Dean May Have Named Wrong 'Hush Money' Hotel

WASHINGTON (AP) — John W. Dean III conceded today he may have named the wrong hotel as the site of a key Watergate cover-up meeting.

Dean, noting he has been asked to provide much data from those records, said "I would hope the committee would put the White House on notice or they may not be there when I get there."

Dean said also that he knew of no legal work done at the White House exploring whether Congress has a right to subpoena the President.

Dean today, asked about legal work performed by White House lawyers on separation of powers and executive privilege. Dean said neither he nor anyone else he knew of had worked on such matters in relation to any subpoena of Nixon. Montoya did not directly suggest that Nixon be subpoenaed.

PEOPLE PANIC

Allende's Palace Attacked

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Elements of a Chilean army regiment attacked President Salvador Allende's palace in downtown Santiago today. The Marxist leader was not there and in a nationwide broadcast from his home he said all other military units remained loyal to him. He declared a state of emergency throughout the nation. Four tanks and half a dozen trucks carrying troops drew up to the palace during the morning rush hour and opened fire with machine guns on the palace guard, the carabinieri, or national police. The tanks did not fire. MOVED IN People fled in panic. Witnesses reported seeing five persons dead. These reports could not be confirmed, but ambulances were seen carrying victims away. Allende said in his broadcast a "seditious sector" of the army was involved. Chilean armed forces have traditionally remained out of Chilean political affairs. The carabinieri have been the nation's most influential armed element. Allende said he had ordered loyal troops to converge on the palace. As they moved in, firefighters spread to the streets around the palace. EMERGENCY The state of emergency meant the armed forces had assumed control of public order and that some individual rights, such as the holding of public gatherings, were suspended. The president spoke on the radio from his home in a residential section of the city. He said: "In these difficult moments the working class should combat the rebel troops. Loyal forces should support the workers. They should not be mistaken in their duty. Only one armored regiment has rebelled. The rest of the troops are loyal to the government."

Produce Firms In A Squeeze

DALLAS (AP) — Fresh produce houses here report they, too, are in a squeeze between what the federal government says they can charge the consumer and what they must pay the producer. Hooper Produce Co. has shut down. Tomato, potato, watermelon and carrot dealers say they are nearing a deal point. "There won't be any supplies on the shelf if something doesn't change," said an Agriculture Department expert who refused use of his name. The manager of J. C. Combs, the largest tomato wholesaler in Dallas, said, "I'm not purchasing any tomatoes. There's going to be a tomato shortage for several weeks." Prices on tomatoes are frozen at 23 cents a carton. The main source of tomatoes at the moment are California and the Carolinas and produce men say they must pay 32 cents a carton. Bill Roderick, manager of Southwest Brokerage Co. of Dallas, agent for farmers who are selling potatoes, said his firm is breaking even but "I'm just not buying any more in quantity. I just can't make any money." He said one major supermarket is considering eliminating potatoes from the bins.

Nixon Asks Americans To Ease Up, Turn Off

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon was expected to call today for a 5 per cent reduction in personal consumption of energy, led by government efforts to cut energy use by 7 per cent. The President also was expected to propose a major government reorganization to collect energy and resource management programs in a proposed new department built around the present Interior Department. Atomic energy development activities were to be divorced from the Atomic Energy Commission and wed to Interior's fossil-fuel research programs under a new Energy Research and Development Administration. "ENERGY CZAR" Energy policy-making and program coordination was to be focused through a new White House "energy czar"—Colorado's Gov. John A. Love—to be named assistant to the President and director of a new White House Energy Policy Office. The administration also was known to be considering conversion of its voluntary gasoline and oil allocation program into a mandatory program to assure fair distribution of short fuel supplies. But that measure was not included in the President's energy message, according to a detailed description obtained by the Associated Press. The President called for these steps that would affect consumers: SLOW DOWN —A slowing down of cars on the highways to save gas. —An easing up on summer air conditioning to save electricity. —And a turning down of heater thermostats in the winter to conserve fuel.

In addition to the proposed government reorganization, federal energy research would be pursued in a \$10-billion program spread over five years, starting with fiscal 1975. Other highlights of the energy message: —Proposal of legislation to create a new Department of Energy and Natural Resources (DENR), absorbing all of the Interior Department except its energy research programs, plus components of other agencies. —Proposal of a new Energy Research and Development Administration (ERDA), taking over the Atomic Energy Commission's \$2.5 billion program of nuclear materials production, reactor development, military applications, and physical, medical and environmental research. SPEED LIMITS —Proposal of federal energy research funding to total \$10 billion over five years starting in fiscal 1975; an increase of \$100 million for energy research in the fiscal 1974 budget, but without increasing the total budget; an indication the funds would be diverted from other programs. At least half of the \$100 million would go into research on coal technology. —The Atomic Energy Commission, shorn of most of its budget and manpower, would retain only its licensing and regulatory functions and would be renamed the Nuclear Energy Commission.

