## Blast Dips Chill Factor To -40 Here

The Friona area was hit by the coldest blast of the winter on Tuesday, as an Arctic cold front pushed through the area, dropping temperatures to the zero mark, and the chill factor to many degrees below zero.

At one point Tuesday afternoon, with winds clocked at 30 miles per hour, the chill factor as measured in Amarillo measured 40 degrees below zero. You didn't have to be out in the weather long to admit that the reading was about right.

Although the front was accompanied by flurries of snow, the flakes were scattered, and only a trace of snow was the official recording at the Friona weather station.

The official low reading at Friona Wednesday morning was -1 degree, the first time this season that the mercury dipped to the zero mark or below.

Temperatures warmed up nicely on Wednesday, to 48 degrees, and Thursday and Friday showed good recovery from the wintry blast, with Friday's high headed for the 60s. But residents were reminded at least for a day or two this week what they have been missing for most of the 1980-81 winter season.

## Record Turnout Is Expected For Show

A near-record number of entries are expected for the 34th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show February 19-21 in Friona, at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Around 275 barrows, 150 sheep and 30 steers are expected to be entered by 4-H Club and Future Farmers from throughout Parmer County.

A change in the schedule for the 1981 show will find the barrow judging beginning at 8 a.m. Friday, due to the size of that entry list, and the sheep show being moved back to 4 p.m.

The steer judging will begin at 8 p.m. Friday night, making time changes for all three divisions of the show.

Animals will be weighed in on Thursday, and classification of sheep will also be held that day.

The annual show concludes as usual on Saturday with an auction sale beginning at 1 p.m., with the top animals from the show making the sale.

Judges for the 1981 show will be Marcus Phillips, Hereford v-o-g instructor, barrows; Joe Ed Wise, Dawson County Agent, Lamesa, lambs; and Spencer Tanksley, Bailey County Agent, Muleshoe, judging the steers.

## Bond Issue Carries By More Than 8-1

A total of 210 Friona voters braved the well below zero chill factor weather on Tuesday of this week to cast their ballots in the city's \$1 million water improvement bond election.

When the tally was complete, city residents had given their mandate: they want their future water supply to be assured. The final vote was 172 in favor of issuing the bonds, and 38 opposed.

The vote broke down to 81.9 per cent of those voting being in favor of issuing the water bonds.

"We were pleased with the turnout, especially in light of the weather, and with the results of the vote. We intend to move as quickly as possible to implement the program," said Friona Mayor B.K. Buske.

Buske said that the Farmers Home Administration officials have been contacted, and he expects to meet with them in Amarillo, possibly within a week, to discuss the city's application for an FHA loan for the project, with the bonds to be used as escrow.

The FHA loan should carry a considerably lower interest rate than the regular market interest rate.

Clayton Yeager, a representative of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, the city's engineering firm, met with the City Council in a special meeting on Wednesday following the election, and gave the council some preliminary cost figures on the water improvements.

"Their figures indicated that the project may be slightly more expensive than we had at first estimated," Mayor Buske said.

The engineering firm was taking into account

the fact that a contract on the water improvement project may not be awarded for a time, and built in a little for inflation.

If the city receives favorable action from its application to the Farmers Home Administration for the loan, it will not have to go through the regular bond-rating procedure, which would save the city that trouble and expense.

In action last week, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) gave the city's pre-application its approval and passed it on to the FHA.

The mayor, city manager and city council have been working earnestly on a solution to the water problem, ever since two city wells failed in June of 1980, causing city residents to be placed on a water rationing program.

The proposal as approved by city voters Tuesday will pay for purchase of a tract of land northeast of the city, and with the land goes the water rights. The land involved already has four producing irrigation wells.

Also to be installed will be a reservoir, a chlorinator, pump station, and a pipeline to connect the new water supply with the present City of Friona water system.

Due to the required legal work, actual construction on the improvements will not begin in time to help the water supply for 1981, but would be completed in time for the summer of 1982.

In the meantime, city officials are crossing their fingers and hoping the area does not experience another hot, dry summer such as it did in 1980.

POPULATION FIGURES from the 1980 census have been released for the states and for the largest cities, and the figures reveal some interesting trends in the shifting of population in the nation.

Texas was one of the fastest-growing states, with a 1980 count of 14,228,383, up a whopping 27.1 per cent from the 1970 total of 11,196,730.

