EGYPTIAN TROOPS TRAPPED ON EAST BANK

Three Copters Shot Down

Israel reported that its air and ground forces shot down three Egyptian helicopters over the southwest coast of the Sinai peninsula early today.

Israel said the air battle did not interrupt the delivery of emergency supplies of food, water and medicine to Egyptian troops stranded on the Sinai side of the Suez Canal.

TROOPS TRAPPED Egyptian trucks with U.N. drivers were delivering the supplies for the Egyptian 3rd Army, an Israeli spokesman said, and they were being loaded on Egyptian barges and boats that were carrying them to the troops trapped on the east bank.

The spokesman said the supplies were being ferried from a part of the town of Suez, at the southern end of the canal, that is still controlled by the Egyp-

"It is going slowly because they do not have enough boats, we believe," the spokesman said.

DEADLOCK The International Red Cross

Committee in Geneva announced that Israel was refusing to let Red Cross trucks with medical supplies pass through its lines to the Egyptian 3rd Army as long as Egypt and Syria refused to supply lists of the Israelis they captured in the war. But this deadlock apparently had no bearing on the

other supply operations.

The Israelis had hinted earlier that Egyptian violations of the cease-fire could endanger U.N. supply convoys which began moving Sunday to Egyptian troops and civilians trapped behind the Israeli lines. But the communique report-

On the west side of the canal Sunday, 100 Egyptian trucks with U.N. drivers began passing through the Israeli lines 60 miles from Cairo with food, water and medical supplies for the 3rd Army and the thousands of civilians trapped in Suez, the Egyptian town at the southern

end of the canal. The first convoy of 10 trucks was reported to have reached the canal by midnight, but a U. N. spokesman in Jerusalem said at 7 a.m. that he had no word that it had crossed to the Egyptian troops on the east

Another convoy of 10 trucks

soldiers said there were 15,000 civilians.

The Israelis said Sunday that Egyptian artillery had opened up on the first convoys, apparently by mistake. There were no casualties.

Advance units of the U. N. peacekeeping force also arrived at Suez and Ismailia and began making arrangements to bring in larger units to police the cease-fire.

Egypt temporarily from the U.N. peacekeeping force in Cyprus, the 200 Finnish troops were to be based in Suez, the 200 Swedes at Ismailia, which is at the midpoint of the canal,

> U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim hopes to complete recruiting the new Middle East force of 7,000 men from 10 to 15 countries by Tuesday or Wednesday, a U.N. spokesman in New York reported. He said the first of these troops should arrive by next weekend.

Israel, meanwhile, complained to U.N. observers of an Egyptian cease-fire violation, saying that an Egyptian commando platoon slipped across the Suez Canal from the east bank Sunday and attacked Israeli forces north of the town of Suez.

Central to this latest potential collision between Nixon and Congress is whether a new prosecutor will get access to sensitive White House materials, which could be evidence in one or another of the cases broadly lumped under the title of Watergate.

Cox said Sunday the nine sought "were clearly only a first step in seeking a great deal of important evidence from the White House."

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., a member of the Judiciary Committee, said he would seek to determine whether Cox believes he was fired because the trail in the Watergate investigation was leading to President Nixon.

U.S. Sending Ships Into Indian Ocean

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States, in response to the continuing buildup of Soviet naval strength in the Mediterranean, is sending a carrier task force into the nearby Indian Ocean, the Pentagon said today.

Pentagon spokesman Jerry W. Friedheim said the order dispatching the U.S. carrier Hancock and five destroyers from the Pacific Ocean fleet was delivered during last week's near confrontation with the Soviet Union.

U.S. officials said a decision has not been made on whether the carrier task force will continue toward the Middle East.

The Soviet fleet has continued growing in the Mediterranean since the beginning of the new fighting in the Middle East. Friedheim said the Russian fleet increased over the weekend from 85 vessels to 90. More than half of the 90 ships are combat vessels.

The newlyweds, along with Laurie and Morris Hodges who had their 4-month-old son baptized, are members of the Delancey Street Foundation, a rehabilitation program for ex-convicts and drug users. Behan and Hodges have spent a combined total of more than 30 years behind bars.

