EVENTS OF THE past week have been a major factor in "bringing together" the people of America in a display of nationalism seen all too rarely in these modern times.

Perhaps not since the end of World War II has the country been united for a common cause as they were in the days leading up to, and immediately following the release of the 52 American hostages from Iran.

Americans were virtually unanimous in their feeling that their countrymen were being held illegally. And, although opinion had varied greatly about the ways and means of securing the release of the hostages, the unanimity showed once again in the joy exhibited by their freedom after 444 days of captivity.

Perhaps Americans were able to identify with the families of the hostages, putting themselves in their places and being able to "feel" what their reaction would be if they had been, in fact, directly involved in the hostage crisis.

But for whatever reason, Americans all across this great land came up with various ways of showing their joy at the release of the hostages.

The "yellow ribbon" fad caught on and quickly spread across the nation. Church bells tolled. In Texas, Governor Bill Clements proclaimed this past Sunday as "Hostage Sunday," in order that Texans might give thanks for the safe release of the Americans.

Unlike the Vietnam conflict, and even the Korean War, the hostage crisis gave Americans something they could rally behind—an opportunity to unite and display their Yankee independence.

It appears that the 14½ month long crisis may have served as a unifying instrument for our country, just as often-times the family unit is drawn closer during times of adversity.

From that angle, perhaps the crisis served a useful purpose.

WITH THE AUCTION sale last Saturday of the equipment and property of Adams Drilling, the city lost one of its oldest established businesses.

The business was hit by a destructive fire late in 1980, and the first thought by the owners was to rebuild. But, due to high costs, high interest, etc., it was later determined not to do so.

Adams Drilling Company helped develop the irrigation well business in this area. It's tough to lose a business of this stature, due to the payroll which is lost, plus the loss of service to the surrounding area.

HOWEVER, WE HAVE the makings of some better news on the business front. Don Finley reopened his donut and pastry shop this week on Main Street. Jerry Poarch is announcing this week his plans to move to the old Gibson's location on Highway 60, and the rumor is out that Poarch's old location will be filled by a current business.

So, hopefully our news will be taking an "upbeat" nature. At least the signs are pointing that way.

WE LEARNED THIS WEEK that our readership has virtually doubled, without our knowing it—in fact, without our having to print that many more papers.

Reception To Honor Charles Lovelace

A reception to honor former Parmer County sheriff, Charles Lovelace, has been scheduled for February 1, from 2-5 p.m. CST, with the entire population of Parmer County invited to attend.

Set to take place at the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell, the reception "is for Parmer County citizens to come and show their appreciation to Sheriff Lovelace," said Irene Woods, one of the reception organizers.

The reception is being organized by the Parmer County Sheriff's Department in recognition of their former boss, who stepped down from his office January 2 after 32 years as Parmer's top law official.

The organizing committee has invited area law enforcement officials, in addition to elected officials and employees of Parmer County, to attend the appreciation reception for Lovelace.

"But this is not reserved for law enforcement personnel alone. We want the entire Parmer population to attend and pay tribute to the former sheriff," said Mrs. Woods.

The committee will serve

refreshments, and a money tree will be provided for the former sheriff.

Lovelace chose not to run for reelection last year. He first took the sheriff's oath of office in January of 1948, and for the next 28 years he had no further opposition in his quest to retain the sheriff's badge.

Over his 32-year reign as Parmer's chief lawman, Lovelace watched crime prevention methods change drastically "from night to day" but said that crimes themselves have not changed at all, "there's just a big increase."

During a recent interview with the State Line Tribune, Lovelace expressed his feelings about his lawman role and Parmer's citizens by saying, "I have enjoyed this job very much, and appreciate the people of Parmer County who made it all possible."

The legendary law officer added, "I enjoy being a public servant. I enjoy doing something for somebody and helping them. There's a real feeling of accomplishment."

Parmer's citizens will have their chance to show their feelings of appreciation to Lovelace at the upcoming reception.