DPS Trio Face Investigation

Two out-of-town state highway patrolmen and a narcotics agent are facing disciplinary action by their divisions of the Department of Public Safety and State Narcotics commission following an incident in the north side of Big Spring Monday night. When three men stopped at Fina's, one of them pulled a gun inside the place, according to witnesses at the scene. Owners ordered them to leave and the local police were called. The men were not in uniform at the time of the incident. Local police, thinking the men might be armed robbery suspects, located the car at the Phillips 66 Truck Stop and ordered them out of the car. Witnesses there report that the men refused to identify themselves or get out of the vehicle until local police ordered them at gunpoint to get out. City police had been notified that the three men had a gun in their possession. There were no local charges filed, but the men were turned over to the Department of Public Safety and the narcotics division for investigation. A spokesman at DPS in Austin said that the men are under investigation and facing disciplinary action and that results of the investigation are incomplete at this time.

Chief Of Drug Unit Quits, Rips Ex-White House Aides

WASHINGTON (AP) — John E. Ingersoll quit today as chief of the government's largest drug enforcement agency and accused the White House of frequent and disruptive interference with his operations. Ingersoll told newsmen on his last day as director of the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs that resigned presidential aides H. R. Halde-

man and John D. Ehrlichman were responsible for easing him out of the job and also for continual interference. CONFUSION A career law enforcement officer who is joining a private firm next week, Ingersoll said he was upset when he was told that he ought to find another job. He indicated that he would have been interested in the job of head of the new Drug Enforcement Administration if he had been assured of independence from the White House. The Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs and other federal drug enforcement units merge at midnight Saturday into the single agency under Justice Department supervision. NO TAKERS But the new Drug Enforcement Administration has no leader and officials of the affected agencies say work at the highest levels is floundering in confusion. Ingersoll said he knows the job has been offered to a few people but he knows of no one who has agreed to take it.

Dumas Fire Hurts Five

DUMAS, Tex. (AP) — Five-volunteer firemen were injured today fighting a discount house blaze in this Texas Panhandle city. Injured were Assistant Fire Chief Junior Clower, 35, David Daniel, Orval Kirkham, Dane Beck and Craig Knight, 15, the son of Fire Chief Charles Knight. Several were reported in critical condition. Spectators helped lift an awning which had fallen on the men. Later a crane was required to remove it, officials said. Officials had not determined the cause of the fire, which destroyed the Gibson's Discount Store. They estimated the loss at one-half million dollars.

Panel Defers Action Pending Study Of Artesia Hall Case

HOUSTON (AP) — W. Kendall Baker, a Houston lawyer and former member of the Texas Welfare Board, says he may have been "sold a bill of goods" by Dr. Joseph D. Farrar, owner of the Artesia Hall school for troubled teen-agers. Baker testified Thursday night before a House welfare subcommittee investigating how the controversial school near Cleveland obtained a license to operate after four reports from welfare workers had urged that the school not receive a license. BRUTALITY The lawyer represented Farrar against the Welfare Department and Liberty County officials in 1971 when an injunction suit was filed in an attempt to close the school because it was operating without a license. A license was granted shortly before the court hearing. Baker said he would take responsibility for how the school got the license rather than anyone in the Welfare Department punished. He did not see any Welfare Department files which included physical brutality complaints while he was involved in the case, Baker said. "Until now, I knew of none of these things," he said. "I do not believe in corporal punishment." NO DATE Rep. Lane Denton, D-Waco, chairman of the subcommittee, recessed the hearing after Thursday's lengthy session. He said the hearing will be resumed next week but no date was set. Welfare workers have testified that they thought the license was granted because Baker exerted influence on behalf of Farrar. "I certainly did not mean to exert any special influence on the department," Baker said. "I am heartsick at the events and the demoralizing effect they have had on my beloved department that I tried so hard to help for so many years." Baker said during a visit to the school he saw a chain cage. "But he (Farrar) told me it was for children who were having flashbacks from drug trips," Baker said. "I had understood the children at Artesia were severely disturbed and many had severe drug problems. I thought you needed those kind of restraints for such children."

CITY GETS FIRST WOMAN TRAFFIC CHIEF IN STATE

Rules Guilty Plea Made Voluntarily

Kincaid, accused of slaying his parents at their Fort Stockton, Tex., home, and his lawyers said Thursday that Kincaid only made the guilty plea because he had been promised probation by 187th District Court Judge John Benavides. Hearings for the 1973-74 fiscal year budget of the United Way were wrapped up about 10:30 p.m. Thursday as the last of 11 agencies presented its fund requests. Jimmy Taylor, chairman of the five-member budget committee said the committee, after receiving the requests from the various agencies and organizations, drew up a set of recommendations to be presented to the board of directors at the annual meeting in July.

