Floyd county had rain, hail and snow this week in a storm period that opened Tuesday afternoon to give portions of the east plains excellent seasons, and this morning at 9 o'clock heavy snow was falling in Floydada.

Floydada was in the area of the heavy hail storm that north of town was just a good rain Tuesday afternoon. One-half of an inch to 2 inches of moisture were reported

Wednesday found the plains covered with billowing clouds that eye upon the sky. These clouds threatened most of the morning finally breaking into a light rain about 11:30 a. m. and later into a heavy downfall that registered .1

And now that the prairie dogs have been so greatly diminished the grazing land is beginning to be taken by the mesquite trees. The cow man's worries have been added to materially

In the battle between prairie dogs and mesquites the prairie dogs had the better of it, biting back the tender mesquite shoots early in the spring and retarding growth. But now, their enemies gone, the mesquites multiply.

PROTECTING WILD LIFE

Protection for wild life has also brought about a change that is interesting. Game preserves in which one could not hunt freely with gun and dog, have become the happy home of an increasing number of coyotes, bobcats, civets, pole cats and what not. "Two fundamental rules should followed in cancer treatment. Pirst, have an annual physical examination by a reputable physician. In this way incipient cancerous onditions can be discovered and by proper treatment the disease can be onquered. The second rule is to

All the funds collected as license fees are spent by the Highway Department for the furtherance of its work and by the Road and Bridge Funds of the several counties for the construction and maintenance of their lateral roads. All of the funds collected as gasoline taxes are spent by the Highway Department, except twenty-five per cent to the Available School fund. The amount of funds allocated to the Available School fund from gasoline taxes collected from trucks amounts to \$4,265,151.02 or \$2.36 for each child attending the public free schools of Texas.

Trucks are taxed more per \$1.00 of cost, or per \$1.00 of earning than any kind of property in existence.

The taxes paid by trucks flow first into the coffers of the State and thence into the highways and schools of Texas. Too often this source of revenue is not appreciated by the beneficiaries because of the method of collection. The burden remains the same upon the truck operator, regard-



SOIL TESTS BEST USED TO CHECK EACH OTHER

A productive soil is the pride of any good farmer. He knows by its productivity crops it produces, but the chemical element or elements needed in deficient soils is a problem for the soil scientist. The nature and extent of deficiencies can be found by using one, two, or all three test methods-field plots tests pot tests in the greenhouse, or laboratory tests. The last two are best used when they supplement results of field test experiments.

Specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture look up-on field tests as the most reliable means of determining fertilizer needs for any soil. The Department and many of the State Experiment Stations have field plot tests under way on a large number of the important soil types with different crops and different combinations of crops.

It is not possible, however, to have controlled field experiments everywhere. Federal scientists and at least three-quarters of the states use laboratory tests to supplement the hospital Wednesday night for field observations of soil types and of crops to detect unusual conditions and as an aid in planning and interpreting field experiments. They find that, although chemical analysies show the total of various soil constituents, they may not show the supply available to plants. Special chemical methods are required to show relative amounts of available plant nutrients.

In addition to the tests for soil acidity, the so-called "rapid" chemical tests are widely used to estimate the phosphate and potash requirements of soils. At present these tests are not well standardized. Those most widely used as the ones that correlate best with field tests. Yet even tests that correlate well with field tests on one group of soils may not correlate well with field tests on a different group of soils.

Soil specialists in the Department and in most of the State Experiment stations use pot tests in the greenhouse largely to determine soil deficiencies of secondary elements such as manganese, boron, and zinc. They are also valuable in the preliminary testing of new fertilizers and new fertilizer mixtures. Through use of pot tests in the greenhouse it is frequently possible to eliminate some field plot tests and concentrate on those most necessary.

In the Yearbook of Agriculture for 1938, "Soils and Men," it is pointed out that of the approximately 6 million farms in the United States reported in the last census, nearly 37 percent were less than 50 acres in area, and almost half of these produced crops with a gross value of less than \$1,000 annually. Their net value was considerably less.

These small areas become farms for several reasons. Often the prospective farm operator can afford only a small place. Promotion and real estate subdivision have lured many people to purchase small

Some small farms, with intensive crops such as poultry, fruit, and truck, produce relatively good in-Farms of this type, however, are few in number and are not suited to many sections of the country The majority of small farms are heavily planted to cash and soil-depleting crops. Injury to the soil is not apparent at first, but when it becomes apparent, the damage is done and retreat is impossible.

Any solution to the problem, the Yearbook continues, must be founded on an understanding of the agricultural possibilities of various areas. Within each area are profitable crop rotations and livestock enterprises based upon the best interrelation of soil, slope, climate, labor power, use of equipment, and managerial ability
