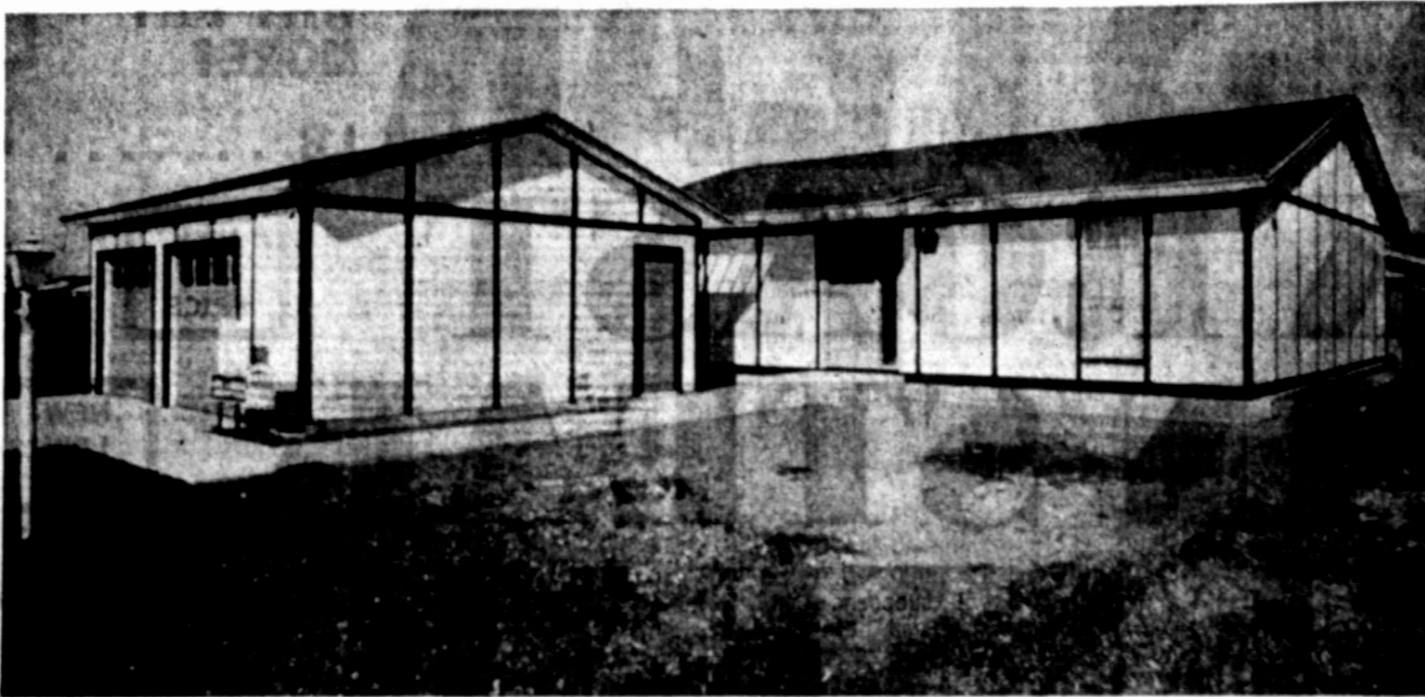

Troops Grab Camps in Viet

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops and tanks captured two government camps near the Cambodian border, and a South Vietnamese spokesman said most of the 300 defenders may have been killed or captured.

Saigon's chief military spokesman, Lt. Col. Le Trung Hien, first reported that the garrison from one of the camps 125 miles northeast of Saigon, Bu Bong, withdrew after a day of savage battle Sunday.

But later he said it was feared that government casualties at Bu Bong and Bu Prang, a mile away, would be similar to the 280 troops and dependents reported killed or captured when the Le Minh camp in the central highlands was overrun Sept. 22.

Asked whether the attacks Sunday on Bu Bong and Bu Prang marked the beginning of a "full-scale Communist offensive," Hien replied:

"We can say that this is a period of transition for the enemy before he launches an offensive."

