Nixon, Pompidou Vow To Revitalize Alliance

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP)— President Nixon and French President Georges Pompidou today ended their two-day summit talks. They agreed to work for a revitalized transatlantic alliance that can meet the changing needs of the 1970s. The American and French leaders took leave of each other with few if any firm accords of substance but with an understanding that if all goes well a unique summit conference of North American and West European government leaders can be arranged.

FOR INSTANCE

This would bring together all 15 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, plus Ireland which is the only non-NATO country inside the Common Market. Personal relations between the two presidents evidently warmed considerably during their conference with each passing subtle political commitments to the other. French officials, for instance, reported this conference exchange between the two leaders: Nixon claimed he has been working since 1969 to improve

American-French relations. Past misunderstandings in his view were the fault of American politicians who had failed to understand the aspirations of the late Charles de Gaulle. He was quoted as quipping: "I'm becoming more and more Gaullist myself."

SEE YOU IN PARIS

Aides reported Pompidou came back immediately with: "In my own country people are saying I'm becoming less and less Gaullist."

"That," rejoined Nixon, "is

not apparent to me."

Pompidou emerged from the conference briefly to address newsmen saying his agreements with Nixon outnumbered their disagreements.

"The results will show themselves in the coming months and years," he said.

Nixon and Pompidou shook hands after their windup meeting and Nixon said, "I'll see you in Paris."

Pompidou smiled and waved goodby.

The two presidents could point to nothing in the way of a dramatic achievement from their private talks Thursday in Iceland's chilly capital. But their spokesmen indicated hope for eventual agreement through negotiating procedures endorsed by the two chief executives.

Henry A. Kissinger, Nixon's foreign policy advisor, told newsmen Thursday that procedures now set in motion may produce an unprecedented sum-

mit of 16 Atlantic nations by the time Nixon visits major European capitals in October or early November.

The participants probably would include all members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Common Market.

LOWER LEVELS

Kissinger said, however, that "it really is too early to tell" whether enough progress can be made at lower levels to justify an autumn supersummit.

Effects Of Gas Shortage Spread To Fort Stockton

HOUSTON (AP)— A shortage of natural gas plaguing a Houston firm which forced power rationing in San Antonio and Austin now has struck industries along the Gulf Coast.

Robert Wells, vice president of Coastal Gas Producing Co., said the firm has been forced to shut off or limit supplies of gas to about 40 industries along the pipeline system which stretches from Fort Stockton, Tex., to Louisiana and from near Austin to the Mexican border.

INVESTIGATE

Oscar Wyatt, Coastal Gas chairman of the board, met Thursday with officials of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, which has been asked to investigate his company's actions.

Wells said late Thursday night the results of that meeting would be made public by the company today. Wells, while saying a complete list of industries affected by the cutback Thursday was not available, said it would hit hardest at the highly industrialized Southeast Texas coast.

The cutback was necessary, he said, because of an order last Friday by the Texas Railroad Commission giving priority to natural gas supplies to

electric power generating plants in San Antonio and Austin and those of the Lower Colorado River Authority.

FEED STOCK

While some of the companies getting gas from Coastal were using it to produce power, Wells said, others were using it as feed stock for various petrochemicals.

Coastal States has contracts, Wells said, to deliver about 1.9 billion cubic feet of natural gas daily and it now can only supply about 1.5 billion.

Although forecasts of future needs of industries and power plants were covered in the contracts, Wells said, a recent decline in the output of gas wells has caused the cutback.

MARKET WOES

Rep. Henry B. Gonzales, D-Tex., asked the SEC last week to look into the company's inability to deliver on contracts. Gonzales, from San Antonio, asked the agency to determine whether Coastal States filed accurate annual reports on its natural gas reserves. Wells said the company vig-

orously denies Gonzales' charges.

The SEC tracing this week suspended trading in Coastal States' stock, but trading was resumed Wednesday and the stock closed at 9½. The New York Stock Exchange reported Coastal's stock opened at 7½ Thursday, almost 300,000 shares were traded, and it closed again at 9½.

Wells said the list of industries facing gas cutbacks included the Gulf Oil Co. U.S. Refinery at Port Arthur and the Union Carbide, Marathon Oil Co. and Texas City Refining Co. plants at Texas City.

Others are the BP Oil Corp., B. F. Goodrich and Phillips Petroleum Co. plants, Pennzoil Pipeline Co., said its supplies from Coastal would be reduced 12 per cent.

A Gulf spokesman here said the reduction would be replaced by other suppliers. A Union Carbide spokesman said while the shortage would not affect its Texas City plant, a temporary cutback at its Brownsville plant, employing about 400 workers, would be necessary.

NO SURVIVORS 23 Perish In Amazon Plane Dive

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)— A Brazilian jetliner with 23 persons aboard crashed and exploded on landing in the northeast coastal city of Sao Luis today. The Cruzeiro do Sul airline said all were killed.