The former federal penitentiary in San Francisco Bay is now part of the national park system and open to public tours.

MIDLAND - An attempted implosion Sunday of Midland's Hotel Scharbauer brought part of the landmark structure crashing to the ground but didn't bring the whole house down.

Charges set in 400 places throughout the basement and first floor of the six-story structure succeeded in collapsing the original structure built in 1928 but left an addition built in 1951 still standing.

It was reportedly the first failure with such implosions for Jack Brown, manager of the Engineered Explosions Services division of Welex which has demolished other taller structures such as the Worth Hotel in Fort Worth.

A crowd of several thousand viewed the attempted demolition, planned as the first step toward construction of the Midland Hilton, a 14-story hotel, on the same site.

Steel beams used for the outer walls of the addition, a parking garage, was blamed for failure of the implosion.

What action do you take? A .- With unbalanced hands containing a void in the enemy suit, it is against our policy to stand for penalty doubles of low-level contracts. Therefore, our recommended action is to bid two dia-

Scurry Panel Wins Award

The Scurry County Historical Survey Committee was named first-place winner of the award for Best County Historical Survey Committee Newsletter.

The award was made at 'the annual meeting of the Texas Historical Commission last weekend in Fort Worth. The Scurry County group is headed by Hugh Boren Jr., Snyder.

This award is designed to encourage wider distribution, on the local level, of news of the survey committee's activities and of general news relating to historical preservation.

The Harris County Heritage Society, based in Houston, was named recipient of one of the most prestigious history awards given by the state of Texas the Ruth Lester Award for Meritorious Service in Historical Preservation.

The Harris County Heritage Society was formed in the 1950s in response to the threatened demolition of an 1847 structure which had once been a home and early school in Houston. Since then it has saved scores of buildings.

Among the winning counties in historical survey committee evaluation (from this area) were Garza, Midland, Scurry, and Tom Green.







"The basic problem in the energy crisis is with oil and coal," said Goodwin. "Both are in short supply, and the country is using more and more of them.

Demonstration Club.

Goodwin said the four sources of energy are gas, coal, oil and nuclear power. He said coal is more plentiful than gas or oil, but not in this part of the country. He said TESCO has joined with Texas Power and Light and Dallas Power and Light to research development of lignite. This is a form of soft coal.

According to Goodwin, there are currently 31 nuclear power plants in operation and 53 under construction. He said longrange plans are to use more coal and nuclear power for energy.

Goodwin discussed the current trend of recycling glass, metal and paper, and said that although it is a good idea, the process takes more energy. Therefore, while recycling helps one of the country's ecological problems, at the same time it increases the energy problem. In conjunction with the program, Goodwin showed a film, "Energy Situation."





It remains to be seen, of course, how well the U.S.-Soviet move 'to end the fighting in the Middle East fares in bringing peace to the area. Many questions remain unresolved, and still offer the opportunity for a renewal of the fighting. But if the guns can be stilled, it might at least provide an atmosphere in which negotiation might have a chance.

Actually, it seems that the U.S.-Soviet agreement was not so much a product of the heralded "detente" as of old-fashioned Cold War maneuver, made more effective by the Russian desire for increased trade with this country.

There is no question that the Soviet Union sought advantage from the renewed Middle East fighting. The Russians quickly began to supply the Arab armies with arms once the shooting started, ac-

cording to our intelligence, and brushed aside our early appeals to the spirit of detente. Only when the United States began its own airlift of supplies to Israel, restoring the military balance, and the war momentum shifted to the Israeli side did the Soviet peacemaking go into operation. Even, then, an undiplomatic gesture triggered a

Thus the detente, which has been the setpiece and pride of the Nixon-Kissinger diplomacy, was

revealed to be something less substantial than we had been led to believe. When the first crunch came, the Soviet Union reverted to self-interest toughness, our own toughness seemed to moderate

If Kissinger, working with the Soviet Union, can now bring about negotiations leading to a peace foundation in the Middle East, it will be an accomplishment prhaps eclipsing his Nobel -Prize-winning efforts ending the war in Vietnam.

Commonsense Additions

We Americans being the way we are - "it can't happen to me" - the automobile safety-belt harness that must be fastened before the car

can start is a good thing. In time, the feeling that it is a complicated bother will wear off and its use will be routine. It will save lives and reduce serious injuries and that's what counts.

