Verdict Due On Tennis 'Management'

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Tennis administrators will decide this week whether to give the stars a voice in running the circuit or risk a continuation of the split which hit Wimbledon.

The International Lawn Tennis Federation, at its annual meeting at Warsaw Thursday, will consider plans for a new governing council to run international professional tennis.

If the players get their way and win an equal voice with the ILTF in running the circuit, the game will go on as at present.

Nobody was prepared to predict what would happen if they fail.

Tennis was shocked when more than 70 stars of the Association of Tennis Professionals decided to boycott Wimbledon in sympathy for Nikkii Pilic of Yugoslavia. His suspension by his national federation for refusing to compete in Davis Cup, was upheld by the ILTF.

ATP claimed that no player should be ordered to play for his country. And from that point, the argument developed into a struggle for control of the world game.

Despite the absence of the ATP stars, Wimbledon was a tremendous success. A total of 300,172 fans watched the 12 days of play—the second highest attendance in tournament history.

But the ILTF knew that Wimbledon was a special case. It is one of Britain's big social events. But the fans might not go to other tournaments if the big stars are not playing.

Jack Kramer, ATP executive director, said Sunday that Wimbledon had been an outstanding success without the ATP stars. "But what would happen if they refused to play in the other '96 ILTF tournaments?" asked Donald Dell, ATP's legal adviser.

Although the 1973 men's singles lacked the usual quality in depth, some of the late round matches were worthy of the best Wimbledon traditions.

Winning the title for the first time was Jan Kodes, the 27-year-old Czech star who has twice won the French title on clay. He beat Alex Metreveli of Russia in three-sets in the final—the first Wimbledon final between two players from Communist East Europe.

Chris Evert, 18-year-old star from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., thrilled the packed center court fans by toppling the favorite, Margaret Court of Australia, in a memorable women's semi-final.

But in the end it was Billie Jean King of Hilton Head, S.C., who won the title for the fifth time. She crushed a nervous Chris in two sets in the final.

Mrs. King, 29, completed the Wimbledon "Triple Crown" for the second time. She won the women's doubles with Rosemary Casals of San Francisco and the mixed doubles with Owen Davidson of Australia.

The Nastase of Romania and Jimmy Connors of Belleville, Ill., were the men's doubles champions.

Stockton Triumphs In Milwaukee Open

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A three-foot par putt—which he said was a little bit discourteous—nailed down Dave Stockton's victory Sunday in the Greater Milwaukee Open Golf Tournament.

"The courteous thing" Stockton explained of the putt, "would have been to let Romero (Blancas) putt first. And he was playing second."

"But it was my option. I can putt out any time I want to. And I wasn't of a mind to stand around and look at that three-footer while somebody else lined up a putt."

"I wanted to get it in the hole."

He did. It preserved a one-stroke victory—the sixth of Stockton's career—and first in two seasons—and was worth a \$26,000 first prize.

Stockton, who won the first Milwaukee Open in 1968 and took the PGA national title in 1970, won with a one-over-par 73 in the muggy heat of the final round and had a 276 total, 12 under par on the 7,010-yard Tuckaway Country Club course.

