## TAKE STEPS TO SPEED SCHOOL DESEGREGATION EFFORTS

# Funds Frozen When Big Spring Fails To HEW The Line

shall and Victoria Texas school district are among 11 school districts in the United States who will have applications for new funds frozen according to an Associated Press release.

Supt. Sam Anderson said his only knowledge of the government decision was that supplied him by members of the news

**NEW FUNDS** 

Supt. Anderson stated, "This does not explain the term 'new funds.' We are not clear whether that me. s new federal programs or new funds or extension funds for old

programs already approved." He indicated that the school attorney will be in touch with Peter E. Holmes of HEW's Office for Civil Rights, who made the announcement.

Holmes, in an announcement this morning emphasized that letters have been sent out to the school districts involved and that the letters carry "no immediate threat of a federal fund

STOP MONEY

This is in direct contrast to the announcement that funds have been frozen for 11 school

The Associated Press release further stated that the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, where this action was instigated, had stated that its order did not mean that federal funds will be cut off immediately - only that HEW must notify the schools that their desegregation efforts are

being questioned. The appeals court said that hearings must be held by HEW before it can cut off funds to a school district. Big Spring schools have not had any hearings of any type in connection with the matter.

Today is the deadline set by

the appeals court for the HEW to take steps in speeding the desegregation in 17 Southern and border states.

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, following a hearing Monday, denied the Nixon administration's request for postponement of a lower court order requiring the desegregation step-up. FEDERAL FUNDS

The lower court ruled Feb. 16 that today is the deadline for HEW to notify 116 school districts that they face the loss of federal funds because they have not met desegregation

HEW also was ordered to tell another 85 districts by today that they must explain statistics indicating they still discriminate against black chil-

Government lawyers who sought the delay argued that HEW had shown good faith in implementing court-ordered school desegregation plans. They said HEW was awaiting congressional clarification of the Supreme Court's busing order before enforcing it.

The NAACP Legal Defense Fund opposed any delay. The appeals court did not rule on the merits of the lower

In his ruling, U.S. Dist. Court Judge John Pratt said 74 districts reneged on desegregation plans, and 42 were determined by HEW in 1971 as presumably violating the Supreme Court's Swann (busing) decision.

ACCEPTABLE PLAN Seventeen either have come into compliance or under court jurisdiction, he said, and the other 25 were sent letters

March 24 asking for new plans. Lawton, Okla., and Anne Arundel County, Md., submitted acceptable plans, seven others have sent in proposals, one is in the process of preparing a

plan, three have expressed desire to comply voluntarily and another appears to be in compliance, he said.

"The remaining 11 districts have declined to submit revised desegregation plans ...," he said. This group includes Big

LYNCHBURG, Va. (AP) - A Randolph—Macon Women's College freshman found dead on campus Sunday night died from "severe internal and head injuries," the state medical examiner's office said.

Police identified the victim as Cynthia L. Hellmann, 19, of Houston, Tex.

The medical examiner who performed the autopsy said Monday that Miss Hellmann was "beaten with a fist and kicked." He said there was no evidence of sexual abuse but that further tests were being made.

# Some Of Cosden's Oil Will Come From Irag

Cosden Oil & Chemical barrels of Barah, Iraq sour Company is putting the reverse twist on oil supplies.

Pumps were started Tuesday at Harbor Island, north of Corpus Christi and deepest of the Gulf Coast ports, to send Iraq sour crude oil on its way to the Cosden refinery at Big

A generation ago West Texas was drowning in oil and begging for outlets to send oil to the Gulf Coast for refining or overseas shipment. Now, with the Big Spring refinery unable to obtain sufficient domestic supplies to operate at capacity, imported oil is being pumped about 600 miles to make up the deficit in supply. This may approximate 10,000 barrels per

American Petrofina, parent company of Cosden, plans to import a shipload a month to Bar Harbor.