Taylor would not release the list of recommended allocations to each group but did affirm that not all of the some \$160,000 requested could be granted. He intimated that one or two agencies made much larger fund requests than usual.

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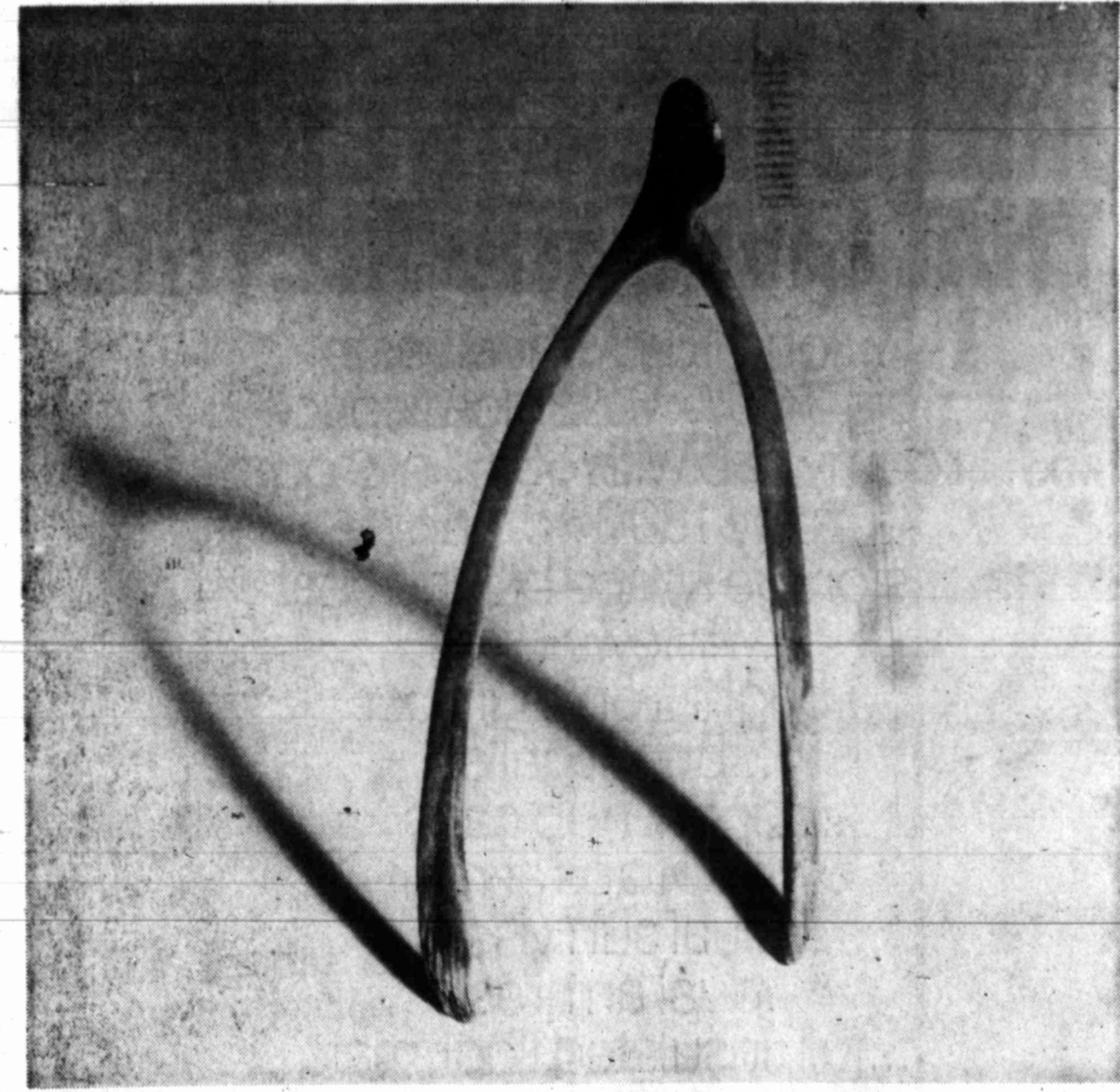
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Farmers Urged To Get Certification Retirement Of Joe Gordon Means IRS Office Closing

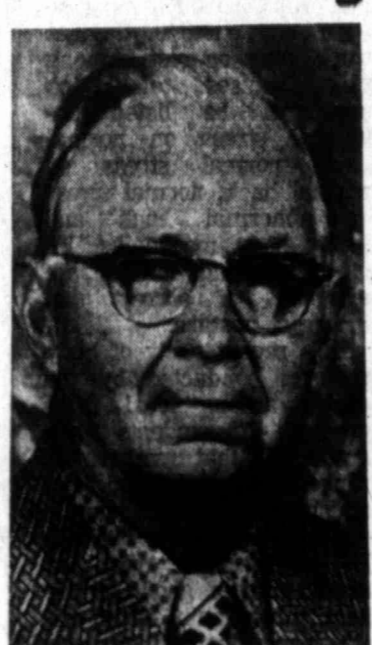

Larson has been a large animal practitioner in the San Antonio area since his graduation from Texas A&M in 1956.