The airline reported that the two-engine Caravelle "had an accident during a landing operation." It added that the right wing hit the runway after touchdown at the Sao Luis airport.

The plane was on its daily run from Belem at the mouth of the Amazon River, to Rio de Janeiro, with stops along the way.

All of the plane's seven crewmen were Brazilians. Three of the 16 passengers had foreign-sounding names, the airline said. It gave them as Giovanni Pedone, Dr. N. Zahn and Dr. M. Zahn.

Sao Luis, capital of the state of Maranhao, is about 1,400 miles north of Rio de Janeiro.

The Cruzeiro do Sul Caravelle took off from Belem at 6:15 a.m. with its scheduled time of arrival at Sao Luis about an hour later.

Air Pirates In Command

A Colombian airliner hijacked Wednesday flew down the west coast of South America today with two air pirates still in command of 22 remaining passengers and a fresh crew of seven.

The four-engine turboprop Electra left the Dutch island of Aruba north of Venezuela this morning after the Colombian SAM air line turned over a ransom of \$50,000 to the hijackers on the promise the passengers would be freed and the plane abandoned on the next stop.

Irish Republic's Surprise Choice

The Irish Republic's surprise choice of English-born Protestant Erskine Childers as president opens the way for a new attack on religious feuding in Northern Ireland, but Childers doubts whether his victory will have any immediate effect.

Terrorists killed two persons in Belfast late Thursday as Northern Ireland held local council elections as a prelude to legislative elections June 28. The Protestant Unionist Party, which has ruled Ulster for 50 years, again held firm control.

MASSAGE PARLORS NOT RUBBED OUT

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)— A temporary restraining order has been issued by U.S. Dist. Court Judge Sarah T. Hughes, denying the Dallas suburb of Irving authority to enforce a new massage parlor ordinance.

Claiming that the ordinance is unconstitutional, two massage parlors, The Massage Palace and the Tokyo House Inc., filed suits against the City of Irving. The operators of the parlors say the ordinance is too harsh and restrictive and denies them due process of law.

The suits also claim that Irving is trying to annex land on which the parlors are located in order to make the establishments subject to the ordinance.

Heaviest Showers Fall North Of City

Fast-falling rain broke the record total set in 1921 at the Big Spring Experiment Station and brought the total for 1973 to about half the annual norm here.

Precipitation total this year is 10.99 compared to a normal 6.62 inches at the station. May brought 3.88 inches of moisture against 2.84 normal during the month.

Previously, 1.30 inches in 1921 was the most rainfall on May 31.

Rain drops pounded Big Spring at a rate of four inches an hour at times. Rain first fell between 2:45 and 4:15 p.m. and then came back harder between 8 and 8:40 p.m.

Rain may have allowed some to replant in dry spots, damaged fields with cotton seed just planted and helped cotton already well established, County Agent Bruce Griffith said.

Ranchers are "tickled pink" of course, Griffith said.

LAKES

Reports from the Colorado River Municipal Water District showed 3.50 at its pump station on the Snyder highway just north of town, 1.9 inches at Moss Creek Lake, trace at Lake Thomas, Lake E. V. Spence, and Martin County pump station, also Odessa .10, Midland .53 of an inch.

The Colorado River at Silver, above Lake E. V. Spence had risen to 3½-feet Friday morning, probably from showers south of Colorado City. It could gain some from rains nearer Colorado City and from the Bear's Creek runoff from the Big Spring area.

Texas Electric Service Company measured 1.8 inches at its switching station northeast of town, 1.70 at its Lake Colorado City plant, .70 of an inch in Colorado City and 1.20 at Sweetwater.

AREA SITES

Miscellaneous reports included 2.6 inches west of Big

Spring .20 of an inch in Silver Heels addition, .10 of an inch at Luther, 2.2 inches on the Gail Road, and in town 1.50 and 1.10 in the southwest quadrant, 1.9 on Morrison Street, 2.2 on Gollad and 1.86 on Purdue near Kentucky Way.

One half mile north of the experiment station, Bill Fryrear, location leader, heard of 2.90 inches but a mile further

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Firemen Kept Hopping During Local Storm

Big Spring firemen were kept hopping during the electrical storm here Thursday night, answering three fire calls and two false alarms.

Things were further complicated by the fact that their intercom radios went out part of the time and their telephone lines had some trouble. Some persons calling Central Fire Station reached the North-side Station.

Most severe damage was at a fire at 801 Wills, where lightning hit the living room area and started a fire that caused extensive damage. Fire officials report that lightning may have struck the television. The house belongs to Mrs. M. C. Mullett and is rented to two Air Force lieutenants.

