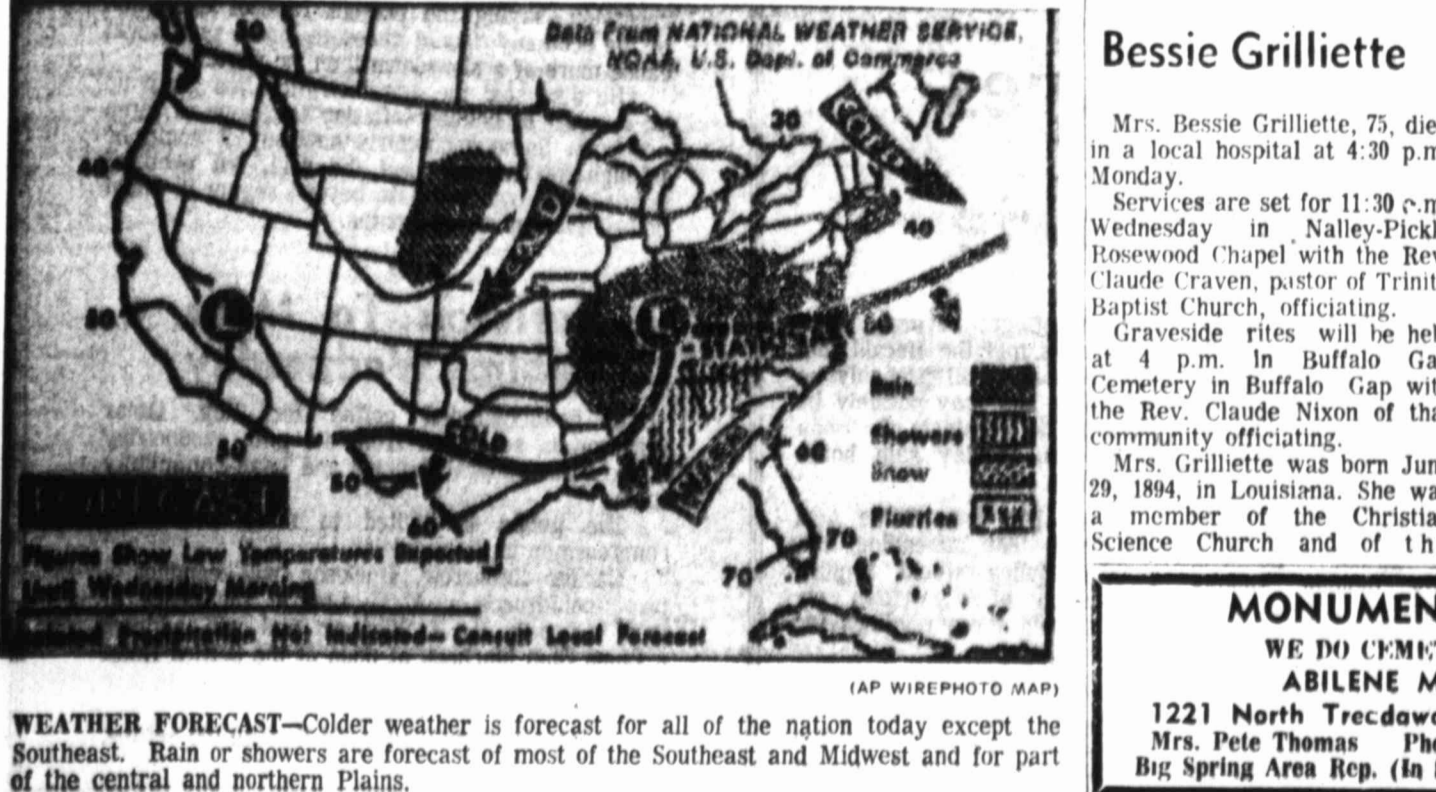

Lions Auxiliary Told Of Children's Camps

Work done by Texas Lions Clubs to aid people handicapped by visual problems was explained by Mrs. Carl Hyde of Midland when she was guest speaker for the May meeting of Downtown Lions Auxiliary.

The work includes teaching the blind how to walk with canes, do household tasks, type, do minor repairs, etc. Through the Lions program, the blind are taught how to care for themselves and to function as useful members of society.