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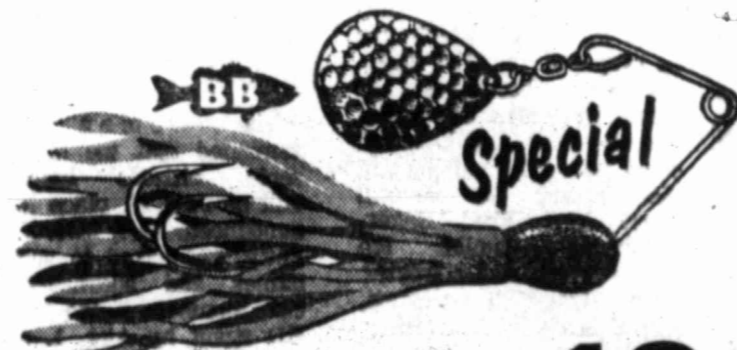

Kirby Horton Guest Speaker For B&PW

"Eighty per cent of people suffer from back pain sometime in their lifetime," said Kirby Horton, physical therapist at Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center, when he was dinner speaker Tuesday for the Business and Professional Women's Club.

Horton explained that the back pain usually stems from spinal malfunction when undue stress has caused injury to the spine.

"The easiest way not to have spine trouble is to prevent it, rather than trying to treat it after the damage has been done," he said.

Noting that a healthy back "must be a way of life," Horton said it must be protected everyday, at work, play or rest. Among the causes of back problems, he listed abnormal stress on normal back, normal stress on normal back, normal stress on abnormal back and faulty body mechanics. He used visual aids to illustrate examples of correct and incorrect posture.

In a recent study of body posture, conducted by the center among local fifth-graders, 273 students were graded. Of that number, 123 ranked good, 134 rated fair, and 16 were marked poor.

Horton concluded his talk by giving eight rules for maintaining a good, strong back minus pain. They are:

- (1) Never bend from the waist only; bend the knees.
- (2) Never lift heavy weights higher than your waist.
- (3) Do not carry an unbalanced load.
- (4) Never carry anything heavier than you can manage.
- (5) Avoid sudden overloading motions.
- (6) Keep working surfaces at correct heights.
- (7) Relax muscles that are not being used.
- (8) Keep head in line with spine, whether sitting

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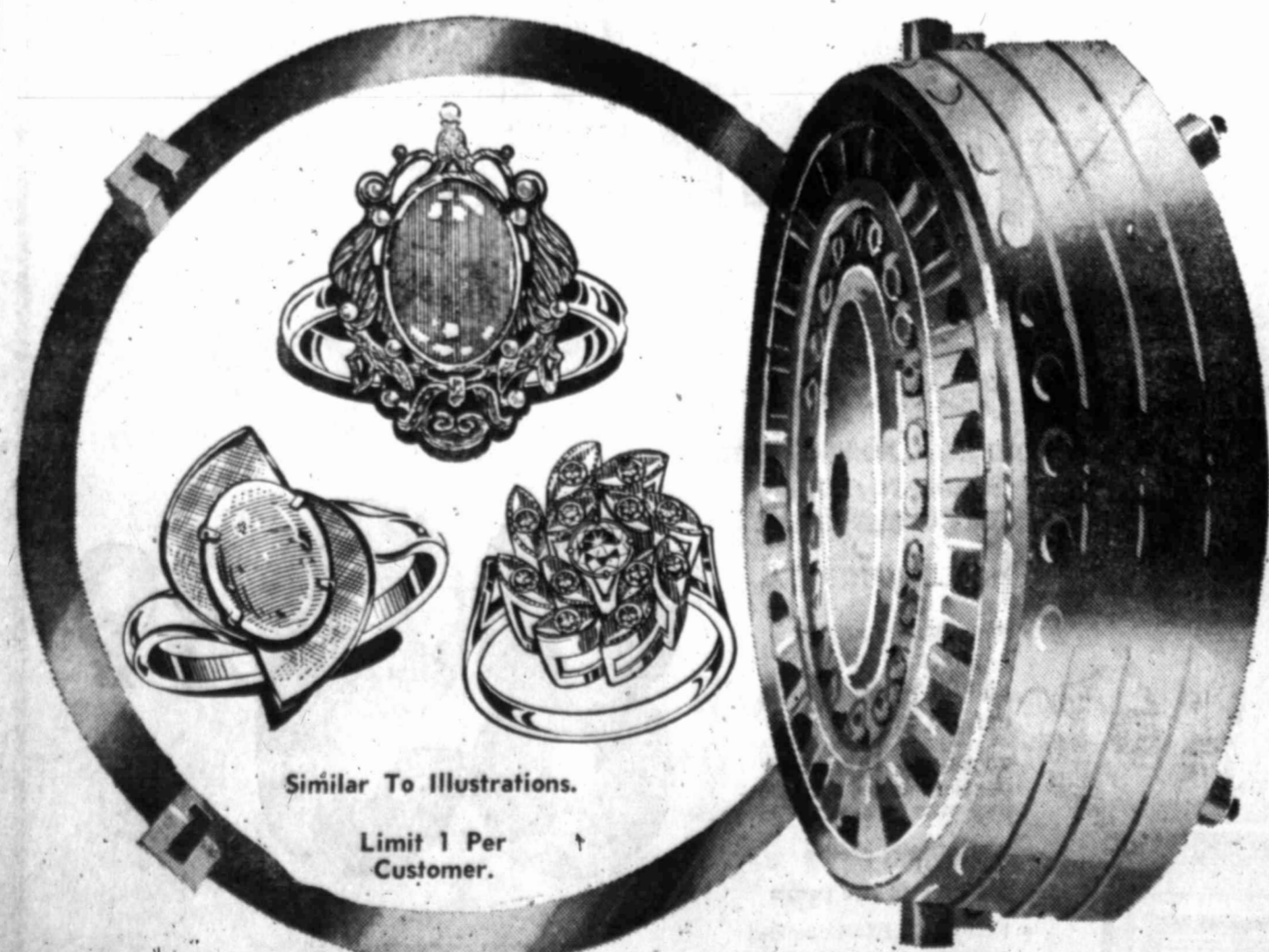

