## Pioneers To Observe 50 Anniversary

### Floyd County's Golden Anniversary Celebration Planned for May 28th

Pioneers of Floyd county will ask the people of the whole area to join them on Tuesday, May 28, in the celebration of the county's fiftieth birthday.

Whether there will be one day or two days of the celebration was a matter left undecided until their next meeting on April 15, but it was decided definitely to "put the big pot in the little one."

This crop of pioneers won't celebrate the next 50 years, it was pointed out by George L. Fawver in the meeting, who voiced the sentiment of those present that it would be well to make this coming May 28th of the year 1940—the end of the first fifty years of the county's official history—a day to be long remembered. A barbecue and the trimmings is one of the things on which the pioneers have their hearts set.

Postmaster Joe McCollum, of Lockney, presided at the meeting held in the county court room. Among those present were Tom W. Deen, C. L. Anderson, Tom McLain, George L. Fawver, Homer Steen, B. Gully, M. L. Probasco, Ham B. Smith, A. T. Swepston, Mrs. Hope Hammonds, Roy L. Snodgrass, Mrs. Maud Hollums.

If a two-day affair is arranged the probabilities are that a rodeo will be held. J. Claude Henderson of the Chamber of Commerce and Roy L. Snodgrass are to look into the possibilities of this type of entertainment being secured.

### Parade in Forenoon

To avoid confusion later the general committee set apart three hours for events of the day that have become customs at the re-union.

First, the parade will be held in the forenoon beginning at 10 o'clock.

Second, the speaking and the formal sessions will begin immediately after the noon lunch.

Third, the old-fashioned dances will begin at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Interment was in the Lockney cemetery under direction of Harmon Funeral home of Floydada.

Mrs. Mickey died at her home at Mickey last Friday morning at 3:30 o'clock. She was born in Henderson county, Texas, on March 18, 1867. She was married to C. R. Mickey, who preceded her in death eleven years ago, and came with her husband to this county in 1905. Mr. Mickey was a pioneer merchant.

Mr. and Mrs. Mickey settled at the community which bears their name, living there until 1909, and returned to this county in 1916, having lived here since that time.

Mrs. Mickey is survived by five children, Roy R. Mickey of Lubbock, Floyd and J. E. Mickey of Mickey, Mrs. Iva Bowles of Comanche, and Miss Bonnie Mickey of Mickey, 17 grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Also surviving here are a brother, Jno. B. Richardson, of Cleburne, Texas, and a sister, Mrs. F. W. Willmon, of Duncan, Oklahoma.

Young Democrats of Floyd county, meeting at the district court-room Tuesday night, inaugurated a drive for membership and planned a special meeting for next Monday night, at which time a delegate will be named to go to the state convention of Young Democrats of Texas at Beaumont on April 18-19.

Calvin Hazelwood of Lubbock, who has been president for the past year of the West Texas Young Democrats club, was present for the meeting and made a brief address, stressing his pleasure at the progress made by the newly organized Floyd county chapter and reporting on the regional convention held in Amarillo recently.

Hazelwood was introduced by Walter Travis, president of the Floyd County club.

C. L. Harris, member of the Texas Legislature from Spur and candidate this year for Congress from this district, was introduced by Richard Stovall. Harris, who is president of the Dickens county Young Democrat club, stressed the importance place which the organization can have in the national scene and came out strongly against a third term for the president as leading toward dictatorship.

Harris struck out against the increasing centralization of power in government, both state and national. "When you delegate a right to Austin or to Washington," he told the group, "you lose a privilege as individual citizens."

Hazelwood, in his talk, told of the activities of the West Texas Young Democrats clubs, and pointed out that the regional convention last year had endorsed John N. Garner's candidacy for president of the United States.

A delegate to the state convention will be selected and instructions voted by the club at the meeting Monday night. The meeting will open at 8 o'clock at the county court-room.

Opening the membership drive, Travis appointed Richard Stovall as chairman of a membership committee. The chairman asked that every member of the club work as a member of the committee during the next few days, and stated that he would delegate several to launch an active campaign throughout the county in preparation for Monday night's meeting. Plans were made to hold the meeting of the club at Lockney, the time and date to be settled Monday night.

Plans were also launched to hold meetings both in Floydada and Lockney prior to the July primaries and to bring candidates for office, both local, state and national, here to address the voters of the county. Clement B. McDonald, George Sherrill and Walton Hale were named on a committee to make definite plans for the series of programs and to contact speakers.

Membership in the organization is open to any person, regardless of age, who can qualify as a member of the Democratic party, although officers must be selected from a group under forty years of age. Efforts will be made to have a large attendance at the meeting Monday night, with representatives from all sections of the county.

"This is a county-wide, and not strictly a Floydada organization," President Walter Travis pointed out.