MORE LIGHTNING

At 8:30 p.m. a fire occurred at 703 E. 16th at the John Hawkins residence, which suffered damage to a window frame and smoke damage. This

fire also was begun by lightning. A fire at 8:45 p.m. occurred at 911 W. 8th with no damage after lightning struck a gas meter. There was a false alarm at Cook's and at the old football field at the high school.

During this same period of time, police were kept busy answering reports where cars were stalled in the deep water flowing at many intersections. One car was reported off the

moved in due to an electrical storm and pouring rain.

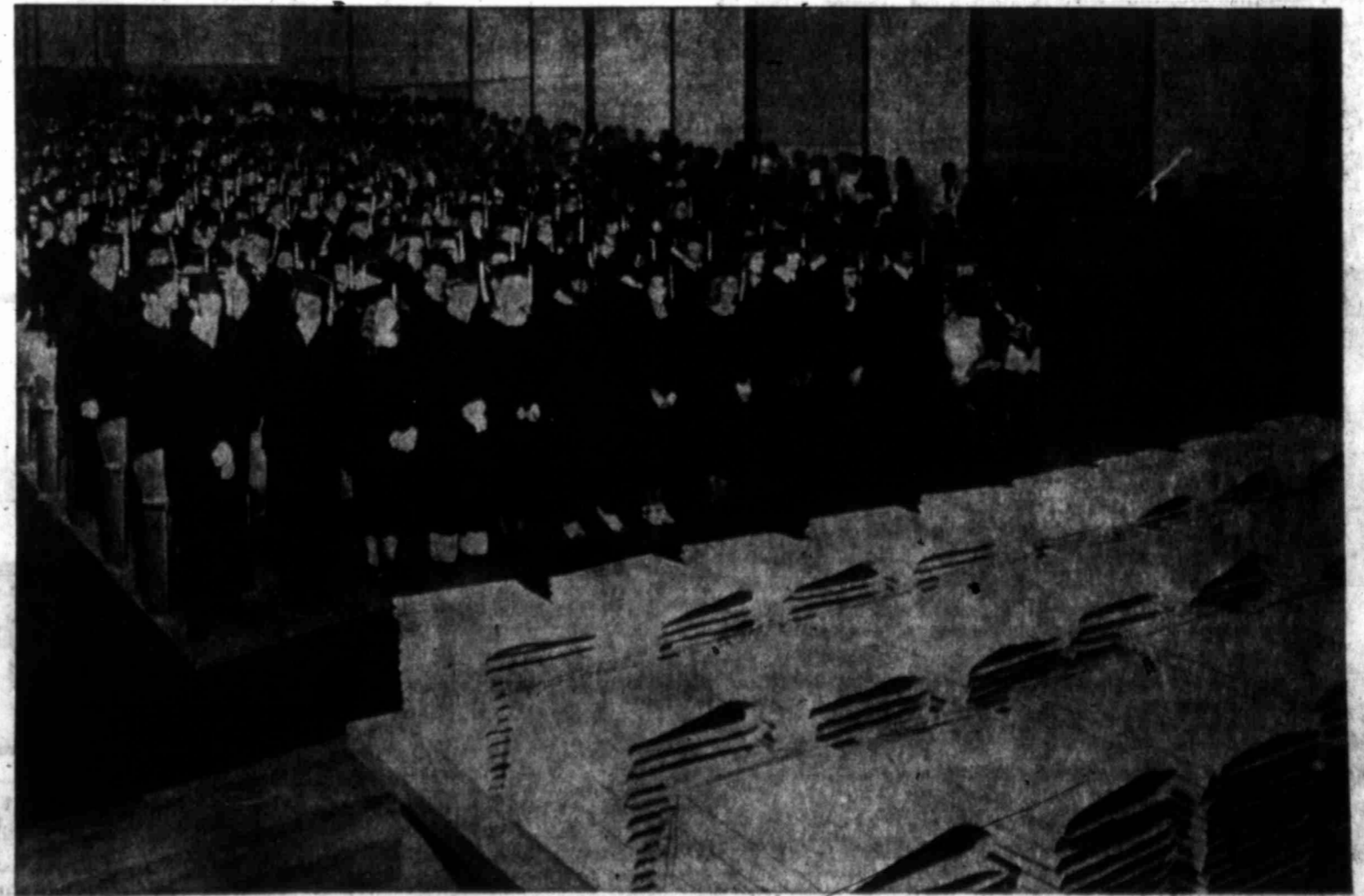
The high school auditorium was filled to capacity with people standing in the back and some having to return home as a result of the overflow crowd, when 323 students received their high school diplomas.

Personnel Switching Quiz Pushed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional probes are digging for information about people who switched from jobs with the White House, executive offices or the President's re-election team to posts with federal agencies.

Various alphabet agencies—from ICC to CPSC, Interstate Commerce Commission to the Consumer Product Safety Commission—are being asked to give written information about such personnel shifts to the House Commerce Committee investigation subcommittee.