NOT SELF-SJFFICIENT "West Texas refiners are no longer self-sufficient," said Ben Crocker, president of American Petrofina Pipeline Company, which will move the oil.

crude aboard and docked Monday at Harbor Island. Cosden had purchased a 10-in. 583-mile pipeline from Arco Pipe Line Company May 1, 1972 as an insurance against critical shortage of supply several years hence. But in less than a year, Cosden is taking the first tender of foreign oil.

Paul Meek, Cosden president, said he did not know specifically how long it will take the Iraqi oil to reach here, but perhaps a week or so because the former Arco line is presently full of oil.

A pump station was installed at Harbor Island to reverse the flow, and modifications were to deliver the oil here. The initial boost will be to the Refugio station, then through boosters to Crane and then on to Midland and Big Spring. The line has a capacity of 30,000 to 40,000 barrels per day, but Cosden is not due to require that much. The refinery here has a capacity well in excess of 50,000 barrels per day and had had difficulty in getting as



The consumer hoping to find post-boycott meat bargains is going to be disappointed, according to an Associated Press sampling of lamb, beef and pork prices in several major cities across the country.

The AP checked the prices of eight meat items in 11 cities on April 2 — the first business day of the week-long boycott and the day the Internal Revenue Service began enforcing price ceilings imposed by President Nixon. It rechecked the same cuts at the same supermarkets

The survey showed that 40 items - or 46 per cent - were unchanged in price over the two-week period; 21 — or about 25 per cent — decreased in price; 17 - or about 20 per cent - cost more; and 10 were unavailable either the first or second survey date. Price cuts ranged from a fraction of one

per cent to more than 30 per cent for certain items on special sale

The survey also compared the April 16 prices with the ceilings posted last week. It found 43 items — almost half were selling at the ceiling price; 39 items were selling below the ceiling; and 6 were un-

Of the items below the ceiling, 41 per cent were between 6 and 10 cents per pound lower and 28 per cent were between 11 and 20 cents per pound lower. Other cuts of meat ranged from 1 to 40 cents below the

None of the supermarkets involved in the survey was among those which announced a policy of keeping prices below the ceiling levels.

Pork was down in more cities

- five - than any other item. It was selling below the ceiling price in nine cities. Supermarket managers said

the price changes simply reflected supply and demand.

"As far as pork is concerned, the price is coming down a little bit - there's more of it on hand," said Al Liefort, manager of Neb's Market in Phoenix, Ariz.

Jack Anderson, the meat buyer for a Big Bear supermarket in Columbus, Ohio, agreed, adding that more hogs were being delivered to livestock markets. Anderson said competition with other stores was responsible for beef and lamb items selling below the ceiling in his market

The items checked were one pound each of: round steak, center cut pork chops, chopped chuck, sirloin steak, rib lamb chops, veal cutlet, leg of lamb and standing rib roast. The cities were Baltimore, Kansas City, Oklahoma City, Chicago, Phoenix, Atlanta, Washington, Columbus, Boston, New Orleans and Los Angeles.







# For What It's Worth

From out of the past, some odd but true goodies about heros and other sordid types . . .

Baseball players of yon older days were so superstitious so painfully superstitious. Manager George Stallings of the 1914 Boston Braves, who had a special coach to police the dugout area for paper and peanut shells because they were bad luck, was one of the hardest hit. When the Braves started a batting rally he would remain in the particular position, pose or contortion that he happened to be in when the action started. If he had his back to the field, or was looking up in

the sky at a bird - no matter what, he'd hold that position until the rally was finished. Once he was caught crouched in the corner of the dugout picking up a match, so he got a team member to come tell him every detail of what was happening. The Braves sent nine batters to the plate in that inning, and after 15 minutes of the torture, Stallings was so cramped he had to be taken to the locker room and massaged . . .

Ever wonder what happened to Bevo I, the first University of Texas mascot? In 1915 Texas A&M defeated the Longhorns 13-0 in what was pretty much of an upset and some Aggie pranksters branded the score on the steer's hide. Three years later, when the unhappy numbers were still in sight, UT officials figured it would be best for all - with the exception of the bovine, possibly - to get rid of the reminder, and Bevo was slaughtered.

