## Friona Girl In Miss Texas

They may introduce her as "Miss Hurst-Euleless-Bedford," in the Miss Texas Pageant this week, but residents of this area will know Laura Ellis as a native of Friona. In fact, the Friona Chamber of Commerce thinks there should be another hyphenation in her current title.

Laura, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Ellis of Friona performed her talent act in Wednesday's opening night of the pageant, and was said to have done a near perfect job in her ballet.

She competed in the swim suit competition Thursday night and also had interviews that day. Her evening gown competition was to be Friday, with finals on Saturday night.

The finals in the pageant can be seen in this area on KAMR-TV (channel 4), Amarillo, beginning at 10:30 p.m. Saturday, July 11.

Laura was Friona's Maize Queen in

1978-79. The following year, she added the "Miss Tri-County" title (Bailey, Lamb and Parmer counties). That same year she was second runnerup in Shamrock's "Miss Irish Rose" pageant, and was a finalist in the Miss Wheatheart of the Nation pageant.

She has studied ballet since before she started to public school, and following a year at West Texas State University, where she had a drama scholarship, Laura has taken time out from her formal education to study with the Dallas Ballet Company.

Miss Ellis was a dancer in the "Texas" production in Palo Duro Canyon during the summer of 1979, and also had a role in "Stars Over Palo Duro." For the summer of 1980, she won a dancing role in Six Flags Over Texas' Southern Palace, starring as "Miss France" in the anniversary show.

There are a record 70 girls in the 1981 Miss Texas Scholarship Pageant.

Laura is the second Friona girl to make it to the Miss Texas Pageant. Kay Burleson Cash was the other entry. By coincidence, both started out as "Miss Friona Star" in Friona's Maize Queen contest.

## Friona Ford Sets Grand Opening

Friona Ford Sales, Inc., which is having its Grand Opening this week is a relatively new corporation in Friona. However, its forerunners, McKillip Motor Company of Farwell, and Friona Motors, Inc., Friona, have been around a long time.

Friona Motor Company, which was Oscar Baxter's first business in Friona, was a tractor and farm equipment dealership. He purchased the business from Green and Scott in 1952 and continued to operate it on the location presently occupied by Budget Motel and Shirley's Cafe until 1958.

In May of that year Baxter and his partner, Cordie V. Potts, a long time farmer in the Rhea Community, purchased the Ford dealership for Parmer County from Lawrence McKillip, who had been operating it in Farwell as McKillip Motor Company.

Later that summer facilities for operation of the business were constructed at the corner of Grand and Highway 60, where Friona Ford Sales, Inc., is now located. In September of 1958 the dealership was moved from Farwell to Friona.

At that time Kater Crume came to work for Friona Motors, Inc. as parts foreman. Robert L. (Preach) Collier had been working for Friona Motor Company as a mechanic since Baxter first bought the business, so he was the first shop foreman for Friona Motors, a position which he held until 1976.

Several changes of ownership have been made since the dealership has been located in Friona. In 1974 Oscar's son, John, who has been connected with the business ever since, and a son-in-law, Troy Young, purchased the interest owned by Cordie Potts.

Then, in March of 1978, two brothers, V.R. Wilcox of Friona, and Roger Wilcox of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, purchased Oscar's interest in the firm, and the name was changed to Friona Ford Sales, Inc.

About a year later D.L. Harguess moved back to Friona from San Angelo after purchasing John Baxter's interest. Later V.R. Wilcox sold his interest to his brother, Roger, and Harguess. Then Harguess sold his interest to John. Since May of 1980 Roger Wilcox and John Baxter have been co-owners of the firm.

Several months ago a re-modelling project was started. First a new shop was added to the southwest side of the building. Then, a new front was added to make a more spacious show room and to make room for new and enlarged offices.

Wilcox and Baxter are assisted by the following employees: Larry Hodges, shop foreman, who has been with the firm three years; LynEldon Randolph, a two year employee; James Bentley, who has been there about eighteen months; and Robert Ward, a comparatively newcomer with three months on the job, although he had worked for the company before moving to Dimmitt.

Also Curtis Israel, parts manager, who has been with the firm about two and one-half years; and Floyd Polk, who has been employed about eighteen months.

The bookkeeping department is staffed by Jean Low, who has been on the job about five months, and Libby Procter, who also takes care of the U-Haul rental service and is on the sales force, when needed. Mrs. Procter has been with the firm about one and one-half years.

The newest member of the staff is Grady Phillips, who recently moved here from Matador, Texas, and is a salesman.

The entire staff joins the owners in inviting everyone in the area to visit the newly re-decorated and enlarged facilities any time, but especially during the Grand Opening.

## Court Awards Auto Bid

Awarding the bid for a new vehicle for the sheriff's department was the main item of business at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court.

Three bids had been received by the court, two from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds and one from Friona Ford Sales, representing three makes of vehicles. After much discussion, the bid was awarded to Reeve Chevrolet-Olds for a trade difference of \$8,642.

A 1977 Chrysler four-door is the trade-in vehicle.

Two representatives of the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview, C.L. Abernathy and Seth Halbert met with the court to make their annual report of patients served from Parmer County.

