Talks Of Shade For Skylab

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — One temperature reading inside the troubled Skylab space station shot to 150 degrees today as the space agency pondered whether to rocket three astronauts up to the lab to unroll a curtain-like device to shield the craft from the searing rays of the sun.

At least one of the astronauts would have to take a space walk to install the aluminized curtain, which would be about 12 feet by 40 feet in size. Training required for the tricky task could delay the planned Sunday launching of the Skylab 1 astronauts.

The sun shade is the option receiving the most attention from experts who are coping with what to do about the high temperatures that presently make the orbiting laboratory uninhabitable.

HIGH READINGS

They say the high readings, which have risen steadily since the craft was launched Monday, are the main barrier to sending astronauts Charles Conrad Jr., Dr. Joseph P. Kerwin and Paul J. Weitz into space Sunday to link up with the 85-ton lab.

Mission Control reported today that throughout the night radio commands frequently shifted the attitude of the Skylab so that different areas were exposed to the sun.

Copter Crash Claims Seven

FT. KNOX, Ky. (AP) — Seven soldiers were killed early today when an Army helicopter crashed during a flight to evaluate a new night vision device, a base spokesman said.

The wreckage of the helicopter was found at 8:20 this morning, nearly eight hours after the craft was due to return to the base.

A search for the chopper was launched when the UH-1H helicopter failed to return to the post's Godman Army Air Field at 12:35 a.m. as scheduled.

The wreckage was found about two miles north of Muldraugh, Ky., nearly four miles north of the base airfield, the base spokesman said.

Names of the dead were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Many Grads Here To Study Trades

Of the 325 spring graduates at Big Spring High School, around 2/3 of the class will probably enter either a four-year college, a junior college or a trade school. Only 20 per cent will enter a four-year college.

Of that group, probably only 15 per cent will complete a four-year college course. Many will complete trade courses. The largest percentage attend junior colleges and many of these eventually finish their course, although not always in four years.

This is according to counselors at the high school, who estimate that a very small percentage of the class — possibly only one or two per cent will go into the military service immediately.

Around 20 per cent of the class have already married or plan to marry within three months after graduation. Most of these will then find themselves in the position of having to go immediately to work, although a small group will try to marry and attend college as well, counselors point out.

Deputy Slain, Jail Two Men

ANGLETON, Tex. (AP) — A sheriff's deputy was shot to death Tuesday night while answering a disturbance call at Old Ocean, a small Brazoria County community.

He was James Douglas, 25, Freeport, a deputy only since April 1. Sheriff Robert Gladney said two men were being held in jail. Gladney said Douglas answered a disturbance call and a scuffle developed after the deputy arrived at the scene.

Election Commission Proposed By President

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spurred by Watergate revelations, President Nixon asked Congress today to create a special bipartisan commission to conduct "a complete re-examination of our system of elections and campaign practices."

ABUSES
In a special message, Nixon said "recent disclosures of widespread abuses during the presidential campaign of 1972" make reform an urgent and essential priority item to "help restore the faith of the American people in the integrity of their political processes."

While not once mentioning the word Watergate in his message or in a companion address prepared for radio broadcast, Nixon said many more disclosures of 1972 campaign misdeeds "will doubtless soon be

made." The President submitted a proposed joint resolution that would create a 17-member Nonpartisan Commission on Election Reform that would be called on to submit a final report by Dec. 1.

NOTHING
The commission's mandate would be as broad as the federal election process itself," Nixon said. "Nothing would be excluded."

Nixon specifically urged that the commission consider the wisdom of a constitutional amendment that would limit a president to a single six-year term and double the tenure of House members to four years.

While expressing no personal opinion on presidential tenure," Nixon said, "Personally, I have long favored the four-year term

for members of the House, with half of the members elected every two years."

KNOWLEDGE
Here's how the membership of the commission would be selected: Congress would appoint four Democrats and four Republicans, two each from the Senate and House. The chairman of the Democratic and Republican National Committees automatically would serve. The President would choose seven members, no more than four from the same political party, "for their experience, knowledge and perspective in this field."

Commission members would elect their own chairman and vice chairman "to further ensure the commission's complete independence."