The requests stem from concern by some Democratic congressmen about the state of the so-called independent regulatory agencies that Congress created to carry out administrative or judicial-type functions.

Reps. Harley O. Staggers, D-W.Va., chairman of the Commerce Committee, and members John E. Moss, D-Calif., and Bob Eckhardt, D-Tex., recently proposed legislation aimed at providing more independence to such agencies.

Staggers has circulated a letter to a dozen agency chairmen or acting leaders whose operations come under the eye of his committee.

The letter asks for details of agency hiring. He also sought the identity of the person who actually decides whether a particular applicant will be hired as an agency attorney.

The letters were sent before the Washington Post reported recently that former White House aide Charles W. Colson and two partners made plans to place a lawyer in a key position at SEC to help their firm represent clients.

Congressional probes are expected to look into this published report. "It's one thing after another," said a source close to Staggers. "Messing around with the SEC... is causing no end of concern."

The panel is investigating secretly various matters involving SEC, including the commission's actions in International Telephone & Telegraph and Robert L. Vesco cases. The subcommittee planned to take testimony today from former presidential Counsel John W. Dean III regarding the ITT matter.

A spokesman for the Committee for the Re-election of the President said he has not put together a list of where his former staffers are working now. "I hope to have it together in a week or two. There are a lot of people I've just lost track of, frankly," he said.

Bar Suit Nets \$1.1 Million

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (AP) — The owners of a bar have agreed to pay \$1.1 million to a man injured in an automobile accident allegedly caused by one of the bar's patrons.

The settlement was approved by Superior Court Judge Joseph Karesh on the basis of a 1971 state Supreme Court decision which held that bartenders and bar owners are responsible for injuries caused by obviously intoxicated persons they continue to serve.

Attorney Bruce Walkup brought the suit on behalf of Howard Bennett, 62, a former history professor, and his wife Elizabeth. Bennett sustained brain damage in the 1968 crash

and has been hospitalized since. The Sailors Union of the Pacific, which operates the bar, bartender Tom Commins and bar manager Jack Wilson were defendants in the suit. Bennett's auto was struck by another driven by Huey Glynn, who witnesses said had been speeding at 80 miles per hour prior to the crash. Glynn agreed earlier to pay \$100,000.

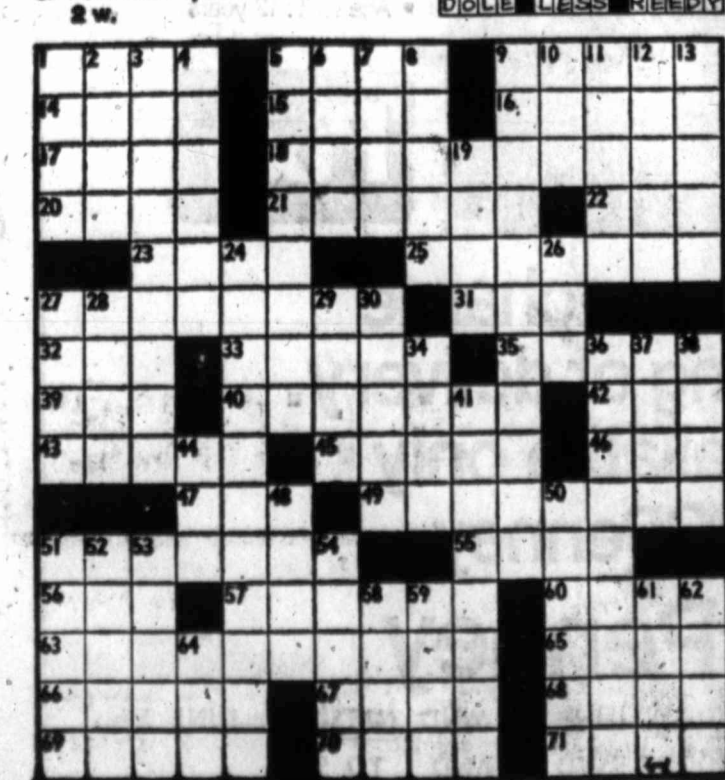

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Hospital Gets More Money

AUSTIN — Big Spring State Hospital shared substantially in the increase for mental health and mental retardation facilities in the final appropriations bill passed by the Texas Legislature for the next two years.

Funds totalling \$10,767,848, an increase of more than \$3 million over the last biennium, were allotted to Big Spring.

Rep. Renal B. Rosson of Snyder said he was especially pleased with the better support for mental health and mental retardation facilities and especially without a tax increase.

This appropriation for Big Spring, which includes the state employee pay raise recom-

mended by the House Appropriations committee, was part of the \$9.7 billion budget bill.

Included in funds for the hospital are \$4,782,446 in general revenue for 1974; \$5,495,670 for 1975; and an additional \$355,980 in construction funds to renovate and air condition the administration building.