City Fights General Raise

General Telephone Company has filed with the Public Utilities Commission for a rate increase, and almost simultaneously with this announcement, officials of the City of Friona announce that they will fight the increase.

General has asked the PUC for additional revenues totalling \$44.6 million.

What does this mean in dollars and cents to the average telephone user?

"As near as I can tell, they are talking about service cost increases ranging from 29.5 per cent on the most basic services up to a 127.1 per cent increase on certain business

telephone services," says Friona Mayor B.K. Buske.

In addition to the hike in the cost of monthly service, the telephone company also is asking for initial installation charges to be hiked from \$62.50 to \$80.85 for residential, and from \$69.70 to \$98.85 for business telephones.

"General Telephone Company had a rate increase last October. They also were penalized \$4 million by the PUC for service problems. The City of Friona plans to join the other cities in the Texas Municipal League in fighting this proposed increase," Buske said this week.

C-C Supports Bond Issue

The Friona Chamber of Commerce's Committee on Membership and Commercial Growth met on Tuesday, January 27. The main topic was the pending bond election for additional city water.

After much discussion the committee voted to endorse the bond issue, subject to approval of the entire board of directors. A telephone poll was made and the board voted to endorse the upcoming bond issue.

The Chamber's board felt that securing adequate water supplies was

necessary in order to keep Friona a progressive, modern community.

In other action, the committee composed a letter to be sent to all members of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, asking for suggestions on how to improve the Chamber's role in the community.

The Chamber's board of directors encourages comments and criticism from the entire community in order to make the Chamber a more effective group.

50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 6, 1931

A White Leghorn hen belonging to A.J. Stephenson of this city presented him with an egg as big as the average goose egg. This egg measured six inches around the short way and eight inches around the long way and is now in the incubator at the Wicks Hatchery.

45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 7, 1936

The Friona Chiefs romped to a 19-16 victory over the Amarillo Sandies on Thursday evening in the local gym. This is the second game they have taken from Amarillo. The Friona second string beat the Clovis second string, 16-14.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 7, 1941

The next annual meeting of the Parmer County Singing Convention will be held in Friona on February 16, according to Arlie Green, president. Good singers from all parts of the county are expected to be present, as well as quartets, trios and choruses from neighboring counties.

35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 1, 1946

During the latter part of last week, F.L. Bandy of Clarendon purchased the "Helpy-Selfy Laundry" and took immediate charge of it. The laundry was purchased from a Mr. Lee, who several months earlier purchased the

business from Rev. E.E. Houlette, who originated the business several years ago.

Acreege Factor Is Terminated

The number of acres planted to program crops will not be an eligibility factor under the 1981 wheat, feed grains and cotton program, and any farm may participate in the program regardless of the number of acres of program crops planted on the farm, according to Prentice Mills, County Executive Director for Parmer County ASCS.

"It was announced earlier that a participating farm would be restricted to an acreage of program crops no larger than the farm's assigned Normal Crop Acreage (NCA)," said Mills who added, "This is not true now. There is no limitation on the acreage of program crops that may be planted on a participating farm."

Mills stated that all a person is required to do to participate in the program is to measure his acreages very carefully, report these acreages to the ASCS office and to sign an application for program benefits.

The ASCS director listed program benefits as: The Disaster Program "which is the same as it was in 1980." The loan program, "to be basically the same as it was in 1980 with the reserve program being available with interest-free loans," he said.

"Also, if the market should dip low enough, there will be a deficiency payment on applicable crops," Mills stated.

According to Mills, a farm's 1981 plantings will have no bearing on the NCA established for the farm in future years. "As far as is known at this time, there will be no voluntary set-aside acreage offered in 1981."

