# American Spacecraft To Sweep By Jupiter

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (AP) - Pioneer 10 sweeps by Jupiter tonight in a reconnaissance of the solar system's largest planet.

The unmanned 570-pound spacecraft will hurtle within 81,000 miles of Jupiter and its orange, brown, and grey clouds at 9:25 p.m. EST, traveling at a speed of some 67,600 miles per hour. It was launched from earth 21 months ago.



Nixon Paid Less Than \$6,000 In Income Taxes Past 3 Years

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House will formally disclose this week that President Nixon paid less than \$6,000 in federal income taxes during the past three years, sources report.

Confidential documents now under preparation also list Nixon as paying more than \$72,000 in federal income taxes in the first year of his presidency before he obtained a substantial tax deduction for donation of his vice presidential papers to Supporters of public financing, realizing the chances are the government. scant that the package will get

Lt. M. L. Bryant, watch commander at the California Medical Facility prison here, said Corona has been taken off the critical list but remains in serious condition with 32 disfiguring knife wounds.

DUE TO RECOVER

"We still haven't found any motive" for the Sturday night attack by two men in Corona's jail cell, Bryant said.

Prison officials said Corona, 40, is expected to recover. During three hours of surgery his mutilated left eye was removed and his right eye was sewed shut to protect lacerated tissue, authorities said.

But Bryant said: "There is still hope that he will retain his sight in the right eye."

Corona also sustained numerous stab wounds in the chest and abdomen.

Last January Corona was convicted of murdering 25 migrant farm workers and burying them in shallow graves near Yuba City, Calif.

Lt. Gordon Steeves, watch commander at the time of the attack, said four men were in custody for questioning, and he added, "We believe the assailants to be among these men."

Steeves refused to release the names of the suspects or answer questions about details of the attack, except to say it occurred in Corona's unlocked 7-by-10 foot concrete-walled cell.

Corona's attorney, Louis Garcia, said in an interview Sunday his client was acquainted with at least one of two men who attacked him, and possibly both of them. Garcia said Corona had no feud with the men nor any advance warning that such an attack was coming.

### **Several Stations** Here Remain Open

Traffic slowed down through Big Spring Sunday, but was about as usual within the city itself, according to police officers.

The IS 20 and Highway 87 traffic was "considerably slowed down by the President's request" according to station attendants at stations here which remained open.

There was one truck stop open on IS 20, another open for emergencies only and two stations on Highway 87 open. Operators of these stations indicate that they probably will not close until it becomes mandatory.

Midland and surrounding counties reported traffic normal on country roads but very light on Interstate 20. Three stations remained open in Midland County, with only about 50 per cent closing in Ector County. There was none open in Martin and Crane counties.

Ironically, the day saw two wrecks with injuries within the city of Big Spring. Wrecks on highways across the state were reported down for Sunday.

Parr, free on \$5,000 bond, was arraigned before U.S. District Court Judge D.W. Suttle on a federal indictment returned last month.

#### TAX-FREE

The documents show he paid \$38,646 in federal taxes soon after he took office on his 1968 income as a lawyer. And they disclose that \$30,916 was withheld from his paycheck in the first five months of this year for his 1973 taxes.

Nixon's salary as President is \$200,000 a year. He also received a tax-free \$50,000 annual expense allowance, and records disclose he has made substantial profits on real estate transactions since taking office.

Wells can't be drilled or completed without casing or oil string. Yet, operators complain that their chances of getting any pipe are, at best, "impossible." Some charge that majors have acres of pipe stored either in their own yards, or in the yards of suppliers and truckers. They also claim that suppliers in general won't even take orders, although they advertise freely the virtues of their pipe.

MARKET CRAZY The used pipe market has gone crazy. One veteran independent said "we are running used pipe now that a few months ago we wouldn't have even considered." Seven-inch recovered or reconditioned pipe which formerly went at \$1.50 a foot now is commanding \$6.

BLACK MARKET A legitimate black market has

sprung up in the case of few who have been able to obtain new tubular goods and chose to double their money without ever touching them.

# Spiraling Traffic Toll Slows As Gasoline Stations Close

Traffic accidents fell off sharply as a major cause of violent deaths during the first weekend in December raising speculation the ban on Sunday sales of gasoline kept Texans off the roads and out of harm's

 By midnight Sunday, 23 persons had met violent deaths. Ten came in traffic smashups, five died in tshootings, three were killed in a train wreck near Cotulla and the rest died by various other means.