Texas, Florida and California--termed the sun-belt states, showed the largest gains of the populous states. Between them these three states gained almost ten million people during the last decade.

The 1980 population figures show a shifting of the population out of the north and east, and into the south and southwest. Experts say that people are also moving more into the Rocky Mountain area, as some Americans apparently are searching for regions with fewer people.

Among the state's largest cities, Houston grew 26.1 per cent, and with its 1980 population of 1,554,992, stands as the nation's fifth-largest city, behind New York City, Chicago, Los Angeles and Philadelphia.

Dallas, with a population of 901,450, is now the seventh largest city nationally, and San Antonio, which grew 19.7 per cent during the decade to 783,296, is tenth, giving Texas three cities in the nation's top ten for the first time.

El Paso moved ahead of Fort Worth as the state's fourth largest city with 424,522 people, and the border city went from 45th nationally in 1970 to 28th currently. Fort Worth, with 382,349 souls, held its previous rank at the number 33 position.

Otherwise, Austin holds down the sixth spot in the state, and grew by 35.4 per cent the past decade to 343,390, gaining 15 spots nationally.

In our area, Lubbock grew by 16.8 per cent, to a 1980 figure of 174,157 (seventh in the state) and also gained 15 spots, going from number 93 in the nation in 1970 to 78th at present.

Although Dallas showed a modest growth of 6.8 per cent, and Fort Worth actually showed a 2.8 per cent decrease, a better picture of the growth of that area could be seen by studying the population growth of the suburbs of those cities.

All of the figures have not been released as yet, but a good example is the city of Arlington, between Fort Worth and Dallas, which grew from 89,723 people in 1970 to 159,117 in 1980, a whopping 76.7 per cent.

Figures for other of the Dallas-Fort Worth suburbs are expected to show similar growth.

The figures for Amarillo were not included in the release we received.

As a result of its growth, Texas will gain three seats in the U.S. Congress, and hopefully our rural section will not have to be spread a lot thinner.

However, in the state government, both Bill Clayton's district and Bill Sarpalius' senatorial district will have to be enlarged, since our section of the state did not grow at the same pace as the rest of the state.

Hence, the residents of this area will lose part of their voice in state government, by having their districts enlarged. This is even more reason to elect strong, effective representatives, and we believe that the two we have fit this mold.

Certainly Bill Clayton has proven himself along this line, and although Sarpalius is a novice, he has exemplified good leadership capabilities, and is off to a good start in the young legislative session.

WE HEARD THIS WEEK that people need to be on guard against telephone solicitations, who are trying to sell older people on insurance policies, hinting that the new administration may cut out or down on Social Security payments.

The administration has assured that older residents will not be hurt by their proposed budget cuts. Residents of all ages need to be wary of long distance sales solicitations for all manner of products.

-Shain Rhodes, a 15 year old 4-H member from Friona, will participate in the beef scramble at the 1981 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Shain, son of Wayne and Judy Rhodes, will "scramble" during the March 7 matinee performance in the Astrodome. Not only will he have the opportunity to catch a calf, but also he will be a part of the Saturday entertainment package that includes the best rodeo contestants in the world and stars Dolly Parton as the featured entertainment.

Always a favorite with rodeo audiences, the calf scramble begins as an athletic event in the rodeo arena. However, for the contestants who manage to catch a calf, halter it and drag it across a finish line, the scrambling is only the start of a year-long educational experience.

Each winner in the calf scramble receives a \$400 calf purchase certificate which enables him to purchase a purebred, registered heifer that he agrees to feed, fit, groom and return to the Houston Livestock Show for special show ring competition the following year.

Each winner also agrees to keep accurate monetary records, submit monthly progress reports both to the Livestock Show and to his individual sponsor, photographically chronicle the progress of his calf and prepare a 500-word essay on his project.

Every performance of the 1981 Rodeo will feature a calf scramble (either beef or dairy) as its fourth event. In each beef scramble, 24 boys will compete for 12 calves; and, in each dairy scramble, 28 boys will compete for 14 calves.

Through the 1980 Show, winners in the calf scramble have received more than \$1.7 million to purchase some 8,700 quality animals.