Nixon, in his radio talk, said the panel would be "in no way competitive with the Senate's Ervin committee" which will begin televised hearings on the Watergate scandal on Thursday. Rather, he said, "the new commission will draw on information being developed by the Ervin committee, and also on other studies of past campaign abuses."

MONEY LIMITS
In his address, Nixon listed these examples of the types of reform he felt certain the commission would consider:

—Strict limits on the size of individual campaign contributions;

—Strict limits on the size of campaign contributions of the amount that can be given by business,

labor or professional organizations;

—Strict limits on cash contributions;

—Tightened control over the activities of multiple organizations working for the same candidate;

—Shorter election campaigns;

—New disclosure rules that would simplify not only the filing of reports, but also the public discovery of what was important in those reports;

FREE TIME
—Reducing the cost of reaching the public, as, for example, by making free radio and television time available to candidates, or by revision of the equal time requirements that now restrict broadcasters in their campaign coverage."

Goldwater Urges Nixon To Get Going

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Barry Goldwater urged President Nixon today "to start making moves in the direction of leadership," and Sen. Stuart Symington charged Nixon's chief aides "tried to obstruct justice" by hiding the Watergate affair under a CIA umbrella.

Testimony before the Senate Armed Services committee indicates the ploy didn't work because the CIA refused to go along. But convicted conspirator James W. McCord Jr., says he believes the White House tried to use the cover anyway.

"It is not easy for me to say this about my country or my President," said Goldwater, the 1964 Republican presidential nominee, "but I think the time has come when someone must say to both of them, 'let's get going.'"

Goldwater said "we are witnessing the loss of confidence in America's ability to govern, we are watching the price of gold go to disastrous heights having an equally bad effect upon our stock market."

"We have a far greater responsibility to our children and I might say to ourselves than to allow the sordid Watergate to wash out all other concepts of responsibility," the Arizona continued in a statement.

"I mean responsibility to the world, to our own people and particularly that responsibility which is ours as a world leader to continue to lead. It is to this end that I urge my President to start moves in the direction of leadership which have suffered from lack of an understandable concern about Watergate."

Nixon announced one move today in asking Congress to create a special 17-member nonpartisan commission to completely re-examine the system of elections and campaign practices.

Antitax Granny

MOUND BAYOU, Miss. (AP) — A 63-year-old grandmother who refused to pay taxes to support the Vietnam war says she's willing to face a federal prison sentence rather than renounce her protest.

"I'm too old to be frightened by anything," said Mrs. Martha Tranquill, a registered nurse at Delta Community Hospital in Mound Bayou.

She was sentenced Tuesday in U. S. District Court at Clarksdale to nine months in federal prison after refusing to apologize in court for income tax violations stemming from her protest of American involvement in Southeast Asia.

"The war is still going on and we are pretty much in the same position as we were in 1964. We still have men over there and of course, the corporations are moving in now to set up businesses and exploit the people," said Mrs. Tranquill.

The soft-spoken Springfield, Ill., native said she became a "devoted pacifist after they dropped the bomb in Hiroshima."

Uniform Salary Scale Adopted By HC Board

Howard County Junior College trustees adopted a uniform faculty salary scale Tuesday, both for parttime and fulltime members, and then elected present administrative and teaching staff members to fill places they now hold.

The faculty scales begins with \$7,500 for a beginning teacher Bachelors degree and no experience, and \$8,500 for a master's with no experience, and increases at the rate of \$100 per year up to 22 years and to a maximum of \$11,800 for a Ph.D. with 22 years.

SPELLED OUT
Also spelled out was a scale for special duties ranging from

\$100 for a department head (with only one in the department) up to \$1,000 for coaching major sports (basketball, tennis and golf), \$500 for lesser sports (women's basketball and volleyball and, also rodeo) to \$1,000 for supervising dormitories and \$3,000 for supervising the student union building.

In adopting the scales and electing administrators and faculty members, the board in effect approved a \$600,000 payroll for the next budget year. The instructional cost would be \$384,000 and the special duties another \$21,000.

Administrative payroll, exclusive of the chief executive, would be \$196,000. Faculty adjustments were made at the previous meeting, half of it back dated to the beginning of the school year, and the other half to be included in the new budget year. Administrative adjustments represented an increase of \$7,500.

