## **Controlling Food Prices Rules Will Be Disclosed**

SILENCE Sex, Sadism Arraignments

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Cost of Living Council planned today to release its new Phase 4 regulations for controlling food prices, which spiralled last month despite the government's price freeze. The latest Consumer Price

Index showed that food prices increased eight-tenths of one per cent in July, in defiance of the 60-day price freeze intended to keep the lid on costs. To a shopper, the July increase meant spending less than one cent per dollar more on groceries, but food prices for the last six months still were increasing at an annual rate of 17.8 per cent, a government official said.

## **Gripes Aired** To Carriers **On Service**

Meeting today with representatives of three motor carrier freight firms, 20 local businessmen aired complaints about slow shipments, unreliable delivery times and damaged freight claims.

Represented at the morning meeting were the Chamber of Commerce, T&P Railroad, Merchants Fast Motor Lines and United Parcel Service.

The businessmen discussed possible advantages of attracting additional carriers to service Big Spring and of getting the authority of the East Texas Motor Freight, Braswell and Western Gillette firms revoked

While many present indicated dissatisfaction with ETMF in particular, one calling its service actually a "disservice," most seemed to agree that ETMF, Braswell and Western Gillette are doing Big Spring no good.



HOUSTON (AP) - District Court Judge William Hatten postponed today the arraignments of two youths charged with murder in the sex and sadism case in which the bodies of 27 young persons have been recovered.

Elmer Wayne Henley, 17, and David Owen Brooks, 18, had been expected to enter pleas of innocence to the charges but Hatten postponed the arraignments until Oct. 8 after hearing from defense lawyers.

Hatten granted, however, motions by Dist. Atty.Carol Vance for orders directing that Henley and Brooks undergo immediate examination by the Harris County psychiatric unit.

Hatten called Henley's arraignment first.

After reading the three murder charge indictments returned against the youth, Hatten asked, "How do you plead?"

Henley stoo d but remained silent. His lawyer, Charles Melder, told Hatten his client had not been served personally with copies of the indictments.

Hatten then read an indictment in which Brooks is charged jointly with Henley in the death of one teen-age boy whose body has been recovered.

Brooks also stood but remained silent. Attorney Ted Musick told the judge he had not had an opportunity to talk extensively with his client.

Hatten then ordered the postponment until 9 a.m. Oct. 8.

Both Melder and Musick had told newsmen last week their clients would enter pleas of innocence. Melder said, however, part of his defense would be a claim of insanity.

Both Melder and Musick objected to Vance's motions for psychiatric examinations although Melder did not repeat an earlier objection in which he contended such an examination would violate Henley's constitutional right against selfincrimination.


Stein also noted there have been substantial new food price increases since the price freeze was lifted July 18.

The freeze had an over-all effect on the economy, holding total consumer price increases for July to two-tenths of one per cent, down from an average monthly increase of six-tenths of one per cent during the first six months of the year, the index shows.

the cities of Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan for an increase in the company's domestic and commercial gas rates. In the application, Pioneer has requested a rate increase of 26.6 per cent which would permit the company a 7.08 per cent return on the fair

In announcing the rate request, K. B. (Tex) Watson, president of Pioneer, made reference to a recently completed independent study of Pioneer earnings from the Big Spring distribution system. Watson pointed out that the mayors of the three cities involved were notified last December by Pioneer that the study of the facilities was to be made and that the city officials were invited to participate in the inspection.

**RRC MAN HELPS** In addition to the inspection team of an independent consulting firm, Watson said that a representative of the Railroad Commission of Texas participated in the survey. A report of the findings of the study was presented to members of the commissions in Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan about the middle of May.

