

REPUBLICAN SENATOR CHARGES WHITE HOUSE SMEAR Dean May Have Named Wrong 'Hush Money' Hotel

WASHINGTON (AP) - John W. Dean III conceded today he may have named the wrong hotel as the site of a key Watergate cover-up meeting. It was the first factual dis-

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crepancy to turn up in five days of testimony before the Senate Watergate committee by the ousted White House counsel, who has said President Nixon knew of the Watergate cover-up.

Gurney said this cast doubt on other Dean testimony. After a brief pause and a whisper from his attorney, Dean said the coffee shop in the Statler-Hilton is named the Mayflower. The audience in the packed hearing room broke into applause and cheers. FOLKSY STORIES

In a morning session punctuated by folksy stories told by Ervin and Sen. Howard, H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn., Dean was led again through some of his accounts of meetings with Nixon. Sen. Daniel K. Inquye, D-Hawaii, asked Dean about White House actions taken against its political enemies, especially members of Congress.

Dean said Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., had been under surveillance for a time by White House-directed agents. He said he knew of no buggings or break-ins employed against Kennedy.

Dean insisted that he took any role in planning of such operations only under extreme pressure. In this area, too, he often · repeated · testimony he had given earlier in the week. Dean said also that he knew of no legal work done at the White Hcuse exploring whether

Congress has a right to subpoena the President. Shortly before Dean began his fifth day of testimony, Sen. Howard H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn., the committee vice chairman,

appealed to President Nixon to give a sworn account of his meetings with his accuser, Dean, but said he believes the Constitution bars the committee from compelling the Presidentto testify.

Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, D-N.M., the first questioner of

Dean today, asked about legal work performed by White House lawyers on separation of powers and executive privilege. Dean said neither he nor any-

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one else he knew of had worked on such matters in relation to any subpoena of Nixon. Montoya did not directly suggest that Nixon be subpoenaed. The committee heard Thursday that the President suggested through an aide last March that his attorney general publicly attack a charge by Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., that top White House aides knew of or condoned political espionage.

People fled in panic. Witnesses reported seeing five persons dead. These reports could not be confirmed, but ambulances were seen carrying victims away.

Allende said in his broadcast a "seditious sector" of the army was involved. Chilean armed forces have traditionally remained out of Chilean political affairs. The carabineros have been the nation's most influential armed element.

Allende said he had ordered loyal troops to converge on the palace. As they moved in, firefights spread to the streets around the palace.

EMERGENCY

The state of emergency meant the armed forces had assumed control of public order and that some individual rights, such as the holding of public gatherings, were suspended.

The president spoke on the radio from his home in a residential section of the city.

He said: "In these difficult moments the working class should combat the rebel troops.

"Loyal forces should support the workers. They should not be mistaken in their duty. Only one armored regiment has rebelled. The rest of the troops are loyal to the government."

Panel Defers Action Pending Study Of Artesia Hall Case

HOUSTON (AP) - W. Kendall Baker, a Houston lawyer and former member of the Texas Welfare Board, says he may have been "sold a bill of goods" by Dr. Joseph D. Farrar owner of the Artesia Hall school for troubled teen-agers.

Baker testified Thursday night before a House welfare subcommittee investigating how the controvershal school near Cleveland obtained a license to operate after four reports from welfare workers had urged that the school not receive a license.

The wheels of foreign policy turn now not only on diplomacy, spheres of influence and military power, but also on oil and weapons sales. The United States appears to be in the process of making a contribution to the arms race in the oil-rich Persian Gulf. Iran, the lone non-Arab country producing quantities of oil, is to buy \$2.5 billion in American arms, plus advisers. Kuwait and Saudi Arabia together are to purchase more than '\$1 billion in weapons, including the superb Phantom fighter-bomber.

Iran shares borders with the Soviet Union. It also feels threatened by Iraq, which gets arms from Russia. Iraq, in turn, claims it fears Iran will cut its access to the Persian Gulf.

On the pro side, the sale of more than \$3 billion in U.S. arms to the three nations would recover some oil-spent dollars. It would also broaden U.S. influence in the Persian Gulf area, vacated by Britain.

On the negative side, there is the possibility of being caught up in an Iran-Iraq conflict, with the U.S. on one side and the Soviet Union on the other. This would be a blunder, especially with more than 1,000 American advisers scheduled to

Potential For Tragedy

A tragedy, of nature and of man may be enacted in the tropical forests of the Amazon basin, particularly in Brazil. There the government is building a road through the Amazon rain forests. a road that will surely create pressures to clear

the land for farming and for cities. The tragedy is found in a discovery by scientists: The soil of tropical rain forests is seriously deficient in nutrients. When land is cleared and turned into farm land, the soil will not support more than about three crop years. After that, farmers must move to new land, leaving an almost ,

sterile area that may never again support trees, but only savannas.