Largest single appropriations for the hospital include \$3,033,338 for 1974 and \$3,724,619 for 1975 to cover salaries for all classified personnel.

During the current biennium, Big Spring State Hospital spent a total of \$3,648,139 for 1972 and was budgeted \$3,957,553 for 1973.

Charge Sheriff's Deputy With Killing Wife, Sons

ESCANABA, Mich. (AP) — A sheriff's deputy has been arraigned on charges of first degree murder in the deaths of his wife and two infant sons.

The burned bodies of Dennis Murphy's wife and children were found at their home in nearby Garden Thursday morning after Murphy was found handcuffed behind the village's firehouse.

State Police said Murphy's wife, Janet, 20, and sons, Randy, 2, and Robbie, 7 months, died as a result of the blaze.

Murphy, 25, was held here without bond after his arraignment.

Deputies at the Delta County Sheriff's Department said County Prosecutor Tony Marinkewicz had not released any information on why Murphy was arrested.

Gerald Bouchard of nearby Fayette, the deputy's father-in-law, said Murphy told him two men came to the Murphy home about 1 a.m. Thursday and reported a serious traffic accident about 15 miles away.

Murphy told Bouchard he was asleep, and his wife, who talked to the men, informed them they would meet him at the fire station and go from there to the accident scene.

Police reported the deputy

said he drove to the station in his patrol car and was attacked by two men when he walked into the building.

Murphy said he was held by one man while the other got his handcuffs from the patrol car. He added that he was dragged outside and handcuffed and his shirt was pinned over his head so he could not see his assailants, police said.

Volunteer firemen said they were unable to contain the blaze at Murphy's home because gas had been drained from the main fire truck, leaving it with enough fuel to get to the scene but without enough to run the pumps. Ignition wires also had been pulled from Murphy's patrol car.

When firemen returned to the fire house for a second tanker, they found the deputy.

Murphy had been a deputy since January and was the only peace officer in the town of 350 residents.

Prisoners Sent To State Pen

Antonio Rivera was returned to the Texas Departments of Corrections this week, and three others — Elbert Earnest Turner, Albert Wilborn Jr. and James L. Howard — started prison terms.

Deputy Sheriff Bill Chadwell and Texas Highway Patrolman John Ferguson escorted the prisoners to Huntsville.

Interstate Road Jobs Authorized

Two projects affecting Interstate 20 west of here have been authorized by the Texas Highway Department.

One is for the construction of 3.8 miles on Interstate 10 (with which IS 20 merges) in Culberson county. It starts 2.3 miles west of Van Horn and goes to 1.5 miles east of Van Horn. Estimated cost is \$7.6 million.

The other project is 5.7 miles on IS 20 in Ector County from Judkins to FM 866, estimated to cost \$4.5 million.

HCJC Enrollment Reaches 344

Enrollment for the summer semester at Howard County Junior College reached 344 in mid-morning with late registration scheduled to end at 5 p.m. today.

L. L. Lewis, registrar, said late registration was going slowly. "We don't expect to go over 350 total," he noted. Last summer's first session enrollment was 367.

New Medical Secretary Study Gets Applications

Individuals looking for a career in office work have a chance for a much-in-demand specialty at Howard County Junior College.

Applications are now being taken for medical-secretarial training. The curriculum is geared for both those who have basic office skills but who need medical orientation, and for those who wish to train under the two-year program that has an associate-in-arts degree based on medical-secretarial courses.

The health field has considerable opportunity now, said Paul Ausmus, who is coordinating the allied health courses and there is every prospect that it will have increasing demands for skilled personnel.

In addition, applications also are being received for the two-year medical assistant program

at HCJC, and the response has been good for those wanting to qualify as a "good right arm" of physicians. These applications should be submitted as soon as possible because of the extensive screening process, said Ausmus.

This is not to say that there is no urgency to applying for the medical-secretarial course; indeed, Ausmus and other college officials need to know soon if there will be enough for the class and how to schedule faculty.

Those taking the two-year program will get training in typing, stenography, secretarial procedures with special emphasis in the medical field such as medical records, hospital admissions, health insurance, medical terminology, medical shorthand, etc., along with related course work in zoology, anatomy and physiology.