By consensus, Dr. Thomas Salter, president, is to write into contracts that any instructor's student load falls below 15 semester hours, then additional duties may be assigned (without additional pay) to equate with 15 hours.

Also approved by the board was a contract with Quality Food Service, which currently operates the college cafeteria, for payment based on \$2.45 per day for each student up to 100 and scaling down to \$2.25 per day for 130 and above.

REQUEST OKED

The board honored Ronnie Phillips' request to be relieved of the duties as supervisor of the men's dormitory. It also, with regrets and with appreciation for services to the college, accepted the resignation of Dan Shockey as director of theatre and speech-drama instructor. He has accepted an administrative post with the junior college in Carthage.

Bids were authorized for printing of a college bulletin, a prelude to the approval of the college catalogue, for which bids will be sought. The naming of someone to head the department of business education was tabled because, said Dr. Salter, the number of applicants was insufficient for broad comparison.

'THERE WERE AS GOOD A FOLKS AS THEY COME' Cons Wanted For Questioning In Slayings Of Six On Farm

REYNOLDSVILLE, Ga. (AP) — Authorities today pressed a search for three escaped convicts wanted for questioning in the slayings of six members of a rural family.

RAPE, TORTURE
Sheriff Dan White of Seminole County, said the five men killed were shot in the back of the head from one to seven times each, and the lone woman victim was raped and tortured before she was killed.

He said deputies were concentrating their efforts on find-

ing a car believed stolen by the murderers.

Department director William Beardsley, commenting on the search for the three escaped convicts, said: "There's no point in looking for anybody else. 'The circumstantial evidence is overpowering.'"

He said three persons have been found who can give some description that will help in the investigation.

The escapees had threatened earlier they would "kill any policeman who tries to stop us for any reason."

Police theorize that five male members of the Alday family were gunned down in a night-marish sequence as they returned one by one from a corn field.

NUDE BODY
Later, the nude body of the wife of one of the victims was found in a field six miles away. Authorities said she had been raped and shot to death.

The victims were identified as 66-year-old Ned Alday; his sons Jerry, 35, Chester, 32, and Jimmy, 25; his brother Aubrey,

57; and Jerry's wife, Mary, 25.

"They were as good a folks as they come, and they didn't drink beer, wine or whiskey," said Seminole County Sheriff Dan White. "They were church-going and hard-working."

The five Alday men were found early Tuesday lying face down in a beer can-littered house trailer, each shot in the back of the head. Mary Alday's body was found several hours later. She had been shot in the back of the head and in a shoulder.

EXXON TO SPEND \$400 MILLION Expanding Baytown Plant Into World's Largest Oil Refinery

HOUSTON (AP) — A \$400 million expansion program that will make Exxon Co. USA's Baytown facility the largest oil refinery in the world, has been announced by company officials.

Baton Rouge plant would be expanded from 420,000 to 450,000. Bayway would expand from 255,000 to 285,000. Exxon officials would not confirm that the expansion would make Baytown the largest refinery. Industry sources, however, currently list the 630,000-barrel-a-day refinery operated by Creole Petroleum Corp. at Amuay Bay, Venezuela, as the world's largest.

Both Exxon USA and Creole are affiliates of Exxon Corp. of New York. Wright said investments in supporting facilities such as pipelines, tankers, and industry offshore terminals could increase potential capital commitments to a significantly higher level.

A potential ten-trick swing hinged on West's selection of an opening lead against South's three no trump contract.

The first round of bidding requires no comment. However, South was confronted with an interesting problem when West's one heart overcall was passed back to him. Inasmuch as North was unable to take action, it appeared unlikely that the partnership could score a game in clubs which would require the winning of 11 tricks.

On the other hand, South observed that it would be a cinch to scramble home with

nine tricks at no trump, provided that West led a heart. South accordingly jumped to three to trump which became the final contract.

West gave careful consideration to his opening bid. If he led the queen of hearts to dislodge the king, he would probably establish five tricks for himself in that suit. However, West lacked a quick card of re-entry and he feared that the unit of time surrendered to the declarer, by giving the latter a trick at the outset, might deal the defense a fatal blow.