 South had the good fortune to score an overtrick in his four spade contract. His reward was well earned, however, for, like a good general, he centered his campaign on preserving his weak spot from a direct enemy assault.

West rejected an aggressive defense in favor of a passive campaign by choosing to open the four of clubs and the ace was played from dummy. North's queen of spades drew the outstanding trumps and declarer paused to assess his prospects. If he succeeded, a heart could eventually be discarded on the dummy's long club, and South restricts his loss on the deal to one or two heart tricks—depending upon which opponent has the ace of that suit.

If the club finesse should fail, however, a heart return may administer a prompt setback to South's hopes if West has the ace of hearts and the defense can cash three tricks in that suit. De-

clarer looked for an alternative plan that might improve his chances.

At trick three, the king of diamonds was led from dummy. When East followed with the deuce, South discarded a club instead of ruffing, and West was in with the ace of diamonds. A club came back and declarer put up North's king. When the queen fell, the dummy's clubs were established and South was able to discard two hearts from his hand. A trick was conceded to the ace of hearts and declarer claimed 11 tricks.

The fall of the club queen, while extremely fortunate, was not essential to South's campaign. Once the diamond trick can be conceded to West, declarer's success becomes assured. If the queen of clubs does not drop when the king is played, dummy continues with the ten. If East covers with the queen, South ruffs and reenters dummy with a trump to discard a heart on the nine of clubs.

If the ten of clubs is not covered, declarer merely discards a heart from his hand. If West has the queen of clubs, he is welcome to it, for he cannot attack the heart suit without establishing South's king. The defense is limited to three tricks—one club, one diamond and one heart.

If East had covered North's king of diamonds with the ace, South ruffs and now must rely on the club suit. His best bet is still to refuse the finesse, playing ace, king and another club—for every effort should be exerted to keep East out of the lead to protect South's heart holding.

Fugitive Arrested

LAREDO, Tex. (AP) — John Fay Jr., 30, wanted in Pennsylvania on bond default, armed robbery and murder charges, was arrested by FBI agents in this city near the Mexican border.

Fay was to appear today before U.S. magistrate Tom Goodwin in Laredo. Bond was recommended at \$10,000.

The FBI said Fay was arrested for failing to report for sentencing in Pittsburgh, Pa., June 25 for bank robbery. The charges were in connection with the December 1972 robbery of the Northwest Pennsylvania Bank and Trust Co. at Quenterville, Pa.

Fay also is wanted by Johnstown, Pa., authorities in connection with a June 15 armed robbery in which Michael Spondike was shot fatally.

Agents said Fay did not resist arrest at a Laredo motel, though he was armed. His woman companion was not taken into custody, the FBI said.

No Politics Within FBI, Kelley Vows

WASHINGTON (AP) — Clarence M. Kelley is taking command of the FBI with a promise to erase the political shadows hanging over it.

The new director says he would resign in protest before bending to political pressure.