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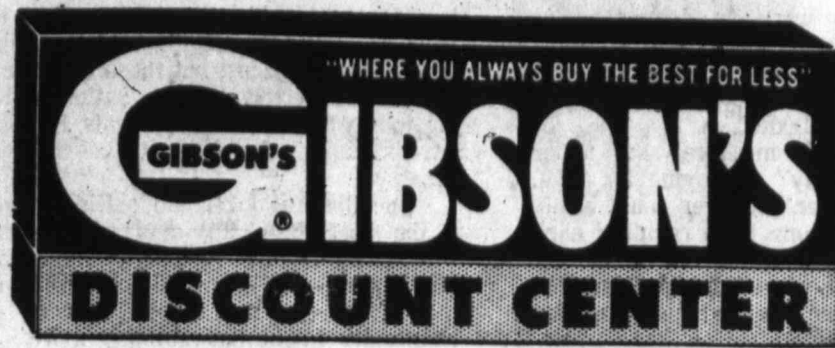
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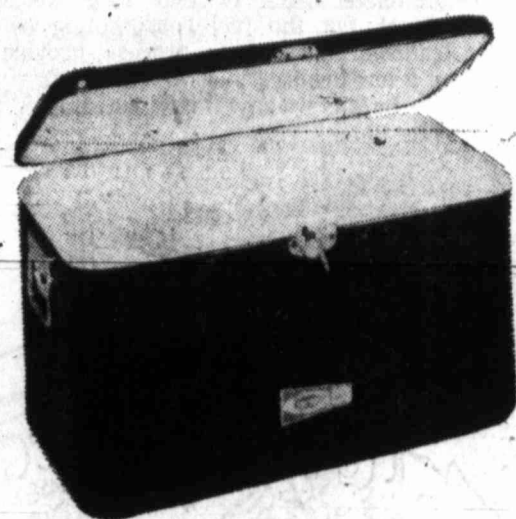


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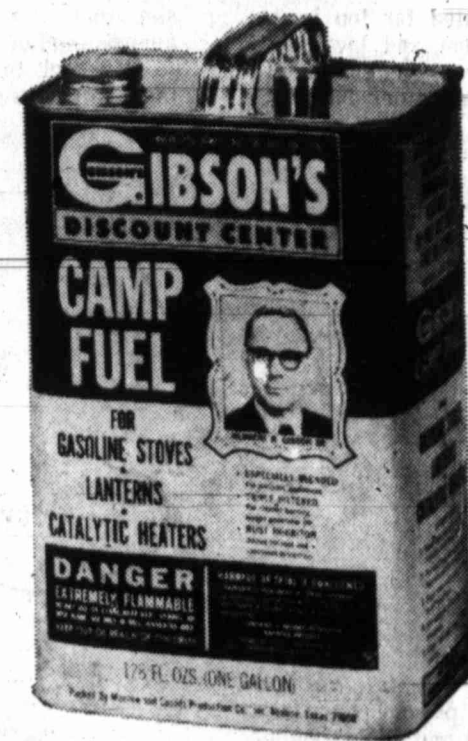

SEVERAL PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS are expected to cause some debate when the 64th Session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church meets on the campus of McMurry College, June 5-7.

The three-day session is being held at McMurry for the first

time in history. McMurry College is owned by both the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Annual Conferences, and is celebrating its Golden Anniversary this year.

Ministers and laymen will be here representing more than 225 churches in the Northwest Texas Conference, including Big Spring.

Bishop Alsie H. Carleton, resident bishop of the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area, will preside over the conference which has announced this year's theme as "Heritage Horizons."

Dr. Hilbert J. Berger, pastor of St. Andrew United Methodist Church of West Lafayette, Ind., will be the conference preacher. The conference is expected to take action on eight amendments to the denomination's constitution referred by the 1972 General Conference.

One proposal would give laymen a vote on such matters as ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.

Another proposed amendment would permit each of the 76 annual conferences in the 10.6 million member denomination to elect as many additional lay

members as necessary to equalize lay and ministerial membership in the annual conference.

Another amendment would remove the 21-years-of-age qualification for delegates to General Conference.

Other amendments deal with boundary changes within the denomination, substitution of nouns and pronouns in the constitution and a provision to permit more frequent meeting of the general church body.

Singer Claims Religion Results In Inner Peace

NEW YORK (AP) — To pert, pretty Katie Hanley, a hit singer in the movie "Godspell," living has come into happy focus.

"I've never known such peace of life," she says. "It's an amazing change."

What made the difference, she adds, is a new, brimming faith that has grown in her simultaneously with the development of the light, frolicsome musical about Jesus, drawn from the Gospel of Matthew.

"Again and again, in little ways, God brought me the answer," she said in an interview. "It completely changed me."

Now that it has happened, she intends to use her musical and acting abilities through movies, television—or on the stage to convey her new-found faith to others.

"I want God to use me to bring people to Jesus," she said.

Up to two years ago, before her work in "Godspell" began on the New York stage, the outlook had been different for Katie, a lissome, 5-foot-4 woman of 24 with auburn hair and dancing blue eyes.

"I had the average church upbringing," she said, recalling her Presbyterian background in Evanston, Ill. Her father, Robert E. Hanley, is an attorney in nearby Chicago. "I believed in God. But always before it was a morbid, corny kind of thing. Now it's real."