Mrs. Hyde showed slides of the work done by Texas Lions through their summer camps for crippled and diabetic children. Children with these special problems are usually unable to attend other camps. During the camping sessions the diabetics and crippled children have the experience of meeting other children with similar problems and learn to care for themselves. They enjoy, as much as their handicaps will permit, all the activities in which children participate at other camps. This includes swimming, archery, handicrafts and worship services.

Mrs. Hyde said that anyone interested in sending a diabetic or crippled child to one of these camping sessions may obtain application blanks from Robert Penner of the local Lions Club. Positions for counselors at these camps are also available, and applications may be made

by writing to Texas Lions Camps, P.O. Box 247, Kerrville, Texas.

Mrs. Jim Holmes presided at the meeting, which was held at the Officers Club, Webb AFB. Also discussed was the Lions Memorial Fund, through which contributions may be made. An acknowledgment of the donation is then sent to the family of the deceased.

Donations may be sent directly to Texas Lions Camps at Kerrville, or an interested party may contact Mrs. D. S. Riley, of Big Spring, a permanent member of the board for the Lions League for Crippled Children, or Ernest Boyd of the Downtown Lions Club.

KIDS EYE FOOD PRICES 'Make Some Dough, Stick In Something'

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Have rising food prices and difficulties of preparing well-balanced meals got you down? Some kindergarten cooking buffs may be able to solve your problem.

"With food prices going up and nutrition being emphasized, I asked my two classes what recipes they would recommend," said Kathy Stock.

The classes are the two kindergarten sections at Cartwright Elementary School in Northwest Phoenix.

David Standley recommended pancakes. "Need flour, water, canned milk. Take and put on stove and start cooking it," he said.

For lunch a grilled cheese sandwich was suggested by Kim Musgrove. "Need

butter, bread and cheese. Take a pan and put the grilled cheese in it and cook it."

For meat loaf, "Get some meat," said Blue Neville. "Put some onions in it. Put juice in it. Put in oven. Put stripes on it. Then it's done."

A good recipe for cheese omelet was recommended by Michelle Florence. "Need cheese, egg, and pan. Put cheese in when it's boiling and then turn it over and then put on stove. Takes one minute."

Uhris Porak said for strawberry pudding you use:

"One quart of milk and three cups of sugar and then put in one bowl and then take this thing with two beaters and put three eggs in while stirring. Put in refrigerator for awhile."

"Get a jar of peanut butter," said Mike

Daugherty in describing how to make peanut cookies. "Put peanut butter in pan and bake in pan." Donnie Farmer said for soft boiled eggs, "put eggs in cookie can and put on a platter and eat them."

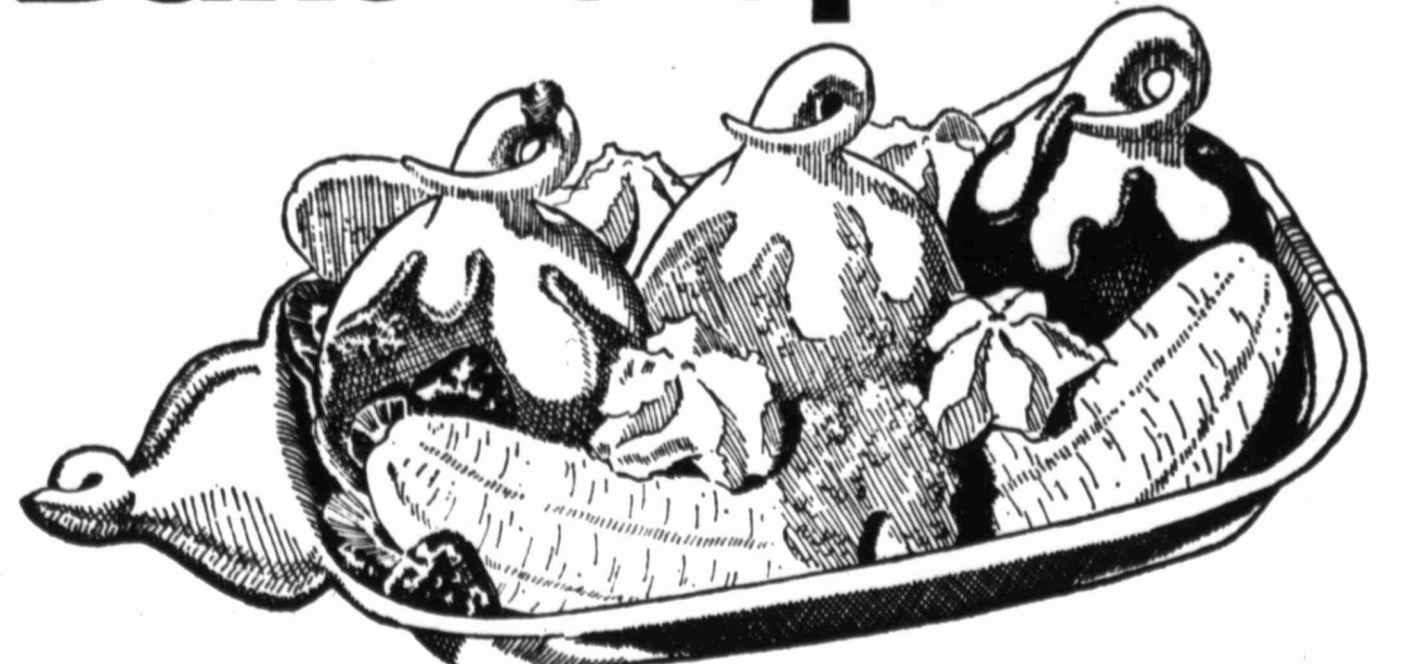
A cupcake recipe came from Sam Riter. "Make some dough and stick in something and cook it. Wipe in designs and put stuff on it."

