CHANDLER, Ark.—The "dust bowl" is far from a static, these days. It's a streamliner example of ultra-modern housing construction.
The hardier stocks of Arizona's pioneers on the soil which once formed the stage for an American frontier are disappearing from the horizon. Where once and sagebrush and scrubby agriculture has steadily forged ahead.
And the thousands of "Dust Bowl" refugees, destitute wanderers of the westlands, have taken a new lease on life.

back and coated with aluminum paint to reflect the sun's hot rays. The units are decorated inside and landscaped outside in modern mode.
Yet the project cost is the lowest of any similar program yet attempted. The approximate expense of \$400 per room is \$600 per room less than the maximum allowed in the Wagner-Steagall slum clearance bill.
RENT on the agricultural apartments is \$1600 for life, payable over a period of 60 years with 1 per cent interest. The government, however, does not expect many of the tenants to remain long enough to pay this figure. If inhabitants obtain enough to move to a farm of their own, the family equity will be sold to another deserving group to use as a stepping stone.
The farmers, or "tenants" as the west knows them, are selected from applications. They will operate the tract as a co-operative enterprise.
Cotton raising, poultry raising, truck gardening, dairying—these form the Chandler farm routine. In slack seasons, the tenants will be kept busy on public work projects.

Ray Stewart Funeral Sunday At Crosbyton

Member of Prominent East Plains Family Succumbs To Heart Attack Saturday Afternoon

Funeral rites for Ray Stewart, member of a prominent East Plains family, whose death occurred in Floydada late Saturday afternoon, were held at 3 o'clock. Rev. Vernon Shaw, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Floydada, officiated at the service held at the graveside. G. C. Tubbs led the song service and P. C. Harmon had charge of the arrangements.

Stewart suffered a heart attack which proved fatal before a physician could arrive on the scene. He died in front of the Kirk and Sons store on north side square, where he and a friend had gone to sit on the running board of a car, while he recovered from what was thought to be a fainting spell brought on by the heat. He had danced a few minutes in one of the sets at the old-fashioned square dance in the Sarginer building. R. R. Game Warden Cannon Seeks Delegation Of Floyd To State Meet

When the Texas Wildlife Federation holds its annual session this June 10 and 11 in Galveston, five of the six counties in the area served by State Game Warden Jim Cannon are certain to be represented and participating, he has assured State Commissioner Tucker.

"I would like very much to see a delegation from Floyd County there also, joining with the representatives of other counties in the district at the meeting," Mr. Cannon said in Floydada Monday. "Not only do we want the landowners only do we want the sportsmen represented as well." The other counties in the district are Motley, Dickens, Cottle, King and Crosby. Mr. Cannon is enthusiastic over the results of the past year in preserving the wildlife of the area. Not only has the quail population increased very satisfactorily, but also prairie chickens, deer and wild turkey. There are now three flocks of wild turkey growing in this county. Mr. Cannon informed a reporter. There is an encouraging betterment, also, in the number of fish that are growing in the waters of the area.

The state game commissioner would like to see every county in the state represented and every point of view on a proper procedure to protect the game. Any who can attend the Galveston meeting are asked to contact their county agent or get in touch with Mr. Cannon. The probabilities are that automobile parties will be made on an expense sharing basis to reduce the cost of the long trip, he indicated.

News Review Of The Week

Monday, May 23

AMARILLO — Mobilization to fight an enemy equally as deadly as a foreign invader, yet so small that many people have scoffed at possible danger until it appears with ugly arrogance on their doorstep, was begun with military precision yesterday when the Panhandle Committee for Grasshopper Control met in extraordinary session in Amarillo and Dalhart again last night.

MEXICO CITY — Leaders of 1,000,000 Mexican workers tonight considered asking President Cardenas to arm them to help fight what they termed "the Fascist rebellion" in the state of San Luis Potosi.

Discussion Held

LONDON — Great Britain has won assurances from both Germany and Czechoslovakia that they prefer peace talks to war. Prime Minister Chamberlain made the announcement to a silent House of Commons today.

AUSTIN — The March murders of Mrs. Weston G. Frome and daughter of California in West Texas was cited before the Highway Commission today in a plea for fencing of the stretch of lonely highway on Highway 80.

Tuesday, May 24

PRAHA — Differences between Czechoslovakia's German minority and the government seemed greater than ever tonight, 24 hours after Sudeten German leader Konrad Henlein had his first meeting with Premier Milan Hodza.

WASHINGTON — The House passed a revamped wage-hour bill tonight and sent it to the Senate. Southern senators were repeatedly beaten back.

Rebellion On

MEXICO CITY — Two of Mexico's largest unions asked for arms to fight a rebellion in San Luis Potosi which government officials were not taking very seriously. War office attaches said "nothing startling had happened."

CLEVELAND — Ten persons, seven passengers and three crew members, were believed burned to death when a blazing 21-passenger plane crashed just south of Cleveland late tonight.

Wednesday, May 25

AMARILLO — The fight on the menacing hordes of grasshoppers in the Panhandle will be speeded today as the Works Progress Administration starts assigning men to poison-mixing points.

HUNTSVILLE — Texas officers followed a cold trail tonight as they hunted five convicts who bound a guard and escaped from the East-ham Prison Farm today.

Towns Bombed

MEXICO CITY — An undetermined number of San Luis Potosi towns were bombed by Rebel Chief Cedeño's planes which the Mexican Minister of War charged were piloted by United States pilots.

