HAVE YOU EVER wondered where some of the common sayings or phrases we use in our everyday conversation originated? We ran across the explanation for some of these phrases this week, and thought you would enjoy them, too.

For example, the phrase, "Watching your P's and Q's" is believed to have come from the day when innkeepers used to chalk up their customers' debts on the walls of their taverns. They kept track of the number of pints owed for under the letter P, and the number of quarts in the "Q" column. Another thought on this one is that young printers' apprentices were told to be careful in distinguishing between the back-to-front forms of the letters "p" and "q" when sorting type.

"Selling Down the River" probably came into existence during slavery days in the United States. Colonists in the northern states would be offered high prices for their domestic slaves by plantation owners in the South when slave ships from Africa were delayed and labor was scarce.

"The cold shoulder," is a term which refers to a polite snub. According to tradition, it came from medieval France, where a chateau guest who was served a cold shoulder of beef or mutton instead of hot meat was intended to take it as a gentle hint that he had overstayed his welcome.

"To knuckle under." There are two possible explanations of this phrase, which means to admit defeat. One is the medieval form of submission, bending the knee--then called a knuckle. The other derivation is a player's old custom of rapping the underside of a table to admit defeat in a game.

"Kilroy was here" is a slogan which came into being during World War II. James J. Kilroy was a shipyard inspector in Quincy, Massachusetts, and his signature on equipment was used to indicate that it had met his approval. His name found its way to many obscure places, and so tickled the soldiers' imagination that they soon counterfeited the signature and left it virtually everywhere there was a writing surface and something with which to write.

"By hook or crook" may have come from the ancient custom by the feudal lords of allowing their tenants to gather as much wood from their lord's land as they could rake up from the undergrowth with a hook, or pull down from the trees with a shepherd's crook.

"Double Dutch," or "It's Greek to me," is an expression by English-speaking people to describe something that is unintelligible. Other nations have their own terms. The French and Greeks say "It's Chinese to me," and the Polish people say "I'm listening to a Turkish sermon."

"Not to be sneezed at." During the 17th century, snuff takers learned to control their sneezing and reserve it as a sign of boredom or disapproval. Anything that merited their favor, then, was deemed "not to be sneezed at."

"Touch and go" is an expression which comes from English sailing tradition. Many a ship would "touch" bottom in shallow water, and "go" when the tide floated her off--a narrow escape from a possible shipwreck.

FOOTBALL CONTEST

Leaders Volley For Spots In Grid Wars

Contestants in the Friona Star's annual football contest are beginning to stake out their positions in the standings, heading into the sixth weekend of the contest.

Going into this week's action, Mark Neill leads the pack with a score of 82, with Kenneth McLellan right behind at 81.

Next, at 80, are a trio of contestants, Wade Cargile, Jack Clark and Jerry Hinkle. Ron Cain and Ron Harkey (the defending

champion) are right behind, with scores of 79.

From there, the field spreads out, with seven contestants having scores of 78, three at 77, four with 76, seven more at 75, eight at 74, and another 15 with 73, the most popular score. (The scores of all leading contestants may be found on Page 8 of this issue).

Scores took a nosedive in last weekend's contest, with the average score being about 14.5 per contestant. Upsets in the college and professional ranks, plus a couple of high school games that didn't go exactly according to expectations, held down the scores considerably.

Only two contestants correctly predicted as many as 19 of the 22 contest games, and these two easily claimed the top two weekly prizes.

Mollie Seright Warren of Lubbock emerged as the weekly winner, on the basis of the Dallas-St. Louis tie-breaker score. She predicted the score to be Dallas, 21-20, guessing the St. Louis score on the nose but missing the Dallas score by four.

Mollie will receive \$10.00 cash as the weekly winner in the contest.

Another Friona product currently living in Lubbock, Kim Frye Smiley, took second place in the weekly event. Like Mollie, Kim also picked 19 games, but missed the tie-breaker score by 20 points, tabbing the score at Dallas, 27-10. She will receive \$6.00 for her efforts.

Warren's misses were Dunbar-Canyon, Amarillo-Hereford and Purdue-Wisconsin. Smiley missed Texas Tech-Aggies, Kansas City-New England and Giants-Green Bay.

Only two other contestants managed a score of 18 for the week, Jim Pope and Nancy Jackson. Pope took third place, missing the tie-breaker by 13 points to 21 points for Mrs. Jackson.