For scrambled eggs, Michael McCall directed. "Take some grease. Crack the eggs and then stir them and eat them and cook while you're stirring."

South's insistence on playing a suit contract was a questionable bit of judgment, but once having made his decision, he handled himself very commendably in the play.

Perhaps North should have bid three clubs over two hearts. If South by some chance had a preference for diamonds, slam was not out of the question. When North, instead, jumped to three no trump, it was unlikely that he held a fit for either of South's suits, and the latter might have left well enough alone.

After South persisted to four hearts, North was

obliged to show a preference for spades—which became the final contract.

West opened the five of clubs and the king was played from dummy. South observed that his trump holding was a bit shaky and he decided to single in as many spades as possible by ruffing. At trick two, he cashed North's other high club, discarding a diamond, and then he ruffed a club with the three of spades. When West dropped the queen of clubs, declarer decided to abandon that suit.

He next played the ace and another heart, trumping in dummy. The ace of diamonds was followed by a diamond ruff and another heart was ruffed with dummy's remaining trump. Declarer's careful timing netted him the first eight tricks, and at the same time reduced West to his five trumps.

A diamond was led from dummy and when East covered North's spot with the jack, South discarded a heart. West was obliged to trump with the six of spades and then lead away from his tenace. South won the trick with the ten of spades.

A heart was returned and West ruffed once more only to surrender the last two tricks to declarer's ace-queen of spades. In all, West was limited to exactly two trump tricks—a very neat performance by South.

Water Consumers Save \$90,000 In Quarter

A wet and cold winter, a late supply, which as of March 31 were 223,400 acre-feet in Lake J. B. Thomas and Lake E. V. Spence and were 77,000 acre-feet more than the same time a year ago, the district has reactivated its weather modification program as of April 15.

Revenues for the first three months of the year to Colorado River Municipal Water District have amounted to \$1,089,177, whereas the same time a year ago they were \$1,178,675.

Of this difference, \$32,000 has come in lower municipal demands, which produced \$600,156 in revenues. Oil and industrial demands also were down by about \$52,000, generating only \$477,513 for the first quarter. Recreation revenues were up by some \$2,000 in reaching \$11,366, reflecting higher levels of lakes. However, the Perkins-Prothro pipeline has been inactivated, leaving a \$5,755 shortage of revenue here.

Expenses for the first quarter, exclusive of debt service, were \$306,076, approximately \$1,000 less than the same period last year. Most of this resulted in less power costs to deliver the lower volume of water. The difference between operation costs and revenue is transferred to the net revenue fund, mostly applicable to repaying of bonds and interest.

For the first quarter, customers were billed for 3,370,635,000 gallons, or some 680,000,000 gallons less than for the same period in 1972. Municipal deliveries of 1.992 billion gallons in the first quarter was off by about 52 million gallons, thus bulk of the decline was in mining and industrial consumption.

