Reds Violate Cease - Fire

SAIGON (AP) - The South Vietnamese government said Communist forces violated the cease-fire 147 more times in the 36 hours ending at noon today, and that 34 government soldiers were killed and 199 wounded. Civilian casualties were put at 19 dead and 19 wounded.

Most of the casualties were in small, isolated Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., President Nixon's special emissary, left Saigon today for his second visit to Phnom Penh, the final stop on his four-day

tour of Southeast Asia. Haig arrived in Saigon Tuesday night. He met skirmishes, the military command said.

Dorrell Royal's agenties Dies

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Mrs. Marion Kazen, 27, daughter of University of Texas athletic director and Mrs. Darrell Royal, died today at

Mrs. Kazen had been hospitalized and in a coma from head injuries since the small car she was driving and a passenger bus collided on March

She had been listed as in serious condition most of the time but her condition changed to critical Tuesday night, the hospital said.

Two of her children, David, 3, and Christian, 5, were in the car with her and suffered minor injuries but had been discharged from the hospital. Mrs. Kazen's former husband is the son of Rep. Abraham Kazen Jr., D-Tex., of Laredo.

Auto Pollution Extension

WASHINGTON (AP) - Environmental Protection Administrator William D. Ruckelshaus today granted a one-year extension of the 1975 antipollution standards for automobiles, but established interim standards requiring some use

of new anti-pollution devices. Ruckelshaus set interim standards which, he said, would require the use of "catalytic converters" on all domestic automobiles sold in California in 1975.

A somewhat less strict standard was set for the rest of the nation and Ruckelshaus said it "will likely result in some catalysts used on some models nationwide by 1975."

City Wasting No Time Anteing Up

A check for \$1436.75 was sent by city officials via County Judge A. G. Mitchell this morning to the Permian Basin Regional Planning Council as Big Spring's dues for its first year of membership in the council.

City commissioners unanimously approved a resolution at last night's commission meeting to join the planning council at a cost of five cents per capita. It was passed on an emergency basis due to several matters of local import pending before the regional body.

The city will officially become a member when the planning council formally accepts its applica-

Dealers' Attorney In Austin Today

Roger Brown, a local attorney representing area butane-propane dealers, was to appear before a House Committee at the state capital today.

He will be speaking concerning a proposed resolution asking the Texas Railroad Commission to prevent discontinuing sale of liquid petroleum gas (LPG) to local dealers.

Skelly Oil Co. has informed area LPG dealers it plans to cease selling LPG locally after April 30. LPG is being piped elsewhere, reportedly.

In protest, some dealers and the partner in the firm of Brown, Hamby and Bancroft appeared before the Railroad Commission Monday. The Commission was reported to have shown sympathy for the position of area dealers.

Informed sources said President Suleiman Franjieh has decided to accept Salam's resignation.

The United States meanwhile denied charges by the Arab guerrillas that it had a hand in the raid.

Salam, who has been premier since October 1970, submitted his resignation after a special cabinet meeting Tuesday. He said he was quitting in the

higher interest of Lebanon. There was speculation that Salam was dissatisfied with the failure of the army and the police to crush the Israeli invaders. Most local newspapers said he had asked for the resignation of a "prominent official," believed to be the commander of the army, Maj. Gen. Iskandar Ghanem. But Franjieh was said to have cautioned against premature action.

The Palestine Liberation Organization charged that the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency helped carry out the Israeli attack, in which three Arab guerrilla leaders were killed, and that the U.S. Embassy in Beirut gave refuge to some of the Israeli raiders.

'MURDERERS'

That allegation is utterly without foundation," said State Department spokesman Charles W. Bray in Washington. "It is mischievous and it has been denied categorically by our Embassy in Beirut.' The charge raised fears in

some quarters that the guerrillas would attack American businesses in the Middle East.




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
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Intent Of Bill Obvious

Sen, Edmund S. Muskie has called attention to a very dangerous bill introduced in the Senate. Backed by the Nixon administration, the bill could amount to blanket censorship of government activities, reducing the press to carriers of whatever tidings the administration saw fit to deliver to

Sens. Roman Hruska, a Republican, and John McClellan, a Democrat, are the bill's sponsors-ofrecord. Their piece of legislation would make it a crime to disclose any classified information. Those disclosing such information would be subject to fines and imprisonment; newsmen and officials of broadcasting or publishing enterprises making use of such information also would be subject to criminal penalties.

The intent and likely results of such legislation should be obvious. Merely by applying a classified stamp to any information, the government could prevent its disclosure. The test would not be whether publication of the information would damage the nation's security, or whether classification was valid, but only that the govern-ment did not want it revealed. No doubt the administration would be spared a lot of em-barrassment and criticism by such expedient action. But the public's right to know would be almost destroyed.