Blancas—who made a five-footer in the last hole after

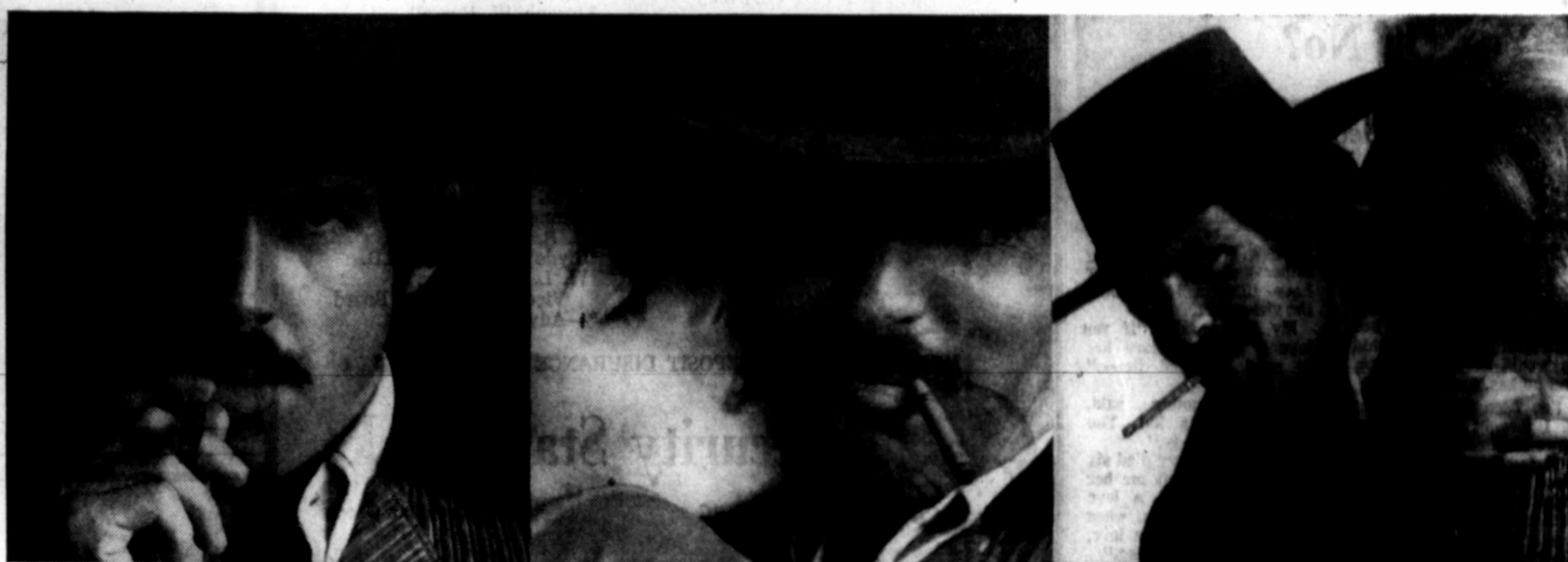
Stockton had dropped his winner—and Hubert Green tied for second, just one back at 277. Blancas and Green each had 688, but it wasn't close until Stockton bogeyed the 17th hole from a bunker.

Canadian George Knudson, with a 67-278 was fourth while veteran Bob Goalby took a 74 and 279.

Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, U.S. Open champ Johnny Miller and Masters titleholder Tommy Aaron were among those who bypassed this tournament to get an early start on preparations for the British Open, which begins Wednesday in Troon, Scotland.

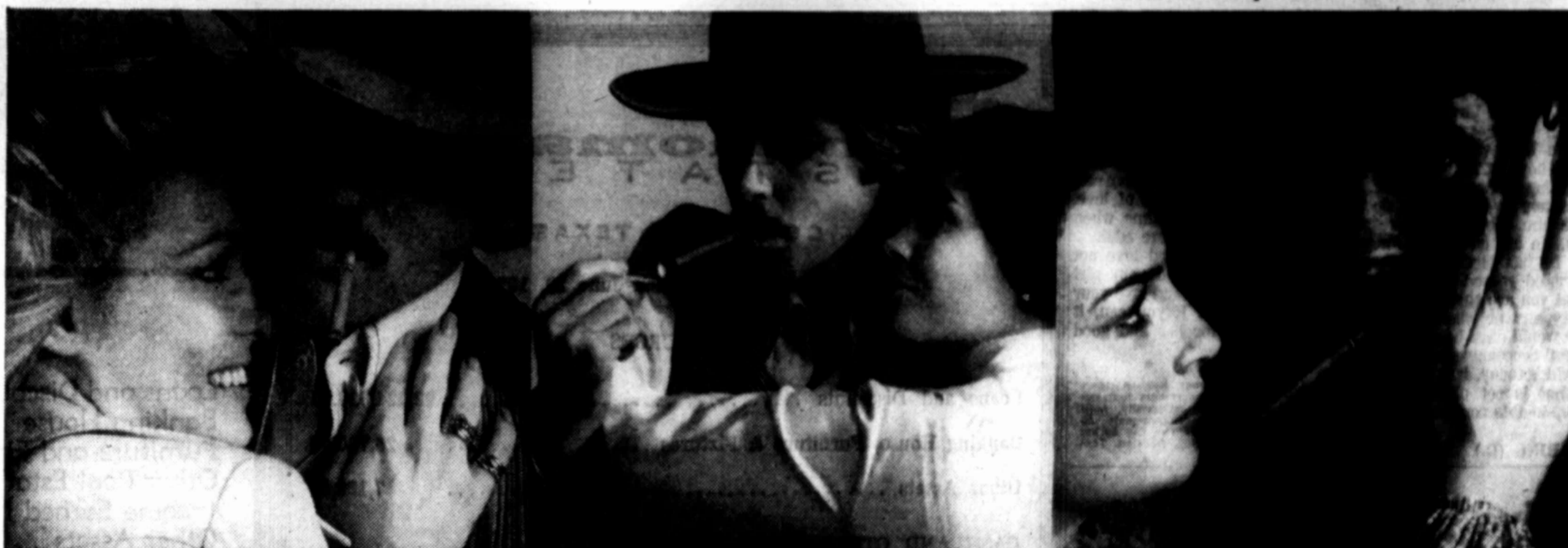

Salty Talent Nabs Riches In Rainbow

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. — Salty Talent, a 22-1 outsider piloted by Elbert Minchey, flashed to a stunning upset in Sunday's ninth running of the \$247,000 Rainbow Quarterhorse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The gelding reached the finish with a one-half length lead over the standard favorite, Truckle Feature, and enriched his owner by \$80,586.

