TWA Flights Are Grounded **By Strikers**

WASHINGTON (AP) Trans World Airlines flights were grounded today by a strike of U.S.-based flight attendants which got underway at midnight.

Union spokesmen said some 8,000 members, including stewards and stewardesses, were affected by the action after negotiators failed to reach agreement on a new contract.

The attendants had been working without a contract since Aug. 1, 1972. They last struck TWA for 29 hours in 1970.

A spokesman for the airline said flights in progress when the walkout, came would be completed, but that all other flights were canceled.

T h e airline was reportedly trying to get other carriers to take on the passengers of its 421 U.S. and 36 international flights affected.

A Los Angeles spokesman for the Airline Pilots Association said his group was honoring the strike, and airline mechanics and maintenance workers were also reported honoring the picket lines.

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. (AP) -- President Nixon neared the end today of a busy weekend of decision-making that focused on Watergate and his precarious personal position, pending energy conservation proposals, and the search for a Middle East peace.

While spokesmen said repeatedly that Nixon "has absolutely no intention of resigning," one source acknowledged that the small official party here concentrated much of its weekend thinking on the leadership crisis that has prompted a rash of public suggestions that the President step down.

DOMINICK SAYS: Genie Is Out **Of The Bottle**

DENVER, Colo. (AP) - Publicly breaking with President Nixon, Sen. Peter H. Dominick, R-Colo., today advised Republicans to proclaim independence from the White House and called on the President to disclose immediately all information bearing on the Watergate investigations

GRAVE CRISIS "I am reluctant to talk about impeachment, as anyone who loves his country should be." Dominick said. "But the genie is out of the bottle, and it cannot be put back in.

Dominick, a member of the Republican Policy Committee in the Senate and a long-time Nixon loyalist, said the country faces a genuine and grave crisis of confidence in the President's ability to lead.

Dominick called on Congress to confirm quuckly the nomination of House Republican Leader Gerald Ford to be vice president

Turns Killer

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) - Cyril Rovansek Jr. telephoned his father to complain that he was depressed and "felt like killing everyone," police say. The father heard a gunshot blast, and the conversation was disconnected.

A short time later, seven persons were dead and a Cleveland policeman lay critically wounded. Police said Rovansek, 31, a University Heights patrolman, killed his wife and his two children, went upstairs and killed a family of four before wounding the policeman and taking his own life on Sunday.

Police surrounded the Rovansek home in the quiet neighborhood and sprayed the house with tear gas before Rovansek's elderly father, who drove to the home after the phone conversation, broke through a back door and found the bodies. The victims, in addition to Rovansek, were identified as his wife, Patricia, 32; his daughter. Kimberly, 7; his son, Cyril III, 8; Jerry Diloreto, 46; his wife, Shirley, 29; and their daughter and son, Jinda, 7 and Michael, 5.

There was no immediate explanation for the shootings, Friends, relatives and fellow patrolmen described Rovansek as a quiet, even-tempered family man.

Fred Buzhardt. Sen. Saxbe Denies Quote

WASHINGTON (AP) - Atty. Gen.-designate William B. Saxbe today denied advocating destruction of the White House Watergate tapes if they

proved to be incriminating. The Republican senator from Ohio was quoted by the Hong Kong Standard on Aug. 23 as saying during a speech to the local chapter of the American Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong: "I think the President is right on standing on his rights not to' release the tapes. I personally wish I had never heard of the tapes. If they're incriminating, they should be destroyed, and I'm sure they will: but I think he's right in saying that a president cannot be horsed around with in the courts."

Meanwhile, in its first editorial in its 50-year history, Time magazine said in this week's issue that Nixon has "irredeemably lost . . . his ability to govern effectively" and should resign.

Across the nation, some newspapers editorialized for his resignation, while others continued to support Nixon, Among those calling for him to step down were The New York Times, and the Detroit News, Denver Post and Atlanta Journal, three newspapers that had supported Nixon in the past. 'IT'S HARD TO FIGURE' Most Wanted Women

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI is baffled.

It hasn't a clue about the whereabouts of the three women who made the select "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" list three years ago this October. The women, all associated with what the Federal Bureau of investigation calls revolutionary or New Left groups, have virtually disappeared, an FBI spokesman said.

NOTHING GOOD "We've had hundreds, maybe thousands of leads," he said, requesting that his name not be used because he is working on the case. "But there's been nothing real good on them in the last year and a half."

"They have no previous records, and they don't follow the usual criminal activity,' the spokesman said. "they live an entirely different life than the criminal as we know him. You have to dig into different places, get information from entirely different sources."

But how could they have disappeared so completely - without leaving so much as a lukewarm trail behind them?

