Two Webb Airmen Killed

A pilot and a student from Webb Air Force Base were apparently killed instantly at 11:20 a.m. today when their T-38 crashed into an irrigation canal near the Twin Buttes Reservoir southwest of San Angelo.

A witness at the scene related that apparently the plane was coming in for some type of practice landing and lost power as it was headed west

to east across an irrigation canal. The plane crashed into the canal and hurled wreckage for several miles. One body was apparently found in the canal and one was thrown clear, according to witnesses.

Webb Air Force base released an official statement at 12:20 p.m. that they had just learned of the accident and that there were "military casualties." A team of Webb officials departed immediately for the scene. Names of the fatalities were withheld pending notification of relatives. An accident investigation

AUSTIN (AP) - The Senate approved two bills 30-0 today that would allow the University of Texas and the state to take oil and gas - instead of money - for royalties on land leases.

Sen. W. E. Snelson, D-Midland, said such an arrangement would give the university and the state the advantage of selling the oil and gas and possibly getting more money than it would from accepting money as royalty.

Also, Snelson said, it could prevent gas shortages such as Texas has experienced within the

FLOOD LEVELS OF RIVERS DIP

Thousands Still Homeless

Major sandbagging efforts on levees along the Mississippi River north of the St. Louis area have halted for the first time in days as the mighty river began "flattening out" along southeastern Missouri and cresting southward.

More than 10 million acres of land, much of it prime farmland, remained under water along the the Mississippi's 1,500 mile route and thousands of families were left homeless.

DISPLACED The Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Small Business Administration. the Internal Revenue Service and other federal agencies moved in to assist families and businesses displaced by flood

The Army Corps of Engineers said 35,000 persons had been evacuated along the Mississippi from the area between Hannibal, Mo., to the Gulf of Mexico. Some were being placed in federal and state housing projects. Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz is scheduled to make an



The United Nations Security Council has completed another of its exercises in futility. It passed a resolution condemning Israel's military attacks in Lebanon. The resolution also deplored "all acts of violence which endanger or take human lives." This was a vague reference to Palestinian terrorists.

The resolution was toothless. There was no proposal of sanctions against Israel or against some of the Arab states and the Soviet Union which support the terrorists.

There were four abstentions which point up how meaningless the "action" was. The United States abstained because the resolution did not provide "the even-handed condemnation" of the Palestinians who perpetrated the murders in Khartoum, Sudan, and the Munish Olympic massacre.

China, the Soviet Union and Guinea abstained because the wording was not strong enough against

Security Council's resolution changed nothing.

Israel has been mostly successful in driving the terrorists away from its borders. With King Hussein, the Israelis kicked Al Fatah out of Jor dan. From there they moved to Syria and then to Lebanon, where a weak government could not control them. Now the guerrillas are returning

to Syria.

Israel's raids into Lebanon are subject to in-

ternational condemnation. They are attacks in a sovereign country. Israel has vowed to go after the Palestinians where they can be found.

In turn, the Palestinians have not backed off their pledge to reclaim their homeland from the Israelis. They have attacked around the globe. claiming many innocents in the process. The guerrillas are backed in words and money

and arms by part of the Arab world and some

of the Communist bloc. The prospects are for more of the same. Israel remains in the driver's seat, almost six years after the Six-Day War in 1967. It is willing to

negotiate, but only directly with the Arab states from which is seized territory. Israeli contempt

for the United Nations is boundless, resulting from previous "guarantees" which did not work.

If there is to be an eventual resolution of the Middle East - and that is vital to the rest of the world - it should come between Israel and the Arab world.

Israel should move to redress the real grievances of the Palestinians, to settle the return of land taken in 1967 and to remove the chip from its shoulder. In turn, the Arabs should get the terrorists in hand, recognize the fact that Israel does exist will likely continue to exist, and so reach an accomodation.

These events are unlikely in the immediate future. But until they happen, or begin to happen, more bloodletting and more futile U.N. gestures are to be expected.

Works Both Ways

By law a man in military service is automatically entitled to dependency benefits for his wife. This includes a housing allowance and medical and dental benefits.

But a servicewoman can get dependency benefits for a civilian husband only if she can prove she furnishes more than half of his support. The Defense Department is recommending to Congress that this be changed and the servicewoman given equal dependency rights. Some say that by enlisting more women, fewer men have to be enlisted.

One wise purveyor of just such advice has been Secretary of State William P. Rogers, the suave old pal who helped Mr. Nixon through some of his other self-styled "crises." It will probably stay concealed until Mr. Nixon gives his own version of Watergate to the American people, now planned for this week.

WE WORSHIP the gun. If there isn't a pistol, a rifle or a cannon handy, we'll take after each other with a razor, a switch-blade or a mudball.

Homicide rates have doubled for men, and increased by 50 per cent for women, in the United States compared to 15 years ago. The Canadians must live too close to us, because the incidence of homicide is up dramatically there, too.

OBVIOUSLY, man finds living more tolerable in both Western Europe and Japan. Homicide rates in both places either declined or showed little change, during the past 15 years.


According to the study, the homicide rate for white males in the U.S. in 1968, the latest year for which official figures are available, was about three times higher than in Canada, more than ten times that by the laws of the land.

THE PENCHANT for violence is especially noticeable among the young men in the 25-44 age group. Their hatreds are often a little more intense. They are prone to kill without compassion, knowing full well that they probably will not even be prosecuted, much less punished.