Pope missed Wellington-River Road, Purdue-Wisconsin, Kansas City-New England and Giants-Green Bay. Mrs. Jackson missed Clovis-Plainview, Purdue-Wisconsin, Kansas City-New England and Giants-Green Bay.

Car, Tax Change On City Agenda

Awarding of the contract for a new police patrol car, and discussion of the procedures by which the city taxes are to be assessed and collected by the Parmer County Tax office were the main items of business at the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

The council had been submitted bids on six prospective automobiles for police use, three each from Friona Ford Sales, Inc. and Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, including both 1981 and 1982 models.

After considerable study and comparison of bids, the bid was awarded to Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, which had submitted the lowest bid within the specification, \$6,404.04 for a 1982 model Chevrolet Impala.

Appearing before the council was Mrs. Patsy Nance, County Tax Appraiser, Bovina. She presented the council with a copy of a proposed contract for the collection of city taxes by the County Tax Office, which has been established in Bovina.

Mrs. Nance stated that it appeared that all taxing entities in the county would participate in the collection

process, and that the cost levy would not exceed 1.5 per cent of the tax roll. She left with the city attorney a copy of the proposed contract, along with a proposal to continue having the firm of Brandon, Blair and Company, Amarillo, collect the delinquent taxes.

Mayor B.K. Buske and other members of the council stipulated to Mrs. Nance that it would be highly desirable for the county office to maintain a tax collecting office in the City of Friona one or two days per week for the three months during the tax collecting season.

The contract is to be reviewed and considered at the next meeting of the council.

In other business, the council reviewed the city's monthly financial statement, being for the final month (September) in the city's fiscal year.

Manager A.L. Outland presented the council a summary of investments at Friona State Bank, with maturity date and projected interest, indicating that the city's finances were not in bad condition.

A petition for the installation of a new city street light at the intersection of Ninth and Maple was presented and approved, noting that all adjacent property owners were in favor.

Outland, along with water superintendent Clyde Fields, presented a recommendation on solicitation of bids on the one million gallon storage reservoir and chlorination-pump station, items in the city's water improvement program.

It was pointed out that construction of these two facilities would take the longest amount of time, and action needed to be initiated, in order to keep inflation from eating into the approved city bond issue.

Approval was authorized to proceed with bid solicitation, in conjunction with the consulting engineer.

Otherwise, a resolution was passed appointing a city secretary-clerk, to act in the absence of the city manager. City employee Louise Dunnam was so appointed.

Also discussed was the possibility of making the alleyway west of Friona State Bank a one-way facility, with traffic to move south. Action on this question was postponed until the November meeting.

Broadcast Underway

The remainder of the Friona Chieftain games for the 1981 season are to be broadcast each week on Friona Cablevision, Channel 6.

The broadcast of the games, home and away, will feature a live audio (voice) broadcast on game nights, with a full video and audio playback on Saturday mornings beginning at 10 a.m. on Channel 6.

The program is a joint venture of Friona Cablevision, Jim Tucker and Bill Ellis and made possible by several Friona businesses (see advertisement, Page 11).

Some Offices Set Closing

Some offices in Friona will be closed Monday, October 12, in observance of Columbus Day.

This construction includes a new substation of approximately 10,000 KVA capacity along with the necessary transmission lines to serve it. This new construction further includes distribution lines of 146.8 miles of overhead line and 22.3 miles of underground line, which will provide service for 1044 new consumers which the Cooperative anticipates serving in 1982 and 1983. New distribution tie-lines will be constructed to improve voltage-levels, increase capacity, and improve system operating economics. Most of this construction will be located in Parmer and Castro Counties. These facilities will make it possible for the Cooperative to meet the increasing demands for electric power. Texans To Vote Nov. 3

Texas Cattle Feeders Association President R.L. (Bob) Bliss today urged his fellow Texans to vote for Proposition Five on November 3.

Proposition Five seeks to include livestock and poultry with all other farm products, which are already exempt from property (ad valorem) taxation. It is one of seven propositions on the November 3 ballot.

"Of the seven largest cattle feeding states, Texas is the only state which unconditionally imposes property taxes on livestock," Bliss said. "This places Texas beef producers at a price competitive disadvantage with other states. We now have an opportunity to correct this inequity."

"Obviously, where this tax is levied, costs of production are greater than where it is not imposed," he added. "As long as this situation continues, we are increasing the cattle feeders' production costs and making cattle feeding in Texas less attractive than in other states. Some feedyards outside of Texas even advertise their competitive advantage."