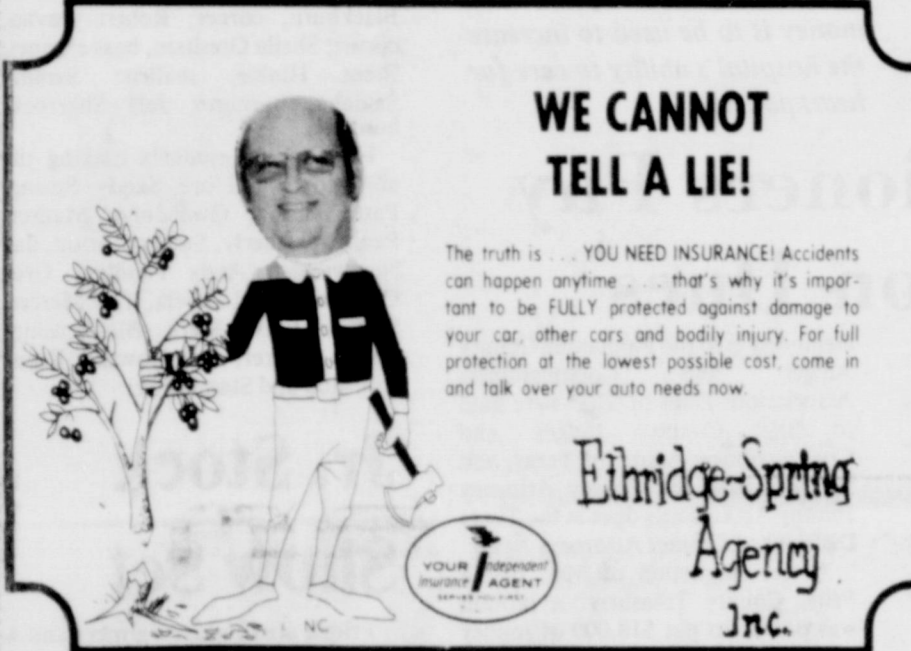
Target prices for 1981 were listed by Mills as feed grains, they will be at least-corn: \$2.35 bu.; grain sorghum: \$4.46 cwt.; barley: \$2.55 bu.; wheat-no less than \$3.81 bu.; cotton-somewhere between 68.5 and 75.5 cents per pound.

"Producers should encounter no problem in participating in the 1981 farm program," Mills remarked. "However," he said, "all are invited to contact their local ASCS office with any question they may have concerning the program."

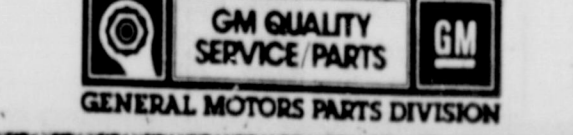

Resolution Honors Trio Of Hostages

Senator Bill Sarpalius today introduced a resolution honoring three Texans who were among the Iranian hostages who have been released. The Senate passed the resolution unanimously.

The three Texans honored by the Panhandle Senator and the full Senate are Lieutenant Commander Robert Engelmann of Hurst, William Royer, Jr. of Houston and Marine Sergeant John McKeel, Jr., of Balch Springs.

The resolution praised the bravery of the three Texans, "held in captivity in Iran for 444 days by a group of barbaric fanatics." Sarpalius' resolution told of the three Texans being "subjected for 14 months to physical abuse by being bound, gagged, blindfolded, pushed and shoved often in the presence of mobs of maniacal, militant Iranians who taunted and flaunted their

captives before the world."

Sarpalius, through his resolution, praised the courage, forbearance and dignity of the hostages, calling it "unsurpassed in history." The resolution also invited the three to visit the Senate for a personal welcome, heartfelt thanks, and recognition of valor. Additionally, each man will be presented with a Texas flag which was flown over the Texas Capitol on January 20, 1981, the day the former hostages were released.

"We as people have a lot to be proud of. If you don't believe that, look at these three men. These Texans have set an example for all of us. I am very proud of them, and I was glad to be able to show them the Senate is proud of them, too," Sarpalius said.

Solar Greenhouse Goes On Display In Amarillo

Radishes, onions and lettuce have been harvested from the winter garden in the attached solar greenhouse built last November by 25 Panhandle area residents and the West Texas State University Alternative Energy Institute.