If the bill becomes law, about the only information forthcoming about government would be press releases prepared by the government.

Anything else could be classified; the lid of censorship could be lashed down tight

The administration's penchant for closed-door government and its dislike of the press have long been evident. This bill would make it the law of the land that government's desires to cloak itself in secrecy take precedence over the right of the people to know what it is doing. Few pieces of proposed legislation can be more dangerous than this; it deserves short shrift in Congress.

Loophole To Close

The federal government is approaching a decision on welfare benefits for strikers.


This is a classic labor-management confrontation. Management argues that strikers should not be subsidized with welfare while on the picketline. Labor says its members pay taxes and are entitled to aid when in need.

Here is the key difference: A strike is the

result of a conscious decision to leave the job. It does not stem from accident, disability, poverty or misfortune.

When the government, via the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, makes the decision, it should bar welfare benefits for strikers. The public should not be made a party to either

People 'Museum'

Hunted down a distinguished folklorist, newsman and historian the

other day in San Antonio. He is R. Henderson Shuffler, who at that moment stood at the rear of the handsome Institute of Texan Cultures building puffing a pipe and

waiting for a new fire engine. SHUFFLER IS devoting himself to helping persons of varied cultures

understand each other. He and the staff, including a lanky, sun-weatherd Texan, O. T. Baker, are doing this through displays showing that many different peoples made Texas what it is. Baker is manager of projects, exhibits and the Texas Folklife Festival.

How many national, racial or ethnic groups got together to create Texas? The institute says 26 and has the facts and artifacts to prove it.

But, "this is not a museum," says Baker.

Severest Test

WASHINGTON - At the formal preview of the great French impressionists on loan exhibit to the National Gallery Secretary of Defense Elliot L. Richardson took a wistful backward look at his origins. He remarked that once, as a very young man, he had collected reproductions of these same pictures.

THAT WAS when he had considered printing as a career. He continues to be a water colorist of no mean ability and when he has time, which is more and more in short supply in his new post, the secretary goes back to the avocation that might have been a vocation.

Perhaps the most cultivated and urbane of the men who have come through the Nixon years, Richardson has also proved in three widely contrasting posts to be one of the ablest. As secretary of defense he is confronted with demands that will tax all his abilities. Not the least is the burden put on him to defend the continued bombing by B-52s in Cambodia.

THIS IS becoming for the critics a constitutional issue of the gravest meaning. The use of American air power had been justified by the need to protect American troops on the ground. Now that all the troops are removed there can be no legal justification, say the critics with Sen. J. William Fulbright in the forefront, for pounding this shattered, largely ruined little country. If the President can do this, he can at any time and in any place use American military might to achieve his politicaldiplomatic ends. This is usurpation of the war-making power that must have the Founding Fathers revolving

IN SEVERAL forums Richardson has given different reasoning for the accelerated daily pounding - as many as 80 B-52s - of Cambodian trails and highways. At one point he called Cambodia an "ally." No one had gone that far before.

On another occasion he said it was essential to clean up a lingering corner of the Indochina war. In his latest statement he said it might be necessary to airlift supplies, arms and gasoline to besieged government forces in Phnom Penh. The reason for the bombing is obvious enough to try to shore up the faltering regime of Premier Lon Nol as his capital is increasingly cut off from all contact by rail and river.

RICHARDSON'S legal skill in this box cannot be discounted. Graduating from Harvard Law School with horiors, he became a law clerk first to Judge Learned Hand in New York and then to Justice Felix Frankfurter, a connossieur of law clerks out of Harvard. In elective politics in Massachusetts he was first lieutenant governor and then attorney general, a post he left to come to Washington at Nixon's bidding as under secretary of state, then secretary of HEW.

HIS ADMIRERS are now asking whether the Pentagon is not a booby trap. As defense secretary he succeeded that tough graduate of Congressional politics, Melvin R. Laird. A cynical House member put it this way: "You don't really think that Boston guppy can survive those sharks over in the Pentagon, do you?

Around The Rim

Several years ago Helen Wilson, who now lives in Fort Worth, brought in a picture. Here were two newsmen who looked like school kids, seated at their desks and batting our copy like mad. These were the likenesses of Robert W. (Bob) Whipkey and me, pretty much the "staff of the Herald back in 1935 when he came here. Truth was that neither of us were too far out of college.

HE WAS sharp as a tack, a fast and accurate worker, a rapid reader (and, he would not appreciate this. a not-so-good proofreader, in which role he served constantly). So he had my respect from the start; he won my gratitude when he took a little weekly column I had established and said it would henceforth become a front page Sunday feature under the title of "The Week."

