



COULEE CITY, Wash. - The staccato rat-tat of compressed air drills; the creaking of gigantic winches; the muffled roar of exploding dynamite charges; the dull, steady throbbing of powerful pump machin-

And 4000 toiling human beings, appearing almost microscopic against the setting in which they work.

That's Grand Coulee, the colossal engineering project which, when finished, will be the largest dam in the world. More than that, it will be the largest manmade structure of all time, surpassing even the Great Pyramid of Egypt.

Since time immemorial, man has found it to his advantage to harness the power of nature and the elements, and today as an army of laborers swarm over this huge dam-site, engineers visualize the greatest possibilities for hydro-electric power in North America.

Rising at the north end of a weirdly beautiful natural setting, Grand Coulee is a chasm carved by the Columbia river in a prehistoric age. It is 50 miles long, two to six miles wide, and varies in height from 600 to 800 feet. Ninety-two miles west of Spokane, the project itself is in the hands of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Interior, and the cost of construction is expected to exceed \$260,-

What then are the facts behind its inception, and the benefits to which it will give rise? This is the picture:

When farms first sprang up in the Columbia river basin during the settlement of the great northwest, the land was fertile, crops were plentiful and rich. And then the rainfall dwindled, fell off to nothing. Agriculture in the territory became "dry-farming." The farmers themselves became known as "dust-eaters," and for good reason. Today, there are 1,200,000 acres of arid but potentially fertile land waiting to bear crops again-when Grand

Coulee is finished. Although the immediate need for the huge dam is a source of water supply, three purposes are evident. They are:

1-To irrigate the entire Columbia basin for farming.

2-To provide thousands of kilowats of waterpower for industrial use.

3-To act as key unit in a 10dam exploitation of the basin proposed by United States Army

Draw out and take you a lamb. The lamb was the animal chosen of God to typify Jesus, who was called the "Lamb of God." Kill the passover. Moses, though

now acting as a great political leader, was instituting one of the most prominent religious ordinances. First it was sacrificial, and showed the faith of the individual in the God of Israel. Next, it was typifying Christ. Again, it was a memorial, or remembrance. It was to testify to future generations of God's goodness in remembering his covenant and delivering his people from bondage. Also, it was to show God's protection of his own, and testify that "whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also resp. The Egyptians had wickedly slain the male children of the Hebrews; now God was letting them drink of the same cup which they had passed to the lips of the Israelites. Slaying the first-born of the Hebrews made them want to go; slaying of the firstborn of the Egyptians made them want them to go.

V. 22. Ye shall take a bunch of hyssop. Hyssop was a bushy plant, suitable for sprinkling purposes. Strike the lintel and the two side posts with the blood. The lintel was a prominent place and could be easily seen on entering the door. This act of worship and obedience on Israel's part was also of high symbolic significance. First, the destroyer would supposedly enter the door; and the blood being thus sprinkled, the destroyer could not reach the inmates without passing through the blood. SHIP POLLEN 600 MILES TO GET COTTON CROSSES

More than 9,200 crosses were made at the cotton breeding experiment station at Florence, S. C., during the past year by cotton specialists of the Bureau of Plant Industry. A large part of the crosses represent hybrids between the long-staple, slow-maturing Sea Island variety and the quicker-maturing but shorter staple an educational campaign ipland varieties

Nearly 2,000 crosses were made between a new strain of extra long penstaple Sea Island cotton introfuced from Puerto Rico and planted at Brooksville, Fla., and several varieties of upland cotton

On the day before the flower buds of the Sea Island cotton were to opress to Florence, a distance of about 600 miles, where the pollen was used in crossing. A high percentage of sets was obtained in these crosses by W. H. Jenkins and E. E. Hall, Uniited States Department of Agriculture and South Carolina experiment station scientists in charge of he work

The cross-breeding will be coninued in 1937 in back crossing and out crossing several of the promising The object of the breeding work is to establish pure lines of the thickly branched upland cotton combined with the Sea Island seed and lint characters, and with high-
