AS YOU MAY (or may not) know, the year 1981 marks the 75th anniversary of the city of Friona, which was founded in the year 1906.

Thus, the Chamber of Commerce has embarked on a diamond jubilee theme for the city's 1981 Maize Days celebration.

The annual Maize Days celebration grew out of the city's 50th anniversary celebration, which was held in 1956. That Golden anniversary celebration turned out to be so much fun that the local civic leaders decided that the city would be missing something not to have some type of celebration every year.

The name "Maize Days" was settled on, because at that time Parmer County was the state and nation's leading producer of maize, or grain sorghum.

Crop patterns have changed during the past 25 years, until now corn is the number one crop. But our Maize Days celebrations continue--and this year's affair will be the 25th year they have been held.

We're now in our second generation of having Maize Days. Already, we have had daughters of past Maize Queen candidates competing in pageants themselves. Now, we are getting sons and daughters of the civic leaders who were instrumental in the beginning of Maize Days taking leadership roles in the city's annual celebration.

The theme for the 1981 Maize Days parade is "Happy Birthday, Friona--Diamond Jubilee!"

We think it's quite an accomplishment that Maize Days has this much of a heritage. It has become synonymous with the city of Friona. Folks across the region are apt to say: "Friona--oh yes, that's where they have the Maize Days celebration!"

School Begins On Monday In Friona

School begins for youngsters in the Friona Independent School District on Monday, August 24. Buses will run their regular routes on Monday.

High School students registered on Friday for the new term of school. Students in kindergarten through the eighth grade will register on the first day of school.

Students new to the system are asked to bring immunization records and report cards or official records from their previous school.

Parents are reminded that Texas law requires all students to be immunized for polio, rubella, rubeola and diphtheria. Also, the mumps vaccine is required for all children under nine years of age.

"The school will definitely enforce the laws regarding immunizations, and parents are strongly urged to have these updated prior to enrollment," Superintendent Tom Jarboe said.

It was also announced this week that seventh and eighth grade football players, like those in high school, must have their physical examinations made. These must be taken as soon as possible, as players cannot participate without the examination.

Jarboe again asked the cooperation of school patrons in regard to the construction and renovation at the junior high campus.

"There will be some inconveniences for awhile, and we apologize for this. We hope that the parents and students will be patient until the work is completed," he said.

In other school news, Superintendent Jarboe announced that Tom Johnson has been assigned to coach the high school girls this year, in addition to his duties as boys' basketball coach.

The action became necessary due to a late resignation from girls coach Al Stinson, which caught the administration off guard.

Mikie Simpson, a new teacher in the system, will coach the freshman girls.

"Due to the timing, we felt the only way we could fill the vacancy adequately was by reassignments within our ranks. Luckily, we had someone of Johnson's ability willing to take the responsibility," Jarboe said.

Arrangements Made For School Lunches

Special arrangements have been made to provide meals for the students in kindergarten through the eighth grade during the first week of school.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said that since the new cafeteria will not be operational as far as providing a hot lunch for the first week, cafeteria workers will make sack lunches at the high school cafeteria and take to the elementary-junior high cafeteria.

"We encourage any parents who wish to send lunches for their children to do so. For those who wish to bring their own lunch, we will also have milk available for 20 cents, if they want it," Jarboe said.

The school superintendent also said he urged parents of junior high students to cooperate by getting their

children to either bring their lunches or eating those prepared by the school.

"Obviously, if everyone tried to leave the campus to eat lunch off campus, we would have a tremendous safety problem. We hope parents will cooperate with us to this extent," Jarboe said.

The lunches which the school will prepare will include a sandwich or hamburger, potato chips, fruit, desert and milk. The regular lunch prices will apply.

Jarboe said he felt that this special arrangement would be necessary for only one week, and that the regular hot lunch program will be operational by the second week of school.

The high school will have its cafeteria in operation on a regular basis for the opening of school.

Maize Days Denotes City's 75th Birthday

"Happy Birthday, Friona--Diamond Jubilee!"

This will be the theme for the 1981 Maize Days parade, announcing the 75th birthday of Friona. The theme was decided upon this week by Chamber of Commerce officials, after some discussion, and realization of the city's birthday tie-in.

Jerry Cass, chamber board member, will serve as chairman for the 1981 Maize Days celebration.

Other officials for the celebration include: Queen's pageant, Maxine Loafman, coordinator, and Lois

Norwood, co-chairman; Parade, Roger Wilcox and Dale Houlette, co-chairmen; Barbecue, Mike Cortese, Fred Church and Bob Hurst, co-chairmen.

This year, the barbecue is to be catered by Johnny's Barbecue of Midland, which comes highly recommended. Advance tickets have been printed, and will be sold for the barbecue event. Price is \$4 for adults and \$2.50 for children 12 and under.

Houlette, Danny Kendrick or Robert White.