Interested persons may view the attached greenhouse during an afternoon open house on Saturday, February 7. The greenhouse was built on the south side of the Combs-Worley Cottage of the Amarillo Children's Home at 3400 S. Bowie.

From 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on February 7, visitors will see the 18-foot-by-12-foot attached greenhouse which was constructed with new materials for less than \$1,800. Workshop participants will answer questions on design and construction.

The November workshop was sponsored by the Texas Solar Energy Society and WTSU's Alternative Energy Institute. Coordinating team members who will answer questions at the open house are Stacy Reese, instructor of horticulture in the Department of Plant Science of the WTSU School of Agriculture; Dr. Ron McBride, assistant professor of industrial education and technology; and Dr. Earl Gilmore, research professor with the WTSU Alternative Energy Institute.

Area workshop participants were selected from applicants in Amarillo, Canyon, White Deer, Perryton, Friona, Pampa and Spearman. Several of the participants plan to attend the open house.

During the open house, persons may register for a Solar Greenhouse Seminar, a one-day seminar on how to design and build an attached solar greenhouse which has been planned

for Saturday, April 11, at WTSU.

Meg Mooring, research associate with the Alternative Energy Institute, said a fee of \$30 per participant will be charged for the seminar. Registration forms will be available on February 7, she said.

Solar greenhouses are attached to the southern exposure of buildings to attract maximum sunlight, according

to the team members. Sunlight filters through fiberglass panels to heat water stored in barrels. The warm air from the water rises and circulates throughout the greenhouse and is vented into the adjoining cottage.

An additional heating source is provided and the greenhouse adds living space.

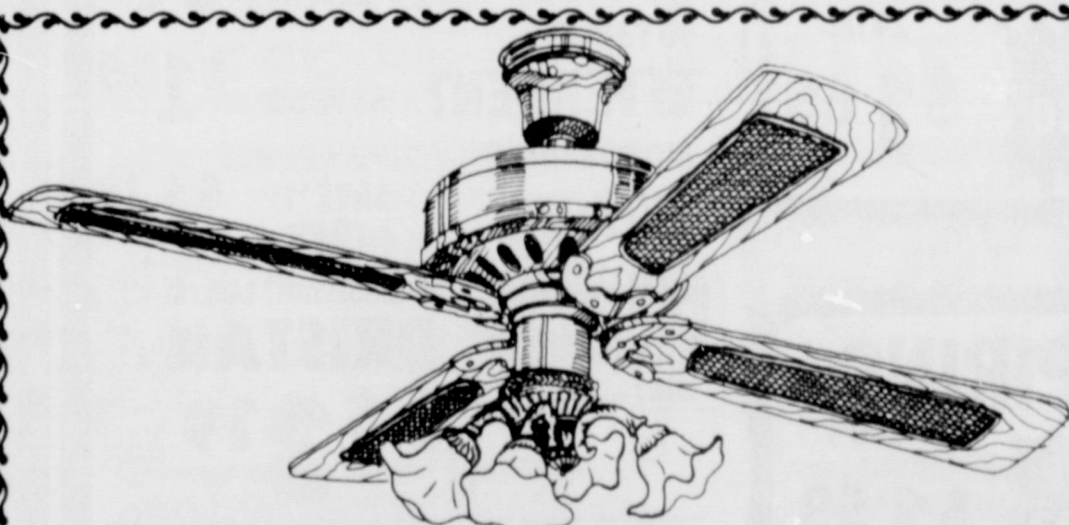

George Louder of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission appeared before the court to explain some of the programs his group administers.

The list of members of the Parmer County Historical Commission was approved.

Sheriff Bill Morgan reported on the cost of jail food, discussed recently. The court agreed to purchase a 20-foot food freezer, and that "T.V.