Bliss said the constitutional amendment cleared the Texas House of Representatives without a single dissenting vote, indicating their recognition of the inequity. It is supported by nine Texas farm organizations.

He added that the tax represents only a minute portion of the revenues collected by local taxing authorities—about one-fourth of one percent of revenues, statewide. "But the tax is inequitable," Bliss said, "because of widespread and inconsistent administration."

"In the long run," Bliss continued, "this is a positive step we can take to help hold the line on food costs."

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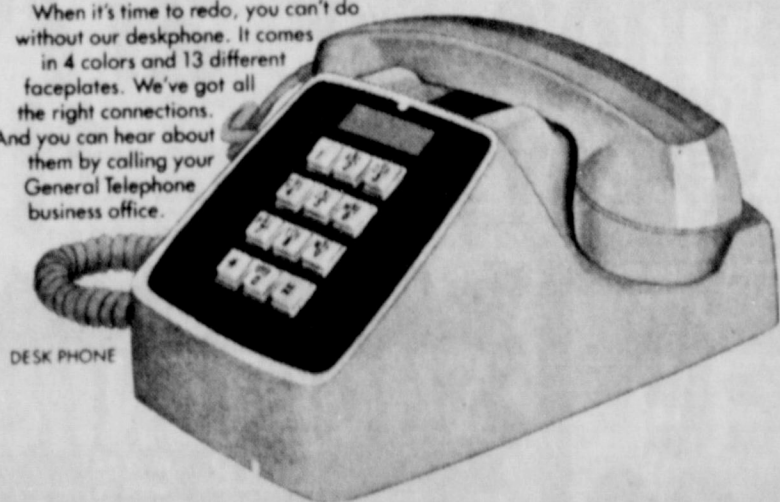
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Judy Bryant, Wade Shelton United In Church Ceremony

The bride is a graduate of Friona High School and Texas Tech University. She taught at Tahoka and was employed at Albertson's in Lubbock.

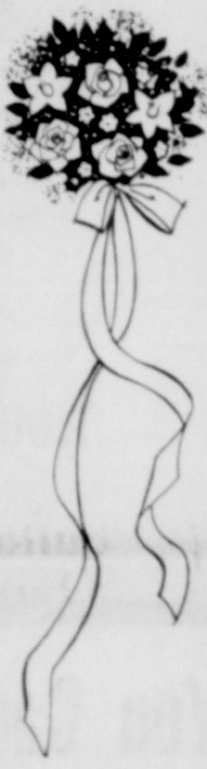
The bridegroom is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin and Texas Tech School of Law.

Parmer County Law Enforcement Report

FRIONA POLICE REPORT

approximately 2:43 p.m. at the location of the Railroad crossing No. 14831-B and FM 292.

A red International grain truck, 1980 model, driven by Shawn Hays of Clovis was attempting to cross the tracks when the vehicle he was driving struck an on-coming train. The warning signals were operational at the time of the accident.

The train was struck about 10-15 feet from the front of the engine.

The engine was a Santa Fe diesel, engine number 5641 and the Trooper said he did not know if the driver of the truck did not see the warning lights or if he was attempting to beat the train across the tracks.

In the second accident, which involved two vehicles, there were injuries reported.

Trooper Hunt was called on an accident on October 3, at 1:45 p.m. 13 miles east and 3.1 miles north of Farwell, on FM 145.

Vehicle one was a tan Chevy pick-up and was driven by Manuel Hernandez of Bovina. Vehicle two was a 1976 blue Olds driven by Roy Sterling Donaldson of Farwell.

According to the DPS report, vehicle one was traveling down a county dirt road, and view was obscured by Johnson grass in a lake bed, which kept the driver of vehicle one from seeing the second vehicle oncoming.

The two vehicles hit left fender to left fender. Vehicle one was cited for traveling on the wrong side of the road, not passing.

Four persons in the Donaldson car were injured, but they were not seriously hurt, according to Trooper Hunt.

Hernandez was uninjured.

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TAKE HOMECOMING WIN

Chiefs Win Battle Of Defenses, 7-3

The fans attending Friona High School's Homecoming Game last Friday were treated to a great defensive struggle, as the Chieftains started a new kind of streak by winning their second game in a row, beating the Vega Longhorns, 7-3.

The win was not without its anxious moments, as the outcome was not decided until the final play of the game, when Vega tried to run the ball in from Friona's 1 1/2 yard line, but was stopped short as time expired.

The game was one of breaks, which were brought about by good defensive plays on the part of each team's defensive unit. Friona's touchdown came about after a partially blocked punt.

