THE MX MISSILE system has suddenly grabbed the attention of a number of folks in this area. especially the farmers.

Now, ordinarily you wouldn't expect farmers to be in the forefront in a program dealing with the nation's defense, but in this case, it gets right down on their level.

Most farmers are opposed to the system being located in the Texas-New Mexico area, due to the fact that it would ruin so much of our fertile agricultural land.

Those opposed to the program have secured maps which indicate the number of missile shelters or silos which would be required. A map of the Parmer County area is being reproduced inside this issue. Perhaps when you see the map you will understand why the farmers are taking the issue so seriously.

Those favoring the MX location in the area argue that it would bring an influx of thousands of people who would be required to work in the construction phase.

Maybe so--but what about the stress and strain which would be put on our schools and cities for a short time. Then, when the MX system is scrapped--in about ten years after it is put in operation, what about all of this wasted farmland? And ghost

In our opinion, Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and other area counties are much too valuable in their current roles of helping feed the nation (even the world), to sidetrack for a missile

Even though you are in favor of a strong national defense, the thought arises: surely there is land more suited to such a missile program without ruining our area's productive capabilities.

Farmers and civic leaders need to be on their toes. This week's round of hearings caught most of them by surprise. If you're against the program, you'd better use your voice and influence as best as you can during the coming months.

Otherwise, this area's farming potential may be a thing of the past in a few years.

HEARINGS HELD

Farmers Oppose **MX Missile Site**

Friona area farm leaders have been in the forefront this week as a series of hearings have been conducted by the U.S. Air Force on the possible effects of locating the MX Missile in the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico

Hearings were conducted in Dalhart and Amarillo, as well as Clovis and Portales, N.M. In most cases, opponents of locating the missile system in this area were very much in the majority. In fact, only one or two spokesmen in each instance defended having the system

Possibly the most support for the missile system was in Dalhart, which stands to become a secondary headquarters for the system as proposed for Texas and New Mexico.

But in the other three hearings, testimony was overwhelming as to the detriment of the system, relating to the area's capabilities of producing much-needed foodstuffs for the

A large crowd attended the hearing in Amarillo on Wednesday. The crowd had assembled originally on Monday, but the Air Force, through some blunder, failed to show up, and it had to be rescheduled for Wednesday.

Among the 20-plus who testified at the Amarillo hearing were M.C. Osborn, speaking on behalf of the Texas Wheat Producers and Parmer County Soil & Water Conservation District, Bertram Jack, Arlin Hartzog, and Carl King of Dimmitt, president of the Texas Corn Growers

In his prepared speech, Osborn pointed out that Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties are the top two agricultural producing counties in the United States.

"The Wall Street Journal pointed out in a recent article that food (supply and cost) in the United States

. . . . fuel situation of today," Osborn told

the Air Force committee. "You boys will be in Clovis tonight for another hearing, and before that you will probably be offered a steak and potato supper. Why don't you just tell your hosts, 'I believe I'd rather eat a missile'," Osborn ribbed the Air Force officials.

The Friona area farmer said he was mainly attempting to protest the use of good, fertile farmland, which could be rendered useless by the establishment of the missile system in this area.

Other areas which are under consideration include one in Utah and Nevada. The Air Force reportedly has under consideration three alternatives: (1) locating the entire system in Texas-New Mexico; (2) locating the entire system in Utah-Nevada and (3) locating part of the system in Texas-New Mexico and part of it in Utah-Nevada.

One member of the Air Force team indicated that emotional appeals concerning loss of land would not weigh heavily in the Air Force's evaluation of the hearings.

"It's like a highway. Everybody uses it, and certain people have to give up their land they don't want to give up," the official was quoted as

At the hearing Wednesday night at Clovis, which was attended by between 500 and 600 people at Marshall Junior High School Auditorium, opponents of the missile system came up with a couple of good

reasons to oppose the location of the missiles, besides the ruination of agricultural land.

