Special Notice For Newly-Issued Ration Books

Special notice to be inserted in newly-issued gasoline ration books to the holder that "Entirely new ration books are being issued to you and help you to buy on the black market," the Office of Administration announced.

The new books will be issued by OPA on or about February 1. The holder is requested to tell every holder of a ration book, supplemental or transitory, that he can play in stopping the criminal traffic in gasoline.

The new books will be issued in every "A", "B", "C" and "T" ration book issued. It is important that the holder immediately check the book or indelible pencil for license number and state registration on the face of each coupon. Otherwise these coupons will be void and may be revoked.

The new books protect you and help you to buy on the Black Market. The new books for "T" ration cards contain an additional message—"All 'T' coupons must be returned to your Office of Defense Administration District Office within five days after the expiration date shown on the coupons."

The use of interchangeable ration books with serially numbered coupons for fleet or official vehicles is being discontinued. The coupons will be enclosed with the official or fleet registration and the state and city seal of the principal office of the operator is located. Class "T" coupons must be enclosed with the coupons.

When trying to leave no loose ends in its drive to round up petty chiselers and counterfeiters who are guilty of making gasoline black market a thriving business, Howard R. Gholson, district director of OPA, said.

Endorsement by motor vehicle owners has been extremely helpful in combating black market activity in tracing stolen and counterfeit coupons. It has also proved effective in halting the transfer of these coupons.

"Because of the importance of endorsement in stamping out the black market, failure to endorse coupons is a ground for revocation," he added. It was pointed out that dealers who sell unendorsed or loose coupons will not be permitted to replenish their inventory with such coupons.

Four of the above list were "Fathers".

Effective February 1st the Local Board will forward every Selectee for a pre-induction physical examination, and will order to report for induction only those certified as acceptable to the Armed Forces. The furlough period will be not less than twenty-one days acceptance, before date of induction, and there will be no further furlough when the Selectee is inducted, but he will go direct to Reception Center. This is a welcome change to the Selectee, since he will not take the chance of being rejected, after he has made his arrangements to leave, and in many instances, has disposed of a business, or property, that he would want to keep, if not accepted for Service.



Retail Grocers Will Begin Use of Ration Tokens

The nation's retail grocers will begin the use of the new ration tokens on February 27, when housewives will begin to receive them as change in the purchase of rationed food for points.

The new token plan will enable the housewife to buy about the same amount of rationed processed foods and meats-fats as she now buys, according to J. Doyle Settle, district OPA rationing executive.

The present 16 points for meats and fats becoming valid at the beginning of each week roughly total 64 points a month. Under the token plan 30 points, (3 stamps) will become valid at the beginning of each two weeks period, a total of approximately 60 points each month. For processed foods, 43 points become valid each month. Under the token plan 50 points will become valid the first of each month.

The tokens are red and blue in color. The red ones will be used for meats and fats and the blues will be used for processed foods. They are about the size of a dime and have a point value of each.

Under the token plan each stamp for meat or processed foods, regardless of the printed designation, will have a point value of 10. Sugar is not affected. Tokens will be issued only as change in bona fide purchases, and only enough tokens will be issued as change to reach the value of the number of stamps nearest the point purchase.

In other words, a purchase involving 27 points will be paid for with three ten-point stamps, and change of three tokens will be given by the grocer. The supply of tokens will not permit the grocer to exchange them for more stamps than are needed for the purchase, and grocers will not be permitted to change stamps for tokens where no bona fide purchase is made.

Stamps will be valid for a period of 12 weeks with a new series of stamps and should eliminate the buying rushes incident to the expiration of short validity periods.

Consumers are urged to familiarize themselves with the use of tokens, and to cooperate in every possible manner with the retail grocer in distributing them.

The attention of housewives is called to the fact that it will still be necessary to present their war ration books to the grocers, and to tear the stamps out of the books in the presence of the grocer. Loose stamps may not be accepted by the grocer.

Consumers' war ration books should be carefully safeguarded, as War Ration Book Four will probably have to last for the duration, and will be difficult to replace if lost.

Austin, January 27.—The first opportunity for University of Texas students to become mass blood donors, will be presented this week when they register for this cause, sponsored for the week of February 7 by the mobile unit of the Red Cross.

The campus blood donation program is being carried on by a committee of students under Dean Arno Nowotny.

Students between the ages of 18 and 21 must have written permission of the parents before they can donate blood.

District Golden Gloves Tournament Feb. 3, 4, 5

Prospects for winning honors in the annual District Golden Gloves tournament at Texas Tech's gym the nights of February 3, 4, and 5 are definitely bright for SPAAF, according to information given out early this week. Staff Sgt. Bob Rings, once ninth ranking middleweight of the world is coaching the boxers. Probably the best prospect on the team is Sgt. Clyde Jones of Perryton, Texas, who won the State TAAF light heavyweight title in 1938 in Abilene and the All Service Southwestern championship in 1941. He is a graduate of Perryton high school and was a student at McMurry College in Abilene and at Texas A. and M. College. He will be a heavyweight contender.

Coach Nathan B. Eubank, athletic officer at SPAAF, said that the SPAAF boxers had issued a challenge to surrounding teams which will participate in the tournament to meet SPAAF contenders in pre-tournament matches in the post recreation hall.

Special Gas to Recuperating Servicemen

To aid servicemen in recuperating from illness or wounds received while on active duty, the Office of Price Administration today announced that they may be issued special gasoline rations for use in traveling to and from their homes or their places of convalescence.

The action was taken at the request of the War and Navy Departments which said that the use of an automobile may, in some cases, aid greatly in a serviceman's recovery to health.

Today's amendment provides that this special ration covering the needed gasoline is to be issued upon presentation of leave papers to a local board, together with a letter from the attending medical officer certifying that transportation by automobile, rather than by any other means, will materially assist in the recovery of the serviceman's health.

TEXAS MAN TO SERVE ON INDUSTRY'S COMMITTEE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Austin, January 27.—Chosen as the only educational representative west of New York, Dr. John Hutchinson Frederick, professor of transportation and industry in the School of Business Administration at the University of Texas, will serve with seven business men on industry's new committee of Economic Development.

Privately financed by industry, the project is not government sponsored, but is industry's own effort to solve its post-war problems, it was explained. It will meet several times annually to discuss plans submitted by trade associations, principally on market and market development pertaining to post-war employment problems.

Dr. Frederick will serve on the review committee, most important of the four committees under the general chairmanship of Paul G. Hoffman, president of the Studebaker Corporations.

SEVERAL DEATHS IN STATE CAUSED AS RESULT OF ASPHYXIATION

Austin, January 27.—Several recent deaths in the State, resulting from asphyxiation by gas fumes, has brought a warning from Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, upon the importance of proper ventilation.

It is never safe, the doctor stated, to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no gas leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated, and harmful fumes will be inhaled into the lungs.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have at least one window or door open, to admit fresh air," Dr. Cox said. "If the weather is too cold to permit leaving an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room which is properly ventilated."
