centage basis. A record reduction in fire losses in the State of Texas during the past few years is responsible for the successive slashes in insurance rates, it was stated by the insurance

The remarkable success of fire prevention campaigns in the state and the greatly increased efficiency of fire fighting personel of fire de partments are responsible largely for this last cut in the rates. Nearly 40 per cent has been taken off the cost of fire insurance in the state

Scientists of the United States year were estimated yesterday at have been growing rubber trees in Tax Collector F. L. Moore's office Florida to see if they would withstand the winters there, also wanted to know if the trees would stand up under Florida winds.

They observed that once winds reached hurricane velocity the rubber trees dropped their leaves. This eliminates wind resistance near the top of the tree and pressure on the tree trunk is lessened. Afterwards new leaves come out and there is no apparent damage to the tree.

## **Real Estate License Law Is Explained**

Act Defines Code of Ethics for Dealers and Provides Strong Penalties

Real estate dealers of Texas are generally well pleased with the real estate license law recently signed by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and which will become effective October l, Polk Goen, Floydada real estate dealer, said recently.

The law is designed to eliminate certain sharp practices from the real estate basiness, Goen said, and does not interfere with any honest or legetimate dealer. Local real estate dealers seem unanimous in favor of the new law.

This state is the thirty-third to pass such a law, but the measure does not require examinations in obtaining icenses, as in many of the states. The act does define a code of ethics and business practices which must be adhered to or result in loss of license

The law not only provides for loss of license to an offending dealer but also provides a maximum fine \$500 and a year in jail or

"There is little doubt as to who comes under the purview of the act and who must obtain a license,' said Goen Monday in discussing the new law. Every individual, partner-
