## Area Alcohol Plant Progress Is Noted


#### Abstract

By JANET WILKE Plains farmers are hurting for money with which to produce their crops. It is also no secret that there are farmers in this area who are looking very seriously at the production of as an answer to the farmer's plight According to Guy Austin, president of Grain Producers International, which is a cooperative of area farmers who are looking into the construction of an alcohol plant in this area, the plant could well be ine of the biggest boosts in the agricultural, industrial, and economical fields to come to Texas in a long time.