Immunizations Offered Here

Immunizations required for public school and college students are being given free at the City-County Health Unit at 201 Lancaster each Tuesday.

Vaccinations against diphtheria-tetanus, measles and

rubella, as well as oral vaccine against polio are given from 8-11 a.m. and from 1-4 p.m. every Tuesday by health nurse Mrs. Kay Pomeroy.

"Children, especially, must have had these immunizations to get in school in September," she said. "People should start

coming in now because there will be a last-minute crowd in August."

Immunization records are kept at the health unit. The polio and DPT series should be started at the age of two

months. Measles and rubella vaccinations can be given only to those under the age of 15.

Mrs. Pomeroy said anyone needing the immunizations may come in any Tuesday. No appointment is necessary.

PAID \$1,000 PER ACRE Shortage Causes Onions To Command High Prices

SAN BENITO, Tex. (AP)—Onion prices are higher in the Lower Rio Grande Valley—and the price is going to be reflected on your grocery bill—but it makes for good times here in this southernmost part of Texas.

Bill Cowden, general manager of Alexander Marketing Co., said Monday some farmers have been paid as much as \$1,000 per acre for their onion crops.

At the highest price they've ever been in the Valley, Cowden said jumbo onions are going at \$15 to \$17 per 50-pound bag. A year ago you could buy more than you wanted for \$2.50 a bag.

Last year's Hurricane Agnes which swept across the Eastern Seaboard and a cold, wet winter are blamed for the rise in prices. The wet winter here changed many of the onions to seed stems before they could be harvested.

Hurricane Agnes, said a farm leader, virtually wiped out crops that would have been harvested last year around Wilkes Barre and Scranton, Pa., that would have gone into storage.

"Before the South Texas onions came in, the storage onions ran out, causing a tremendous shortage of onions everywhere," said Willie Deines of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers and Shippers Association.

Bud Taylor said there is a worldwide shortage of onions and later in the year Valley growers will start shipping them to Europe. He said onions are being sold at premium prices just as fast as they can be processed.

Nobody said so, but it is conceivable that a hamburger with a big slice of Bermuda onion on it might cost more at the local franchise house before the summer gets hot.