Most heifers become the basis for future cattle herds; thus, a one-year learning partnership is stretched into a lifetime career. For those youngsters who decide not to continue their cattle program, the learning experience is invaluable and many times serves to stimulate a career in some other agricultural occupation.

The Livestock Show opens February 25 and runs through March 8, with rodeo performances in the Astrodome beginning on February 27.

The 1981 Rodeo will spotlight the world's top professional cowboys and barrel races competing for one of rodeo's richest purses, against the toughest stock seen in a rodeo arena.

Stars for the 1981 Rodeo include Anne Murray, Charley Pride, Crystal Gayle, The Charlie Daniels Band, The Oak Ridge Boys, Mac Davis, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin Brothers Band, Dolly Parton, Don Williams and Waylon Jennings. Tickets are priced at \$3, \$4 and \$7.



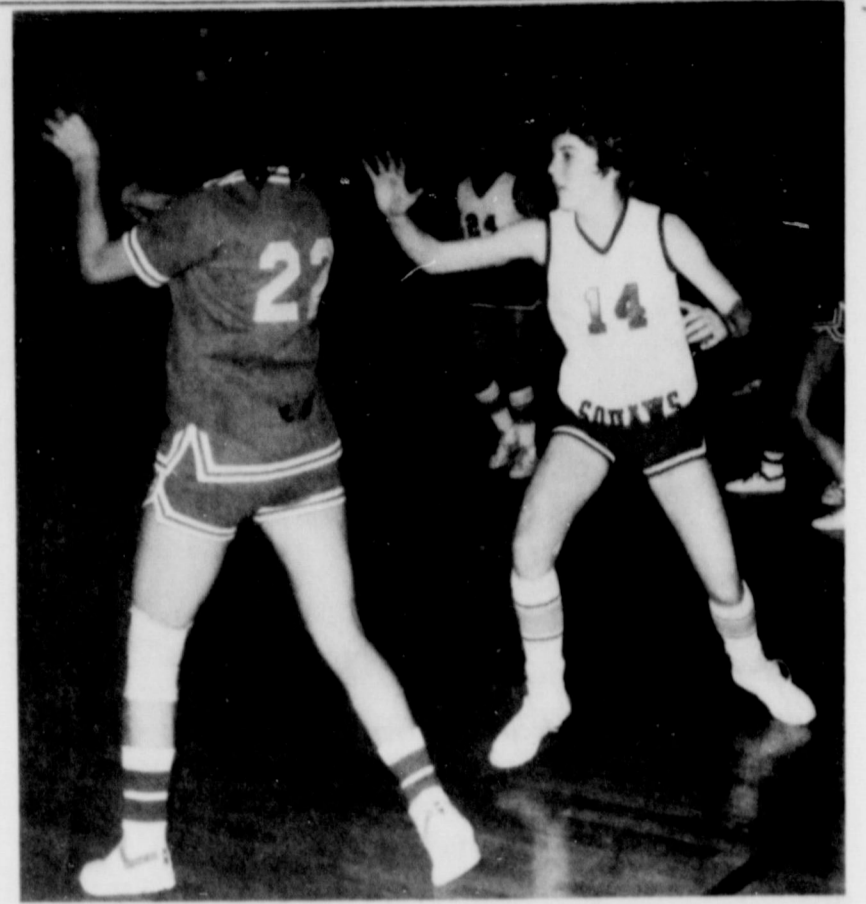

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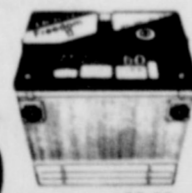

## Pioneer Hybrids Show Resistance

Sorghum breeders for Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., have discovered three of their experimental hybrids apparently have strong resistance to the new Biotype E greenbug that is threatening High Plains agriculture.

Discovered by researchers only last year, the new greenbug could attack virtually all areas of the regional sorghum belt. Therefore, sorghum hybrids previously thought to be greenbug-resistant may well be susceptible to the new insect and its deadly toxin.

However, greenhouse research on sorghums at the Plainview facility of Pioneer has indicated sorghum hybrids with resistance to the Biotype E greenbug could be available to farmers as early as next year, said Dr. Gene Dalton, director of sorghum breeding for Pioneer.

"If the hybrids continue to demonstrate resistance to Biotype E greenbug damage during extensive field tests this summer, they might be available for 1982 plantings," said Dalton. "But Pioneer will release none of the hybrids commercially until they are thoroughly tested and meet our strict performance standards."