In her former attitude after finishing college in Pittsburgh, Pa., she had gone to San Francisco "in rebellion to get away from home," but the vagrant youth scene there didn't still her temper.

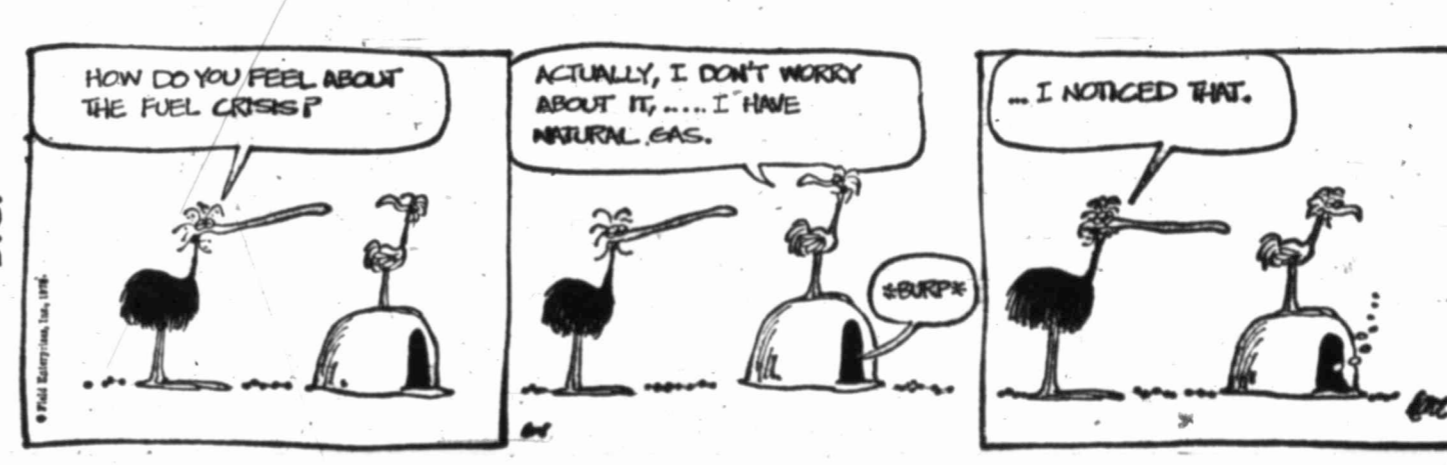

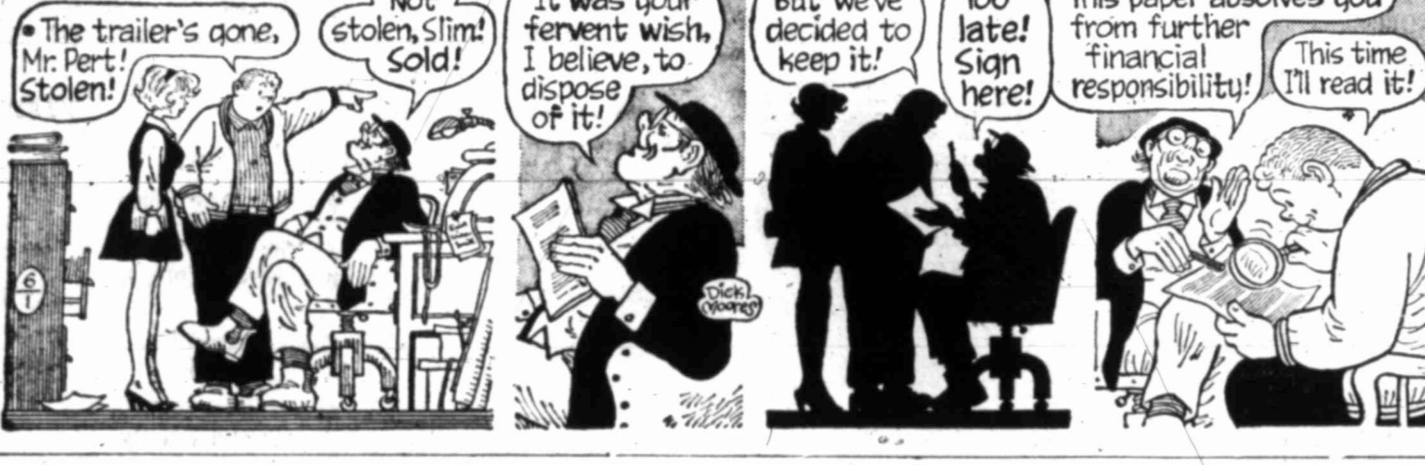

4.4 Million Americans Out Of Work Last Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate, still failing to respond to the economic boom, held stubbornly at five per cent of the work force in May, the government said today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the U.S. job picture was essentially unchanged since last November, although the economy was in the midst of one of its most vigorous expansions in history during that period.

