# Nixon, Pompidou Vow **To Revitalize Alliance**

President Georges Pompidou today ended their two-day summit talks. They agreed to work for a revitalized transatlantic alliance that can meet the changing needs of the 1970s. The American and French leaders took leave of each other with few if any firm accords of substance but with an understanding that if all goes well a unique summit conference of North American and West European government leaders can be arranged.

FOR INSTANCE

This would bring together all 15 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, plus Ireland which is the only non-NATO country inside the Common Market.

Personal relations between the two presidents evidently warmed considerably during their conference with each passing subtle political compliments to the other.

Effects Of Gas Shortage Spread To Fort Stockton

HOUSTON (AP) - A shortage of natural gas plaguing a Houston firm which forced power rationing in San Antonio and Austin now has struck industries along the Gulf Coast.

Robert Wells, vice president of Coastal Gas Producing Co., said the firm has been forced to shut off or limit supplies of gas to about 40 industries along the pipeline system which stretches from Fort Stockton. Tex., to Louisiana and from near Austin to the Mexican bor-

The SEC twice this week suspended trading in Coastal States' stock, but trading was resumed Wednesday and the stock closed at 95%. The New York Stock Exchange reported Coastal's stock opened at 7% Thursday, almost 300,000 shares were traded, and it closed again at 9%.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) - A Brazilian etliner with 23 persons abroard crashed and exploded on landing in the northeast coastal city of Sao Louis today. The Cruzeiro do Sul airline said all were killed.

- The airline reported that the two-engine Caravelle "had an accident during a landing operation." It added that the right wing hit the runway after touchdown at the Sao Luis airport.

The plane was on its daily run from Belem at the mouth of the Amazon River, to Rio de Janeiro, with stops along the way.

All of the plane's seven crewmen were Brazilians. Three of the 16 passengers had foreignsounding names, the airline said. It gave them as Giovani Pedone, Dr. N. Zahn and Dr. M. Zahn. Sao Luis, capital of the state of Maranhao,

## Air Pirates In Command

#### By The Associated Bress

A Colombian airliner hijacked Wednesday flew down the west coast of South America today with two air pirates still in command of 22 remaining passengers and a fresh crew of seven.

The four-engine turboprop Electra left the Dutch island of Aruba north of Venezuela this morning after the Colombian SAM air line turned over a ransom of \$50,000 to the hijackers on the promise the passengers would be freed and the plane abandoned on the next stop.

#### Irish Republic's Surprise Choice By The Associated Press

The Irish Republic's surprise choice of Englishborn Protestant Erskine Childers as president opens the way for a new attack on religious feuding in Northern Ireland, but Childers doubts whether his victory will have any immediate effect.

Terrorists killed two persons in Belfast late Thursday as Northern Ireland held local council elections as a prelude to legislative elections June 28. The Protestant Unionist Party, which has ruled Ulster for 50 years, again held firm control.

## MASSAGE PARLORS NOT RUBBED OUT

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) - A temporary restraining order has been issued by U.S. Dist. Court Judge Sarah T. Hughes, denying the Dallas suburb of Irving authority to enforce a new massage parlor ordinance.

Claiming that the ordinance is unconstitutional. two massage partors. The Massage Palace and the Tokyo House Inc., filed suits against the City of Irving. The operators of the parlors say the ordinance is too harsh and restrictive and denies them due process of law.

Coastal States has contracts, Wells said, to deliver about 1.9 billion cubic feet of natural gas daily and it now can only supply about 1.5 billion.

Although forecasts of future needs of industries and power plants were covered in the contracts, Well said, a recent decline in the output of gas wells has caused the cutback.

#### MARKET WOES

Rep. Henry B. Gonzales, D-Tex., asked the SEC last week to look into the company's inability to deliver on contracts. Gonzales, from San Antonio, asked the agency to determine whether Coastal States filed accurate annual reports on its natural gas reserves. Wells said the company vig-

Wells said the list of industries facing gas cutbacks in-cluded the Gulf Oil Co. U.S. Refinery at Port Arthur and the Union Carbide, Marathon Oil Co. and Texas City Refining Co. plants at Texas City.

Others are the BP Oil Corp., B. F. Goodrich and Phillips Petroleum Co. plants. Pennzoil Pipeline Co., said its supplies from Coastal would be reduced 12 per cent.

A Gulf spokesman here said the reduction would be replaced by other suppliers. A Union Carbide spokesman said while the shortage would not affect its Texas City plant, a temporary cutback at its Brownsville plant, employing about /400

## **Alien Labor Matter**

The remedy for a long-standing evil, the illegal flow of Mexican aliens into the United States, is offered by a bill now before the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee.

