## Fourth of July Week-End Ceremonies Kindle Flame of Peace at Gettysburg GETTYSBURG, Pa. - On the

eve of Independence Day in 1863, the fields of Gettysburg ran crimson with the blood of Union and Confederate soldiers who had met, neighbor against neighbor, in America's war of the

July 4, 1938, will tell a far more pleasant story. And Gettysburg will have become a symbol of everlasting peace within the country's boundaries.

TO the site of President Lincoln's memorable address comes President Roosevelt, under circumstances more encouraging than that which faced the "great emancipator" 75 years

On July 3, the President will dedicate the Eternal Light peace memorial to be unveiled on Oak Ridge. He will kindle the flame to burn forever on the crest in dedication to inter-state peace and in memory of the blue and gray clad boys who died in the battle of Gettysburg.

The memorial, built at a cost of \$60,000, is raised on a rectangular base with two sets of stairs, leading up to the flamecapped tow r, at each side of the platform. Surrounding the monument is a park lined with trees and shrubbery.

Veterans of the Civil War are returning to Gettysburg for the celebration as guests of the state of Pennsylvania and the nation. They occupy a tent city, reminiscent of their wartime camps. Only 8000 of them are now alive and many will be unable to attend. But those at home will hear portions of the program by

The average age of these veterans is 92 years. But increasing age has brought increasing satisfaction, and the reunion of Confederate and Union forces presents a picture of tolerance born of experience.

Supplementing the dedication is a colorful program. On July 4 the U. S. Army will stage a show of modern warfare on the very meadows where the boys in gray surged to the attack in Pickett's charge against the

Other features will be a parade of all veterans attending the event, a Governor's Day to which chief executives of all states have been invited, and stirring musical programs by various military bands. More than 500,-000 people are expected to attend some phase of the celebration which will last through July 6.



## **Reduced Interest Rate** On Land Bank, Com'r Loans Are Extended

The reduced interest rates on Federal land bank and commissioner loans have been extended by Federal legislation for a period of two years, according to word received today from the Federal Land Bank by C. M. Meredith, Secretary-Treasurer of the Floydada National Farm Loan

On Federal land bank loans through National Farm Loan Associations the temporarily reduced rate of 31/2 per cent per annum will be continued for all interest installments payable prior to July 1

The temporarily reduced rate of sioner loans is also continued until W L Pct. July 1, 1940, Mr. Meredith said.

"The temproary interest reduction .800 does not change the contract inter-.300 the mortgage at the time a loan was Meredith said. "At present 10 2 8 .200 the contract rates on new land bank loans are 4 per cent for loans through unimpaired associations. The contract rate on all Commissioner loans made through the land bank is 5 per cent. Under the law. as now amended, both land bank and Commissioner borrowers will resume interest payments at their respective contract rates on July 1,

from \$752,750 to \$1,753,850.

planation accepted by the United a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Jac States Department of Agriculture is ack for a week or ten days. as follows: Popping in corn is an explosion due to the expansion under pressure of moisture in the starch grains. Until the instant of the explosion the expansion is pre vented by the material in which the starch grains are imbedded. According to the department neither air nor volatile oil, as was formerly supposed, is concerned with the process. The wall of the kernel of popcorn is harder than that of ordinary field corn, a fact which causes the entire kernel to explode when heated, throwing out the white interior. Long before the arrival of white men on this continent the American Indians cultivated a variety of corn similar to our popcorn In the Southwest the natives called this grain "little corn." It is doubtful, however, that they used it for popping purposes, although it is probable that our popcorn was originally developed from the Indian

And, in the evidence of his accomplishments. Joshua presents a proof of the reality of God's call to the heart of man.

It was not by chance that the task of continuing the work of Moses, with all its honor and its responsibility, fell upon Joshua. We have the picture of him as one of the twelve going up to spy the land which the children of Israel were seeking to enter. Ten of these twelve spies returned with discouraging and fear-stricken stories. The land was peopled by great and strong enemies, and there was no possibility of the Israelites being able to conquer it. But two men, Joshua and Caleb, had a different report. They emphasized the richness of the land which awaited the people and they said, "We are well able to possess it."

It was in this clear faith that Joshua accepted his leadership, and it was in the expression of his own spirit that he passed on to the people the admonition that had come to him, to be strong and of good courage.

But Joshua saw the people themselves weakened by their own lack of faith and by the immorality that prevailed among them. The worshipping of false gods on the part of the Israelites was not merely a matter of setting up other images It meant the moral decay of the people and their lapse into evil practices that were associated with the worship of these false gods. Surrounded by pagan peoples whose religion lacked the emphasis upon righteousness and the moral virtues, emerging in the monotheistic faith of Israel, there was a constant tendency for social corruption to lay hold of the Israelites, sapping the ideals and visions that their prophetic leaders ever sought to in-

It is in this situation that Joshua stands forth and makes a demand upon the people for a definite choice in the matter of loyalties. He sees them drifting into evil practices with no vital decision, and he calls upon them to realize that they must decide either for Jehovah and the religion of purer ideals, or for the false gods and the practices as-sociated with their worship. Aroused by this plain challenge,

# **Destroy Barberry** And you End Life **Cycle Wheat Rust**

Story Of Its Beginning In America And Means Of Fighting It Told

(Ed. Note. The following paper on wheat rust was prepared by Miss Beverly White, of Terrell, a student at CIA, which is commended by the secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers Association, as indicating diligent study of the subject.)

Puccinia Gramina or Wheat Rust was first brought to the United States by our forefathers, the first settlers. They brought over from Europe the barberry bush to preserve some likeness of their country in this foreign land, and also to make hedges around their grain fields. Thus 'ideal conditions for completing the life cycle of Puccinia Gramina were insured. Both the wheat plant and the