West decided to lead from his sequence in diamonds in the hope of finding his partner with something in that suit. The king of diamonds was opened and East signaled encouragement with the seven. When the king held, West continued with the queen on which South dropped the jack. A third round of diamonds enabled East to mop up the suit, and now a heart shift thru declarer's king turned the deal into a total rout.

The defense scored four diamond tricks and six hearts for a net profit of 600 points. If West had led the queen of hearts originally, South would have taken all 13 tricks.

Accused Killer's Statement Will Trigger Hot Arguments

EDINBURG, Tex. (AP) — A heated legal argument is expected sometime today when the prosecution attempts to introduce a statement which Antonio Rios Zepeda Jr. allegedly gave officers concerning the San Benito strangulation murders.

SOMETHING STRANGE
Rios Zepeda, 21, of San Benito, is being tried on a charge of murder with malice in the April 11, 1972, slaying of Maria Norma Delgado, 15, a San Benito high school freshman. He is also charged, but is not being tried at this time, in the death

of Patricia Segura, 15, a classmate of the other girl. Cameron County Dist. Atty. Fred Galindo told defense lawyer Joe Cisneros of McAllen as court recessed Tuesday that he would likely get around to evidence concerning the statement "possibly" today.

In the statement, Rios Zepeda told officers he killed the two girls after "something came over me."
Although the statement has not been introduced in the trial, it was read in open court during an examining trial last year before Justice of the Peace Romeo Garza at San Benito. Cisneros and lawyer Johnny Dominguez of Mercedes heatedly protested when Asst. Cameron County Dist. Atty. Johnny Gavito read the statement.

The defense says it will call a number of witnesses, probably including the defendant, in an attempt to convince District Court Judge J.R. Alamia that the statement was not voluntary.

BODY FOUND
District Court Judge H.A. Garcia ruled at Brownsville last year before the case was moved to Hidalgo County on a change of venue that the statement was given voluntarily. The body of Miss Segura was found April 11, 1972, in an irri-

gation canal southwest of San Benito. Miss Delgado's body was found in another canal half a mile away the following day.

Cameron County Deputy Sheriff Ed Moody revealed Tuesday for the first time that he was trying to find Rios Zepeda on the day the first girl's body was found. He did not say why.

The laborer was taken into custody several hours after the second body was found. Most of Tuesday's testimony was given by Moody and concerning the taking of a piece of rope from Rios Zepeda's car and of the taking of clothes the defendant was wearing on the day of the murder. Moody denied defense contentions that the items were taken without permission from either the defendant or the defendant's father although he admitted he did not have a search warrant.