Hien said government planes and artillery pounded the area through the night. He also claimed that North Vietnamese casualties were heavy.

The Viet Cong said fighting in Quang Duc was continuing and its forces had "wiped out several units of the Saigon army."

Bu Bong and Bu Prang camps were overrun after orders from the Viet Cong were issued to Communist forces in the central provinces to launch wide-ranging counterattacks to recover territory lost since the Jan. 28 cease-fire.

The Viet Cong claims both camps were in Communist hands at the time of the cease-fire. The government denies this.

The semi-official newspaper Dan Chu reported the government had rushed about 3,000 reinforcements to the battle zone. But it said military sources told it government planes were having difficulty giving air support because the North Vietnamese had deployed a large number of SA7 anti-aircraft missiles.

In Cambodia, diplomatic sources said both the government and the Khmer Rouge were bringing reinforcements into the area surrounding Phnom Penh in preparation for a showdown in the approaching dry season.

Western diplomats said the Cambodian command had brought troops from Battambang, Kompong Chhnang and other outlying provinces.

KINDLED NEW SENSE OF PURPOSE

Arab-Israeli War Shook U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The fourth Arab-Israeli war shook the United Nations to its foundations but also kindled in its supporters a new sense of purpose.

But on Oct. 11, when the war was five days old, Secretary General Kurt Waldheim expressed dismay at the paralysis of the council in the face of spreading bloodshed and destruction.

He said he was "profoundly concerned with the role of the

United Nations in such circumstances. The primary role of our organization is the maintenance of international peace and security. If we fail in that role, the central point of the organization's existence is jeopardized."

Frustrated by the bypassing of the United Nations in Vietnam, Waldheim had asked the General Assembly earlier this year: "Do the majority of the member states really want an organization which is more

than a conference machinery and a forum for the pursuit of national policies?"

The latest war in the Middle East broke out only one month after Waldheim had made a trip to Israel, Syria, Egypt and Lebanon and reported everywhere a desire for peace. The U.N. hold in the Middle East always has been fragile and quickly shattered in the crunch of Arab-Israeli and big power conflict.

The new war followed the

pattern.

As the fighting started on Oct. 6, the chief of the U.N. observer corps in the Middle East, Maj. Gen. Ennio Sillanvuo, issued a cease-fire appeal that was ignored by all.

Sixteen days were to pass before another cease-fire call went out in the name of the United Nations — this time the Security Council's call of Oct. 22. But the United Nations as such had little to do with creating the basis for that call.

Neither Israel nor the Arabs had shown any desire for U.N. intervention in the first days of the war. A deep split between the United States and the Soviet Union — supporting Israel and the Arabs, respectively — blocked effective Security Council action. Under the U.N. charter, the United States, the Soviet Union, China, Britain and France have the right to veto any council action they don't like.

Intense diplomatic negotia-

tions went on outside the United Nations, climaxed by Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin's trip to Cairo and U.S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's trip to Moscow.

Kissinger and Leonid I. Brezhnev, the Soviet Communist party leader, quickly forged an agreement that was taken to the Security Council as a joint U.S.-Soviet call for a cease-fire and eventual peace conference under "appropriate auspices."

