**STORAGE TOO COOL INJURES MANY FRUITS, VEGETABLES**  
 Warm-natured fruits and vegetables from the tropics are more likely to break down under storage that is too cold than products of the more temperate zones. Some of the tropical products, particularly bananas, pineapples, mangoes, and avocados, lose favor and texture when kept in the home refrigerator for several days. If served cold, they should not be chilled until immediately before serving.

Research by Federal Bureau of Plant Industry scientists shows that many products have a "critical storage temperature" below which injury is likely to result although this temperature may be several degrees above freezing. The low temperature damage may show up in many ways—in appearance, flavor and texture; in chemical composition; and in susceptibility to decay from storage. Most of the produce grown in temperate zones will stand temperatures nearer the freezing point than those from the tropics or those whose original home was in the tropics but are now being grown in the temperate zones. Tomatoes, eggplants and cucumbers are examples. Potatoes and pears are good examples of exceptions. Potatoes held below 40 degrees F. for several weeks undergo a chemical change in which the starches turn to sugar rendering them unpalatable. Stored pears must be removed and ripened at temperatures ranging from 60 degrees to 70 degrees. If held too long at around 32 degrees some varieties lose their ability to ripen and "go dead."

**RUBBER TREE DROPS LEAVES AS HURRICANE PROTECTION**  
 Rubber trees will not bend any further in a hurricane wind without breaking than the average tree of any other species. It is the sap from the tree, and not the tree itself, that is processed into rubber. But they do have a way of protecting themselves from sudden tropical storms. Scientists of the United States Department of Agriculture, who have been growing rubber trees in Florida to see if they would withstand the winters there, also wanted to know if the trees would stand up under Florida wind.

They observed that once winds reached hurricane velocity the rubber trees dropped their leaves. This eliminates wind resistance near the top of the tree and pressure on the tree trunk is lessened. Afterwards, new leaves come out and there is no apparent damage to the tree.