Vega's field goal came early in the game after safety Mike Neill was shaken loose from a booming Vega punt deep in Friona's end of the field.

An idea of what a defensive struggle the game was is seen in the fact that Friona was held to its lowest yardage of the season, a net of 100 yards, and only five first downs.

Friona could not move the ball in its first two possessions, and Vega managed just one first down the first three times it had the ball. The Longhorns were punting from their own 36 after its second possession, when the game's first big break happened.

Vega's punter got the ball up into

the 20 miles-per-hour breeze and the kick backed Chieftain receiver Mike Neill up. He had trouble getting control of the ball, and Vega recovered the ball at the Friona 11.

The Chieftain defense dug in at this point, and Vega faced a fourth and seven from the Friona seven-yard line. The 'Horns decided to go for the field goal, and Joe Potter booted the ball squarely through the uprights.

Spotted on the 14, the 24-yard kick gave the visitors a 3-0 lead, as 2:24 remained in the first quarter.

Robert Osborn gave Friona its first first down of the game with runs of six and five yards to the Friona 41, and runningback Nelson Jackson ripped off a 14-yard gain into Vega territory as the first quarter wound down.

But Vega's defense stiffened, and Friona was forced to punt.

A few minutes later, Friona forced a Vega punt, and took over following a high kick at the Vega 44. Osborn ripped through the line for a nice gain to the Vega 30, but fumbled as he was tackled, and the Longhorns were saved a scoring threat.

The Chieftains had another good chance to score a little later, when Friona recovered a Vega fumble at the Longhorn 30.

A penalty moved Friona back, however, and after two passes fell incomplete, a fourth down pass was

intercepted by Vega at their own 15 yard line.

That was about the only threats of the first half, which ended with Vega holding its 3-0 lead.

Friona chose the wind to start the third quarter, and it turned out to be their best move of the game.

Vega took the kickoff, couldn't move, and had to punt. The kick was high and partially blocked, and Friona took over on the Longhorn 19 yard line.

This time the team put some points on the scoreboard.

Runs by Jackson, Osborn and Richard Malouf gained to the 11, where Friona faced a big fourth down and two.

Coach Tommy Moss decided to go for the yardage, and once again, the choice turned out to be a good one.

Jackson was given the ball. He was hit at about the ten, but with a nice second-effort run, struggled free for not only the first down, but found clear sailing for the touchdown after pulling away from his would-be tackler.

Mark Tucker kicked the point after, and Friona took a 7-3 lead with 8:22 left in the third quarter.

Friona recovered a Vega fumble at their opponents' 44 midway of the quarter, but could not move the ball. Three plays gained just a yard, and on fourth down the team punted away.

They had it again at their own 38 following another short Vega punt, but after picking up one first down to the Vega 49, again had to punt.

Vega had the ball for most of the fourth quarter, and Friona's defensive team was put to the test.

The Longhorns took over at their ten after the Chieftain punt, and drove to their 45 before Friona held and forced the visitors to punt.

The kick rolled to the Friona ten, and the Chieftains were in the hole. Jackson got them out of a jam with an 18-yard gain on the third down, to the 30, but three more plays gained just nine yards, and Friona had to punt again.

One more first down might have clinched the game right there, as only 1:08 remained on the clock when Friona punted. Vega's defense crashed through a partially block the kick, and took over on the Chieftain 42.

In the last minute of play, the 'Horns managed to run off eleven plays. They hit on four passes, moving the ball to the Friona four. Friona was called for being offside, moving the ball even closer, inside the two.

Homecoming Queen.

The win was only the second one for Friona against the Longhorns since the Friona-Vega series was resumed in 1977.

"Mistakes plagued us all during the game, but we played good defense

most of the time. The kids realized that they did not play quite up to their capabilities—but they did play well enough to win," said Coach Tommy Moss.

"The entire defensive unit played a good game. All 11 men had a good play at one time or other. It was great to get that second win. We appreciate the good fan support. We hope to improve a little on offense this week," Moss added.

On the partially blocked Friona punt in the fourth quarter, Moss explained that the Chieftain punt blocker backed up and the ball hit him in the seat of the pants and then went straight up, giving Vega good field position.