The report shows that during 1972. Pioneer sustained a loss in its operations of the Big Spring distribution system. It is noted in the report that in 1970 the Texas Railroad Commission established an allowed rate of return on Pioneer's West Texas Transmission System of 7.375 per cent. The 1972 gross revenue deficiency applicable to the Big Spring distribution system based on this allowed rate of return amounted to





# Agnew Accuses Justice Agency Of Smear, Trial By Headline

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President Spiro T. Agnew has accused Justice Department officials of subjecting him to a campaign of smear publicity and trial by headline in "a clear and outrageous effort" to influence a federal grand jury investigating him.

But the Justice Department said there is no evidence to support Agnew's claim.

Referring to reports he said he believed were leaked to the news media, Agnew declared Tuesday that he had to assume "that some Justice Department officials have decided to indict me in the press whether or not the evidence supports their position.

UNFAIR PUBLICITY Responding to Agnew's charges, Atty. Gen. Elliot L. Richardson said the Justice Department was concerned with unfair and inaccurate publicity about the grand jury in Baltimore which is investigating allegations of kickbacks and political corruption in Maryland.

But, in his statement, Richardson said there is no evidence thus far

to implicate law enforcement officials in the news leaks. He said an investigation into the leaks is continuing.

In Baltimore, U.S. Atty. George Beall, reiterated a statement made earlier this month that neither he nor any of the other prosecutors in the case were the sources of news leaks. HUNT LEAKS

Beall is heading the grand jury probe.

"I regret to say that it has become clear that the 'sources close to the investigation' so frequently quoted were indeed just that - persons involved in the investigatory process," Agnew said.

Facing newsmen for the second time in two weeks. Agnew read a prepared eight-minute statement in which he said that he had called on Richardson to vigorously pursue the hunt for Justice Department leaks and plug them.

"It is through proper investigation of all the facts that the truth will emerge - not through trial by headline or by hearing only part of the story," Agnew said. "I am confident that the orderly processes of

justice will result in my complete vindication."

Agnew was notified in a letter from Beall Aug. 2 that he was under investigation by the grand jury for possible criminal violation of tax, bribery, extortion and conspiracy laws in connection with allegations that Maryland contractors paid kickbacks to politicians in return for favored treatment in the awarding of 10bs.

#### PRETTY SOLID

In a statement Aug. 6 and again at a news conference Aug. 8, Agnew proclaimed his innocence of all allegations against him.

Despite Agnew's protestations reliable sources speaking prior to Agnew's appearance Tuesday characterized the evidence against him as massive.

The sources told The Associated Press that Agnew never would have been notified he was under investigation if the evidence hadn't been "damned solid."

"It should be obvious that the letter wouldn't have been sent to Agnew if there wasn't sufficient evidence for an indictment in the view of the investigators," one source said.

## WITH STRIKE AT END **Teachers Make** Play For Pay

HOUSTON (AP) - A negotiating team of teachers met with school board officials today to resume negotiations on teacher demands for higher pay and better working conditions.

About 1,400 teachers struck the opening of the Houston Independent School District Monday but decided to return to the classrooms Tuesday and start negotiating again under protest.

#### **NEED \$800**

The teachers have lowered their demand for an acros-the-board \$1,000 annual pay boost, to \$800 but teacher officials say the school board has turned that down.

The teachers also say they are seeking better working conditions, including cleaner buildings, more money for supplies and better security.

One teacher said he went on the one-day strike because of conditions

at Fleming Junior High School. "I get only 15 minutes to eat

lunch," said Tom Hoeffner. "Students have no toilet paper in the restrooms. Teachers have their tires slashed and after a football game last year students and teachers were stoned by the victors.'

#### **UNDER BRIDGE**

Acting school board president George Oser said the strike underscored the district's financial problems, "I hope the public will better appreciate the financial needs of the district," he said.

Oser criticized the Houston Teachers Association, which backed the strike, for "sometimes giving inaccurate information" to teachers. He said HTA officials had failed to spell out in detail to teachers the administration's counter-proposals prior to the strike.

"But the strike is water under the bridge now," Oser said.

Much was made of a Census Bureau report showing that substantial economic progress had been made by the nation's nonwhite families. And indeed the statistical data looks impressive.