Right off, we set about preparing a special edition commemorating the first 10 years after the first major oil strike. We wrote about every facet of community life we could think of, and only a sense of humor kept us going. I composed some corny lyrics, he a corny tune, and we sang "Doded" (Decade of Development) as

THE NEXT year the Herald's young society editor, Lucille Rix_and were married, and Bob and Ruby had a dinner party for us, and he enviegled a couple of tickets from American Airlines so we could go to California for our honey moon. That was in the day when commercial flying was a novelty if not a daredevil experience.

He got involved in community work and had a hand in getting Jimmie Green to come over from Colorado City (Bob's home town) to be the Chamber of Commerce Manager. Both had key roles in the campaign to land the Big Spring State Hospital.

THEN CAME the war, and when he got a Navy commission, I inherited his spot for the duration. I'll never forget the sinking feeling, when, in his smart uniform and white cap, he boarded the train. Not long after he returned, the town decided to celebrate the centennal of discovery of the "big spring." In addition to becoming a chief promotor as an executive committee member, he

edited and headed the copy for the entire 200-plug-page edition (probably the finest historical work about Big Spring ever produced), dummied in the ads, sold many, and shared in our 12-18-hour day regimen for some six to eight weeks.

THERE WERE fast friendships among the old guard such as Red McMahen, our peppery pressman who had a special gift in saying something that managed to make Bob's jaw twitch, Grampy Glenn, the composing room foreman who habitually made the pronouncement "it won't go," Tommy Hart, Oliver Cofer, Rusty Smith. Red, it was, I think who pinned the title of the "Gray Eagle" on the Chief. This splashed over into the world outside, and from it came a similar sobriquet, "the Gray Fox."

ALL OF US at one time toyed with the thought of murder or threatened to quit more than once, but Bob poured oil on waters. I don't think I heard him say "I'm sorry," but you knew he was because he bent so far the other way in being nice. There were little things you don't forget, like a call I got one evening before flying to Dallas: "Why don't you take Tommy (our eldest son)?" He knew Tom was nuts about planes. Or the time he sent me on assignment to Washington, knowing my family could go along and get to visit my congressman brother.

IF HE had a short fuse (and he did), he had a big heart. In times of trouble among the Herald family, he was early there and late to leave. About 15 years ago that heart suffered physical damage, and there were later flurries. He pushed himself too hard and his color grew ashen. But after retiring, he finally relaxed. looked great, had that old sparkle.

AS WHEN he was at the helm here. he came in, plopped down in a chair and opened the conversation: "Colonel Pickle, three things - "then promptly enumerated them, added 'you may not be able to do this." He knew darn well we'd break a leg

Always he had the Herald at heart. I can just see him over on the other side of the river, smirking and shaking his head sanctify with pride. He died just right for the Herald's

Fear Of Inflation

WASHINGTON - The deepening resistance of Richard M. Nixon's White House to outside criticism on the disastrous course of the new Nixonomics was dramatized in the President's refusal to accept a

RINFRET, Canadian-born head of the New York economic consulting firm of Rinfret Boston Associates, sometimes acts the brash iconoclast in the occult world of economics. But to President Nixon and the 110 giltedged financial and industrial clients in Rinfret's consulting portfolio, he is more often regarded as a trendsetter whose advice politicians of all ideologies seek out.

Indeed, President Nixon thought so highly of Rinfret's ability to marry economics and politics on the speaking platform that he named him chief campaign spokesman for economics last fall. There never was any regret inside the White House over that decision.

YET, WHEN Rinfret attempted to telephone his galvanic alarm over runaway inflation to Mr. Nixon one day last week, he failed to reach

chief of staff, H. R (Bob) Haldeman. Instead, Rinfret was deftly deflected to Haldeman's assistant, Lawrence M. Highby. Highby listened and said nothing when Rinfret, in a bust of exasperation, told him to inform Mr. Nixon that the new Nixonomics of rampant inflation — with no sign of serious preventive medicine either at the White House or in George Shultz's Treasury Department - mark the 'political Waterloo' of the Nixon presidency.

RINFRET is not the only objective, outside economist now convinced that if Mr. Nixon does not plant across-theboard price controls on everything the American consumer buys - a major shift in administration policy which had not occurred as we write this - the American economy will be sucked ever deeper into ruinous Brazilian-style inflation, followed by

ALBERT SINDLINGER, probably the nation's leading expert on consumer analysis, is telling his marketing research clients that his earlier prediction of an acceptably gentle economic downturn in the fourth quarter of 1973 has been not only the President but also his prediction; a full-fledged recession.
