently he observed a way to exert pressure on East if the latter held the king of hearts in addition to the high diamonds. Trumps were temporarily abandoned and declarer proceeded to cash out his clubs. Fortunately for him, West followed to all four rounds. A heart was led to the ace and this was the position:

The ten of spades was led and East had to make a discard. He was reluctant to part with the ten of diamonds, for that would leave South in position to ruff out the ace of diamonds next and establish dummy's king. East chose to discard the jack of hearts. Declarer proceeded to overtake the ten of spades with his king and ruffed a heart in dummy as East followed with the king. The closed hand was reentered by trumping a diamond and the queen of hearts took the fulfilling trick.

Local FIT Unit May Be Shaping

A Big Spring order of FIT — an organization called Fight It Together for housewives concerned about the prices of meat — may be shaping quietly here.

A call to The Herald informed the paper that there was an effort in progress here and that housewives were planning a protest the first week in April. The caller left no name or number for interested women to call to join the protest.

An Associated Press story Monday indicated that a group is planning a nationwide protest April 17.

First suggested by two California women who organized Together, the meat ban idea has been taken up by similar consumer groups across the country.

The same AP story pointed out that, in the meantime, housewives have been passing up higher-priced cuts, cooking more vegetarian meals and picketing supermarkets and government institutions.

FIT groups in Texas Saturday picketed supermarkets in Dallas, Garland, Grand Prairie and Euless.

Besides promoting the general boycott, FIT groups asked consumers to keep meat off their tables on Tuesdays and Thursdays until prices drop.

But market managers in Dallas, where the protest was supposed to have been made, said that so far they have had little effect on sales.

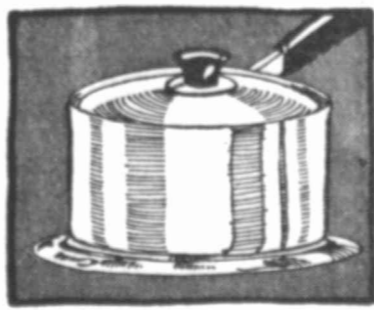

Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.

You can get the most value from your electric range by following these tips.

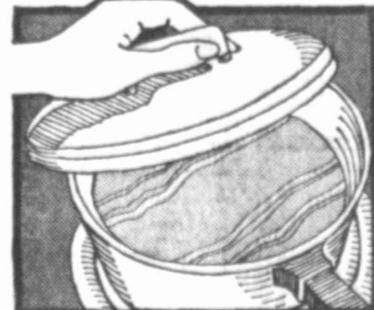


Use flat-bottomed pans

The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily

Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.



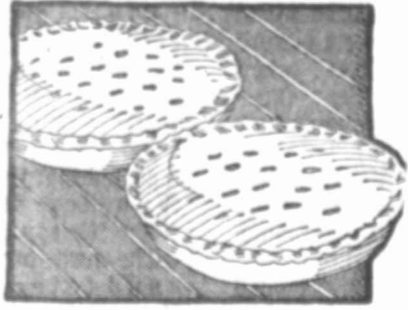
Use minimum amount of water

The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods

can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.

Cook and freeze

Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at the same temperature.



Thaw before cooking

Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

ON DRUGS: (Q.) My sister is on drugs. She told me some time ago, and I thought she was lying. Now I am sure. I have seen her taking stuff and smoking grass.

I have tried desperately to stop her but she says it is not doing her any harm. I know it is. I can tell. Before long our parents will know. What can I do? I am 15 and she is 18. — Sad Sister in Virginia.

(A.) Talk to your parents about your sister. Now, the quicker the better. This is the only fair thing to do. They can take steps you can't take. Ask them not to tell her you told. But if she finds out do not feel guilty for telling. You owe it to her.

17 YEARS: (Q.) — My mother couldn't get along with my father, so she walked out on him when I was 7. Because she did, he got all four of the children, including me.

In about a year he got a woman pregnant and married her. My two older

sisters left. That left my little brother and me to do the work and try to keep things together.

Two years ago the woman left my father and took the three children they had had. She couldn't stand him. Last year he married another woman with two children.

This woman used me for a built-in babysitter. I couldn't take it any longer so I left and took my brother.

We are living with my mother and stepfather. I am 17 and my brother is nearly 15. Pretty soon now, as soon as I am legally able to do so, I am going to leave. I want to make a happy and decent life for myself.