One man asked the Air Force officials conducting the hearing if the location of the missile system in this area would displace people living here. The answer was that if half of the system were located in the Texas-New Mexico site, a total of 141 families would be displaced. If the entire system were located here, it would displace a total of 1400

"How many people would be moved if it were located in Nevada-Utah?" the man asked. "Zero," was the official's reply.

Another speaker pointed out that the U.S. Constitution prohibits the federal government from acquiring land without the consent of the legislature, and cited the particular law. In addition, it was pointed out that the state of New Mexico has recently passed a law that this ruling would be strictly enforced.

"This would indicate that if the Air Force tries to put the system over without the legislature's approval, we could be facing a long series of court battles to prove the legality of the situation," stated Don Fortenberry, farmer in the Rhea community who attended the Clovis hearing.

In all, over 20 people spoke concerning the missile proposal at the Clovis hearing, and only one of the speakers spoke in favor of bringing the system to this area. This was a man identified as the fire marshall of DeBaca County. "Then you can have it in DeBaca County," retorted a member of the audience.

The MX missile program proposes a system whereby hundreds of missile (Continued on Page 6)

expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 21, 1930 The Magnolia Petroleum Company is building a new filling station on the corner opposite the Friona State Bank which is expected to be finished

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1935 Report from the Wheat Allotment Committee is to the effect that the wheat farmers are going strong for signing the applications for contracts. It appears that all the old signers are coming back and many new ones who had not signed the former contracts are filling their applications.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1940

Since Saturday of last week, Friona can boast of having a real bowling alley, probably the first of the kind that has ever been in operation here. The recreation center is under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Dorsey, formerly of Bovina, and they state that their business will be conducted to entertain spectators and

At a regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court, Monday, a petition for a bond election to be held for the purpose of issuing bonds for the building of Highways "86" and "214" across Parmer County, and signed by an adequate number of voter citizens of the County, was presented. By a unanimous action of the Court, the petition was granted and an election has been called for December 21st.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1950

Friona and the surrounding agricultural area will have the services of a full-time, professional manager of its Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture beginning next week. Negotiations were completed Tuesday night by the board of directors of the re-activated organization to employ J.A. Romich

of Nocona, Texas, as the first manager of such an enterprise here. Mr. Romich signified his intention to arrive tomorrow or next day ready to begin an immediate work program.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1955 Thieves early Tuesday morning

broke into the Villa Cafe in Friona, getting off with an estimated \$245 haul of cash and small merchandise items. Petty cash in amount of \$31.20 was taken, together with cigarette machine inventory of \$152.70, plus cigars, cigarettes and miscellaneous items. Entrance was made through a rear door, with use of a glass cutter being evident in removing a segment of glass enabling unlocking of the door from the inside. Merchandise was scattered about, the cigarette machine broken open, a music box damaged in unsuccessful attempt to enter the cash compartment, and most cabinet drawers in the cafe were opened.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1960

The bidistrict clash puts the surprising Chiefs, picked to finish third in district, against undefeated untied Denver City, which has been ranked as the top team in the state for the AA classification at times during the year.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1970 The City of Friona passed a

resolution to join the Panhandie Regional Planning Commission at a "routine" session of the city council on Monday. City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland explained that the role of the PRPC was to coordinate efforts to solve the problems of the area, and to allow each government body to have a part.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1970

Parmer County ranked third in the state in farm marketings in 1974 with a total from crops, livestock and government payments of \$159,990,000, according to a report issued by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., for the 25 counties represented by the Lubbock-based organization. 

Leahy Completes **Training Course**



During the eight-week training cycle, he studied general military subjects designed to prepare him for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic occupational fields.





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



"silos" would be constructed within the missile area. Only a limited number of nuclear warheads would be used, and the Air Force would play "shell game" with the missiles, moving them from silo to silo, in an effort to confuse the enemy observers as to the exact location of the missiles.

Air Force officials claim that only about 21/2 acres of farmland would be utilized for each site, but farmers point out that the fact that restrictions placed on proximity to the sites would mean that every place a silo is built would virtually ruin the section of ground for farming purposes.