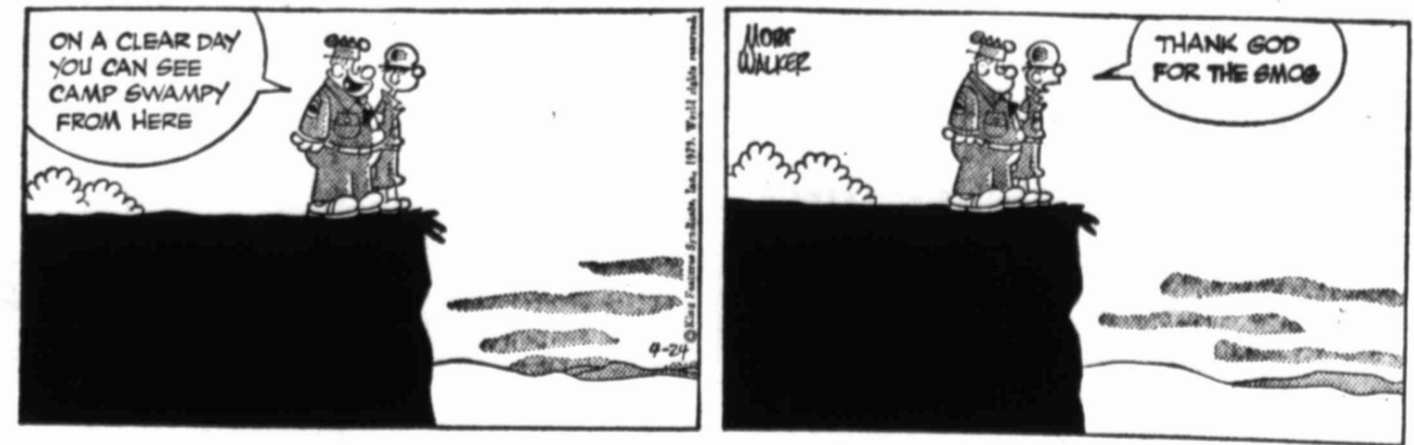

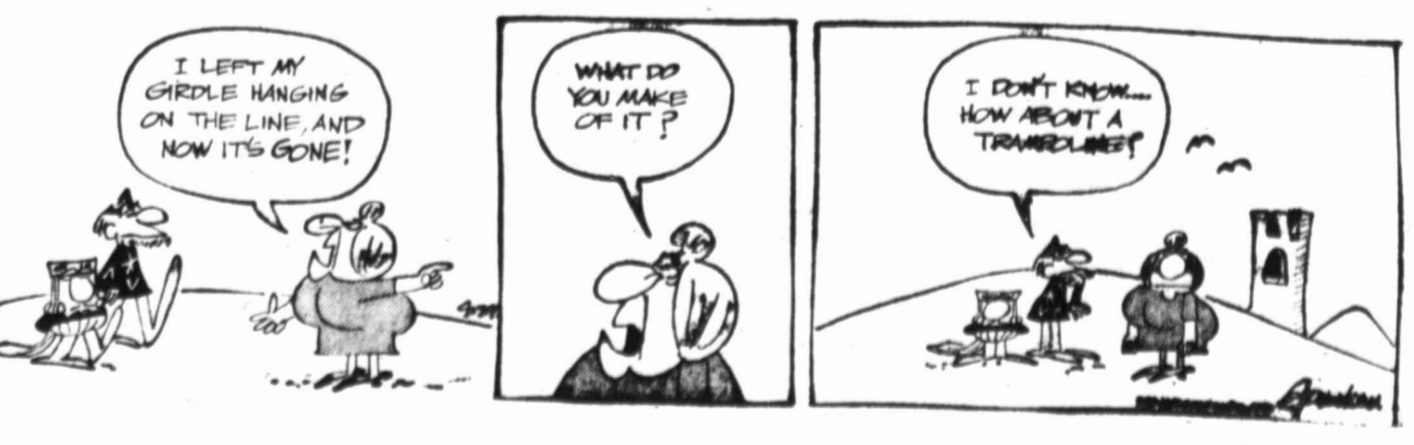

Farmers Could Get U.S. Payments For Drought

President Nixon signed legislation which will compensate farmers in Howard and most other Texas counties for up to \$5,000 in damages sustained because of the drought between Jan. 1 and June 19, 1972, the Farmers Home Administration here learned Monday afternoon.

Farmers who can verify uninsured crop losses compared to their normal crop may apply for one per cent loans for damages. This money must be used to current operating expenses, said Larry F. Bratcher, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration.

Income is not considered in determining eligibility for the loans with forgiveness. Operating farmers, not retired farmers or landlords, may qualify.

Any ranchers who can show losses due to the drought period may obtain the loans with forgiveness. Local Farmers Home Administration county committees will determine who qualifies for assistance.

May 8 is the deadline for application.

Howard and Glasscock County farmers may apply at the Farmers Home Administration office in room 220 of the Federal Building in Big Spring.

Credit Union Seeks Merger

Lt. Col. Jerry S. Grimes, president of the Webb AFB Federal Credit Union, announced here Monday evening that Lt. Col. James Lockley, president of the directors of the Laredo AFB Credit Union, has requested a proposed merger with the Webb credit union.

Laredo AFB's credit union has 3,963 members and \$3,339,239 in total assets.

Grimes noted that the merger proposal stems from closure of Laredo AFB in Laredo by the Department of Defense as part of the major cutback in military spending.

Laredo is one of only two military installations in Texas to be closed by the DOD. The other is Fort Wolters Army Post and Helicopter Training School at Mineral Wells. Webb AFB FCU operates a branch office at Fort Wolters.

Webb AFB FCU members will consider the proposed merger between Laredo AFB CU and their credit union at a special

meeting of the members at Withycombe Hall, on May 3, at 5:00 p.m.

Members will then have until June 1, 1973 to vote on the proposal.

If the merger between the two credit unions is approved the assets of Webb AFB FCU would then become \$18,036,031.

The field of membership of Webb AFB FCU, upon approval, would include civilian employees of the U.S. Government in Webb County and adjacent counties not receiving full membership privileges from another employee-type credit union, military personnel stationed in Webb County and adjacent counties.