## Soil Board Names Two Supervisors

### Nelson And Brown Nominated By State Board; Three Others To Be Elected

W. H. Nelson and F. L. Brown have been appointed by the State Soil Conservation board as supervisors of the newly created Floyd County Soil Conservation district. County Agent D. F. Bredthauer said Tuesday.

Three other supervisors are to be named by the farmers of the county, Bredthauer said, to complete the set-up for the district. Dates and plans for an election to select the supervisors have not been announced.

The Floyd County Land-Use Planning committee will meet at the district courtroom in Floydada this afternoon (Thursday) at 2 o'clock, and members will start formulating a plan for work under the new Soil Conservation district.

At the meeting, members of the Planning board will select five additional farms to be used in water facilities experiments under a co-operative agreement between the Texas Extension and the Soil Conservation Service.

Five farms were selected for that purpose at a meeting two weeks ago. Farms belonging to H. M. Houston, W. E. Ferguson, Carl W. Smith, R. H. Ratjen, and E. L. Thomas were designated at that time. Ten farms have been allotted.

Committees will select one farm in Floyd county to be entered in the competition for the Master Farmer award made annually by Progressive Farmer magazine.

The dairying sub-committee of the Planning Board will report and begin active preparations for the annual Floyd County Dairy Day show which will be held in Floydada on April 29.

## District Interscholastic League Meet to be Held at Lubbock On April 12-13

With the 1940 Floyd County Interscholastic League meet rapidly becoming history, winners from the county meet are turning their attention to the annual District meet to be held at Lubbock Friday and Saturday, April 12-13.

The district meet will be held on the Texas Tech campus in Lubbock. Registration for all literary and athletic events will be held in the lobby of the administration building of the college from 8 until 10 o'clock Friday morning.

No contestant will be permitted to enter any contest unless he presents a contestant's badge, which may be obtained on the payment of 25 cents entry fee. Only one fee will be charged any contestant.

All badges, athletic numbers and full instructions concerning the time and place of each event will be issued at that time.

Preliminaries in tennis will begin at 9 a. m. Friday. At ten o'clock all contestants in declamation will meet in room 101, chemistry building, for assignments of sections and rooms for preliminary declamation contests.

All contestants in debate with their coaches will meet in room 302 of the administration building for drawings, assignments of sections, and rooms, for preliminary debates. Debate headquarters will be in room 304 of the administration building, and further information may be secured there.

Contestants in the one-act play contest will meet in room 202 of the administration building. The first cast should be on hand at 9:30 a. m. Friday.

At 10:30 Friday morning preliminaries in all declamation contests, high school, ward school and rural school, and preliminaries in boys and girls debates will begin.

At 1:30 Friday afternoon semifinals in all debates will be held in room 302 of the administration building.

Preliminaries in volley ball and golf and all athletic events will begin at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

At three o'clock Friday afternoon extemporaneous speech contestants will assemble in room 207 administration building; three-R contestants in room 210, ready writers in room 214; and Spanish contest entries in rooms 219 and 221.

Finals in declamations, high school and ward school all classes, will begin at 3 o'clock in room 220 of the administration building, and finals in rural school declamations will be held at the same hour in room 208 of the administration building.

Finals in tennis and typewriting contests will begin at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Finals in girls debate will be held in room 302 of the administration building at 9:30 Saturday morning, and in boys debate at the same hour in room 320 of the administration building.

Shorthand contests will be held in room 314 of the administration building at 11 o'clock Saturday morning.

Finals in all track and field events, including the rural pentathlon, will begin at Tech stadium at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

## SIGNING WHEAT PARITY APPLICATIONS UNDERWAY AT RATE OF 200 DAILY

## School Trustees Over County Will Be Named Sat.

County-wide school trustees elections will be held Saturday, polls opening at 8 o'clock Saturday morning throughout the county. Trustees are to be elected in every school district in the county, with members of the county board of trustees to be named in precincts 3 and 4 and a county board-member-at-large on the ticket for all voters.

Three members of the Floydada Independent school district board of trustees are to be named in a local board election Saturday. Polls in Floydada will be located in the county courtroom, Jim Houston, secretary of the board, announced Wednesday.

Terms of Bob Medlen, Mal Jarboe, and Walter Collins are expiring, leaving three places to be filled in the Floydada school district.

In the Lockney independent district, two places on the board will be vacant as the term of S. G. Miller, current president of the board, expires and the place left vacant by the resignation of Robert Smith will be filled.

On the county board of trustees, three places will be filled, terms of E. C. Durham from Precinct 3 and W. E. Edwards in precinct 4, and J. W. Howard, county board-member-at-large, expiring at this time. Judge Howard is currently president of the county board.

All polling places will open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, closing at 7 p. m. All elections in the rural districts will be held at the respective schoolhouses, according to county superintendent Clarence Guffee.