WASHINGTON — Dr. Arthur E. (TVA) Morgan challenged today the honesty of the administration of T. V. A. the vast agency he once headed and charged his former colleges of the TVA board with official misconduct. Dr. Morgan earlier this year refused to answer questions as to his own actions while in the TVA.

Thursday, May 26

WASHINGTON — The United States watched with apprehension yesterday the turbulent European situation as German bombing planes were reported "semi-officially" to have crossed the Czech border and Russia stepped squarely in the path

TYLER — State liquor patrol agents and a Tyler city policeman engaged in a running gun-battle here today with Floyd Hamilton and Ted Waters, fugitives from the Montague County jail. The quarry escaped however toward Glade-water.

Accuser Accused

WASHINGTON — Dr. Arthur E. Morgan, deposed chairman of Tennessee Valley Authority, impassively heard himself accused of having tried to "obstruct and sabotage" the government's conduct of a lawsuit upon whose life of TVA depended.

SAN LUIS POTOSI, Mexico — Gen. Alfredo Lexma reported today federal fliers were clipping the wings of former General Cedillo and his rebels.

Friday, May 27

NEW YORK — A jury of middle-aged married men tonight acquitted 16-year-old Donald Carroll of the slaying of his 18-year-old sweetheart, Charlotte Mathiesen. The verdict was rendered this afternoon.

AKRON, O. — Police and pickets battled for three hours today in a riot which caused injuries to at least 100 persons and gassing of hundreds more. Officials threatened to call National Guardsmen to enforce order at the strike-stricken plant.

Courts Called In

WASHINGTON — It became a definite possibility that the courts would get their hand into the TVA puddle today as Dr. Arthur E. Morgan, ousted TVA chairman, began to think seriously of testing the authority of President Roosevelt to oust him. Morgan was being encouraged to take court action by friends.

JERSEY CITY, N. J. — Rev. Jerry O'Connell of Montana and bitter foe of Mayor Frank Hague made a brief appearance at Pershing Field tonight but was whisked away by police before he could deliver a prepared speech assailing the state democratic leader.

Saturday, May 28

MEXICO CITY — The federal government today threw infantry, cavalry and aviation units into a widespread search for General Cedillo, rebel chief and leading dissenter among the Mexican government.

WASHINGTON — An old line Southern Democrat, Senator Harrison of Mississippi, told the Senate today that President Roosevelt was "all wrong" when he criticized the new tax law. Incidentally Senator Harrison helped write the bill and might therefore be prejudiced in his criticism.

Larger Patrols

AUSTIN — Ninety-five additional state police officers, their six-week training course completed, today were assigned to district patrol stations. The new officers brought the force to nearly 300.

NEW YORK — Federal agents today sent an urgent request to French officials to intercept a second "runaway witness" in the government's investigation of a suspect major spy ring.

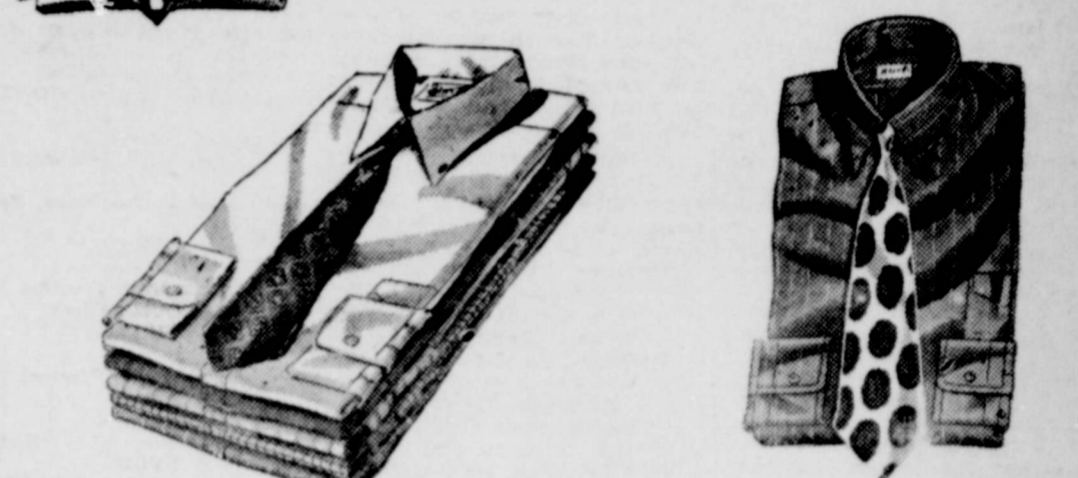

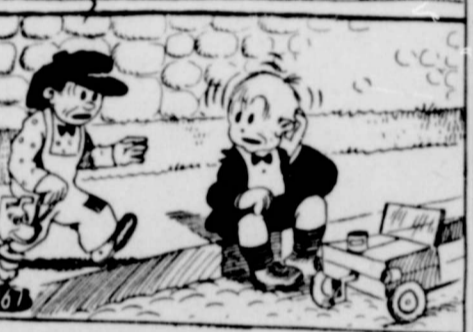

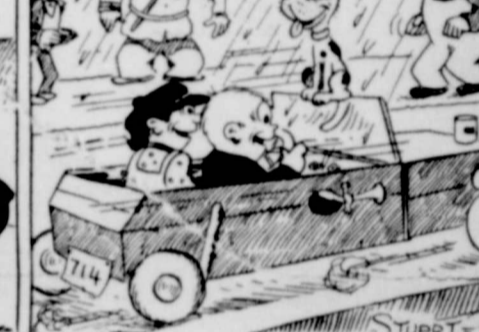