How can I tell my parents what they have done to me and what they are doing to my brother? — Lonely in Louisiana.

(A.) Telling your parents off would not really do any good. They are victims of confusion, divorce and lack of direction in life.

I believe you have learned that there has to be planning and working for it if we are to be happy. We have to make it happen. Before you go, talk to your brother about the importance of making a better life. Encourage him to find an adult friend who can help him. — a teacher, Sunday school teacher, counselor, minister, neighbor, or well-balanced relative. He will need someone when you are gone.

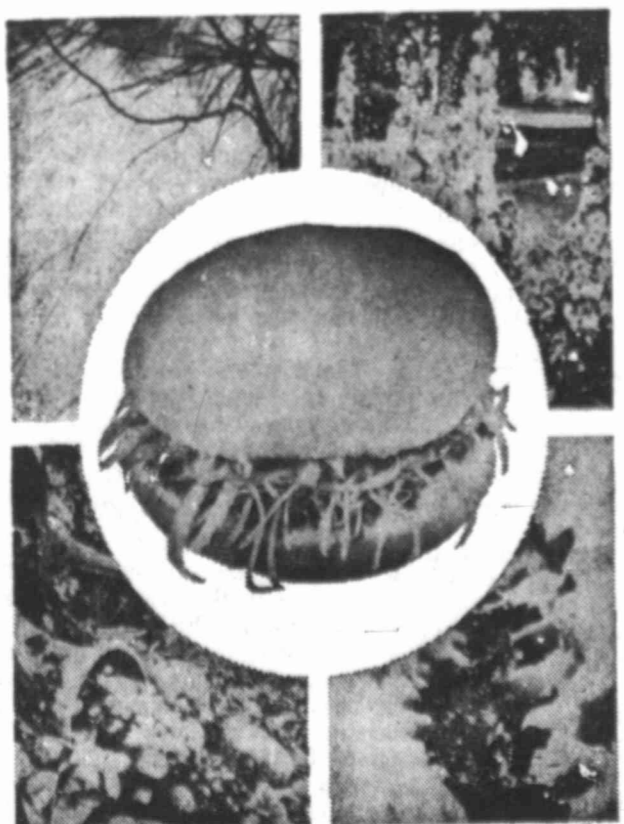
Council Likely To Talk Of Lower Water Rates

Possible lowering of city water rates will probably come up for discussion at tonight's City Commission meeting after having been tabled until completion of a comparative study of other cities rates. Commissioner Eddie Acra asked for the decrease at the March 13 Commission meeting. The study, made by Finance Director Robert Massengale, was completed last week.

The survey of five area cities shows Big Spring in the middle with Midland and Odessa charging the highest rates and San Angelo and Abilene the lowest. Consumption of 10,000 gallons of water costs Big Springers \$7.15 a month. Other rates for the same amount of water include San Angelo, \$5.76; Abilene, \$6.10; Odessa, \$9.20; and Midland, \$8.55. Rates were computed at 10,000-gallon intervals up to 50,000 and then for 100,000. Rates for usage of 100,000 gallons are: Abilene, \$39.70; San Angelo, \$41.96; Big Spring, \$54.15; Odessa, \$56.95; and Midland, \$82.55. "I feel like we've got a pretty good water rate," said Massengale. "Abilene and San Angelo are in a different situation — they've got more water."

justed) for Big Spring is 165 million gallons. Minimum charge is \$3.30 a month for 3,000 gallons. After the first 3,000, the rate is 55 cents up to 50,000 gallons and then 50 cents up to 100,000 gallons. "Sixty per cent of our water is used by firms utilizing over 100,000 gallons apiece," said Massengale. He estimated that 80 firms account for that 60 per cent. Average usage by individual residences is between 1,000 and 10,000 gallons a month, Massengale said.

Acra said he asked for a study of the city's water rates to give the average citizen a break. "At first, I was going to ask for a tax decrease in ad valorem taxes just looks good. You can take them off your income tax, but you can't take off water payments," he said. He said citizens have complained to him that it has gotten too expensive to use water for yard work. "Maybe if the rates can be reduced," Acra conjectured, "people will start trying to beautify our city." According to Massengale, the city purchases its water from the Colorado River Municipal Water District at an average cost of about \$50,000 a month. February cost, which he called "a little low," was \$47,059.46 for the 165,783,000 gallons provided.