Greenbugs first became a problem for sorghum farmers in the late 1960s. The insects, not much larger than a pin head, suck fluids from

plant leaves, then excrete poisonous wastes into the plants. "It's the greenbug toxin, not the bug itself, that kills the plant," said Dalton.

By the mid-1970s, researchers had developed sorghum hybrids resistant to greenbugs. The Biotype C greenbug was, and still is, the main culprit.

The Biotype E was discovered only after researchers found that plants thought to be resistant to Biotype C were nonetheless dying from greenbugs. Even though they were not widespread last year, the new insects pose a potentially-severe problem for growers.

"Pioneer had many tests scattered throughout the sorghum belt last summer," said Dalton, "but we were able to confirm Biotype E greenbug damage in only one of these locations. We will not know how widespread the new Biotype is until after the next crop is planted."

The greenhouse discoveries of apparently resistant hybrids involved seed that was developed from an inbred line on which Pioneer began research in the late 1960s.

"The work we began in the late '60s was designed to broaden the genetic base of Pioneer parent lines," Dalton said. "We used a number of exotic lines, collected from all over the world. And the new inbred line carrying this Biotype E resistance is a

product of that research effort."

Dalton said farmers "must take a sensible approach in sorghum production, weighing all benefits against all costs. They should select hybrids based on all performance traits and use careful inspection in their insecticide application program."

Jim Lindsey, president of the Southwestern Division of Pioneer, added that the promising discovery "vividly demonstrates" the value of an aggressive, well-funded and comprehensive research program.

"We feel the discovery is a real tribute to our sorghum breeding staff and the project to which they committed themselves over a decade ago."

# Windham Leaves Enviably Show Record

An era came to an end for the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show with the 1980 show.

Scotty Windham, longtime vocational agriculture instructor at Lazbuddie High School and director of the project animal activities at Lazbuddie, was participating in his last county show.

Windham accepted a position at Abernathy High School following the 1979-80 term, after 21 years with the Lazbuddie School system. The new vo-ag instructor at Lazbuddie is Rick Copp.

And Windham's students gave Scotty a good "going away" present by sweeping all three of the 1980 show's grand championship awards.

Although Lazbuddie exhibitors have had some outstanding feats connected with the county show, Windham said it was the first time since the grand champion sheep award was re-instated that exhibitors from Lazbuddie had swept all three of the championship awards.

Under Windham's watchful eye, the project animal program at Lazbuddie yielded spectacular results. The name Lazbuddie has become synonymous with winning stock show titles.

Lazbuddie showmen achieved a feat which may never be duplicated again, when they captured the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show's barrow title for 16 consecutive years, 1961 through 1976. In a number of those years, Lazbuddie showmen swept virtually every breed title in the barrow competition.

In Windham's 21 years with the Lazbuddie junior livestock program,

youngsters from his community won 18 barrow titles and six county steer titles. Forty-five class champions were won in the sheep show (as far as the judging went for several years), plus two sheep titles since that award was reinstated.

And Windham's students scored impressive wins at the major shows as well, during his tenure here.

Vandi Tarter captured the county show's barrow title in 1980 with a Duroc. The win by the Duroc breed tied it with Hampshires for the most titles in the county show, eight. Durocs have won the title in 1977, 1978 and 1980.

Poland China entries have won six county titles, crossbreeds have won five titles, mainly in recent years, and Chester Whites have won four times.

Phillip Jesko of Lazbuddie had the grand champion steer in the 1980 show, an 1156-pound Angus. The win

was only the fourth for an Angus steer in the county show. Hereford steers lead the list with at least 18 titles.

Steer breeds are not noted in our records for 1950, 1951, 1954, 1957 and 1959.

Crossbred steers have won the county's steer title four times.

The win by Miss Tarter in 1980 gave Lazbuddie its 21st barrow title overall in the past 33 years. Friona is next with six titles.

Friona showmen lead in steer titles with 15, to 10 for Farwell.

**SIX-MONTH REPORT**

**Friona Industries' Earnings Increase**

Friona Industries, Inc. had net earnings of \$1.9 million, or 85 cents per share, on revenues of \$101 million during the first six months of its 1981 fiscal year.