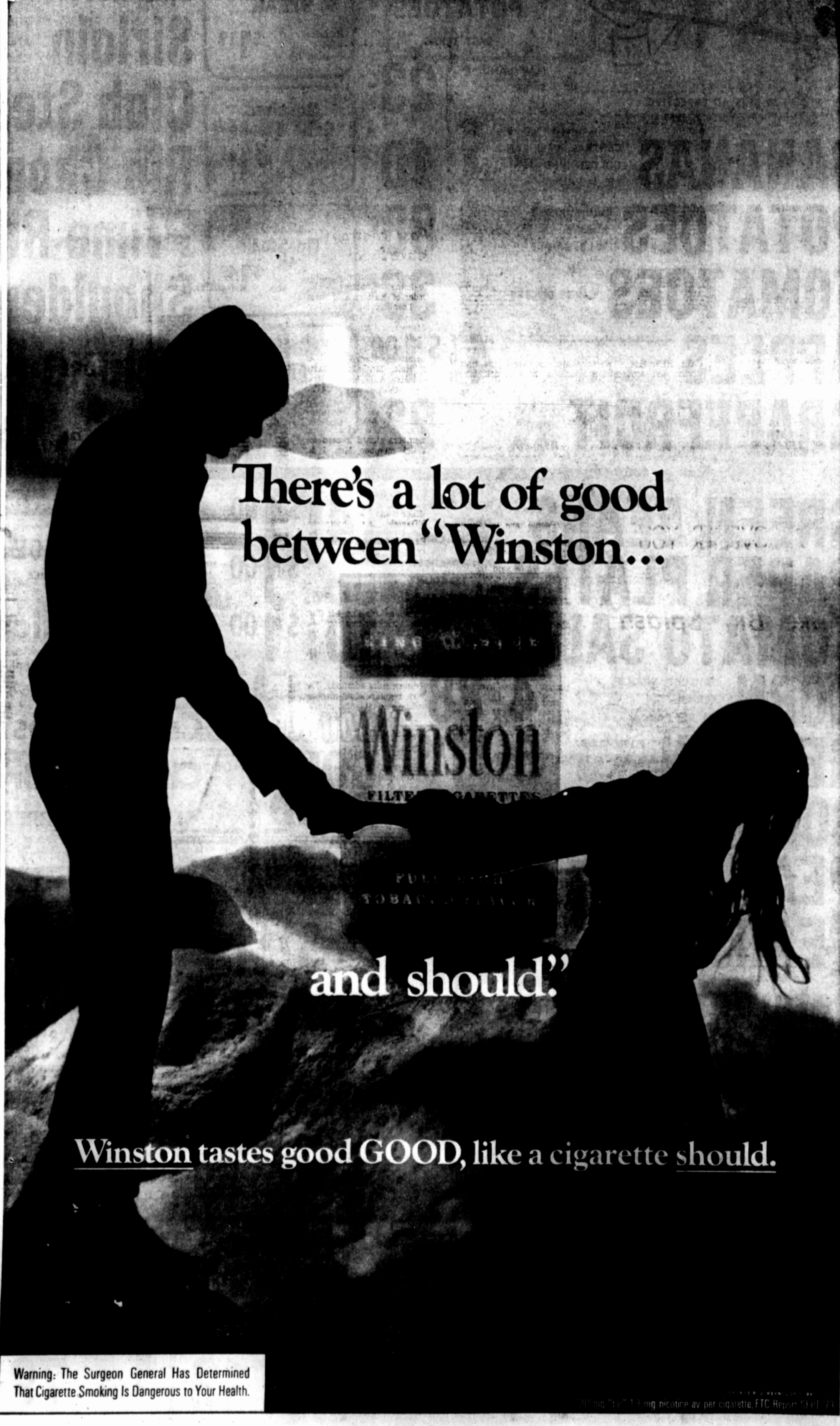

U.N. Delegate: "Don't Call Me Madame!"

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Barbara McClure White, the first woman with ambassadorial rank in the U.S. delegation to the United Nations, wants to be called "Ms. Ambassador."

"It's my personal preference," she said in an interview. "Who wants to be called 'Madame'? 'Ms.' recognizes you as an individual whether you are married or not."

Before taking the U.N. post, the 53-year-old, unmarried foreign service officer was deputy director of the U.S. Information Agency. She also has served in Chile, Portugal, Spain and Italy.

Ms. White's chief assignment at the United Nations is to represent the United States on the Trusteeship Council, which over the years has seen nine of the original 11 trust territories achieve independence.

Today only two remain — Papua-New Guinea under Australian mandate and the U.S.-administered Trust Territory of the Pacific.

Ms. White also runs the host country relations committee to which U.N. delegates from abroad can bring their complaints about life in New York.

She is not the first woman to serve in the United States on the Trusteeship Council. Others have included Shirley Temple Black and Eleanor Roosevelt, but none ever had full ambassadorial ranks.