As in April, the number of people that the bureau counted out of work totaled 4.4 million. The work force remained at 84 million, the bureau said. The figures were adjusted to take seasonal job patterns into account.

white-collar workers, from 3.1 to 2.8 per cent.

There was a small decline in the unemployment rate of teen-agers, 15.4 per cent.

The report cast new doubt on whether the Nixon administration will be able to bring the jobless rate to the range of 4.5 per cent by year's end, as it has forecast. The administration now is trying to slow the economy down, a policy that would tend to push the unemployment rate up.

The bureau said the number of nonagricultural payroll jobs climbed modestly last month, increasing by 150,000 to 75.2 million. There was a similar increase in payrolls in April.

The jobless rates for most of the other major groups of the labor force remained at about the same levels as in April. For adult men, it was 3.4 per cent; adult women, 4.6 per cent; and

Cops Call Candy's Report Of Giant Gems Caper 'Hoax'

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Police have labeled as a hoax Candace Mossler Garrison's report last month that an intruder broke into her hotel bedroom and stole \$200,000 worth of jewelry.

Detectives said they became suspicious when the blonde millionaire from Houston described her assailant as a man "with soft brown eyes" and "soft hands."

Suspicions were increased when Mrs. Garrison described the fleeing intruder as a "running shadow" in the corridor a "couple of minutes" after he left her room—a distance of about 30 feet.

Capt. Donald Fleming said when Mrs. Garrison told how the burglar offered to make love to her she was asked to

take a polygraph test to see if she was lying.

"That's when she blew town," Major W. E. Philbin said.

"She was under the influence of prescribed—drugs and we've now dropped the case as unfounded," he added.

Philbin said Mrs. Garrison's "track record isn't too good."

In 1966 Mrs. Garrison and her nephew, Melvin Lane Powers, were tried for the murder of her wealthy husband, Jacques Mossler. A jury found them innocent.

Mrs. Garrison claimed April 26 that an intruder slipped into her hotel room here and threatened to strangle her with a bathroom towel before taking her jewelry.

"He was supposed to be holding a penknife and a flashlight at the same time," Philbin said.

In Houston, Mrs. Garrison reported another \$400,000 robbery 12 days later.

Panel To Prepare School Money Bill Just In Case

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Gov. Dolph Briscoe says he won't call the legislature back to work on the school finance problem, but Speaker Price Daniel Jr., wants to be ready if Briscoe's mind changes.

He instructed chairman Dan Kubiak of the House Education Committee to convene the panel June 18 and have it "prepare, polish and refine" a bill totally revising the school finance system.

The measure, House Bill 946, is the one that passed the House but died in the Senate during the regular legislative session that ended Monday night.

KILL COMPROMISE
Daniel said the committee should "have it ready for legislative action no later than Sept. 15, 1973."

The speaker's refusal to break a 70-70 tie in the final hour of the session Monday killed a compromise bill worked out by a House-Senate conference committee.

Carlton Carl, Daniel's executive assistant, said there was no special significance to Sept. 15, other than it would allow plenty of time for a session before the Jan. 8 constitutional convention.

Briscoe asked the Texas Education Agency and the Legislative Property Tax Commission Tuesday to make through studies of public schools and their financing. He said he would use the results in recommending a new school finance system to the 1975 legislature.

Daniel, however, said in a statement the problem "has been literally studied to death at a cost totaling almost \$2 million since 1965."

Charge Okie Treasurer With Extortion, Fraud

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — State Treasurer Leo Winters proclaimed his innocence and pledged an all-out legal fight after being indicted by a federal grand jury Thursday on nine counts of extortion, mail fraud and conspiracy.

The grand jury also indicted 13 other persons, including State Highway Commissioner H. E. Rainbolt, president of the Federal National Bank of Shawnee; W. Ben Smith Jr., executive vice president of Rainbolt's bank; Robert G. Grove, Winters' lawyer; Ross Cummings, Winters' public relations consultant; and nine directors of Guaranty National Bank of Oklahoma City.

U.S. District Court Judge Luther Bohannon set arraignment for the 14 for June 8 and said he would summon a jury to start trying the cases the week of July 9.

Winters, a Democrat, declared that the year-long grand jury investigation was politically motivated. He said he is "innocent of any wrong doing" and his trial "will be an entirely different thing... we won't have a lot of secret meetings, and it will be open to public scrutiny."

HE TREMBLED
He told newsmen Thursday night that he challenged Burkett to sign an affidavit in the presence of the grand jury deterring that Sen. Dewey Bartlett threatened to block a judgeship appointment for Burkett unless he pressed for a conviction of Winters.

DIFFERENT DEAL
"His blanching and he trembled," Winters said of Burkett, "but he refused to sign the affidavit."

Burkett said Winters' charge "is simply not true—I've never discussed a federal judgeship with Sen. Bartlett."