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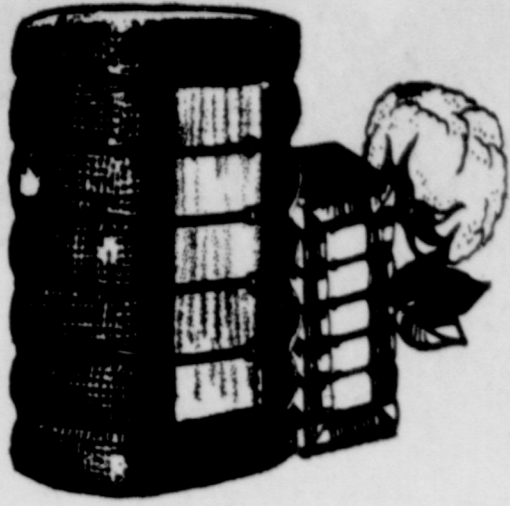

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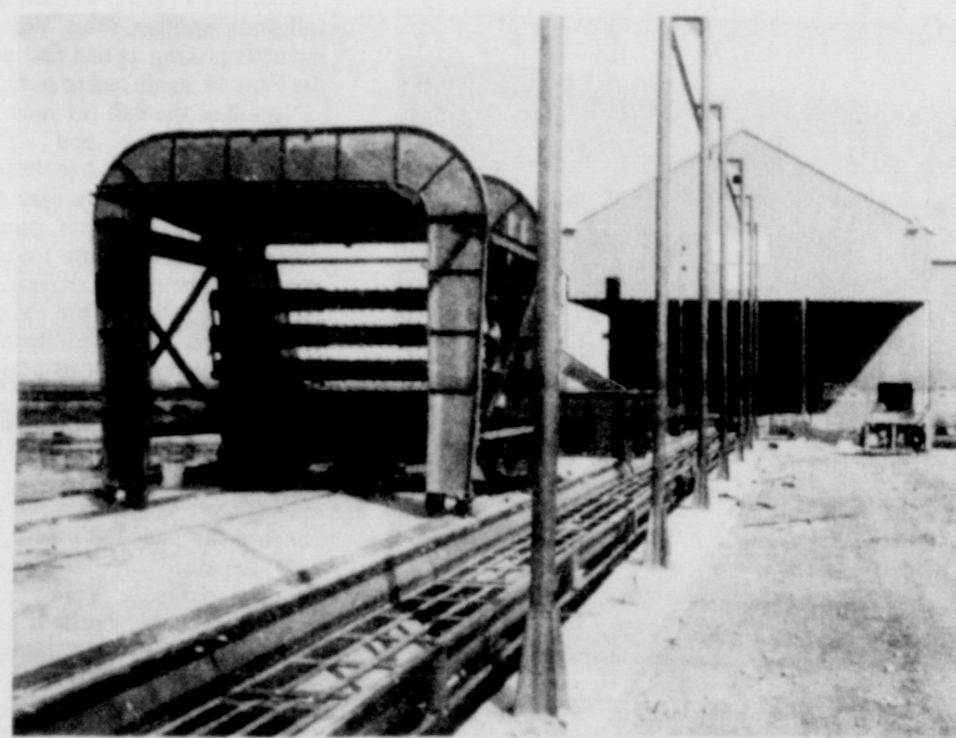
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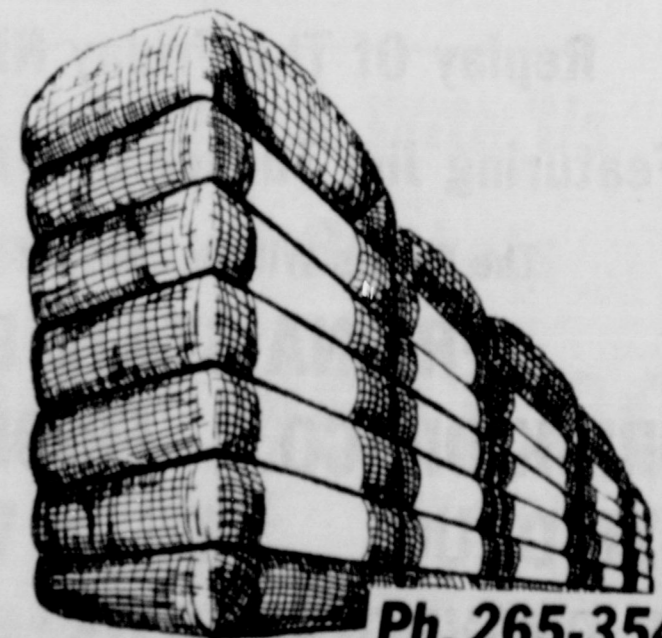
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