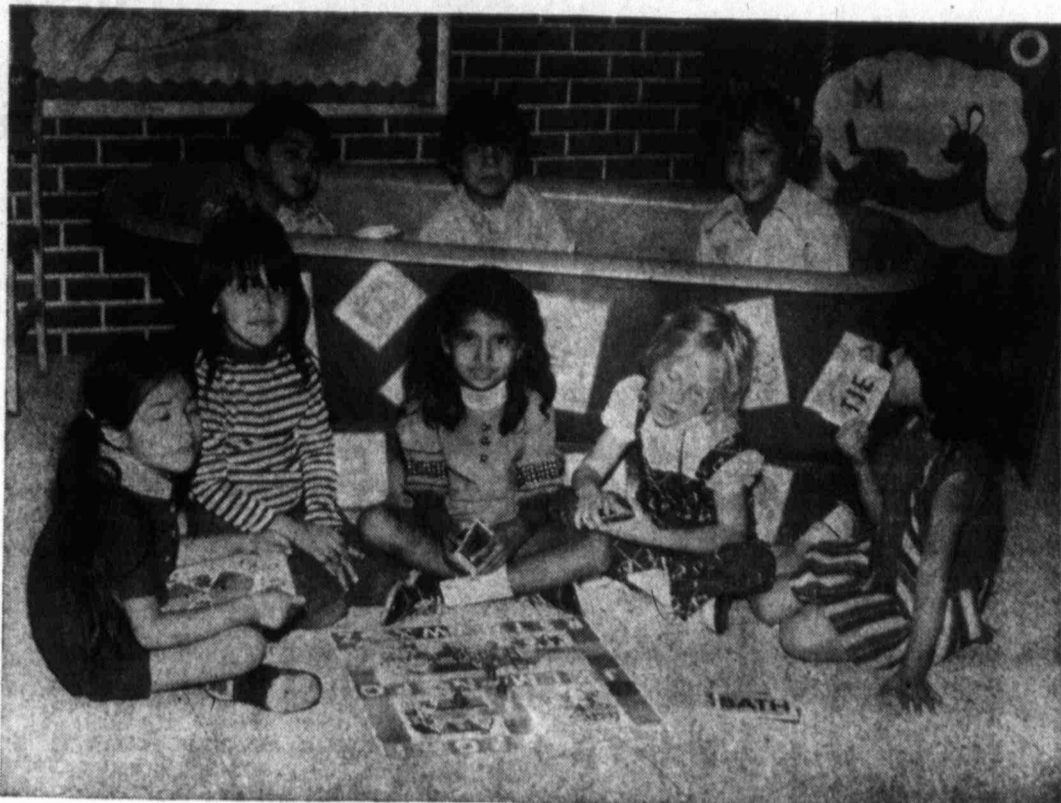

The grand jury, which was not due back until June 4, also was recalled for a special session Friday.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Henry J. Novak Jr. filed a subpoena Tuesday showing he had personally served Charles Watson, cashier of First City National Bank, with a demand for records.

Allen, who spent two hours with the grand jury last week, says he made the contribution to the Nixon campaign on a

personal basis and no company funds were involved. It is unlawful for corporations to contribute to political campaigns.

The grand jury is checking on \$89,000 of the \$100,000 contribution, which was traced to one of four men who pleaded guilty to charges arising from the Watergate break-in.

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) — Thomas H. Thompson, editor of the Amarillo Globe-Times, turns college professor this summer after 32 years with Amarillo newspapers.

Dr. Clark D. Ahlberg, president of Wichita, Kan., State University, announced Thompson has accepted the Wichita Eagle and Beacon distinguished professorship in the university's journalism department.

James L. Whyte, vice president and general manager of the Amarillo Globe-News, expressed regret but called the appointment "a fitting peak for a most notable career."

Thompson, a former teacher, has been editor of the Globe-Times since 1954. He will leave at the end of the month but plans to keep a home in Amarillo.

Thompson will introduce at Wichita State a course in public affairs reporting—the specialty field in which he helped win a 1960 Pulitzer Prize for the Globe-Times—and also will teach editorial writing.

Networks To Halt Fun, Games For Watergate

NEW YORK (AP) — All three networks are stopping their daytime fun and games at 10 a.m. EDT Thursday to televise the long-awaited start of public hearings by the Senate Select Committee investigating the Watergate scandal.

It will be the first time since November 1970 that any network has halted its daytime soap operas, game shows and reruns for live coverage of Senate committee proceedings.

NBC did it that year during a Senate inquiry into the unsuccessful Son Tay prison raid in North Vietnam.

A major witness in Thursday's Watergate hearings will be James W. McCord Jr., according to an aide to Sen. Sam Ervin Jr., D-N.C., head of the Senate Select Committee.

McCord, 48, is the former security chief for President Nixon's campaign committee, the Committee to Reelect the Pres-

ident. He is among those convicted in last June's break-in at the Watergate offices of the Democratic National Committee.

Eight days of hearings have been scheduled by Ervin's committee, including a Friday session. The other days are May 22 through 24 and June 12 through 14.

It isn't known yet how many of the hearings after Thursday will be carried live by the CBS, NBC and ABC television networks. Spokesmen for their news departments say that will be decided and announced on a day-to-day basis.

The hearings also will be broadcast live from start to finish on the 28-station Eastern Educational Network of public TV stations and taped in full for evening broadcast by the Public Broadcasting Service.

The commercial networks' live coverage of at least Thursday's session continues a tradition — albeit erratic — that began in 1951 with the televising of Senate hearings into organized crime in the U.S.

Three years later, the big Senate show on TV was the Army-McCarthy hearings in which millions of viewers saw the dramatic confrontation between Joseph Welch, a courtly Boston lawyer, and the abrasive, Communist-hunting Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

"I LOVE LUCY" focused on Senate hearings into the escalating Vietnam war. Among other things, it resulted in one angry, high-level resignation — at one of the networks.