This compared with net earnings of \$1.8 million, or 82 cents per share, on revenues of \$93 million for the first half of the prior fiscal year.

All of the Company's industry segments reported profits. Custom Feeding was the leading producer of operating profits with \$2,017,000.

Commercial Feeds generated \$835,000 in operating profits, up 24 per cent for the six months, as favorable profit margins were maintained.

Company Cattle had operating profits of \$683,000, three times greater than in the prior year's first half. Higher cattle prices, primarily in the first quarter, helped boost profits considerably.

Animal Health Supplies achieved an 18 per cent gain in operating profits and totaled \$497,000. Increased sales of higher profit margin items assisted in this gain.

Grain had operating profits of \$319,000, up 60 per cent. The sale of grain to outside customers was primarily responsible.

Operating profits from Meat Processing amounted to \$402,000, a decline of 36 per cent due to increases in raw ingredient costs and expenses incurred for a new distribution system.

For the second quarter ended December 31, 1980, net earnings were \$552,000, or 25 cents per share, on revenues of \$51 million compared with net earnings of \$751,000, or 34 cents per share, on revenues of \$51 million in the second quarter of fiscal 1980.

The performances of Commercial Feeds, Animal Health Supplies, Company Cattle and Grain showed

improvement over the same three months of the prior year.

However, Meat Processing registered a small operating loss of about \$14,000 and Company Cattle had a loss of \$217,000, which was still less than the \$331,000 deficit in the comparable quarter of last year.

"A decline in both the price and numbers of Company Cattle marketed and start up costs for our new distribution system for Meat Processing were the primary reasons for the losses in those two industry segments," said Ron Davenport, president.

At the end of the second quarter the Company was serving approximately 750 Wendy's restaurants with hamburger meat, cheese and other dairy items.

Custom Feeding had good operating profits of \$954,000, but were down 17 per cent when compared to a very outstanding operating profit of \$1.1 million in the second quarter of last year. An 8 per cent reduction in the average number of cattle in the Company's feed yards and higher raw ingredient costs were the chief causes.

"High interest costs have caused a reluctance on the part of cattle feeding customers to place cattle in feed yards which has been detrimental to our custom feeding operations," he added.

Commercial Feeds operating profits of \$468,000 were 2 per cent higher. Animal Health Supplies continued an uptrend with an 18 per cent gain to \$313,000. Grain had an almost threefold increase with total operating profits of \$253,000.

"There are indications that total meat supplies, including pork and poultry, will be lower in the coming months. This could generate more demand for beef and higher prices," said Davenport.

This health special is being broadcast on KENW TV Channel 3 on February 15, at 11 p.m., C.S.T. and repeating February 19 at 9 p.m., C.S.T.

Answer sheets for the public to use during the program are available at the Parmer County Extension Office, second floor of the courthouse in Farwell.

Viewers who participate will test

their general medical knowledge and special risk factors. During the test the answer sheets help make the scoring easier.

It will be helpful if you can find out your height, weight, blood pressure, blood cholesterol level, family history for diabetes and the age at which your grandparents died before the program.

The average cholesterol count is 150-270 milligrams per 100 milliliters of blood or about 1/16 of an ounce of cholesterol in a quart of blood.

It's important to take the National Health Quiz, because with the results, each viewer can identify their own risks and change them to extend their useful-life expectancy.

Remember the only way you can fail the health quiz is by not taking it!

