Water Trees Now For Best Results **County Agt. Says**

County Agent D. F. Bredthauer urges the owners of fine trees both shade and fruit trees to do their watering during this month in order to secure the best results next

"Shade and fruit trees will respond readily if given plenty water during September. The chief essential, however, in applying water is to secure even distribution and deep penetration.

With shade trees or orchard trees, the next year's fruit buds are being formed and the current season's crop maturing the same time, primarily July to September.

WHAT MAKES A NEWSPAPERMAN

What does it take to make a newspaper-

Olin E. Hinkle, up at West Texas State Teachers College, seems to doubt whether an 'intensive" course of newspaper study is what is needed. "A broad, general education plus a few courses in journalistic practices and ideals constitute the best education for

Study of economics, history, business law, thoughtlessness of years gone by.

bookkeeping, sociology, agricultural economics, historical geography, modern drama, American prose, modern novel and short story, literary criticism, appreciation of the fine arts, and printing, are the subjects he will specify to qualify for a degree in journalism after the brief fundamental education has been given.

What Hinkle seeks is a minimum waste of time in studying about journalism, and obtaining in its stead an understanding of life and government. Appraising each situation critically and impartially and writing about it clearly, is the proper objective, he thinks, Mr. Hinkle is largely right. A newspaperman like a farmer or banker has to have something on the ball.

FARM MACHINERY TRANSPORTATION

While no reduced freight rates are allowed for wheat or cotton when they are shipped abroad, it is a noticeable fact that the steel makers product gets a "break" when it goes to foreign lands. Thus, we quote from Marvin Jones, congressman from the 18th district, on farm machinery: Domestic Foreign

Mr. Jones says he is not in position to say that there is not some merit in the contention that this is as it should be. However, he points out "If it is wise and just to give a lower freight rate on manufactured products from the industrial areas to the point of shipment when going into export in order to dispose of the surplus, why doesn't the same reasoning apply to farm products going into export, in order to dispose of the surplus of those products?"

One reason why such unusual and unfair discrimination is being practiced against the southwest is that the people of this area are still paying for the civil war and the helplessness of their forebearers following it.

Maybe a happier situation will prevail some of these days. At any rate Mr. Jones and others got a provision in the last farm bill that recognizes these discriminations and will have a tendency to correct them.

Vast opportunities and great problems are immediately apparent, side by side.

For the south today is changing more rapidly than has any section of this country in it's history with the possible exception of California in the days of the gold rush in '49.

During the last three years more than \$500,000,000 in new industrial investment has flowed over the Mason-Dixon line. slowed temporarily in 1937, but the movement is on again with evidence of renewed force.

Of this half billion dollars in new capital, more than \$100,-000,000 was spent to develop paper production which promises to become one of the great in-dustries of the south. Southern pine is used most successfully for brown paper, but the late Charles Herty showed the way to produce white newsprint from

WASHINGTON.- The report of the south has improved the attitude of the southerner himself toward the situation. He feels that an honest attempt is being made to right the wrongs that grew out of the Civil War. He feels that the industrial north has rid itself of much of its antagonism toward the farm-

Part of this changing attitude may come from a new understanding of the Civil War and its problems, an understanding that has come largely through the wide distribution of popular books on the war.

Business men of the nation see immense possibilities of develop-ment in the south if that region should ever reach the consumer level of the rest of the country. The south gives every evidence of having started that climb.

Most important in the picture is the fact that the south is helping itself. The University of North Carolina has developed method of marketing the entire cotton stalk so that it may be used in the rayon industry.