Fred Friendly, CBS News president since March 1964, abruptly quit when his network elected to broadcast reruns of "I Love Lucy" instead of continuing its coverage of the Senate hearings.

Ironically, those were the last Senate hearings televised live by CBS News, according to a network spokesman, until CBS announced plans to cover the Watergate hearings starting Thursday.

Friendly, now a television consultant at the Ford Foundation and a journalism professor at Columbia University, says the Watergate hearings far out-rank in importance any of those previously televised.

For that matter, he says, "I think it's the most important hearing since 1868 and the attempt then to impeach President Andrew Johnson."

TEAPOT DOME "This is not because it (the Watergate hearings) is a 'show,' but because it's the way this country goes about correcting the mistakes of our process. It's certainly more important than Teapot Dome . . ."

"Here you have a whole executive department on trial."

Friendly, 57, declined to assess what effect his angry resignation from CBS seven years ago had on the five broadcast of major news events. However, he was optimistic about CBS coverage of the coming hearings.

Even if the network doesn't cover them live each day, he said, "I'm sure the decision is going to be based on news judgment. And that's all I ever wanted."

WACO, Tex. (AP) — Persons approaching Baylor University from the northeast, northwest or southwest will know when he gets there. Those three corners now are marked clearly by monuments proclaiming the entrance to the state's oldest university in continuous existence.

Mrs. C. A. Middleton, of Corsicana, bequeathed \$15,000 to Baylor. Her son, C. Elliott Middleton of Corsicana, decided to use the money to build the monuments after Baylor President Abner V. McCall and Executive Vice President and Provost Herbert H. Reynolds gave him a list of suggested projects.

A long-time Baylor benefactor, Mrs. Middleton "was a devoted and enthusiastic Baptist all her life and reared her family in that manner," her son said.

Murder Arrest, \$200,000 Bail

GROVETON, Tex. (AP) — Reginald Jones, 48, was held in the Trinity County jail under \$200,000 bond today in the slaying of a 62-year-old operator of a cafe and lounge.

Sheriff Evans said the slaying took place about 2 a.m. Feb. 12.

The sheriff said a person wearing a wig and a woman's coat aroused Mrs. Bell, telling of a disabled car and the need to use the telephone.

Evans said once inside the

place, the slayer strangled Mrs. Bell with a necktie. Sheriff Evans said he personally carried charges before Justice of the Peace E. L. Ainsworth, who set the bond.

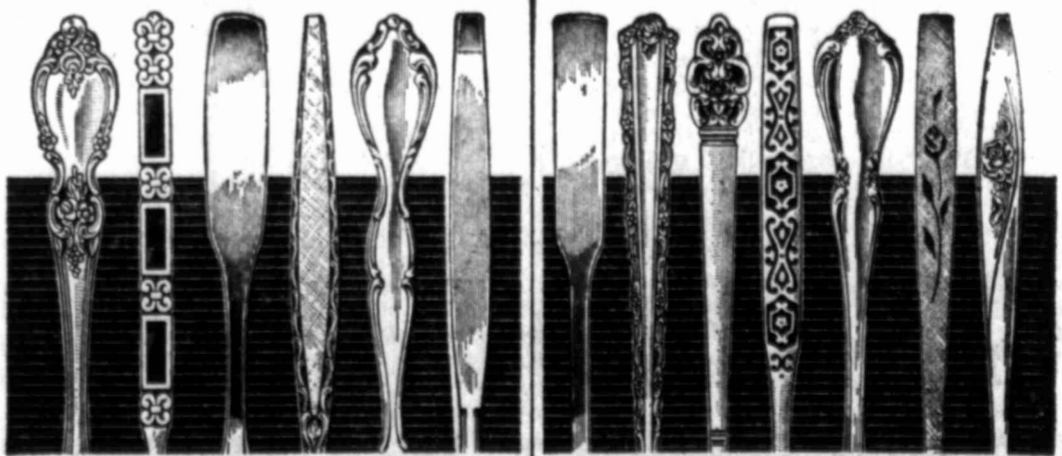