In the report, the proportion of black families earning over \$10,000 a year was shown to have jumped from 9 per cent in 1961 to 30 per cent a decade later. And the median income of black families doubled during the decade of the 1960s, while over the same period income of whites rose by only 69 per cent.-

We can take pride in that record of progress. But pride should be tempered by other figures, since released, which show how far we have yet to go before economic equality and equality of opportunity really are reached.

A Census Bureau report issued in March examines the U.S. poverty picture. It shows that about 1.1 million Americans crossed the official "poverty line" last year, and the number of poor declined.

At last I've found an authoress I can truly identify with. I'm an advocate of the Phyllis Diller school of thought when it comes to cooking and housekeeping. When I read "Nobody Said You Had to Eat Off the Floer," I thought someone was plagiarizing my thoughts.

LET'S FACE facts, ladies. Some women like some of the housework all of the time, and all of the housework some of the time, but none of us like all of the housework all of the time. Carol Eisen tells you why and what to do about it in her book which is subtitled, "The Psychiatrist's Wife's Guide to Housekeeping.'


My favorite chapter was "Why You're Crazy." It explains how the ego tries to balance the id and the super-ego. In other words, why you sit down and read when you should be cleaning the ring out of the bathtub. It also gives explanations for why you enjoy some housekeeping tasks while abhoring others. In many cases, it's a resentment built from childhood. No kidding!

According to Mrs. Eisen, effective housekeeping is based on organization and having a schedule. She points out that the night you're planning a dinner party for 25 guests is, not the time to sort your old buttons according to weight, or to arrange the food in your refrigerator in alphabetical order.

Basically, she says the three elements women deal with in housekeeping are "ease, elegance and economy." And she stresses that you cannot have all three at once. For ease and elegance, hire a full-time maid; for elegance and economy, be your own full-time maid; and for ease and economy without elegance, do your house in formica, linoleum and contact paper.

It's delightful, and I promise you'll feel better after you read it. If your husband reads it too, that's even better. It'll help him realize that running a house is, as Mrs. Eisen puts it, the most damnable and demanding job ever devised.





WASHINGTON - In his last year and a half in office Lyndon Johnson as a crippled President who had renounced re-election stayed with few exceptions in his public appearances within the confines of audiences certain to be if not sympathetic then safe. Military installations, hawkish groups supporting his bombing of North Vietnam and the expansion of the war in South Vietnam, this was the arena where he could hopefully get applause and where protesters would be at a minimum.

That is a dismaying precedent for President Richard Nixon who has three and a half years to go. He chose for his first appearance after his televised address the national convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in New Orleans.

**SOUNDING A** clarion call to patriotism, coupled with an appeal for help against those who would exploit Watergate to interfere with his responsibilities to the nation and the world, he could anticipate a roaring response. Here, too, was a precedent that finally found its way to the courts.

When the President went to Charlotte, N.C., for "Billy Graham Day" his mission in behalf of his great friend had been carefully plotted. A memorandum introduced in the Ervin committee investigation told of the threat of violent protests and demonstrations to disrupt the celebration. On his memorandum H. H. Haldeman, then one of the President's two chief lieutenants, had written "great" and "good."

"Did you really think that these demonstrators were subversives?" Sen. Lowell Weicker asked Haldeman. "That was the information I had,"

he replied. At the rally in Charlotte strong-arm tactics were used against young people, some of them with long hair, some passing out pamphlets, "Nixon Is a Sinner." Fourteen young people brought suit for damages charging they had been assaulted and deprived of their civil rights. In a remarkable.

James B. McMillian spelled out in detail the bully-boy tactics used against the young protesters and ordered the case to trial on its merits. THE CHIEF bully boy was Ernie Helms of the Veterans of Foreign

Wars with a build, as Judge McMillan put it, like a Washington Redskins tackle. He seemed as chief bouncer to be coordinating the efforts of the army of Secret Service agents sent into Charlotte. Called to testify in the suit he refused, citing the Fifth Amendment privilege against selfincrimination.