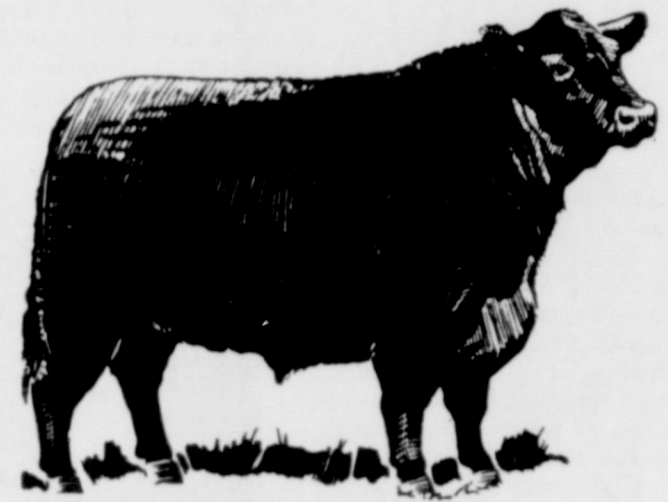

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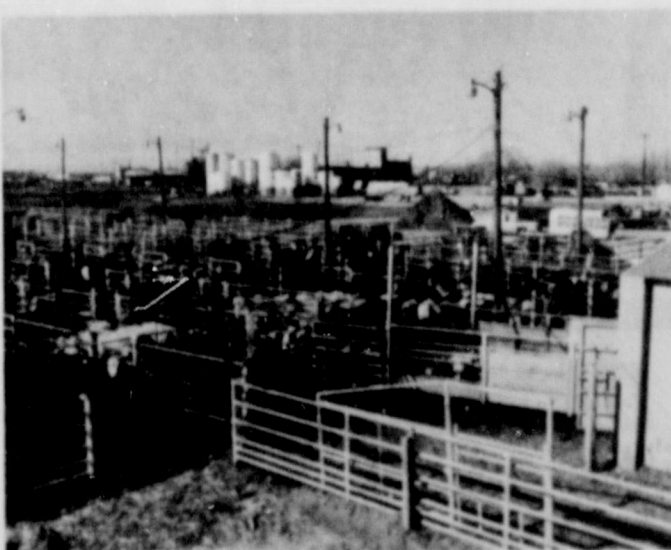

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

President Reagan has vowed to help reduce federal spending by cutting the fat out of many established government programs. There are many misused "Great Society" programs that can and should be cut and among these is the "Legal Services Corporation" of which the Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc. is a big part.

The Conservative Caucus, Inc., among others, is promoting a drive to eliminate federal funding for the Legal Services Corporation. To quote them, "If America is as conservative as the polls tell us, why do you keep losing, and the liberals keep winning? Especially on issues like taxes, welfare, crime, busing, defense, quotas, food stamps, OSHA, and energy. One big reason for liberal victories is the tax-payer funded Legal Services Corporation."

Last year the American Taxpayer paid over \$300,000,000 in taxes to support an elite corps of several thousand government funded lawyers and several thousand more of their full time assistants. These people do not fall under Civil Service so they are free to become social and political activists. There are about 17,000 people employed by this Federally funded legal services project. Leaders in the program are committed to the implementation of a radical social and political agenda which includes--organization of unions of prison convicts, who seek (and sometimes receive) social security benefits, political rights, etc.;--lawsuits by young children to challenge the authority of their parents on matters like access to personal mail, choice of schools, etc.;--expansion of the food stamp program to college students from affluent families and people who have voluntarily decided not to seek gainful employment--and lawsuits promoting racial quotas in education and employment.

In essence, the LSC funds a nationwide network of liberal activists who are spending our money to socialize America.

Our community is well aware of what the Texas Rural Legal Aid (TRLA) has been doing locally. The incidents during the vegetable harvest last summer were the most publicized

and the TRLA filed several lawsuits against agricultural producers and shippers based on labor grievances. It is interesting to note that, to the best of my knowledge, all of the suits filed, relative to agricultural labor wages, could have been investigated and settled by the Department of Labor. This harassment, however, is not limited to the agricultural industry. These lawyers are constantly filing senseless and frivolous law suits and are promoting discrimination in our community where Latin is pitted against Anglo to the point where our school children are feeling the pressure. It is ironic that they are using your tax money to sue you. The TRLA leadership readily admits that over 80 per cent of the law suits that they file are against government entities. **Our tax money is working against us.**

