

Open Portales-Muleshoe Road and You'll Open 'New Frontier', Rancher Claims

There's a stretch of wild blue yonder between here and Portales where the antelope (literally) still play and there may or may not be a discouraging word.

But there are some ranchers in the area across the border who had "just as left" the antelope would shuffle off farther to the west, believing the sound of twin exhaust pipes on a convertible would be more pleasing than the howling of a dust-hoarse coyote.

Such a modern rancher is Eddie Kleeman who has heard the coyotes and the antelopes romping on the range for 56 years and now he had rather see a few neighbors sitting in the doors of their ultra modern and highly mortgaged houses located smack in the middle of their 10-acre tracts which, he might be admitted, also will be heavily mortgaged.

Kleeman can provide part of the land for the 10-acre tracts and he's willing to do so for a good price. But he knows that a good road or two in the area will be necessary before

the mortgagee landowners from the lowlands around about will make their appearance.

Now Kleeman after all these 56 years is lonesome and would like to have neighbors, but he also admits (because he is an honest rancher) that he would like to sell off a few hundred acres of his ranch.

Those are the reasons why Eddie is tickled pink over the prospects of a road between Portales and Muleshoe. In fact he's arranged a 100-foot right-of-way right through one of his ranches. And he's let 'em dig scads of caliche of his caliche stashes and he admits that "if that's why, Eddie says, they would talk just right, I'd let you have some caliche for your part of the road, too." Another 60 feet wide.

Kleeman thinks people will want to buy tracts of land along this "new frontier," and that his 14 windmills will add to the attractiveness of the land. Water is fairly easy to reach — 160 to 200 feet deep.

Eddie has a strong feeling for the land and he knows every inch of it. "I've

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11 Injured in Crashes On Rain-Slick U.S. 84

Bumpy, narrow U. S. 84 was on the rampage again this week, and by the time the week had ended, 11 persons had landed in hospitals here as a result of those rampages.

Wet weather made always dangerous 84 even more dangerous, and probably accounted for all the accidents along the route. The crash schedule started shortly after midnight Thursday night, and by noon the next day, hospitals were jammed. Three persons were injured seriously in the midnight stack-up, set off when a livestock transport jackknifed. A small sedan, occupied by two young couples from Portales, plowed into the semi. All four were seriously injured, and the occupants of the truck suffered lesser injuries.

The automobile transport was brought on a series of minor crashes at the same spot, as a pickup truck striking two other automobiles at the scene of the original crash, resulting in injury to the pickup driver.

Most seriously injured were Mr. and Mrs. John Mullen and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Packingham, all four of whom suffered cuts, fractures and possible internal injuries. Mrs. Packingham suffered a possible skull injury, and Packingham underwent a tracheotomy in an effort to aid breathing.

Occupants of the truck were treated but were released Friday. They were Ben Vigil and Bobby Reed, each of whom

suffered cuts and bruises when the truck jackknifed.

Also injured was Randy Johnson, driver of the pickup which crashed into the other vehicles at the scene. Johnson's condition was not considered serious, said the automobile in which they were traveling east on U. S. 84, left the highway and crashed into a tree a short distance inside Bailey County and by a Singleton Funeral Home ambulance.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Packingham were reported to be still in Eastern New Mexico as Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Gunters, University in Portales, Texas, and their two small children, one a one-month-old baby and the other child 2 years old.

The Gunters were enroute from Fort Irwin, Calif., to Fort Bragg, N. C. The younger child, Freeman was told, was born Aug. 1 this year.

Charges were filed in County Judge Glen Williams' court late Friday against Reed, driver of the truck, charging him with See CRASHES, Page Eight

Muleshoe Nips Olton In Story-Book Game

Muleshoe Mules in a last minute, thrill-packed drive, slipped by the Olton Mustangs 13 to 9 for their third consecutive win of the 1965 grid season at Benny Douglas Stadium.

Tailback Joe Priest of Olton was a thorn in the Mules' side as he led the Olton Mustangs in front of the Mules for most of the ball game, but spectacular and thrilling plays by Joe Adams and John Thompson put the Mules out front with only 25 seconds left in the ball game.

Muleshoe won the toss, but could move only to their 45-yard line before moving to the Mustang 21-yard line. Olton, playing rough and tumble football, drove to the Muleshoe 30-yard line in 13 plays before fudging the ball over on downs.

The Mules, making only six yards, punted to the Mustang 15-yard line. Olton, starting another drive, pushed to the Muleshoe 11-yard line where on fourth down Don Mitchell, Mustang tackle, kicked a field goal and Olton pushed into the See MULES, Page Five