Salty Talent is owned by Frank Weaver of Waco, and is

trained by Tom Wiley. Truckle Feature, owned by Gordon Howell of El Paso, had to be content with \$38,720 out of the world's richest three-year old purse. Chicory Moon, ridden by Jerry Burgess for Betty Shebester of Wayne, Okla., ended up third and earned \$20,086.

Masked Rebel, a 9-1 longshot, came out of the gate fast and held the early lead. Truckle Feature also got off to a good start and was close to the front. Another early burst was turned in by Callmemyoh on the rail.

Salty Talent was never far off the pace on the outside as Minchey applied a steady burst of encouragement with the whip. As the field thundered over the midway point of the 440-yard dash, Masked Rebel gave up the lead.

Salty Talent began pouring it on as he reached the last 50 yards. Truckle Feature began advancing and for a few moments it appeared he would spring into the lead. But in the final strides, Salty Talent was actually pulling away.

The gelding clocked the distance in 21.65. The track mark is 21.54.

Chicory Moon missed overtaking Truckle Feature by a nose.

For Salty Talent, the Derby outcome marked a brilliant reversal of form. He went into the race with a '73 record of 3-2-0 out of the 10 starts, good for winnings of only \$6,503.

Truckle Feature reached a milestone in his career. His second place paycheck in the Derby lifted his career winnings over the hundred grand level.

MORE HEAVY RAINS WASH AREAS FROM SAN ANTONIO TO EAGLE PASS

Night Storms Again Break Out In Panhandle

Deluges blamed for at least two deaths during the night set off more flooding today in some areas of South and West Texas, and showers or thunderstorms kept other areas of the state and

It was a continuation of lighter rains in others. Police said a vehicle that failed to stop struck and killed two teen-age girls riding on bicycles in the rain Sunday night along Interstate 20 on San Antonio's south side. The unidentified bodies lay unclaimed in the city morgue today. At one time during the night, flood warnings were up for a dozen counties from around San Antonio toward Del Rio and Eagle Pass, and water blocked several state highways. Authorities reported four young men clinging to trees were rescued early this morning by Seguin firemen after their car was washed off Texas 123 into Geronimo Creek five miles north of Seguin. Lightning struck the San Antonio lines of the municipal power service 140 times during what Jerry Spengler of that agency described as one of the worst electrical storms in the city's history. He said it would be this evening before service could be restored in parts of San Antonio although repairs were worked through the night. Telephone service also was knocked out in some districts. Rainfall amounts of 2 to 4 inches were reported general Sunday from San Antonio into the Hill Country, and there were scattered showers over sections of the state. In addition, radar spotted a tornado 5 miles east of Rio Hondo during heavy thunderstorms and funnel clouds were sighted close to Harlingen amid turbulent weather in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