Dr. Harold Sioli of the Max Planck Institute of Limnology in West Germany has offered some wise advice. He suggested that farming in the Amazon be restricted to the flood plains, where periodic flooding with silt can preserve the fertility of the land. His advice should be heeded.

There is enough unrest in Brazil without risking the settlement of large populations in cleared rain forests, only to have the soil fail, leaving farmers and those who depend on farming perhaps worse off than they were before.

WASHINGTON - The political potency of the drama played out by John W. Dean III on national television became clear when Republican members of Congress installed a portable TV set in the House cloakroom and, ignoring the debate on the floor, hung on every word uttered by President Nixon's ousted White House counsel.

AT THE END of the second day of Dean's gripping testimony, the consensus among these Republicans - and many others we talked to inside and outside the Nixon administration - reluctantly gave Dean high marks as a witness.

That is, his testimony, though still far from thoroughly tested, was buttressed with an impressive array of seeming fact which gave it, in the view of these Republicans, substantial credibility.

THUS, A climax of historic political importance is in the making in the tortuously long Watergate story: Mr. Nixon's own party leaders may soon be confronted with the nightmare choice of continuing to back a President credibly accused of ob-


significance is the fact this particular White House staffer until now was highly optimistic that the President would prevail against what he called "the stool pigeon" - John Dean. Other Republicans, both in Congress and the White House, are more tentative. They feel nothing Dean has said by itself can force the President to resign or result in his impeachment. The credibility of Dean's testimony, according to this opinion, requires corroboration.

THE ONLY future witness who might supply that corroboration appears to be John N. Mitchell, former attorney general and presidential campaign manager. As we reported a month ago, the White House then was becoming uneasy about Mitchell's reliability. Now, that uneasiness has been increased by Dean's testimony that the "sum and substance" of his March 21 meeting with H. R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman was to make Mitchell the fall guy.

MITCHELL might give the Senate-Watergate committee corroboration on two points of Dean's testimony - that Mr. Nixon agreed to executive



EVEN IF that had been true, which

CIA Hunt seems to have been accepted by his superiors as merely another rather flamboyant dirty tricks operator. The trashy fiction that he wrote, based on his CIA experiences, heavily laced with sex, appears to have given them no trouble. As a free-wheeling agent in Europe and Latin America he set his own terms, with the fiasco of the Bay of Pigs, which he helped to mastermind, a prelude to the Watergate bugging.

WAS HUNT merely a bad apple in the barrel? Or was his capacity to transpose the dirty tricks he had worked on foreign governments into domestic politics a symptom of the pervasive corruption of the vastly overblown intelligence agency? If Watergate leads to a thorough inquiry into the status of the CIA, this will in itself be more than justification for the furor.

Behind the dirty-tricks department is the pernicious doctrine that in coping with the Communist enemy the end justifies the means. That has long been the Communist code of conduct in seeking to bring about the downfall of the capitalist world.

THUS, HUNT could mastermind the break-in of the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist in search of evidence to convict the man who made the Pentagon Papers available to the public. Ellsberg was the enemy.

HUNT'S WIFE was killed in a plane crash at Chicago's Midway Airport last December. She had insured herself for \$200,000 and carried \$10,000 in cash. The accident is still under investigation by the Federal Aviation Administration

The question no one has answered, and perhaps the answer can come only from the President, is why these men were in the White House in positions of responsibility.

No matter how much these weird individuals and the Colsons who employed them are discredited, the President's apologists cannot explain why they should have been next door to his private office. That is beyond any extenuation by the last-ditch lovalists.







"Eighty per cent of people suffer from back pain sometime in their lifetime," said Kirby Horton, physical therapist at Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center, when he was dinner speaker Tuesday for the Business and Professional Women's

Club. Horton explained that the back pain usually stems from spinal malfunction when undue stress has caused injury to the spine. "The easiest way not to

have spine trouble is to prevent it, rather than trying to treat it after the damage has been done," he said.

Noting that a healthy back 'must be a way of life,' Horton said it must be protected everyday, at work, play or rest. Among the causes of back problems, he listed abincorrect posture.

In a recent study of body

Horton concluded his talk by giving eight rules for maintaining a good, strong back minus pain. They are (1) Never bend from the waist only; bend the knees. (2) Never lift heavy weights higher than your waist. (3) Do not carry an unbalanced load. (4) Never carry anymanage. (5) Avoid sudden overloading motions. (6) Keep working surfaces at correct heights. (7) Relax