The part of the hide that had been defaced was given to A&M and Texas kept the other half. The Aggies were subsequently invited to a barbecue, thrown through the generosity of the first Bevo, and presumably, a good time was had by all . . .

In 1943, Esquire Magazine polled the nation's sports writers, radio announcers, the public and soldiers at Fort Polk, La. in order to uncover the six greatest sporting events of the century. Gene Tunney's victory over Jack Dempsey -the famed Long Count Fight - was voted No. 1 followed by Bobby Jones' victories in the U.S. and British Amateur golf championships

Next came Jesse Owens' performance in the 1932 Olympics, the 1926 World Series pitching of Grover Cleveland Alexander, Babe Ruth's 1932 World Series clout over the right-center field fence - just where he had said he would put it — and Red Grange's five touchdowns in a 39-14 Illinois victory over Michigan .

Gus Dorais and Knute Rockne arrived at Notre Dame at about the same time in September of 1910, both young and both broke. The pair, who were later to become immortals as players and coaches, decided some income must be had. # Major Loopholes

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. has been presented a "Friend of the Press" award to recognize his work on Itgislation designed to offer more protection for the people's right to know. Specifically, the speaker was praised by the group giving the award, the Texas chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism society, for open meetings, newsmen's shield and open records legislation.

It's true that the speaker has been an ardent supporter of legislation to protect the right to know; the bills formed part of his "reform" package submitted to the House. And the legislature has spent a lot of time on this legislation, to its credit.

But what is emerging from Austin in the form of completed legislation is something less than what was desired, particularly as pertains to the open meetings law now passed by both houses.

Texas already has an open meetings law on the books; the effort at this session of the legislature was to improve upon it and strengthen it. Not all of that goal has been met

The newly written law is an improvement in some important areas; it more clearly defines such terms as "meeting" and "quorum," and eliminates therefore troubling ambiguities in the present law, which have made it difficult to enforce. It increases penalties for open meetings law volations. Perhaps most importantly, it includes legislative committees for the first time.

But amendments added to the basic law in the Senate weaken it, and could result in less, not more, protection of the right to know, if the loopholes now included are stretched out of shape

One section of the new law reads: "Private consultations between a governmental body and its attorney are not permitted except in those instances in which contemplated litigation, settlement offers, and matters where the duty of a public body's counsel to his client, pursuant to the Code of Professional Responsibility of the

State Bar of Texas, clearly conflicts with this act." The troublesome phrase is "contemplated litigation." That could be construed by a governmental body intent on avoiding doing the public's business in public to cover virtually anything.

Another section reads: "The public may be excluded from that portion of a meeting during which a discussion is had with respect to the purchase, exchange, lease or value of real property, negotiated contracts for prospective gifts or donations to the State or governmental body, when such discussions would have a detrimental effect on the negotiating position of the governmental body as between such body and a third person, firm or corporation."

This section was adopted at the request of University of Texas regent Frank Erwin. It appears to be an unnecessary loophole and, like the previously mentioned section, an invitation to less scrupulous public bodies to close meetings for convenience rather than good reason. There might be some argument over whether discussions of property purchase should be closed, along lines that revealing purchase plans might drive up the price an official body might have to pay. But bodies with the power of condemnation would suffer scant hardship even in those instances. There is hardly any reason apparent for closing

Dispelling Myths

THE MYTH: Women should stick to "women's jobs" and shouldn't compete for "men's jobs".

THE REALITY: Jobs, with extremely rare exceptions, are sexless. Tradition rather than job content has led to labeling certain jobs as women's and others as men's. In measuring 22 inherent aptitudes and knowledge areas, a research laboratory found that there is no sex difference in 14, women excel in 6, and men excel in 2.