PSYCHIATRISTS will insist the incidence of murder has skyrocketed because there has been a marked decline in traditional values in most segments of society.

I prefer the more realistic view. that society itself is playing by two different sets of rules. The individuals with the criminal bent are fully conscious of that fact and are exploiting it. They live by the harshest code, secure in the knowledge that their rights will be fully protected



NEW YORK (AP) - Whenever you hear about what "the public" is doing in the stock market, you should take note of the latest figures on institutional ownership. The public is probably an insurance company or a pension fund.

Continuing a 25-year trend, the multibillion dollar institutions raised their percentage of ownership last year and now account for nearly 30 per cent of all stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

But that is only the official figure. Data doesn't exist for several institutional categories, such as bankadministered personal trusts and investment - counseling organizations; so they are not included in the figure. Neither are holdings of mutual funds not registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission, foreign institutions or private hedge funds and nonbank trusts. "Undoubtedly, the inclusion of all

groups would raise the total of all institutional holdings to, perhaps, 45 per cent of the NYSE list," the exchange conceded in releasing the percentages.

And even then, the real story isn't complete. As they grew, the institutions became more vigorous traders; and on some days, they now account for 60 or 70 per cent of all t ansactions. They dominate the Big

most amazing institutional growth of all has been by the corporate pension funds, which now own 180 times more stock than in 1949, when their holdings were \$500 million. At \$90 billion, their holdings have doubled in five years.

In second place are mutual funds, with NYSE assets of a bit more than \$50 billion, followed by insurers with \$40 billion and conprofit institutions, mainly college endowments and foundations, with just under that

One conclusion to be made is this: While there are 30 million shareholders today, millions of them in the past few years seemingly prefer to invest indirectly - through institutions rather than through brokers. One of the more serious problems facing "The Street" in coming years is the matter of liquidity, or the ability to match buy and sell orders without incurring sharp rises or falls

While there were many millions of small, active traders, there always was a random mix of orders, and the NYSE prided itself on its ability to match buy and sell requests with only fractional price changes.

With the rise of institutions, and the speed-up of portfolio turnover, price changes in some stocks have become sharper. It is more difficult to match the huge blocks of stocks that institutions deal in.

It is partly for this reason that some of the more far-sighted members of the investment community have been trying of late to be pleasanter to small investors.

My mother and I have never had a good relationship, because we're just too different in our ways. Also, my best friends are beginning to change. They act snobbish. One thing I know, it's not me that's changing, because my cousins told me so. Dr. Graham, what can I do - things are steadily getting worse. J.JL Let me speak first of your friends, then of your mother, then yourself.

Here's an old saying that applies to all three: "All men have their frailties, and whosever looks for a friend without imperfections, will never find what he seeks. We love ourselves notwithstanding our faults, and we ought to love our friends in like manner.' The fact that your cousins confirm

your feelings proves nothing. Blood relationships often obscure the truth. Of course your friends change just as you do - and the mature person is one who can absorb changing incidentals, and not lose changeless values. The Bible says (Proverbs 27:6) "Faithful are the wounds of a friend." I would seek the help of God immediately to restore the damaged friendship.

Then with your mother, you need a whole new view of that relationship. It is an obligation under God, in which you give her love and honor. It is not an option where you attempt merely to reconcile differences. You have far too easily accepted a sort of parental estrangement, and the immediate repair of that is another assignment I give you.

Pride is an insidious thing. It creeps in our character and ruins every human relationship it can touch. You need the new life of faith in Christ, which can give you a new purpose to live, and a new power to love friend, family and everyone.

Coffee Resists Uniformity

WHIPPANY, N.J. (AP) - Varying coffee-drinking habits around the world dictate variations in automatic vending machines which dispense the drink, according to Earl C. Ramsey, president of Rowe International, which manufactures such machines.

Those made for the Japanese market, for example, have to produce coffee that is two and a half times sweeter than the accepted American standard. For the Swedish market, the coffee machine must turn out a cup twice as strong as ours. Machines made for some South American countries must have coin slots that are easily adjusted for frequent inflationary price changes.

And there are problems right in the United States. Women, more and more of whom are being hired to service machines, don't like to bend over, says Ramsey, so the company has designed its new machines to make it unnecessary to bend over

Honored At Oil Industry Reviewed By Modern Woman's Forum Mady C. Boatright, tells what the oil industry was

oil in Texas goes back to the Indian and Spanish eras, production for commercial use did not begin until 1866 when Lyne Taliaferro Barret struck oil at 106 feet in Oil Spring," said Mrs. Mary E. Brown, Friday to Modern Woman's Forum.

Mrs. Brown said the state's first gusher was brought in the same county, Nacogdoches, and resulted in the first commercial field, first pipeline and first attempt to refine Texas oil. She said early methods of locating oil and drilling wells were crude and surrounded with superstitions. The first attempt to use geology in locating oil was made in 1892 by Patillo Higgins, a Beaumont real

Patillo persuaded three men to join him in forming a company, but after three unsuccessful attempts to find oil, the idea was abandoned.

"Texas oil interest next turned to Corsicana," said Mrs. Brown, "where in 1894 a company engaged to drill water wells found black crude oil instead. This was the beginning of widespread development in other localities of the state. In 1901, large scale production began with the opening of the Spindletop field near Beaumont.

"In 1965, the billionbarrels-a-year production level was reached, placing Texas in the position of 'number one' among the oil producing states."