"I can honestly say that I am non-political. I owe allegiance to no political party, leader or background. As director, I will make my own judgments and decisions," Kelley told a news conference shortly after the Sen-

ate voted 96 to 0 confirming his nomination.

After 12 years as police chief of Kansas City, Mo., Kelley, 61, is returning to the agency he served for 21 years under the late J. Edgar Hoover. He spoke of Hoover as his lifelong hero and promised to honor the "traditions of fidelity, bravery and integrity" he credited Hoover with molding into the FBI.

Since Hoover's death 14 months ago, the agency's independent image has been tarnished by the Watergate scandal. Acting Director L. Patrick Gray III resigned after disclosure that the destroyed materials taken from the safe of Watergate conspirator E. Howard Hunt.

Kelley, who shook up the Kansas City police department with technological innovations, said he will not hesitate to change FBI operations if he finds it necessary.

He said, too, that he will "try to be responsive to the public needs of disclosure" in some form of regular communications with newsmen.

Kelley defended the use of wiretaps as a "very beneficial" investigative tool when carried out according to law. Sometimes FBI agents must break into an office or a house to install a wiretap, he said.

"Under some circumstances, this might be construed as illegal entry," he said. "But it is not illegal entry."

He said he would never condone breaking and entering to obtain files or documents.

After the news conference, Kelley returned to Kansas City to wrap up loose ends before being sworn in as FBI chief. FBI spokesmen said they're waiting on the White House to decide when and where the swearing-in will take place.

Kelley will take over from Acting Director William D. Ruckelshaus, the caretaker appointed by President Nixon after Gray resigned two months ago. Ruckelshaus has not disclosed his plans.

ABILENE, Tex. (AP) — After noting that he had earlier granted a six-month delay at the request of the defense, State District Court Judge J. Neil Daniel has now granted the prosecution a delay of about the same time in the appeal of former House Speaker Gus Mutschér and two others convicted of conspiracy to accept a bribe.

The extension, which will be until Dec. 20, was requested by Dist. Atty. Bob Smith. Judge Daniel said he felt the appeal "should be completed by Christmas."

Mutschér, former Rep. Tommy Shannon, D-Fort Worth, and Mutschér aide Rush McGinty were given five-year probated sentences March 15, 1972.

They had been convicted of conspiring to accept a bribe from Houston promoter Frank Sharp in exchange for influencing passage of two 1969 banking bills that Sharp wanted.

The transcript of the case runs 16 volumes with more than 5,000 pages.

Dist. Atty. Smith said "I am extremely busy, and I don't have anybody on my staff

that's qualified to brief this case."