Ms. White, who comes from Evanston, Ill., said she has been concerned with the rights of men as well as women.

She hired a man as a secretary 25 years ago, when she worked for the League of Women Voters.

"We didn't discriminate in hiring. He applied for the job and I thought he'd be good," she recalled.

her are men, and her bosses have been mostly male. But she claims she has never suffered because of male attitudes.

"There are male

chauvinist pigs around," she said. "And for other women, this has been very serious. But with me, some men are disagreeable at first but I don't take offense and they come around."

"People tend to take you the way you take yourself," she added.

Ms. White said there's a generation gap dividing the men around her in government and professions.

"The young ones often don't want to work themselves into the grave by age 41," she said. "Yes, they want to do something, they want to contribute, they want a profession — but they want to live, too."

Then there are men at the top, Ms. White observed, who can't draw a line between private and public life.

Younger men's views on life and women, she said, will make it possible for more women to combine family and career, sharing responsibilities with men who chose the same life-style.

BRIDGE QUIZ ANSWERS

Q. 1—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
▲K 10 9 2 ♥AKQ5 ♦AJ10 9 5

The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1 ♦ 2 ♣ 2 ♦ 5 ♣
? What do you bid now?
A.—Six diamonds. East's preemptive tactics have made scientific exploration impossible. It is reasonable to assume that partner's free raise must be based on diamond support and something of value in the spade suit. At worst, the slam should depend on a finesse. In addition, there are times when the opponents will take a phantom sacrifice in seven clubs against an unmakeable six diamonds.

Q. 2—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold:
▲K7 ♥AQJ7 ♦AQJ6 5 ♠A4

The bidding has proceeded:
South West North East
1 ♦ Pass 2 ♣ Pass
2 ♥ Pass 2 ♣ Pass
2 NT Pass 5 ♣ Pass
? What do you bid now?
A.—Partner has described a hand with six clubs and five spades. From his leap to five spades it would seem that the suit should be headed by the ace-queen-jack. His clubs should be solid missing the ace. It is easy to count 13 tricks, and you should bid the grand slam at no trump as the safest contract.

Q. 3—As South, vulnerable, you hold:
▲9 8 2 ♥Q ♦9 8 5 4 3 ♠AQ6 3

The bidding has proceeded:

1 ♥ Pass 1 NT Pass
2 ♣ Pass ?
? What do you bid now?
A.—Four hearts. This is a speculative bid, and if your queen of hearts were in any other suit we would recommend a pass. The queen of hearts should be regarded as a sure trick, and your hand will, therefore, produce two tricks (or perhaps even three) for partner who has jumped in face of your weakness response of one no trump.

Q. 4—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:
▲10 3 ♥8 7 2 ♦AJ7 ♠AKQJ2

Your right-hand opponent has opened the bidding with one spade. What action do you take?
A.—The your hand is worth 16 points, we do not recommend a takeout double. Your hand lacks flexibility—too much of its strength is concentrated in one suit. Also, you are not that well prepared for a heart response.

Bid two clubs. A vulnerable overcall at the two-level shows a good hand. Unless partner can take voluntary action, no game will be missed.

Hill Claims He Won't Be Influenced By Candidacy

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Atty. Gen. John Hill says Gov. Dolph Briscoe's announcement for reelection will not enter into any future political decision he may be considering.

Hill has been considered a possible candidate for governor next year, but he said Sunday that he will not announce any political decision for a couple of months.

He added he has been so busy that "I haven't had time frankly to sit down and get involved in a hard political discussion."

Hill made his statements during an interview on Capital Eye, a weekly panel show.

He was asked about Texas' progress in controlling air pollution and said the state has made "spectacular progress."

Hill has filed suit on behalf of the Texas Air Control Board to stop enforcement of new federal air controls. He said he does not approve of the federal regulations enacted by the Environmental Protection Agency.

He referred to the regulations' penalties for refusing to take part in car pools and limitations on constructing car garages.