In his 62-page opinion Judge Mc-Millan found that the young people were no threat whatsoever to the President. Although they carried no weapons of any kind and for the most part were circumspect in their behavior, they were hustled out of the hall even when they had been admitted with bona fide tickets of admission. Under Helms's direction these tickets were declared counterfeit and the young shoved back out.

The Charlotte police and the Secret Service agents, Judge McMillan found, "Participated in a wholesale assault upon the civil right and liberties of numerous citizens, in violation of the First, Fourth, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution." Secrecy in government, refusal to account to oppressed citizens for actions they suffered, is a way, the judge wrote, to breed tyranny.

ONE OF the few public addresses the President has made in the past three months was in late May when he spoke to the prisoners of war returned from Vietnam. Touching a half dozen patriotic themes he drew cheers and applause. The crescendo came when he said, "I think it is time in this country to quit making national heroes of those who steal secrets and publish them in the newspapers. 





DETROIT (AP) - Spurred by the gasoline shortage, small car sales are higher than ever and are expected to take the spotlight when the U.S. auto industry presents its 1974 models next month.

FORD, General Motors, Chrysler and American Motors all put heavy emphasis on their new offerings at the smaller, lower-priced end of the line.

The U.S. automakers sold 1,759,706 compact and subcompact cars in the first seven months of 1973, an increase of 436,333 over the same period last year. The small cars accounted for 29.3 per cent of U.S. domestic auto sales in the first seven months of this year, compared with 22.4 per cent in the same period of 1972.

Small foreign cars also are selling well. Volkswagen sold 296,934 cars in the first six months of this year, compared with 265,366 in the first half of 1972.

Mazda, the only car on the U.S. market with the Wankel rotary engine, has sold 73,055 cars so far this year, compared with 27,210 for

the same period last year.

THE INCREASES have occurred despite the dollar devaluation that made imports more expensive. "The dollar devaluation didn't help, but the fuel crisis did," said a spokesman for Volvo, which reported sales of 34,122 cars in the first six months this year. That's almost 7,000 more than in the same period last year.

The U.S. automakers aren't ignoring the big cars — which George Romney, former president of AMC. once called "gasoline guzzling dinosaurs." But it appeared virtually certain that the hot spot in the 1974 auto sales race would be the small car field.

Entries such as AMC's new compact-sized Matador II coupe and Ford's rejuvenated Mustang line were typical of offerings in that category.

American manufacturers expressed confidence their small-car offerings would further blunt the inroads of foreign cars into the U.S. market.

There was general agreement among them that the foreign-car share of the U.S. market which reached 15 per cent in 1970 and 13.3 per cent last year, would be reduced next year.

## Ritz Cowen Awaits Jury's Beckon

ODESSA — The Ector County grand jury Tuesday agreed to hear testimony from J. Fred Cowen, suspended Ector County Coliseum manager and former Big Spring resident, as the jury's probe of coliseum records got under way.

Cowen, in a hand-delivered letter addressed to District Attorney John Green but directed to the grand jury foreman, Ed Barham, said he would appear to testify, along with his attorney, Guil Jones

of Big Spring. Cowen was suspended from the county payroll last week after he had given a second statement in connection with charges he brought last year that Robert Glenn Tucker, 27, of Lubbock, had atempted to

bribe him. Cowen said that Tucker offered him \$740 on July 14, 1972 to remove 1,000 tickets to the Alice Cooper Show from a drop box at the coliseum.

Tucker was to have gone on trial in district court here last Tuesday, Green, however, did not push the prosecution and maintains the charges against Tucker will be dropped.

The younger Pamplin arrived at the scene at about the same time that two linemen from the Southwest Electrical Service Co. drove up. They found the two officers on the ground, both dead from gunshot wounds in the head.

## School Nears At Lamesa