Check Cottonseed For Fatty Acid

Cotton farmers who are planning on saving seed from their 1980 crop should be sure it is high in germination and low in free fatty acid.

"Most farmers check germination closely but may not be aware of the importance of the free fatty acid content," Dr. James Supak, area cotton agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said.

"Free fatty acid is a by-product of seed deterioration so its content in seed should not be more than one per cent," Supak cautioned. Seed exposed to long periods of wet weather prior to harvesting or subjected to poor storage after harvesting will generally have a high acid content, indicating considerable seed deterioration, the Extension Service specialist noted.

The acid content of cottonseed may be especially important on the portion of the crop that was drought stressed and was still in the fields or in modules during the snow and rain this fall, explained Supak.

Cottonseed delinting plants commonly use the one-per cent level of free fatty acid as the breaking point in saving or rejecting seed for planting purposes, he said.

"Seed with a high acid content often shows a high germination test, initially, but these seed will deteriorate rapidly in storage and germination will drop," explained the cotton specialist. "Of course, a low acid content does not insure top quality seed. Immature seed may be low in free fatty acid content."

Supak advised producers against saving cottonseed for planting that has 1.5 per cent or more free fatty acid. Seed delinting companies can assist producers in obtaining an acid test on their planting seed, he noted. Numerous laboratories in the state also are equipped to check the acid content of cottonseed, the specialist said.

"Have your seed tested and if the free fatty acid is not a serious problem, store in a dry location," Supak recommended. "The use of high quality planting seed is very important in getting a crop up to a good, vigorously growing stand."

Friona's Chiefs basketball team went at it for another week against Boys Ranch and Lubbock Christian. Both games were played here in Friona.