For one thing, a system of roads would be constructed to connect the various missile sites. One of the officials, Col. Bill Sims, indicated that 1,500 miles of asphalt road and 6,500 miles of dirt roads would have to be built in New Mexico alone, before construction of the missile shelters could start.

Following the fourth of the series of meetings on Wednesday, the Air Force officials were to fly back to Washington, D.C., to draft its "impact statement" as a result of the current series of "scoping" hearings. The draft is expected to be released by December 15, after which more public comments, both written and through public hearings, will be accepted for 90 days.

The MX missile timetable calls for a decision on the site location sometime in the calendar year 1981. Construction on roads and utilities for the main MX base would begin in 1982, the Air Force says, with construction on the base to begin in 1983. By 1984, construction of the MX missile shelters is to commence.

Portions of the MX system (10 missiles), are programmed to be operational by 1986, with the total MX system to be totally operational by 1989, with 200 missiles.







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

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

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

It is perhaps the crowning irony of the outgoing administration that the same people who scrapped the very defense systems which could have provided a credible deterrent in the early 1980s are now trying to foist off on the tax-paying public the farce and the fraud known as the land-based MX Missile. While the missile itself has merit, along with the Trident Submarine and a modified B-1 Bomber armed with Cruise Missiles, for future defense needs, the "shell game" concept on U.S. soil was designed more by the Carter Administration to confuse the public about our current vulnerability than it was to confuse the Soviets.

Taking the issue one step further. to attempt to take prime farm land for this MX system is totally ridiculous. Food will be the most important commodity of the '80s, just as oil was in the '70s. Shortages in basic grains are possible even this coming year. We need productive acres for food production for a hungry world.

The devastation to the ecology and the economics in the Panhandle of Texas and Eastern New Mexico area would be large, and hard to even measure with initial planning. To take \$15 million in tax monies in a time of huge budget deficits and waste it in determining whether it is feasible to spend \$50 billion on a missile system that would be obsolete before it could become operational, even under the best of conditions, is typical of this past administration, and symbolic of the reason why there are going to be many new Senators as well as a new administration in Washington in January.

Placing the MX here is infeasible. We will not permit it to happen, so long as this is a free nation. So these hearings should be discontinued immediately, and the money used for balancing the budget.

Water District Sets Election

Parmer County residents within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's service area will go to the polls on January 17 to elect four representatives, including a District Director for Precinct Three (in Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties) and three Parmer County Committeemen.

Parmer County's District Secretary, Pat Kunselman, is now accepting Application-Affidavits at the district office in Bovina from candidates who are eligible to serve as District Committeemen. Any individual who is 18 years of age and who has resided within the district's election boundaries for six months preceding the January 17, 1981 election date, is eligible to serve.

A committeeman may serve two consecutive four year terms under the by-laws of the District. Directors are not restricted in the number of terms they may serve.

Three Parmer committeemen's terms expire in January. Men currently serving in

those positions are Ronald Elliott, elected to his first four year term in 1977; and Troy Christian and Dalton Caffey who were both elected to their first terms in 1973 and again in 1977. Both are now ineligible for re-

Two additional Parmer County Committeemen whose current terms will expire in 1983 are Floyd Reeve of Friona and Ralph Roming of Bovina.

District Director A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is currently serving as a member of the Board. He was elected to his first term in 1973 and is eligible for re-election.

Any interested candidate must sign an Application-Affidavit by December 28 to have his or her name placed on the ballot. Affidavits received by December 11 will be presented at the December Board of Directors meeting, and these qualified applicant's names will be included in the legal notice to be published prior to the election.

Candidates are encouraged to submit their Application-Affidavits soon. Forms are available at the Parmer County secretary's office at Bovina City Hall, for your convenience.





SCOTT JOHNSON Problems Plague Postal Service

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. "At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," the Postmaster said recently.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable, the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. The Postmaster urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around

Parcels are generally shipped in bags, and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side, and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing account for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

Johnson is a 1980 graduate of Bovina High School and is presently attending Lubbock Christian College

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