Following their report, and a reminder that it was time for the county's annual dues to the center, a motion was passed to pay the dues, in the amount of \$2,430.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court, and explained some of the requirements and deadlines set out by the Commission on Jail Standards, at

the last inspection. After some discussion, it was voted to purchase 21 mattresses for the jail, meeting the fire-proof requirements set out by the commission.

A court order was received to pay a court-appointed counsel. This bill, in the amount of \$160 to attorney Doyle Curtis, was approved.

Soil Conservation work by county equipment was approved for West Friona Grain. The work will be performed when the machinery is not needed on county roads, and billed to the company.

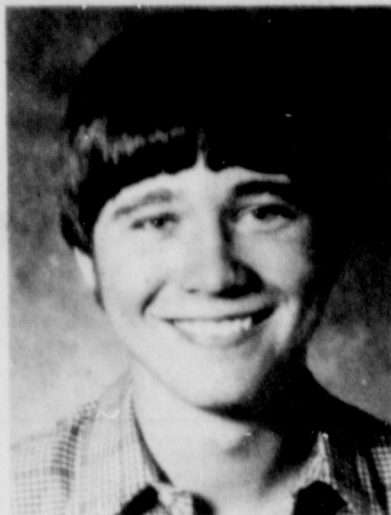

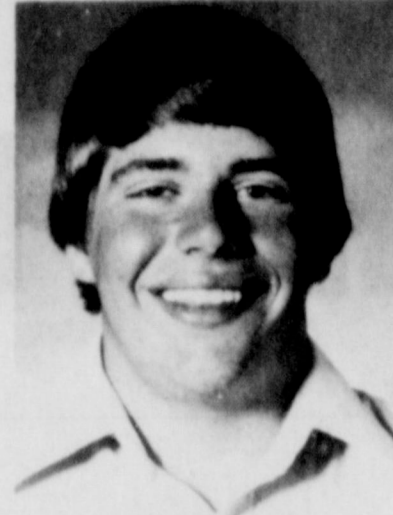
So, the local celebration is achieving what it was designed to do...plus adding a little local plug for patriotism.

Matches will start at 7 p.m. each evening of that week. Some of the women's matches may possibly be played in the morning hours. Times will be set for each match as far as possible.

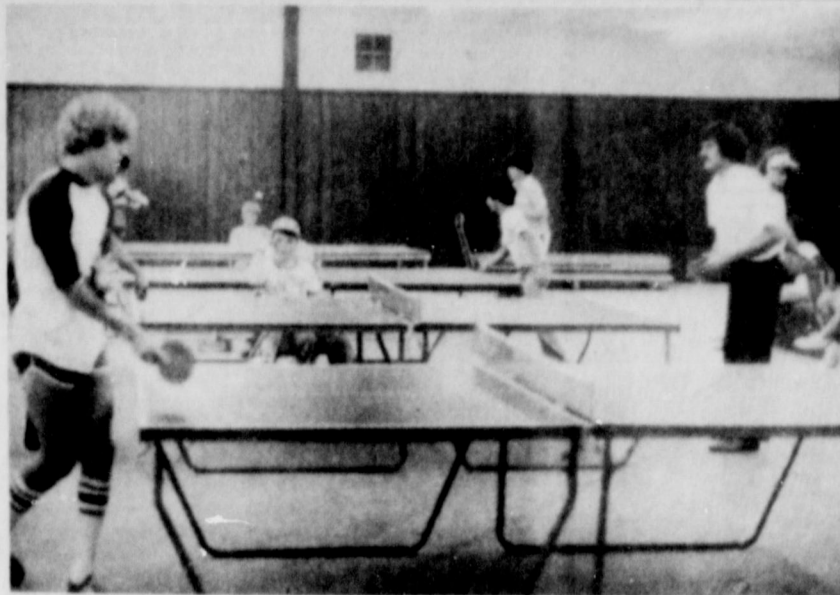
Entry fees will be \$5.00 for each event. Events will include singles, doubles and mixed doubles.

## Four Frionans Attend Upward Bound Program

For 46 high school students and graduates from five Panhandle communities, the first portion of the summer has been an opportunity to experience college life.

The 32 students who have remaining years in high school and the 14 "bridge" students who recently graduated from high school participate in the Upward Bound program at West Texas State University. Summer participants from May 31 to July 3 are from high schools in Amarillo, Happy, Tulia, Hereford and Friona.

Throughout the academic year for three weeks each month, the students come to the WTSU campus on Saturday to receive academic counseling and an introduction to the university.

During the summer program which coincides with the first summer school session at WTSU, the students live in campus residence halls, eat in the campus dining hall and enroll in courses concerning biology, economics, mathematics, reading and writing. Three afternoons each week are spent in career

guidance sessions and two afternoons are free when the students have rapped from the three-story Old Main Building and received marksmanship training with the help of ROTC cadets, learned aerobic dance exercises and heard about weight training.

Weekends have featured dances, visits to Palo Duro Canyon for "Texas" performances, talent shows and a Juneteenth celebration picnic.

Guidelines for the Upward Bound program require that participants come from families with limited income.

