#### WITH TONGUE IN CHEEK

While one must sympathize with the utilities company in that it has a competitor in prospect,—one whose service is un-needed so far as good service is concerned—the fact must be realized that times move along and the utilities company had as well have a competitor as the newspaper or the grocery.

The good old days when the light company told everybody instead of asking them may be past. A competitor may even humanize the light and power business to a greater extent, who knows.

Any way, we are embarked on the experiment. If good management and good fortune are ours we shall be able to pay our creditors. Otherwise, otherwise.





It was well said by Mr. Moore of the Texas Grange that no law that to control or protect a commodity beyond the boundary of a country has been a success. As proof of this statement Mr. Moore pointed out the fallacy of the attempt of England to control rubber, Brazil to control coffee, and Cuba to control the production of sugar. All of us are familiar with the results of these childike, fool-like attempts which attempted to operate beyond the confines of the respective nations involved in the scheme. England learned her lesson on rubber and is wholly responsible for the hundreds of thousands of acres now set to "tame" rubber trees which are owned by the largest users of crude or raw rubber in the world. Like our "brain-trusters" who contended that other nations could not produce cotton enough to disturb our equilibrium here in the United States, England's "deep thinkers" and theorists said that it was imposible for "visionaries" to grow and uccessfully operate "tame" forests in competition with "na-tive" rubber forests. Perhaps the plan was not feasible, but today England is small protatoes in the rubber industry of the world and she will continue to trail the procession from here out.

What happened to Brazil with her coffee program and with Cuba with her sugar problem should be esson enough to any set of "brain-

The fact is, I don't think very much of "brain-trusters". They remind me more of the absent minded professor than anything else. If every "brain truster" now infesting our government could be ousted and common, every-day, practical men of average ability put in their places we would soon be able to get somewhere. An educated fool is once and for all a plain fool and will never be anything else. There are, however, educated men and women who have good old fashioned horsesense. I am just referring to the common run of "brain trusters" in what I have to say about "plain"

Under the Democratic Allotment plan farmers would be subsidized on basis of domestic consumption of farm commodities and would be free to produce as much as they wished.