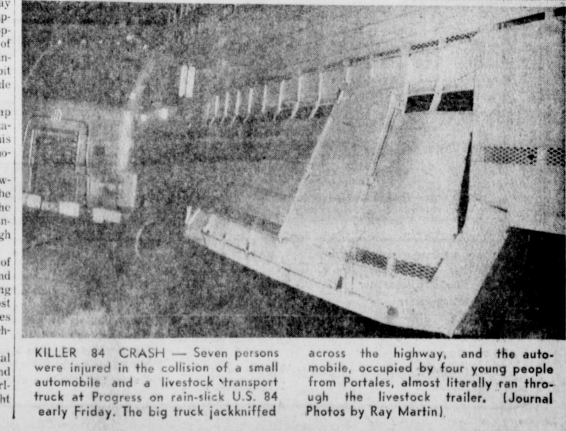
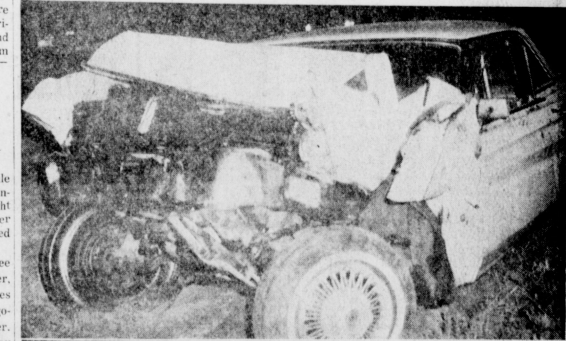

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MRS. KIDD'S RECIPE FOR BAKED APPLE DONUTS

1 1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour	3/4 cup milk
1 3/4 tsp. baking powder	1 cup grated raw apple
3/8 tsp. salt	
3/8 tsp. ground nutmeg	1/2 cup melted butter or margarine
3/8 cup sugar	3/8 cup sugar
3/8 cup shortening	1 tsp. cinnamon
1 egg, beaten	

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and 3/8 cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 2 1/2 x 1 3/4 inch muffin tins 3/4 full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.

In addition to this, 44,000 over-nights in private rooms booked through the tourist office, bringing the grand total of Berlin visitors to 724,000 and overnights to 2.15 million. Traffic from the U. S. was up 25 percent.

"Tokyo is not a city. It's an explosion," wrote a Japanese journalist. Its economic growth runs about 10 per cent a year — highest in the world.

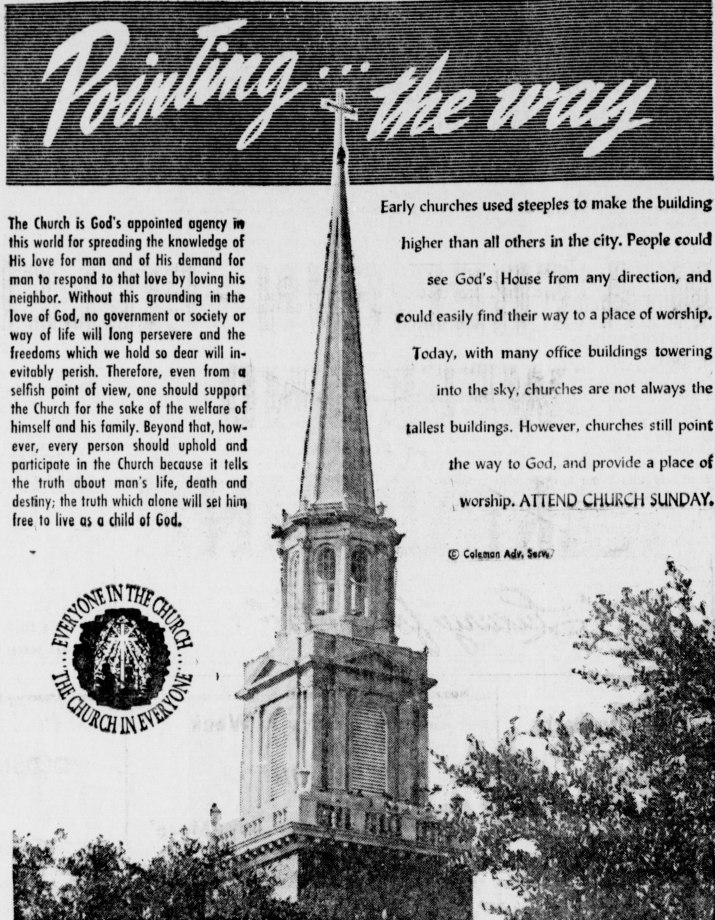

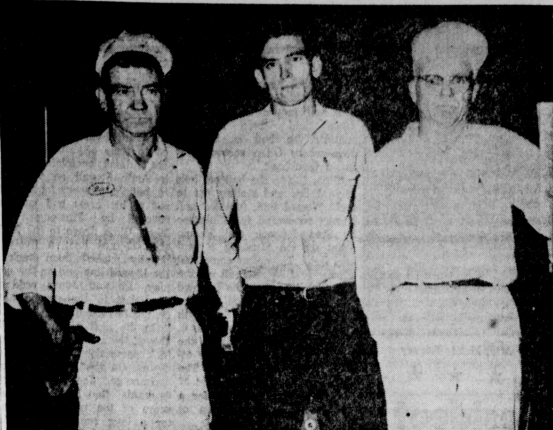

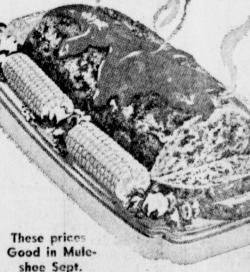