The Chamber of Commerce is urging clubs, businesses and organizations to enter floats in the "Diamond Jubilee" parade, as well as entering a girl in the Maize Queen contest. Mrs. Loafman says that the queen's pageant, which will be held September 17, will carry out the birthday theme.

Entry fee for the queen's pageant is \$25.00 per sponsor. Those wishing to sponsor a girl in the pageant or girls

wishing to enter the contest should contact the Chamber of Commerce office, 247-3491.

Tickets to the Queen's Pageant are also on sale. All seats are reserved. Tickets are available from the Chamber office, and are priced at \$3.00 each.

August's Rainfall Is 5.71"

Friona measured an additional .88 inch of moisture during the past week, boosting the total for the month of August to 5.71 inches, and the total for the calendar year to 15.37.

The total rainfall for the month of August currently makes it the third-wettest August since records have been tabulated by City Manager Jake Outland (20 years). The wettest August was 1966, when a total of 6.83 inches were logged. Again in 1974, a total of 6.54 fell, mostly in an eight-day period, similar to the recent rains.

The amounts for the current week came on three consecutive days. Saturday, August 15, a total of .35 inch fell in an evening shower. The next day, a total of .33 inch was measured, and again late Monday and into the early hours Tuesday, a measurement of .20 was logged.

As with the earlier rains, the showers of this week were slow and soaking.

A clearing trend had begun by the latter part of the week. The high temperature reached 82 on Thursday.

Farmers, with some of the best summer moisture in 20 years or more, were welcoming the hot sunshine for a change, to aid in the maturing process for their crops.

SCS Offers New Service To Farmers

Pumping plant efficiency checks is the new type of service provided by the Soil Conservation Service.

With fuel and labor costs steadily rising, this is an area of management that can no longer be overlooked. Efficiency checks show the operator if he is pumping as much water as possible for the dollars he is spending.

Efficiency checks are usually simple to run, with the farmers' help and at his request. S.C.S. personnel will meter the well then read the gas meter or electric meter to see how much fuel or electricity is being used in a certain amount of time. Then, the depth of the well plus drawdown is measured with a depth sounder. If this is not possible, a careful estimate is made. Finally, the discharge pressure and elevation difference is obtained. With these measurements, pumping plant efficiency can be figured.

How much does it cost to pump an acre-inch of water? How much does it cost to run a well an hour? How much money could be saved per year, if a well is brought up to standard efficiency? If the answers to these questions are important to you, the Soil Conservation Service would like to help you find the answers.



In 1970 Andy and Leola moved to Friona and he went to work for the City of Friona. He was employed as a police dispatcher and worked the midnight to eight a.m. shift for the next ten years.

Since Andy's retirement, the Powells have kept busy at home

and have also done some travelling.

Leola says, "Getting used to having Andy at home twenty-four hours a day was a big adjustment for both of us."

Andy added, "I had grown accustomed to getting up and going to work every day and retirement is something you have to learn to live with."

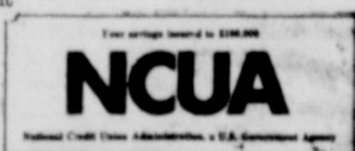

More than 350 students who will enter West Texas State University in the fall semester as freshmen have received Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships.

The scholarships of \$200 each have been awarded to 369 high school graduates who were members of high school National Honor Society chapters in seven states. The scholarships, awarded through the WTSU Development Office, have been accepted by students in 115 cities and communities in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas,

Colorado, Ohio and New York.

Three donations each of \$200,000 by the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo have enabled WTSU to award the hundreds of honor scholarships.

The honor scholars program was established three years ago as the WTSU President's Honor Scholars program to award \$100 to members of high school National Honor Society chapters. More than 1,000 entering freshman students have received the WTSU President's Honor Scholarships.

Following the latest of three financial gifts from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation, the WTSU President's Honor Scholar program was renamed the Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship program.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars who score high on the American College Test and the Scholastic Aptitude Test, which are college entrance examinations, will receive an additional \$100 scholarship and be recognized as President's Honor Scholars.

The additional scholarship will be awarded to the students who have scored at least 28 of a possible 36 on the ACT and 1,220 of a perfect 1,600 on the SAT entrance examination.

Students from states other than Texas who receive at least \$200 in competitive scholarships to WTSU are allowed to pay resident costs. Out-of-state tuition costs often are 10 times greater than resident charges.

Scholarships are awarded from the interest on the \$600,000 which has been invested.

Starters returning include, defense: Trent Johnson, tackle; Carl Jackson, middle linebacker; Rocky Nichols, outside linebacker; Nelson Jackson, cornerback and Mike Neill, safety; offense: Nelson Jackson, Nichols, tight end; Carl Jackson, tackle; Duane Cole, guard; Roddy Berend, center, and Neill, split end.

Nelson Jackson started at quarterback last year, but has been moved to running back so he can carry the ball more this year.

Jackson's 109-yard pass interception return for a touchdown was about the team's only bragging point in a winless season in 1980, which they hope to overcome in 1981.