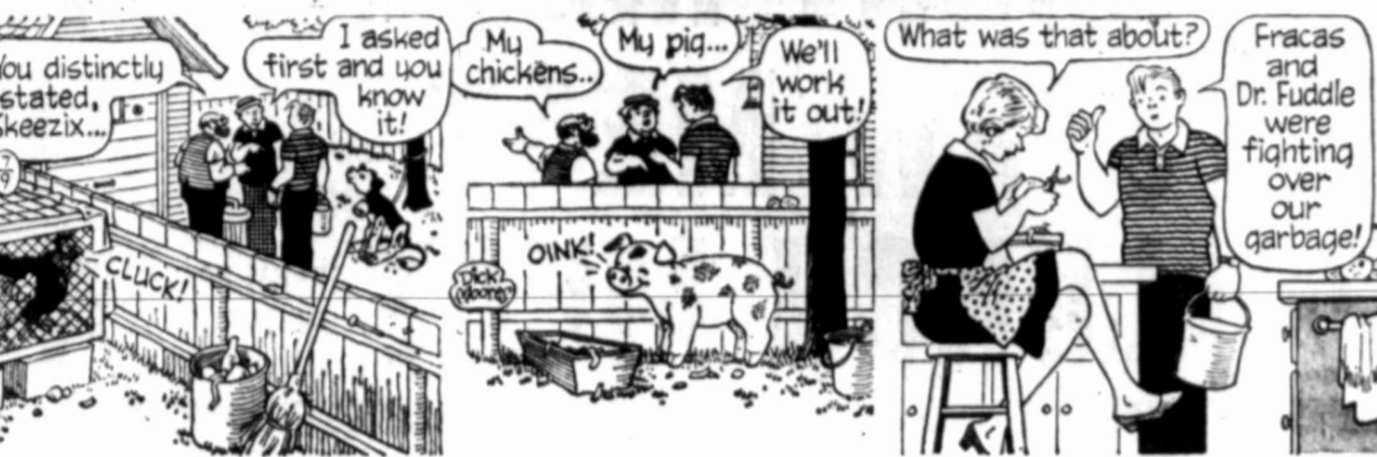

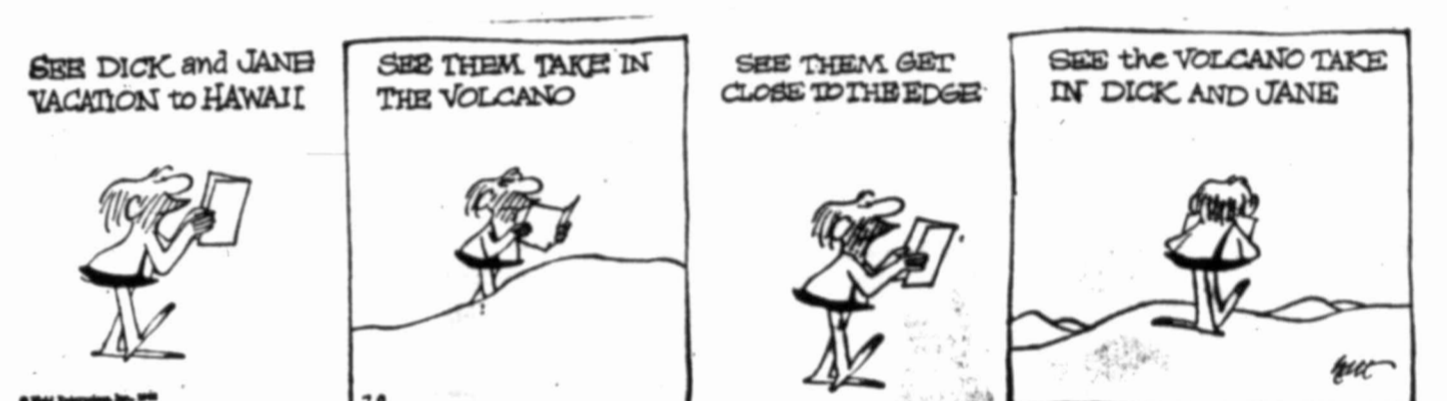

Beards Symbol Of Manliness?

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — What's the best way to look manly, mature, liberal and industrious? Grow a beard, says San Jose State University psychology Prof. Robert Pellegrini.

Pellegrini says he found in a study that a group of college students believes the more hair a man sports on his face, the more he is judged to possess those qualities.

Pellegrini says he paid eight students \$10 each out of his pocket to shave their whiskers in stages and had photographs taken of each man at each stage — from full beard to goatee to moustache and finally clean shaven.

The beards were all "neatly trimmed, not the Gabby Hayes variety," Pellegrini said.

Each photo was then rated by 128 college students, both men and women, on a scale from one to ten on such qualities as masculinity and maturity of each shaven, semishaven and nonshaven subject.

"There seems to be a positive relation between the amount of hair on the person's face and the perception of him as masculine, mature, good-looking, self-confident, courageous, liberal, non-conformist and industrious," Pellegrini said.

Pellegrini said he wasn't sure if his findings would apply off the campus.

FIRECRACKER HOT 'Love Thy Neighbor' Problem To Network

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When can a hit show be a problem to a television network?

When it occurs in the summertime and the hot weather replacement is due to go off in September to make room for the new fall season.

"Love Thy Neighbor" is an Americanized version of an English show that ABC expected would run for six episodes and then be forgotten.

Unexpectedly, the premiere show placed fourth in the 70-city Nielsen ratings.

The second week it was eleventh. If it maintains its pace, ABC may have no choice but to shelve another show and keep "Love Thy Neighbor."

SURPRISE, SURPRISE

"We may have done the network a disservice," said writer-producer Arthur Julian. "What we should have been was a nice little success so it would have encouraged ABC to bring us back in January. But a 39 to 41 per cent share of the audience is something they now have to deal with. You've got to make room for that."

That "Love Thy Neighbor" is a hit is surprising. The show's premise strikes me as being dated. The idea of blacks moving into a white neighborhood is something you would have