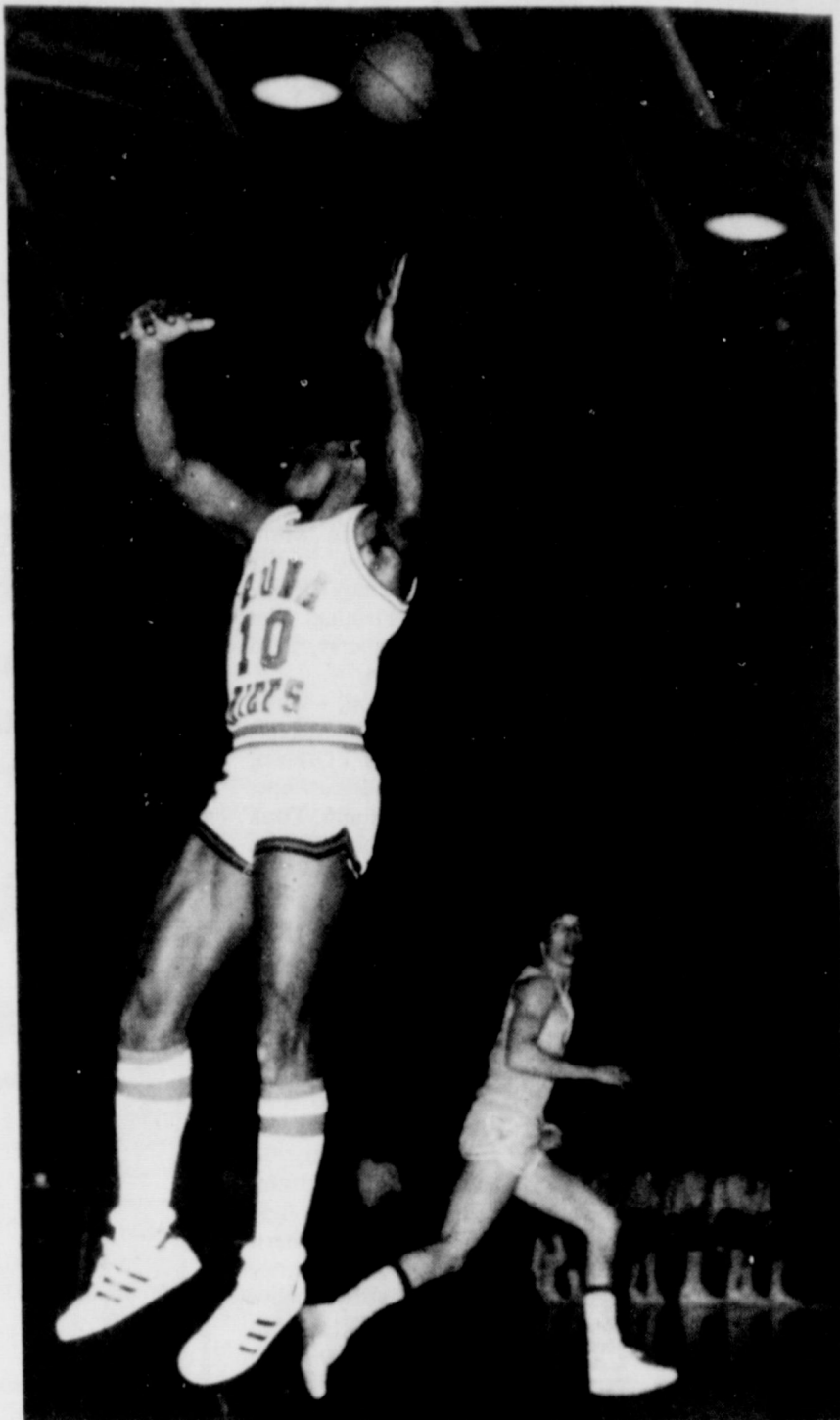

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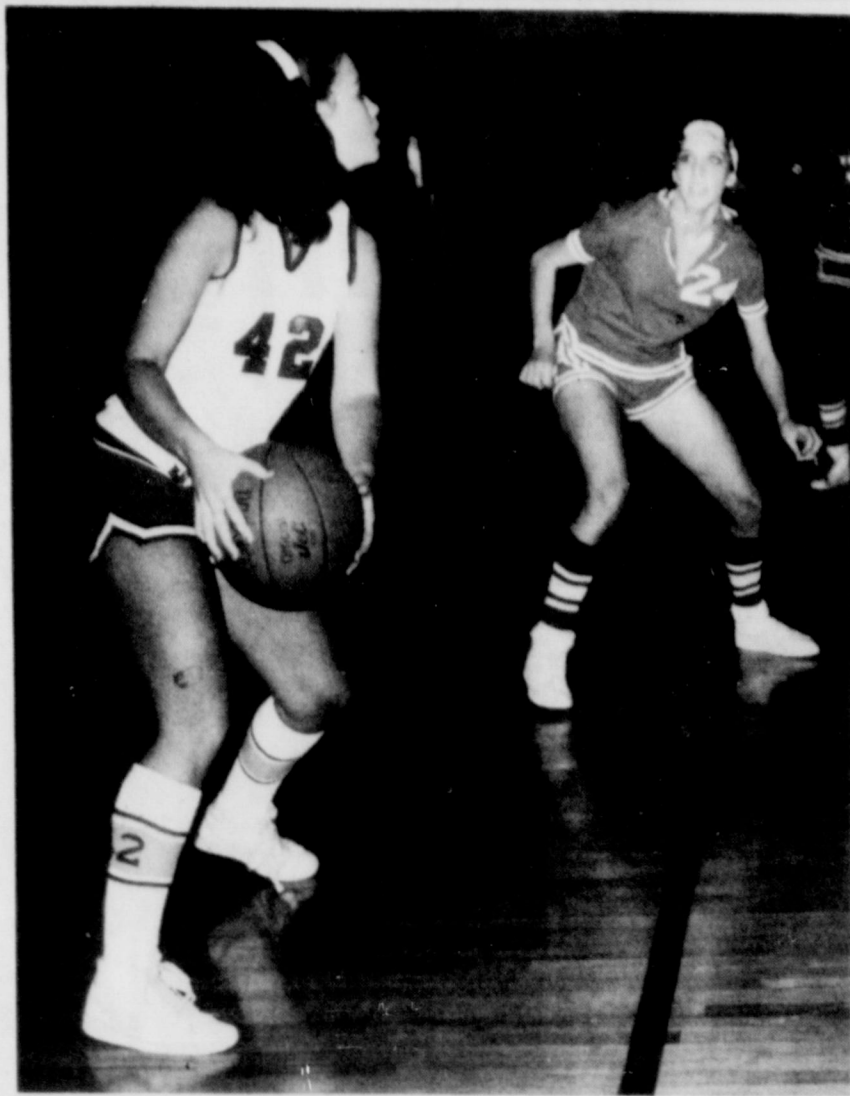

