

Indians' Adobe May Be Used in Modern Homes

A DOBE, the brown, sun-baked clay early inhabitants of southwestern America, Mexico and Central America used to build their shelters, may be used to fashion the homes of modern Americans throughout the United States.

If adobe becomes a popular building material, it will be because of the efforts of a Stanford University chemist who has discovered a chemical surfacing said to enable adobe to withstand weathering indefinitely, and to make it practically an ageless material.

Previously, adobe was suitable for use only in a warm, dry climate; and even there was subject to erosion and weathering. Scientists have long pondered the problem of preserving great historic and prehistoric ruins. Now, among other adobe landmarks, a mighty block of prehistoric apartment houses near Fort Apache, Ariz.; an ancient mission at Tumacacori; the site of the first federal land office at Florence, Ariz.; and the remains of the stage stations on the old Butterfield Overland route between St. Louis and California, may be coated and preserved with the new chemical surfacing.

Whether 'dobe will ever become widely popular as a building material depends on a number of factors. Americans may not want to build their house of ageless bricks, since their homes often must be razed before they're worn out. It will be a long time before adobe- is available everywhere. And it must be produced cheaply enough so that transportation costs will not prevent it from competing with

Formed by sediments of volcanic origin, found in the arid lands of the west and southwest, adobe clay is simply moistened with water, mixed with straw or even weeds, and dried by the sun into hard

Homes built with adobe bricks are cool in summer, and can be heated economically in winter. But whether 'dobe will become as popular for home-building with modern Americans as fi was with ancient Americans, question that time alone will