Some drivers are complaining about it, but another 1974 safety feature dealing with bumpers is not controversial. All 1974 cars must have front and rear bumpers that will resist damage in crashes at 5 miles

per hour or less. Of even more importance, this year for the first time bumpers are designed to have "matching capability" — that is they meet each other regardless of the difference in size of cars.

What a common-sense rule that is. It wil save millions of dollars annually across the nation.

Do you think she should pay all her life for one mistake?

This shows again that the problem of drugs is one affecting all of us, and the solution requires total mobilization of community effort.

Your daughter's mistake is of the unfortunate kind that exacts a price long after the problem is solved. It's regrettable that employers are suspicious, and hence reluctant to hire her, but personnel departments are more guided by past facts than future feelings.

There must be some other kind



WASHINGTON - The overpowering sense of despair and foreboding which filled the House Republican cloakroom Tuesday morning was by no means transformed into jubilation with President Nixon's sudden surrender of the subpoenaed tape recordings at 2

ALTHOUGH Republiran Congressmen were gratedul that the crisis had diminished and immediate dangers of impeachment had disappeared, their resentment toward Mr. Nixon lingered. "Some of us are just etting tired of his crises," a senior House Republican told us in anger minutes after the surprise presidential capitulation on the tapes issue.

The bitter mood in the House cloakroom reflected a nationwide bad temper among Republicans. The President's weekend shocks produced an unexpected and unprecedented hostilty among his own party's loyalists, influencing his decision to retreat on the tapes and making his presidency even more difficult in the foreseeable future.

IN SUM, Richard M. Nixon's prestige in his own party is at its nadir. For the first time, many Republican loyalists are looking at him not as a master politician sometimes insensitive to party interests, but as a political incompetent.

NO SUCH adverse Republican reaction was expected at the White House. "Sure, we're in for a fight," said a presidential aide soon after Mr. Nixon precipitated the new crisis, "but it's our kind of fight." In other words, the White House expected Mr. Nixon's Republican base to mobilize for him against his enemies.

THAT THIS would not happen and that the public reaction would differ from all previous Nixon presidential crises were apparent by Monday morning. Republican members of Congress reported the public reaction was overwhelmingly against the President, For example, Rep. John Ashbrook found solid Republican regulars in his conservative central

Ohio district were protesting. He even received a telegram from one local party committeeman calling for Mr. Nixon's impeachment. Other Republican Congressmen were amazed to find similar reaction.

SUCH REPUBLICAN criticism can be partly traced to narrow partisan cerns. Local party leadere grumble that Mr. Nixon thoughtlessly damaged Republican candidates in the off-year elections Nov. 6. Moreover, presidential willingness to sacrifice Elliot Richardson as attorney general and william Ruckeishaus as deputy at torney general in order to get Archibald Cox's scalp as special prosecutor was not shared in the Republican hinterland. Presidential aides soon discovered that the party faithful, while shedding no tears for Democrat Cox, regarded Richardson and Ruckelshaus as two ornaments of the administration and were bitter over their treatment.

MOST DISTURBING to these Republicans was their feeling that Mr. Nixon had blundered badly in putting Watergate back on the front pages at a time when they felt public attention might be turning elsewhere. In the battle now forming anew on the Watergate issue, the President may get precious little help from resentful Republicans.

Salesmen And Free Speech

Do door-to-door salesmen have a egal right to come calling at your home? Generally speaking, they do indeed, according to the United States

"The knocker on the front door," the Court has ruled, "is an invitation." BUT INVITATIONS can be revoked.

And one way you can revoke this particular invitation is by posting a notice saying "NO SOLICITING, PLEASE" — or words to that effect. Any solicitor who disregards such a notice would probably be considered trespasser. This, in turn, would reduce your chances of liability in case he happens to stumble over a

stray toy or trip on a broken step. FOR THE DUTY of a householder toward a trespasser is slight. You are not required to clear away hazzards on your premises, but merely to refrain from injuring him reckless-

ly or on purpose. What about "NO SOLICITING" signs on apartment houses? Often posted by landlords, these signs have