"The original idea was set up in the sixties as part of the war on poverty," explained Charlotte McClure, a counselor with the program.

She said the program is designed to "enrich the academic, social and cultural backgrounds" of the participants. The student who has graduated from high school gets an introduction to a college atmosphere and guidance in adjusting to change.

The participants also receive additional counseling, she said, unlike many public schools where the ratio between students and counselor is about 600 to one.

A banquet near the end of the Upward Bound session attracted 200 parents from the 50-mile radius of WTSU which is the target area of the WTSU program.

McClure said the program has become increasingly competitive. Interested students inquire about the program through school counselors and high school transcripts are evaluated for the college-bound student.

Program participants from Friona are Nelson Jackson, Carl Jackson and Gilbert Saiz and David Bermea, a graduate of Friona High School.

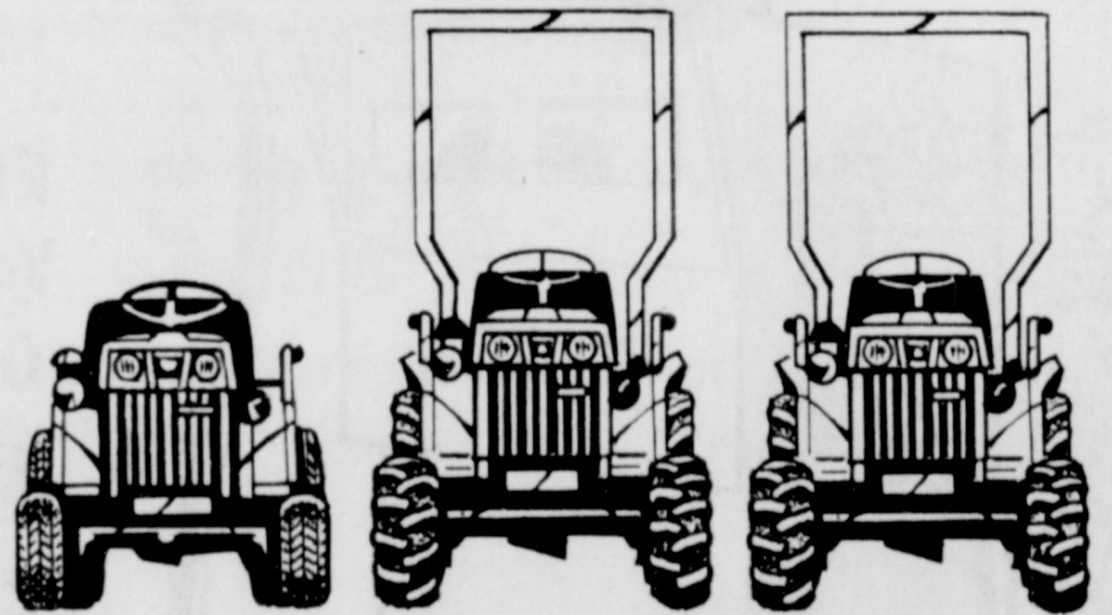

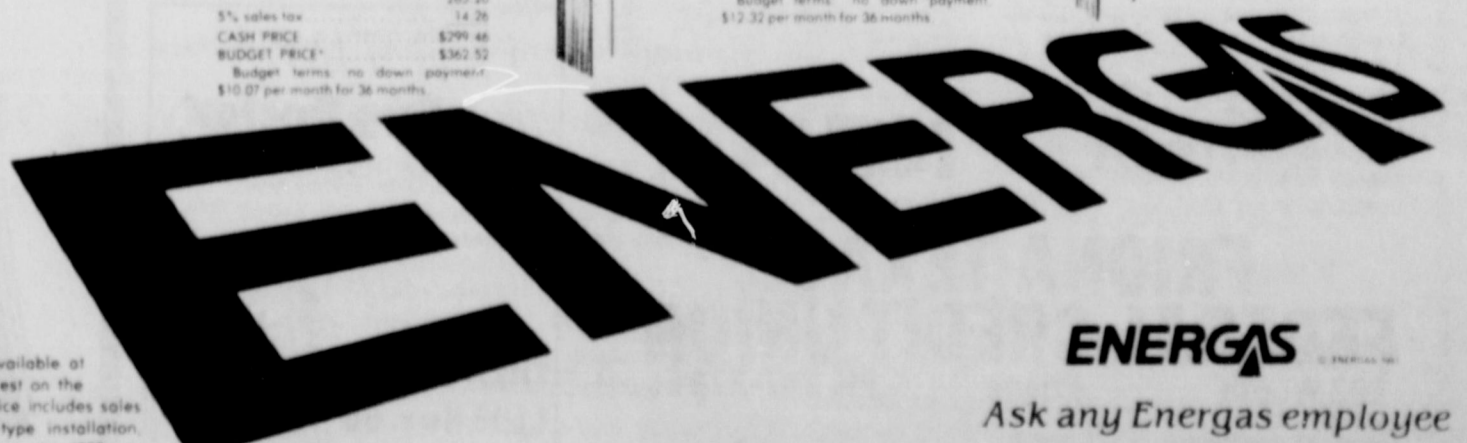