## The People Problem

According to Russell W. Peterson, President Nixon's nominee to head the Council on Environmental Quality, one problem stands above all others in the danger it poses for the world. That problem: Unrestrained population growth.

Peterson, former governor of Delaware, told a National Science Foundation conference the United States should "officially dedicate itself to working within and through the United Nations to help limit the world's population to 7 billion (about double the present level) and to help ensure that everyone in present and future generations will have a healthful and satisfying diet.

The second half of Peterson's recommendation seems impossible to attain if the first half's conditions are not met. Although great strides have been made in developing new and hardy strains of wheat and rice, for example, the shortage of energy alone would seem to doom efforts to match the current rate of population growth with increased food production.

The United States is an extremely fortunate nation. Our farmers are the world's most productive. But this productivity is heavily dependent on the expenditure of energy - both in the form of mechanization and in fertilizers which depend

on petroleum derivatives and energy use for their manufacture. And even with this highly sophisticated and energy-dependent agricultural effort, shortages are now occurring in basic foodstuffs. In other lands, long on people and short on technology, food crises are now chronic.

All the world, not just this nation and other industrial states, in short of energy. Yet without expanded use of energy in agriculture, expansion of food production is highly unlikely. If we cannot have the energy to make that possible, the alternatives are zero population growth or

worldwide famine - and in a shorter time than any would like to believe.



Thus far the federal government has shied away from the sort of concerted effort necessary - government - sponsored birth control programs, including the dispensing of both advice and devices. Time is running out, however; politicians can indulge in the luxury of ignoring the necessity only at the peril of humanity.

Time was when the Fort Worth Star-Telegram was West Texas' only area newspaper. It started serving this remote part of the world more than half a century ago with a combination of news which invariably was ingested - blending national, international and local stories with farm and ranch news, livestock and stock market reports, oil news and feature articles, all unobtainable in other publications.

THERE WERE young people weaned on the Telegram who would have been willing to swear that Fort Worth was bigger and certainly more interesting than New York, Chicago or London.

Fifty years ago, there was a paucity of daily newspapers based in West Texas and all were ill-equipped to compete with the bold new concept in news reporting as offered by the Telly.

THE FORT WORTH paper used the slogan "Where the West Begins" in its masthead and unified half the state that, up until then, had been made to feel like an orphan child.

If the news coverage of the Fort Worth paper was refreshing to an army of readers that hungered for the printed word, its comic page helped with a multitude of friends. too. The periodical had first call on all the finest comic strips in the land and often sewed up rights to cartoons before the Dallas News and other metropolitan publications could bid on them

AN ERA SLIPPED into limbo recently, however, when the exlong since had passed out of the hands of the ambitious and inventive Amon G. Carter family, announced that their paper was packing its tent in West Texas, that the publication's circulation had declined so dramatically in this area in recent years that it had become a losing proposition trying to maintain the service.

THAT, combined with the fact that production costs had leaped alarmingly, resulted in a decision to curtail daily delivery of the news organ to points less than 200 miles from its home base.

A couple or three years ago, the Telegram sent one of its news executives into West Texas to see if he could come up with any ideas on how to improve the situation. He did not return with good news.

In substance, he told his employers their job was monumental and probably hopeless because the area was now honeycombed with a gaggle of fine newspapers whose products would command first attention with the readers.

THE FACT that the West Texas papers could wait on far-later deadlines for their stories painted the Telegram into a corner. The Telegram had been fighting the battle with what amounted to an afternoon paper.

The Telegram will continue to offer its Sunday paper; much of which is assembled piecemeal during the week. to its West Texas friends but, Monday through Saturday, the void on newsstands will be be most noticeable. Even those newsmen who competed with the Telegram for the readers' attention are more than a little sad-

#### **Policy Goes Sour**

of Nixon administration policy toward Greece, dramatized in the overthrow of the Papadopoulos dictatorship so pampered by the U.S., has now created an even more horrendous prospect: the threat of a Qaddafi-style, super-nationalistic regime controlling NATO's strategic eastern anchor.

FOR THE first time since Col. George Papadopoulos overthrew the legal, parliamentary government in Athens nearly seven years ago in a military coup d'etat, American policymakers are showing alarm (though still not stating it publicly).