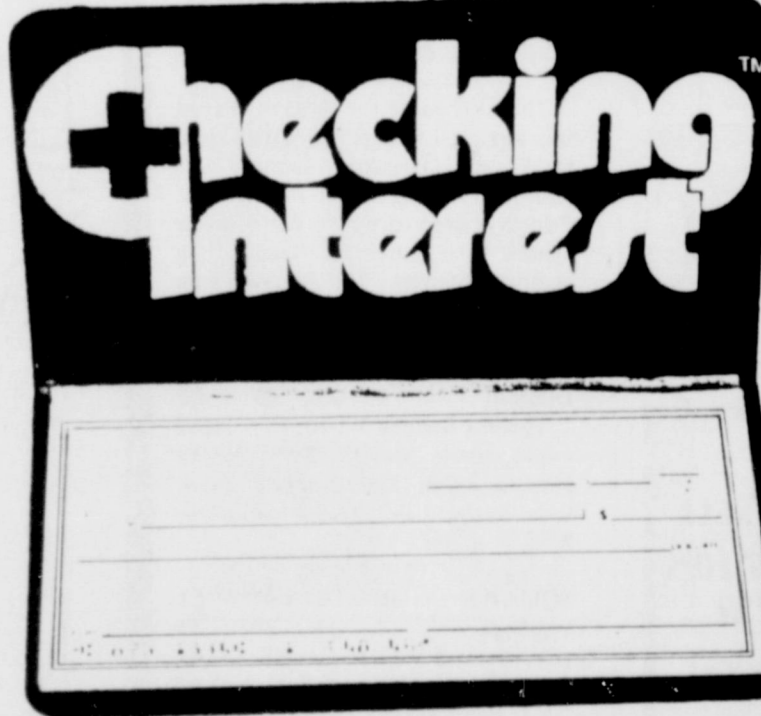

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Book Talk

Despite heated objections from rural residents of Parmer, Bailey, Cochran and Lamb Counties, County Commissioners on December 2nd reaffirmed their decision of last October to cease funding the High Plains Bookmobile.

A public hearing in Olton on November 6th, which attracted more than fifty citizens, saw Lamb County Commissioners in the hot seat for failing, with one dissenting vote, to support Bookmobile service. And yet the public outcry was apparently not enough to move the Commissioners from the four counties to work out their differences and keep the Bookmobile on the road.

According to the latest statistics, the Bookmobile was the only convenient access to books for over 18,000 people, who in 1979 alone checked out over 57,000 books. The situation would be less tragic if the more than \$25,000 which was budgeted annually for the Bookmobile were now to be used to strengthen the remaining libraries in the counties. Indications are at this time, however, that this will not take place, and that the quality of the library service in the four counties will decline sharply.

What remains to be seen is whether citizens in the four counties will now seek alternatives to Bookmobile service (such as deposit collections or small storefront branch libraries), or whether they will simply resign themselves to limited access to books for themselves and their families.

The above appeared in the West Texas Library System newsletter. No doubt a review of the minutes of the county commissioner's meeting would explain the disposition of the money formerly spent for the Bookmobile.

But would it not be better for someone close to the county government to explain this to the general public?