Neill started at split end a year ago, but is waging a three-way battle with Bruce Patterson and Mark Tucker for the quarterback spot on this year's team.

"We will be a big team," Moss points out, and then quotes figures to prove his point.

Senior tackle Trent Johnson weighs in at 250 pounds. Juan Samarron, a junior defensive tackle (one of the eight who didn't play last year) weighs 240. Mark Osborn, a senior who will probably be the starter at strong tackle, weighs 221. Osborn is also one of the "rejoiners."

From there, the team "falls off" to Mike Chaney, a junior lineman who weighs 217, and Martin Lopez, another junior who weighs an even 200.

Then, some "near 200-pounders" include Carl Jackson, 197; Joe Kyle Reeve, starting tackle on offense, 195; Duane Cole, starting guard, 192, and junior center Roddy Berend, 192.

Moss says that the starting line, tackle to tackle, should average 200 pounds per man.

The team holds its second

scrimmage game against Wellington next Friday, August 28 at Silverton, beginning at 6 p.m.

It opens its season against Tulia, a team which is picked to be a powerhouse in class AAA, on September 4.

"I wish we could switch our first two games. I'd much rather start the season against Boys Ranch than Tulia—but we'll play them one at a time," Moss concluded.

The gates will be open to the public in an effort to express the 27th Tactical Fighter Wing's appreciation for the support the communities have given all year.

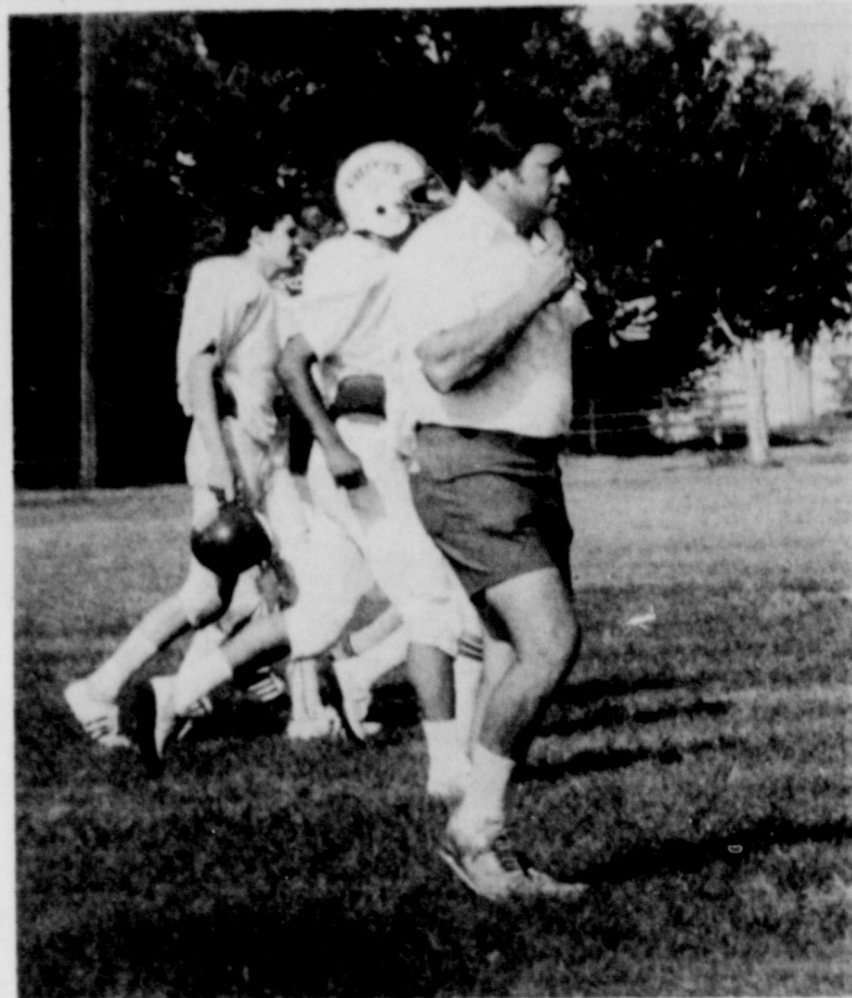
Activities will begin at 11 a.m. and continue until 5 p.m. People will have an opportunity to visit some of the base facilities, see static aircraft displays and much more.

SPS Declares Dividend On Common Stock

Southwestern Public Service Company recently declared a regular quarterly dividend of 34½ cents per share on its common stock and regular quarterly dividends on all series of preferred stock.

Net proceeds from the sale of the preferred stock (and the First Mortgage Bonds) will be used to defray the cost of the Company's construction program, including the payment of outstanding short-term debt incurred primarily in connection with such program.

Dillon, Read Co., Inc. is the sole underwriter of the preferred stock offering.

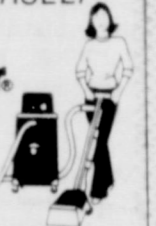