Already passed by the House, the bill would amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide penalties for those U.S. citizens who knowingly employ aliens. The first offense would result in a citation or warning from the U.S. attorney general. The second offense could result in a fine of \$500 for each alien employed. The third offense could result in criminal prosecution resulting in a fine of \$1,000 or a year in jail, or both.

Critics complain that it would discriminate against U.S. citizens of Mexican ancestry, that they would have to prove their citizenship in order to get a job. They also say that it would hinder the flow of needed workers to do jobs that U.S. citizens will not take.

Yet an evil has been tolerated far too long. U.S. citizens suffer unemployment and low pay, especially along the border areas. An estimated 30,000 Mexican citizens cross the border into the





PEKING - The crowds that pour into the big Ta Cha-lan department store seem never to thin out. They mass around the shoe and clothing counters where, from all indications, the range of choice during the past year and a half has increased. Small girls wear bright printed dresses that are a relief from the blue and gray uniformity of the standard costume of men and women.

THIS IS essentially an austere, a puritanical society. That constantly amazes the visitor is the cheerfulness evident almost everywhere - this and the unfailing courtesy and consideration shown the foreigner.

The material rewards on which the West places so much stress, abetted by every resource of advertising, are simply nonexistent. There is not a single privately owned motorcar in the whole country, nor any likelihood that automobile showrooms will open up in the foreseeable future.

BUT IF the Chinese are a deprived people, they seem on the whole, unaware of it. They are told by every media that their goal must be a strong Communist motherland armored against enemies, domestic and foreign. And they measure what they have today against the bleak years of deprivation in the not-too-distant past.

Take the household of Fu Feng-quei, who has been intelligent interpreter and friend during our stay in the People's Republic. A teacher in the Foreign Language Institute, his salary is 69 yuan a month - about \$35. His wife, a medical doctor who practices Western medicine and acupuncture in a clinic, has an income of 60 yuan - \$30.

THEY HAVE two children. The \$3a-month rent for their flat includes light and water. Food costs on the average \$30 a month. They each have a bicycle. They have a standard-size radio and they are preparing to buy a sewing machine. For birthdays they buy a duck and, a greater rarity, a chicken.

\* The surplus from their joint income of \$65 goes into a bank account. Since neither smokes, and this is unusual in China, and since even if they were inclined to drink more than a rare glass of wine, no liquor is available. The bank account grows and is at hand for such extras as the sewing

machine. PERHAPS A half-dozen senior professors in the institute, which offers 20 different languages, are paid \$120

a month and they have sizable bank

accounts. The income of the man or woman pulling a heavily 'oaded cart or sweeping the street is certainly lower, and what they pay for the necessities of life is also lower. This is an egalitarian society, with the differences levelled off as nearly as is humanly possible.


THE CULTURAL revolution gave a great impetus to the levelling process, with professors and bureaucrats sent out to many camps to work in the rice fields, haul fertilizer or, if they were too old for hard manual labor, to tend the sheep. They were to learn from the peasant masses - 80 per cent of the population - what hard work meant and how mistaken they had been in living on a plateau above these masses.

To Americans who knew the old China the equality is evident, above all in the absence of the obsequiousness that was the hallmark of the lower ranks. One man's job is as good as another man's job. A tip would be an insult in a society in which there is no tipping whatsoever. When you leave a restaurant or hotel you shake hands and express your thanks to the waitress and the proprietor.

THE CONTRASTS with America are overwhelming. Sex in China might be nonexistent so far as outward signs go. Pornography is unheard of. Even hand-holding by young couples in the parks is frowned on - at least in the capital - although there is a more relaxed attitude in the provinces. Yet with the healthy, young children one sees everywhere, sex is still a function, albeit a private

function between married couples. 

> THE PROFESSOR Dr. Darrell N. Ueckert of Texas Tech decided to find out just what the covote does on the cow range. His piddling little \$1,500 grant didn't stretch to sheep and goat country.

Dr. Ueckert sure does take the glamor out of Mr. Coyote who has a legendary reputation as a dashing fellow ranging the world without a care, his intelligence beyond that of man and other beasts.

Working with Dr. Ueckert was Dr. Jerran T. Flinders. But Flinders quit Texas Tech and moved to Nevada where he now is ranching.

Grilled Dr. Ueckert pretty closely figuring that Dr. Flinders moved to the family ranch and it still is infested with coyotes. They even come into the back yard. But it is a cow ranch and losses are not as great as sheepmen report.

So who is helping Dr. Ueckert?

HE IS A professional coyote hunter Wyman P. Meinzer a Tech student from Benjamin Tex. He has killed more than 300 of the beasts. Why is a college student hunting coyotes? "For the pelts" said Dr. Ueckert. At even \$12 a pelt it isn't bad work.

The researchers have not found any evidence that the coyotes have killed and eaten any livestock. (Ueckert stresses that the situation may be much much different in sheep and goat country.)