"The big thing is they were active in the New Left and the revolutionary culture," said the spokesman. "There's a lot of suspicions they've gone underground, probably being protected by people who share their views."

They may be moving unnoticed from one commune to another, he said, "or perhaps they slipped over the border to Saxe graduated from Brandeis Canada. It's hard to figure."

"It's my personal preference," she said in an interview. "Who wants to be called "Madame'? 'Ms.' recognizes you as an individual whether you are married or not."

Before taking the U.N. post, the 53-year-old, unmarried foreign service officer was deputy director of the U.S. Information Agency. She also has served in Chile, Portugal, Spain and Italy.

Ms. White's chief assignment at the United Nations is to represent the United States on the Trusteeship Council, which over the years has seen nine of the original 11 trust territories achieve independence.

Today only two remain -Papua-New Guinea under Australian mandate and the U.S.-administered Trust Territory of the Pacific. Ms. White also runs the host country relations committee to which U.N. delegates from abroad can bring their complaints about life in New York.

She is not the first woman to serve in the United Nations for the United States. Others have included Shirley Temple Black and Eleanor Roosevelt, but none ever had full ambassadorial ranks.

Ms. White who comes from Evanston, Ill., said she has been concerned with the rights of men as well as women.

She hired a man as a secretary 25 years ago, when she worked for the League of Women Voters.





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

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Equal Learning Opportunity

The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission has completed its recommended revision of the Texas Constitution, members of the 63rd Legislature, which will meet in January as a constitutional convention, have begun studying the proposed revision

The Senate Education Committee met recently to go over the proposed educational section of the constitution. It found a significant passage: "The quality of education made available shall not be based on wealth other than the wealth of the state as a whole." This expresses a fundamental public educational need in the state, the requirement that the people of Texas provide equal educational opportunity to all their children.

The passage is taken almost bodily from the opinion of a federal district judge in the case of Rodriguez versus State. The case arose in Bexar County in a suit involving the Edgewood Independent School District. The plaintiffs called attention to the fact that the quality of educaion in a school disrict, both in buildings and in instruction, was limited in poor districts. The judge held that local districts, as instrumentalities of the state, must not be limited by the wealth

Surely this is a principle with which few people except those in effluent districts, can find fault. The public school education given a child must not be made inferior because he lives in Starr County rather than in Travis, or Dallas, Brewster or Andrews County.



THIS MARVELOUSLY assists Mr. Nixon's grand strategy: deflect the public rage against the President into narrowly partisan fight. In that attempt, the President benefited from two strokes of good fortune Tuesday: first, revelation of Archibald Cox's indiscreet talk to Democratic Senators: second, degeneration of the Judiciary Committee's impeachment proceedings into a partisan squabble. The latter, though less spectacular, may prove more important.

IMPEACHMENT proceedings resulted directly from spontaneous public demands following the Saturday night massacre, Oct. 20. But even after Mr. Nixon surrendered the tapes Oct. 23. the proceedings were kept going with some side effects ominous

and Robert Drinan of Massachusetts on the Judiciary Committee - wanted to go well beyond Watergate and Mr. Nixon's finances. They envisioned using subpoena power to obtain documents and tape recordings on the bombing of Cambodia, impoundment of social welfare appropriations and other conservative Nixon acts they

Slip-And-Fall Blame

So many people are injured by stepping on banana peels and other slippery substances that lawyers talk about "slip-and-fall" as a separate branch of law. And special rules are invoked to determine questions of legal liability. Take a typical case:

A HOUSEWIFE, shopping at the market, skidded on a banana peel, fell, and sustained a broken arm. When she filed suit for damages, the management argued that the peel had probably been dropped by a careless customer - not by an employe of the market.

But the woman pointed out that the peel had been lying in plain sight of four checkout clerks - and that two other employes had walked right This was poor maintenance, said the past it shortly before her accident.

GENERALLY SPEAKING, the court, upholding the woman's claim. management of a store is liable for a slip-and-fall accident if it knew or should have known - about the hazardous condition. This may call for a kind of detective work in figuring out how long the slippery material had been lying on the floor.

For example, liability in one case was based largely on the fact that the ice cream on which a man slipped had pretty much melted; in another, that a lettuce leaf was "old, dirty, and mashed" when stepped on; in another, that a fallen piece of candy had heel marks in it.



Sunday's airlift for the March of Dimes proved the most successful event of its kind ever sponsored by the MOD here. according to coordinator Vaughn Martin.


About 500 individuals come to Howard County Airport to be flown around town by 16 local pilots "who donated their time for the event. A total of \$730 was taken in for the MOD.






