Wars and diplomatic intrigues involved the world; economic troubles beset United States; Roosevelt's admimistration pushed on toward the goal of recovery, as a business "recession" rang down the curtain on the eventful 365 days.

The Hindenburg fell in flames; Amelia Earhart was lost over the iffe; the Duke of Windsor and Mrs. Simpson were married and the New York Yankees won the world series.

It has been a busy year. . . .

#### The Administration

ROOSEVELT'S second inauguration was followed by announcement of his second-term aims as to unemployment, farm aid, and progress toward a balanced budget, but it was not until February that he sent the famous message to Congress on a proposal to reform the Supreme Court.

Opposition flared in Congress, The President called upon the nation to trust his plan. Chief Justice Hughes condemned the measure for retiring judges over 70 years of age. Justice Willis Van Devanter resigned and the court plan was defeated 70 to 20 by the Senate.

The appointment of Justice Hugo Black to the bench was followed by a blast of "Klan" criticism. As Roosevelt toured the west, Black explained his position and was sworn in. Congress convened in special session as the year neared its close.

#### Disasters

THE burning of the airship Hindenburg, killing 35, at Lake-hurst, N. J., stunned the world, and a grieving nation sympathized with Texas parents who removed the bodies of more than 400 children and teachers from the ruins of a New London, Tex., school. A gas explosion was blamed.

Floods spread over the Ohio river valley and into the Mississippi, drowning hundreds and making more than 1,000,000 homeless.

spirit of giving. Though we have not the words recorded in the direct sayings of Jesus. Paul's report of the words of Jesus. "It is more blessed to give than to receive," expresses the very heart of the Christ life and the Christ message.

ty to his faith.

Our lesson sets before us the truest and most real form of giving. the gift of a man's life in consecration to the gospel, and in loyalty to Christ

Paul was so sincere about the spreading of the gospel that he could rejoice even in his own imprisonment and persecution, knowing that the word of God was being spread abroad. He realized also that his own for-

titude under tribulation was an inpiration to others. He could say ruly that for him to live was Christ, that his whole being was devoted to his Master.

This loyalty and devotion had dominated Paul's every thought. word and action that he had no fear of anything in life, and no fear of death. He lived in a world of piritual realities that death could iot destroy. He had the profound faith that even in death he would gain through a closer relationship o his Lord

It should be remembered in this lesson that Paul was writing to Christians who were in the midst of discouragement and persecution, in a city where he himself had been cast into prison. It was in this city of Philippi, in his missionary journey to Europe, that Paul had been arrested and thrown into the inner prison with his feet fast in the stocks, and it was here that the prison doors had been opened and the jailer had thrown himself at the feet of Paul, inquiring, "Sir, what must I do to be saved?'

We need to read this lesson of Paul in the light of the places and backgrounds and experiences of his missionary journeys. These Philippians understood perfectly well what he meant when he spoke of the things that had happened to him, making for the progress of the gos-

In reading all Paul's Epistles, we should consider carefully the city and the particular Christians to whom they were addressed. A good plan is to read the Book of the Acts at the same time as the Epistle, tracing Paul's missionary journeys and his experiences in the founding of the churches to which he later addressed his letters.