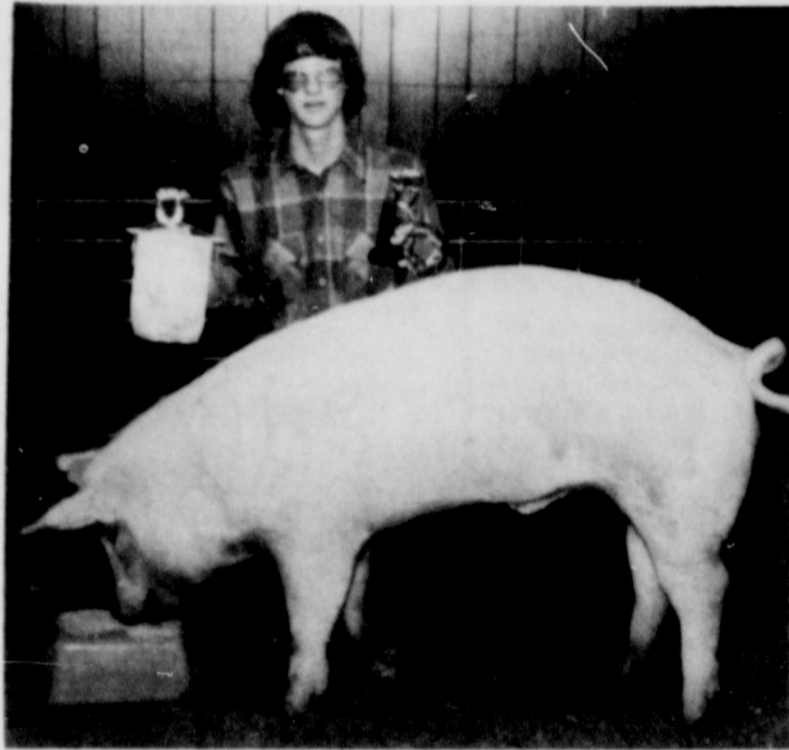
Our goal should be to **completely eliminate** the Federal Legal Services Program and to reject any and all funding for it. There is no way that regulations can be enacted to control the abuses of the Legal Services

Corp., nor can it be reformed by replacing the Corporation's Board of Directors. The LSC is now operating under emergency funding at the same level (\$300 million) as last year. It is my understanding that the President can stop this funding at any point.

If we, as citizens, are to stop this foolishness, it would behoove everyone to write our Legislators in Washington demanding that funding be stopped for this program. You should also contact Vice-President George Bush, Senator Orrin Hatch (Chairman of the Senate Labor & Human Resources Committee, which oversees LSC), Attorney General William French Smith and David Stockman (Director of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget).

Let's support our President in his efforts to reduce federal spending and do away with damaging programs. Collectively, we can make something happen.

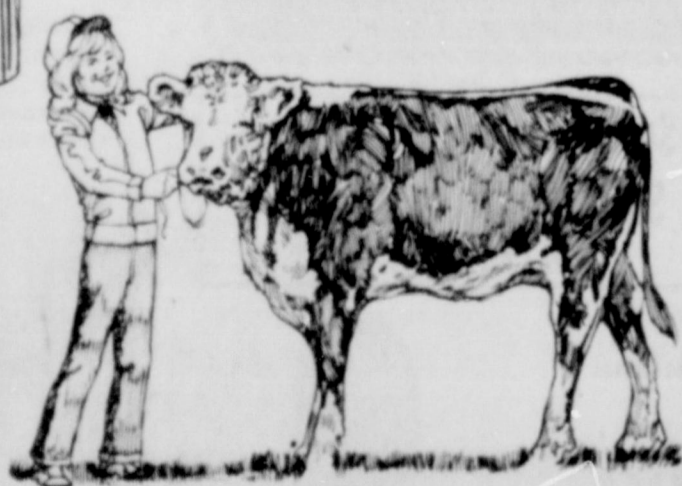

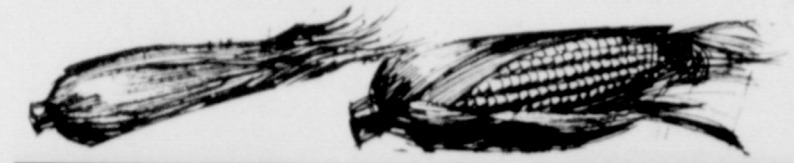

### Make Plans For Use Of Excess Water

We've had several complaints recently. Folks developing new irrigation wells for production have been pumping their water down the county road bar ditch. This is not only a waste of valuable water and energy, but it is a violation of the rules of the Water District.

Many irrigators who allow their water to escape during the development of a new well most often have not planned how they can conveniently use the water before they begin the drilling of the new well.

An excellent example of groundwater conservation was observed in Parmer County awhile back. During the process of pumping out a new irrigation well, overflow from the slush pit was used to prewater twenty-five rows or about five acres on a farm near Lazbuddie. Said the operator, "I would value that salvaged water at approximately thirty dollars an acre."

Operators planning to develop new wells or rework old ones should plan ahead and put that potential waste water to good use.