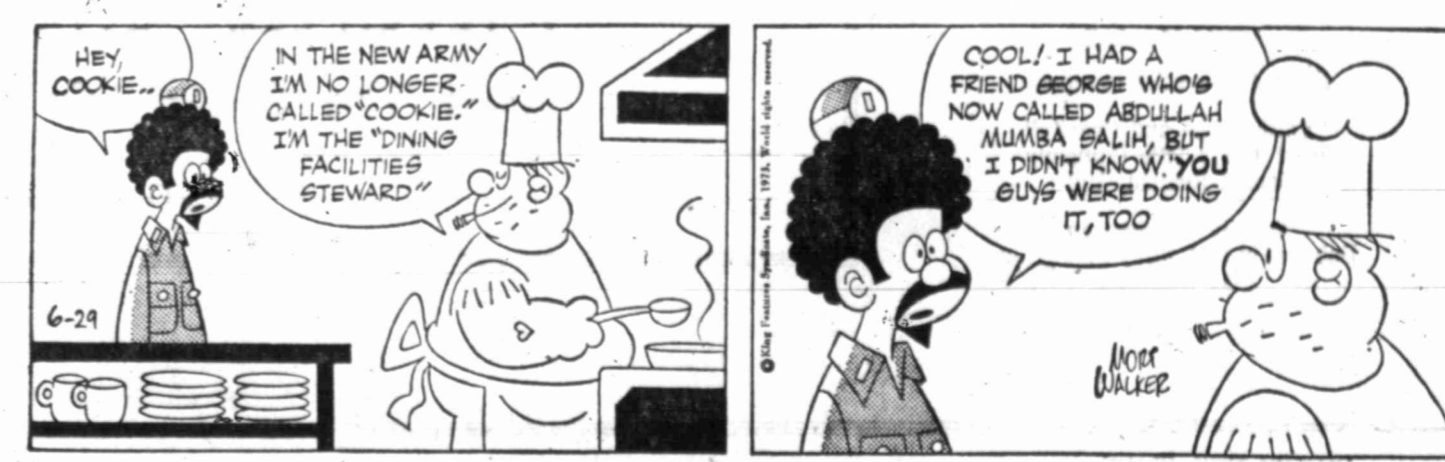

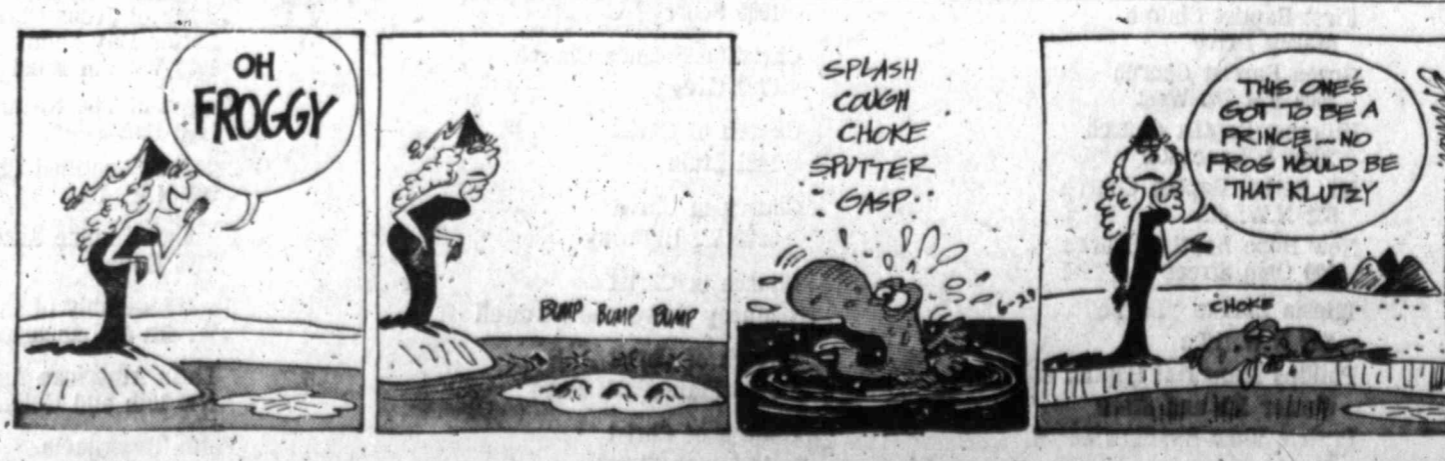

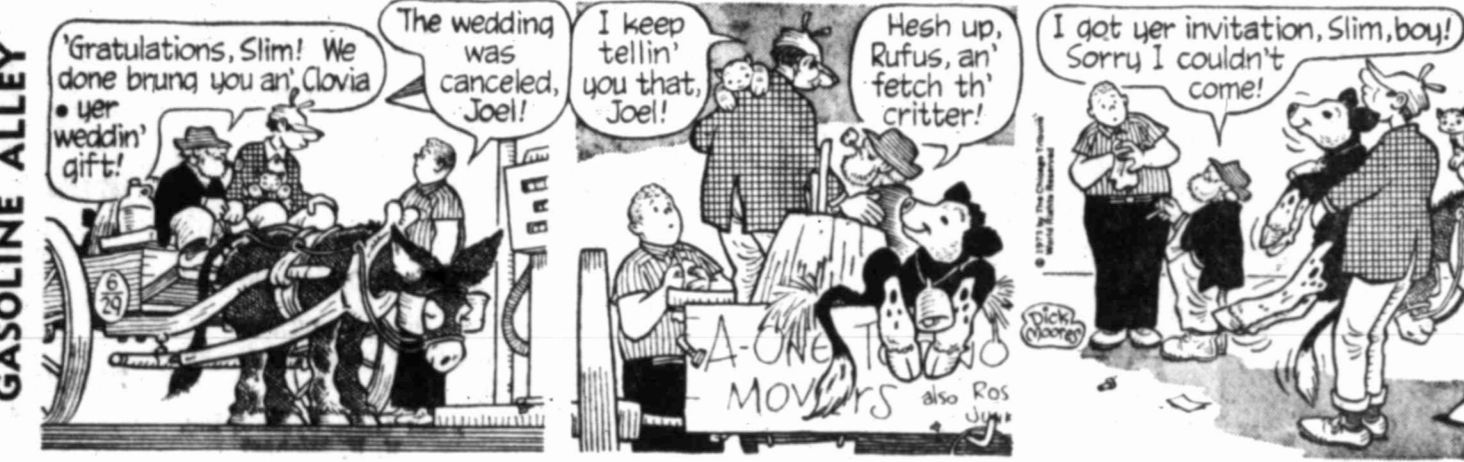

PROJECT 'SAVE' 'Live And Let Live'

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Gov. Dolph Briscoe asked Texas Thursday to join him in a new traffic safety project of "live and let live." Briscoe said the state and federal governments were putting up a total of \$1,160,000 for a six months effort in 14 Texas cities and three counties in hopes of halting the steadily increasing traffic death toll. "The costs have been far too high," Briscoe told a group of officials from the affected cities and counties. "Lives of our citizens are the most valuable resource we have. We cannot and we must not waste these lives through needless traffic accidents."