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Arab Oil Firms Order New Cut In Production

KUWAIT (AP) — The Arab oil nations announced new production cuts today in their offensive against supporters of Israel but said "friendly countries" would not be affected.

The 10-member Organization of Arab Petroleum Exporting Countries (OAPEC) announced production would be reduced this month by 25 per cent of the September output and by five per cent of the November output in December.

But the announcement after a seven-hour meeting of the nations' oil ministers said the 25 per cent reduction would include the oil already cut off by the embargos against the United States and the Netherlands. Since cuts in Arab oil production have reached more than four million barrels a day, or 20 per cent of the September production, it appeared that

new November cut actually would come to only five per cent, or one million barrels a day.

The new cuts have no effect on the oil situation in the United States since all 10 nations already have stopped all shipment of oil to America. Five of the nations also have stopped shipping to the Netherlands.

Kuwait officials said a major question at the meeting was how to ship oil to friends and prevent their sharing it with enemies.

The oil states delegated two oil ministers — Algeria's Abdel Salam Belaid and Saudi Arabia's Ahmed Zaki Yamani — to visit Western capitals, including Washington, to explain the Arab position. The other Arab countries involved are Kuwait, Iraq, Syria, Abu Dhabi, Qatar, Bahrain, Egypt and Libya.

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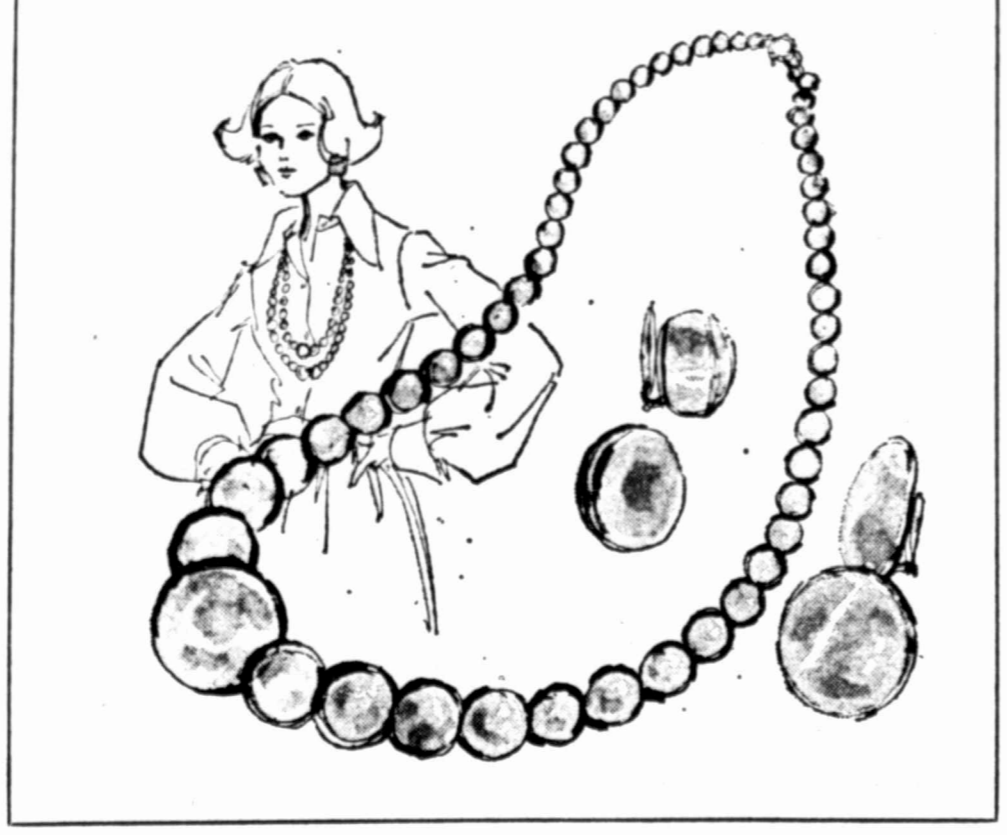