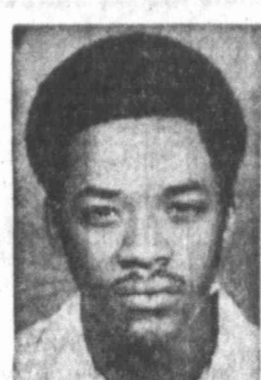

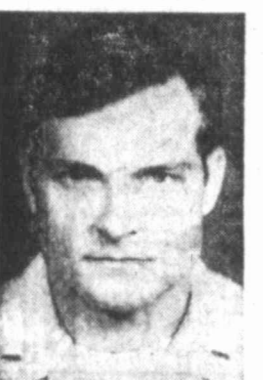

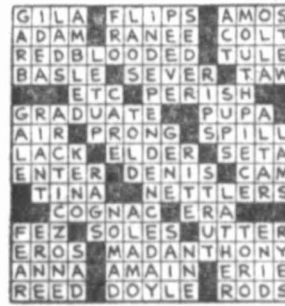

The bill was sent to a subcommittee after the House Revenue and Taxation Committee hearing. Similar bills have died in the last two legislative sessions.

Reed said the absence of disclosure in deeds since the federal law requiring prices ended five years ago has created "a whole generation of young men" in real estate who often "assist or are even instrumental in obtaining excessive loans in violation of lending laws" by working unjustifiably high assessments.

"Kickbacks are considered as commissions to be expected in exchange for their knowledge and influence," Reed said.

Several local tax assessor-collectors endorsed the bill, saying they need to accurately assess the value of property for tax purposes.

John J. Terrell, lobbyist for the Texas Association of Homebuilders, told the committee his

neighboring property owners whose land has not sold for many years could be the losers. If nearby land were sold for more than it was actually worth, he said, surrounding owners could end up paying higher taxes because of the faulty price.

But Reed's testimony indicated that stopping such inflated sales was part of the purpose of the bill. With accurate price information, he said, "no amount of sales talk would convince the average layman investor that the property doubled in value in one week and that he should invest in it at the high figure."

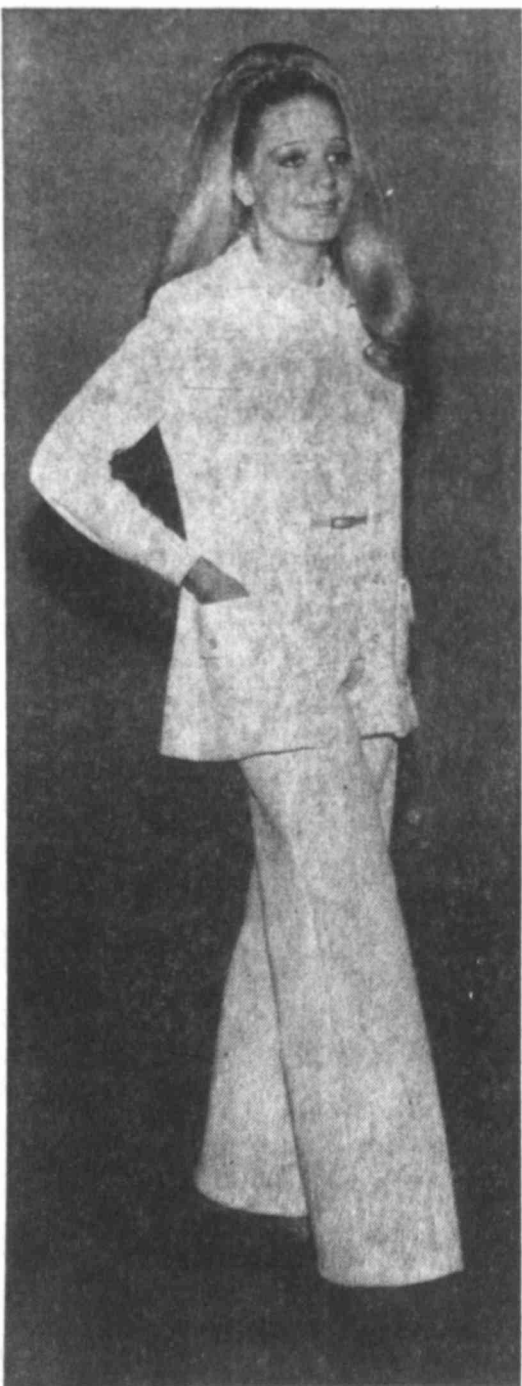