The reason: full-blown American support for the now-deposed Papadopoulos dictatorship may have created a Frankenstein monster in the form of growing anti-Americanism which, under the new nationalistic regime of strongman Lt. Col. Dimitrius Ioannidis, could radically transform the volatile Eastern Mediterranean. That alarm does not seem unjustified.

IF NEW strongman Ioannidis, head of the military police and the only incorruptible figure to emerge from the seven Papadopoulos years, does become a Qaddafi-style xenophobe, he may play to anti-Americanism sentiment. That would complete the wreck of the Nixon policy toward the old Papadopoulos dictator ship. The President always treated it as militarily essential to U.S. interests in the Eastern Mediterranean and the Middle East, no matter how much it poisoned the Greek peopl themselves, hitherto so strongly pro-American.

DANGEROUS LIMITATIONS on the administration's policy have long been apparent. In the 1970 Jordanian crisis, American spy planes were forced to use the island of Cyprus instead of Greek airfields to keep a camera on the strategic war zone. Likewise, Greece was barred to the U.S. airlift during the recent massive resupply of Israel in the Yom Kippur war. Moreover, it has now been established that the Soviet airlift to supply the Arabs during those same critical days

THE CLAIM, of military dividends weakened during the Papadopoulos era anyway, now faces a graver threat from the more nationalistic Ioannidis. The chief victor could be the Soviet Union, with its large Mediterranean fleet and its own secure naval docks in Syria and Egypt.

But, when the President was challenged by the Democrats during the presidential campaign last year on his cozy relationship with the Papadopoulous regime, his reply was that "without aid to Greece . . . you have no viable policy to save Israel." There was no sign, moreover, of any White House recanting as a result of the pro-Arab posture of the Papadopoulos regime when the Oct. 6 Middle East war broke out. To the contrary, on Nov. 4 Alexander Panagoulis, a hero to Greek youth for his assassination attempt against Papadopoulos shortly after the 1967 coup d'etat, was denied a visa to visit the U.S.

The State Department could easily have asked the Justice Department to waive that prohibition in the case of Panagoulis, thereby shrewdly revealing sympathy for the rising hostility inside Greece against the colonels. Instead, Panagoulis was and is barred. This further still strengthens anti-Americanism in Greece, and who knows what political course Ionnidis will take. It may be super-nationalism - or at best, instability, none of it helpful to the



THE TROUBLE for the market, it appears, is that some of these wellheeled investor intellects are throwing in more words than money, and this isn't the kind of a market that can be cajoled. It must be shown.

Nevertheless, for what it's worth - and right now that seems to be very little - a good many analysts and some investors are talking confidently.

The Consensus of Insiders has turned bullish. This is a forecasting system based on the market activities of insiders, such as officers and directors. It's latest signal is for an upturn within two to five weeks.

Just as bullish is Wright Bankers' Service, which guides the fortunes of many important bank trusts. John Wright, its analyst, is a bit chagrined by the current "extremism," but sticks to his forecast of an advance.

"WE BELIEVE that the current stock market represents an unprecedented extreme of unreasoned pessimism and subjective evaluation," declares Wright. It will be "followed promptly by a sharp and sustained advance.

Some of the other forecasters are more selective in their bullishness, urging investors to seek special situa-

## The Right To Travel

"The right to travel is a part of relative or doing research in a foreign the 'liberty' of which the citizen cannot be deprived without due process of law. Movement across frontiers (is) a part of our heritage. Freedom of movement is basic in our scheme of values."

THE WORDS are those of the United States Supreme Court. And, during most of our nation's life, there were no governmental restrictions on going abroad. All you had to do was buy a ticket, board the ship, and sail away.

Nowadays, of course, you do need a passport. But even today, the government's exit requirements are subject to careful scrutiny by the courts.

IN ONE case, a member of a radical organization was denied a passport on the ground that he might make contact with radicals overseas. However, there was no evidence that he was an active member or that the organization had any illegal plans of which he was aware.


has even less right to keep a citizen from coming back into the country than to keep him from leaving. "It is inherent in the concept of

citizenship," said a federal court, "that the citizen, when absent from the country to which he owes allegiance, has a right again to set foot on its soil."

ON THE other hand, lesser limitations on the right to travel have been upheld. In another case, the government granted a passport with "area restrictions" - listing several countries as out-of-bounds.

This procedure was lawful, a court ruled later, because it fell within the presidential power to "conduct foreign affairs." The government could reasonably foresee, said the court, that American visitors in certain trouble spots might complicate our foreign policy.
