AT LEAST TWO Tornados Thrashing **Texarkana**

By The Associated Press

At least two tornadoes slashed into Texarkana as storms causing floods and widespread damage surged eastward out of Texas today.

While property suffered heavily and there were an undetermined number of injuries, police said there was no word of deaths from the twisters in Texarkana.

The funnel clouds dipped down near daylight after near-cloudbursts and thunderstorms laden with hail inflicted considerable loss in a nightlong march over much of Texas.

Police reported one tornado struck the west part of Texarkana close to U.S. 59 south, wrecking several sales firm and causing some damage to the Southwest Mall - a shopping center still in the process of being enclosed.

CREDIT CARDS Consumer Protection Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) - In a victory for consumers, the Supreme Court today upheld a federal regulation requiring disclosure of credit costs on items to be paid for in more than four installments. The decision stemmed from a dispute over

the costs of magazine subscriptions but its impact was likely to reach the entire \$100-billion-plus consumer credit industry in a variety of areas.

Specifically, the court upheld the Federal Reserve Board's so-called four-installment rule. The board fashioned the rule under authority granted by Congress in the 1968 Truth-In-Lending Act.

"Congress has determined that such purchasers are in need of protection," wrote Chief Justice Warren E. Burger for the majority. "The four-installment rule serves to insure that the protective disclosure mechanism chosen by Congress will not be circumvented."

Three other justices agreed with Burger's opinion. Justices William O. Douglas, Potter Stewart and William H. Rehnquist said they approved the four-installment rule, but would send the case to a lower court for more information on the facts involved. Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. dissented.

The case arose in 1969 when Leila Mourning, a widow living in Dade County, Fla., balked at paying the second installment on magazine subscriptions she had purchased from Family Publications Service Inc.

> Watergate Scandal

SAN LUIS OBISPO (AP) – Dr. Timothy Leary has been sent to Folsom State Prison to serve from six months to five years for escaping from the California Men's Colony.

Superior Court Judge Richard F. Harris ordered the sentence on Monday and ruled that Leary, 42, must serve the time consecutively with an earlier term of six months to 10 years for marijuana possession. A probation officer had recommended Leary be allowed to serve

the sentences concurrently. Leary, a former Harvard lecturer, was serving that sentence when he escaped from the men's colony here three years ago and fled to Europe.

The judge denied a bail request, saying bail would be inappropriate because Leary allegedly had told his probation officer he would escape again at the first opportunity.

Ship Raid Nets Pot, Cocaine

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) - More than 1,300 pounds of marijuana and an estimated \$1.4-million worth of cocaine has been seized by federal agents who waded through bilgewater and crawled through narrow pipes in a rusty Latin American freighter, authorities said.

The crewmen of the freighter "think it's a game," the agent in charge of the search said.

"We tear something up and they hide something in it," said Ira Morris, the senior U.S. Customs agent. "It's been like that since we started."

Three Killed East Of Abilene

ABILENE, Tex. (AP) - Three members of an East Texas family were killed and a fourth injured in a car-truck collision on Interstate 20, northeast of Abilene Monday.

Officers identified the dead as Mr. and Mrs. Emmitt Moore, both 55, and their daughter, Sandra, 25, of Detroit, Tex.

Listed in critical condition Monday in an Abilene hospital was a grandson, Ricky Dale Moore, 2.

According to officers, the Monday evening mishap occured when an eastbound tractor-trailer, driven by George D. Wright, 59, of Brownwood. apparently went out of control on the wet pavement and careened across a grassy median, colliding with the Moore vehicle.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Watergate scandal continues to boil after fresh reports of evidence that the White House tried to cover up the facts behind the wiretapping.

There were these new developmentsr -Sources close to the Senate's Watergate investigation said President Nixon surely was aware of a coverup, and that evidence indicates top presidential aides H. R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman participated in the coverup.

-A lawyer for Nixon's campaign finance committee gave court officials three cartons of secret campaign spending records which had been withheld in apparent violation of an agreement to furnish them last November. He said they include payroll records containing the names of two of the Watergate conspirators.

-Transcripts of testimony before the Watergate grand jury quoted convicted wiretapper James W. McCord Jr. as saying under oath that he had been offered executive clemency if he would remain silent about the conspiracy and serve more than a year in jail.

-White House spokesman Gerald Warren again denied that Nixon had advance knowledge of plans for wiretapping Democratic headquarters last June.

The Senate sources Monday declined to go into detail about evidence of a coverup, but said the operation included "attempts to pressure other officials in the government to go along.

The sources said these other officials included ranking members of the Justice Department and of the FBI.

Ehrlichman and Haldeman, whom the sources said appeared to be part of the coverup operation, have hired a lawyer to represent them in the Watergate case.

May Consider **Raising Taxes**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nixon administration may consider raising some taxes if the country's booming economy can't be brought under control in other ways, says the President's top economic adviser.

Something in the tax field would be a natural thing to consider and we do think about it," Herbert F. Stein, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, told a news conference Monday.

HIGH PRIORITY

Stein warned of the danger of a possible recession, saying the present rate of expansion of the economy "could generate forces that would cause more of a slow-down than we want."

He also said the administration has given up on its goal of holding inflation this year to three per cent. Some economists now say it could be as high as five per cent, he said, but declined to make his own estimate beyond saying it would be less than in recent months.

Serious Tug-Of-War

Crisis is a word spun too readily from the tongue, but none can doubt there is a serious problem in the political tug-o'-war on the Potomac.

Sen. Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr., D-Texas, has called it a constitutional crisis that the Congress must win.

Dr. Louis Fisher, political scientist-Library of Congress analyst, called it a "beginning crisis" and "I don't know of anyone who can see how it's going to be resolved.'

Dr. Fisher is subject to the Washington-based "Chicken-Little" syndrome, perhaps, because the Constitution points the way out of the problem.

The beginnings of a solution to the stand-off can already be seen:

A federal court has ruled that the President may not repeal a law (in this case, he may not dismantle the OEO, created by the Congress).

A number of Republican party leaders have abandoned the President on his too-sweeping "executive privilege" and his agonizing delay in helping clear up the Watergate story. John Mitchell, whose people were caught in the burglary, said he "can't wait" to tell his story. Obviously,

the President can. But, sooner or later, he must tell the full story.

The Congress has recognized its responsibilities haven't been well handled over many years. Leaders have concluded that essential reforms will be made: better money management, changes in committee work and capricious privilege that had been sacrosanct too long. 

Agnew Misused

WASHINGTON - In a flagrant criticism was carefully edited out of falsehood, the semi-official Athens News Agency, which operates under the thumb of the Greek military dictatorship, misrepresented Vice President Spiro Agnew as delivering a paean of praise about strongman George Papadopoulos in a speech it said he made at Iowa's Drake University on April 13.

THE ATHENS News Agency, in a datelined Washington and storv headlined in the governmentcontrolled Greek press, was actually quoting from a long question-andanswer exchange that the Vice President had with Drake students on March 15, 1972 - more than a full year earlier.

At that time, the Nixon administration's regard for Papadopoulos was much higher than it is today, based on a belief no longer held that Papadopoulos was really moving toward a restoration of parliamentary government and constitutional rights. Agnew made precisely that claim for Papadopoulos in the 1972 Drake speech.

EVEN SO, Agnew, a long-time favorite of the Greek junta which seized power exactly six years ago, carefully noted in his 1972 speech that notall was well with the Greek dictatorship.

"Let's admit," he said, ". . . that Greece is, to some extent, a repressive government." That careful