BEGINS JULY 1
 "Every year for the past six years, the number of people killed on Texas highways has risen higher than the year before. We are on our way to establishing a seventh new record—a record that I don't want to see achieved."

Briscoe announced that the state, specially the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety was joining with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in a special effort "to save lives, save injury, save economic loss." The effort, called "Project SAVE," begins July 1 in the cities of Dallas, Denison, Garland, Grand Prairie, Greenville, Irving, Mesquite, Plano, Port Arthur, San Angelo, San Antonio, Sherman, Texarkana and Tyler and the counties of Cameron, Harris and Hidalgo. Special accident reduction programs will be undertaken in each area. Briscoe asked every other Texas city and county to join in the traffic safety effort, even if not included in "Project SAVE."

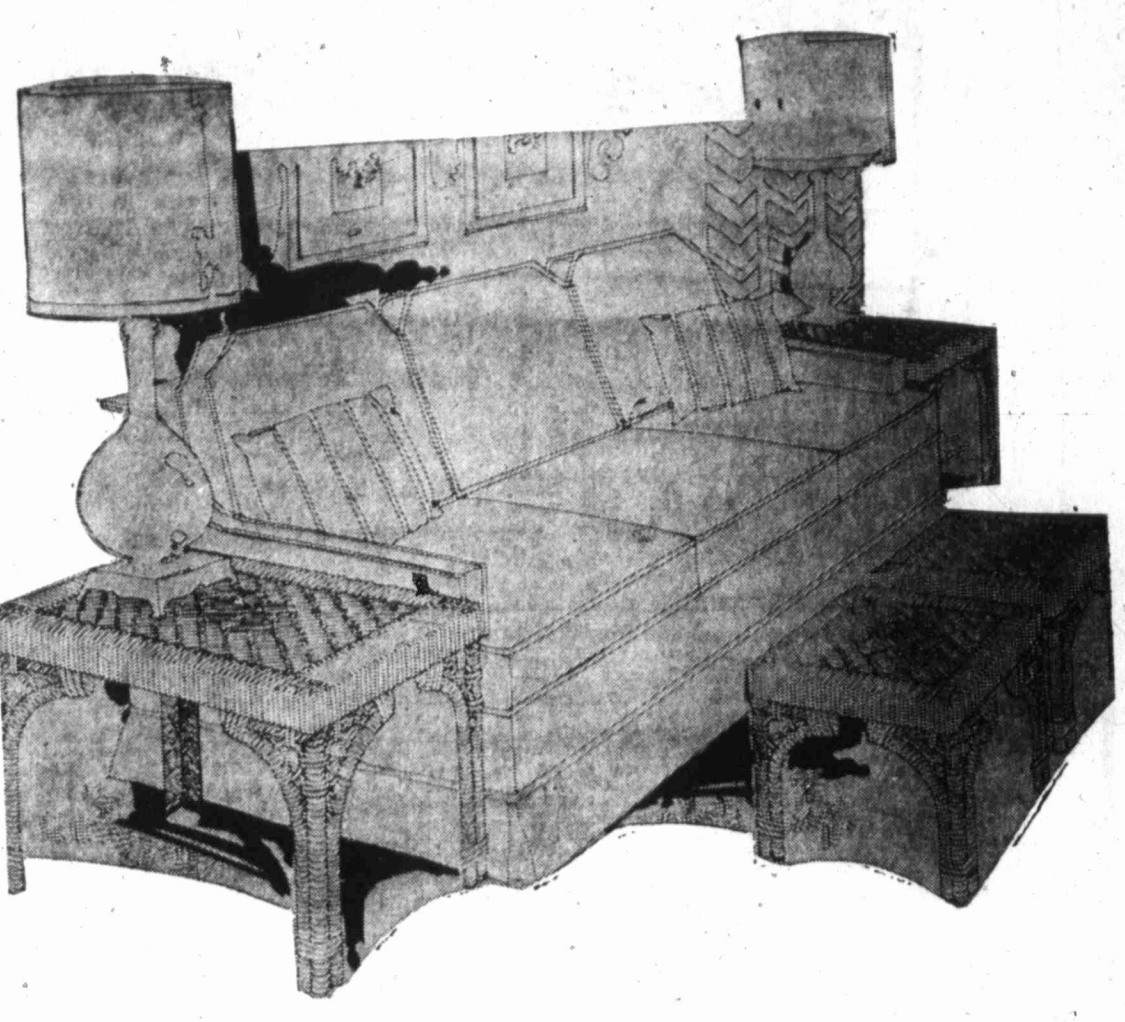