THE MYTH: Women don't want responsibility on the job; they don't want promotions or job changes which add to their load.

THE REALITY: Relatively few women have been offered positions of responsibility. But when given these opportunities, women, like men, do cope with job responsibilities in addition to personal or family responsibilities. In 1971, 4.3 million women held professional and technical jobs, another 1.5 million worked as nonfarm managers, officials and proprietors. Many others held supervisory jobs at all levels in offices and factories.

THE MYTH: The employment of

mothers lead to juvenile delinquency. THE REALITY: Studies show that many factors must be considered when seeking the causes of juvenile delinquency. Whether or not a mother

THE MYTH: Men don't like to work for women supervisors.

THE REALITY: Most men who complain about women supervisors have never worked for a woman. In one study where at least three-fourths of both the male and female respondants (all executives) had worked with women managers, their evaluation of women in management was favorable. On the other hand, the study showed a traditional cultural bias among those who reacted unfavorably to women as managers.

In another survey in which 41 per cent of the reporting firms indicated that they hired women executives, none rated their performance as unsatisfactory; 50 per cent rated them adequate; 42 per cent rated them the same as their predecessors; and 8 per cent rated them better than their predecessors.

IN SUMMING up facts about women workers. Mrs. Taylor emphasized that half of all women 18 to 64 years of age are workers, with about one-fourth of women holding part-time jobs. Most women work because of economic need, yet they are concentrated in low-paying dead end jobs. As a result, the average worker earns about three-fifths of what a man does, even when both work full time year round.

Men's attitudes concerning equal pay for working women has become more realistic and favorable in recent years as men realize to what degree their wives are helping "bring home the bacon". THE FIRST point is easily disposed of by asking ourselves the question, Did Shakespeare have a good vocabulary? Yes; and he also used, however sparingly, profane and obscene words.

The second point raises the question of whether a certain kind of emotion is readily communicable with the use of other than certain kinds of words. Let us assume the only thing it is safe to assume about the matter, namely that every emotion is experienced by everyone, from the darkest sinner to the most uplifted



Pass Opening lead: Three of  $\Diamond$ West's substandard overcall of one heart backfired in a strange manner in today's hand.

After North's free bid of one spade, South made a strong effort to reach slam by cue bidding West's suit and then jumping in clubs. When North did no more than carry on to game, the latter quit-altho with some reluctance.

West, influenced perhaps by his opponent's cue bid in hearts, chose to open the three of diamonds, which placed considerable pressure upon the declarer. With some other lead, South can draw trumps, take a spade finesse in either direction, and subsequently use the ace of diamonds to enter dummy for a heart discard on the established jack of spades. He can hardly fail to win 11 tricks - seven clubs, one diamonds, one heart, and two spades.

The diamond opening, however, deprives South of his reentry to the North hand, before a second spade trick has been established. If he plays the ace of diamonds, draws trump and subsequently takes a spade finesse, the final result will be a two trick set. After East takes the king of spades, South must still lose three hearts.

Declarer realized his predicament, and after a careful analysis he uncovered a plan that made allowance for the king of spades being offside. At trick one, he played the jack of diamonds from dummy! East won the trick with the king and made the natural shift to his singleton three of hearts.

South played the ace and drew trump in three rounds with the A-K-Q of clubs. He now led a spade and finessed North's jack. East was in with the king, however, he had no safe exit. Whether he returned a spade or a diamond, North must regain the lead and South is able to discard his three losing hearts on the ace-queen of spades and the ace of diamonds. His only losers on the deal were one diamond and one spade.

Had East continued with a diamond at trick two, declarer would have been unable to effect his plan; however, he had nothing to lose by trying. The one heart overcall had marked West with at least a five card suit, so that East had at most one heart. When he wins the opening lead, the temptation to shift to his singleton is hard to resist; and once South strips out the clubs. the spade finesse can be taken with complete assurance.

Rehearsals and filming of the picture will not interfere with school work. After the picture has been completed it will be shown at the Cinema.