Three members of the board are to be elected at South Plains, where the terms of Warren Daniel, Hilburn Casey and Will Sims are expiring; and three at Dougherty to fill the expiring terms of Jim Morrison, Cecil Payne and F. M. Covington. (See SCHOOL TRUSTEES page 9)

## Sheppard Will Be 1942 Candidate For Senate

Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas will be a candidate to succeed himself in 1942. In a letter addressed to William M. Thornton, staff correspondent of the Dallas News at Austin, the senior senator from Texas said:

"I note your statement in the Dallas News to the effect that it is felt by some that Morris Sheppard might be willing to step down in 1942, after having reached the age of 67 years and having seen 30 years of service in the Senate. In order to dispel this illusion let me say that I shall be a candidate for re-election in 1942. I have an ambition while continuing to serve the people with the best energies I possess to break the all American record for length of service in Congress. Another election will enable me to do this. There are still five men, none living, who have served in Congress consecutively or non-consecutively longer than I have but after another term my record will exceed the record of each of these."

## County Meet Title Goes To Lockney

### Winner In Rural Division Undecided; Junior Tennis Matches Remain

Lockney schools won the Floyd County Interscholastic League meet, held at Lockney last Friday and Saturday, defeating the Floydada schools by a margin of 5 points, 241 to 236 according to the official count announced Tuesday by Supt. J. W. Jones of Lockney, director general of the meet.

Lockney won in the high school division by a wide margin, 164 to 134, leading in both literary and athletic events, while the Floydada ward school entries piled up a

winning margin, 102 to 77, to bring the deficit down to five points for the meet.

South Plains was in third place in the ward school division with 25 points.

Winners in the rural school divisions were undecided this week, pending play-off in junior tennis matches scheduled to be held at Lockney this week-end.

Hundreds of Floyd county students took part in the annual competition. A complete summary of the results of the meet for all classes and divisions will be found in another section of this issue.

The county meet was brought to a dramatic close Saturday afternoon with the running of the annual county interscholastic league track and field events, as first place points in the dual meet offered the necessary margin of victory for either school in the race for the county Interscholastic League championship.

Lockney teams had captured first place in both ward school and junior high school divisions in track and field Saturday morning, winning the ward division by the narrow margin of one point, 31-30 and running away with the high school junior division with 34 points to 22½ for the Floydada team.

The Longhorns again eked out a narrow one-point victory in the Class A senior track and field Saturday afternoon, going ahead 69-68 with a victory in the mile relay, final event on the card. George Fry, leader of Floydada was high point man of the meet, scoring 20 points with first places in the 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, and discus throw, second in the shot put, and third in broad jump. Owens of Lockney was runner-up for individual scoring honors.

Sand Hill captured the rural school senior track and field meet, edging out Providence 20-18; Lakeview captured first place in rural school junior track and field, and Dougherty led the field in the 7 grade rural school track division. (See COUNTY MEET page 9)

Six Floyd County 4-H club and FFA boys plan to show stock at the fifth annual Fat Stock show to be held in Plainview next Monday and Tuesday, April 8-9.

Howard Smith of the Lockney 4-H club will exhibit 2 baby heaves, and Harold Joe Ramsey of the Lockney 4-H club plans to exhibit sheep.

James Cox of the Sand Hill 4-H club and Seth Johnson of McCoy 4-H club will both show barrows.

Joe Rushing and Russell Patterson will represent the Floydada High school FFA with baby beef entries.

The Plainview show is open to all 4-H club and FFA boys, as well as stockmen, in Hale, Castro, Briscoe, Swisher, Motley, Floyd and Lamb counties. Vocational agriculture students and 4-H club boys between the ages of ten and 21 years will exhibit stock in a separate division from farmers and stockmen engaged in commercial livestock feeding.

Judging of hogs will start at 9 o'clock Monday morning and of lambs at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon. Judging of beef cattle will begin at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

C. B. Martin is general superintendent of the show, with Harry Igo as assistant. W. H. Messick is superintendent of open classes, Ralph Robinson superintendent of the sheep division, S. J. Young superintendent of beef cattle division, and Bert Weil superintendent of the hog division.

## EDITORIALS

Bank statements issued as of March 26, on call from the Comptroller of the Currency, reflect a continued general plenitude of money in the plains and panhandle country. For the second time in recent years at this season of the year the report of The First National Bank of Floydada shows deposits in excess of a million dollars. Banks learned a dearly bought lesson in 1932 and 1933 as regards an ample reserve of cash and of quickly convertible investments in loans. They may be unduly wary but at least they can pay off, and that quickly, when and if depositors get panicky.

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, by getting mad at the newspapers and giving them fits for their "unfairness," has made Page One with regularity the past several days. He is going to start the publication of the right kind of a newspaper this week. He feels he is going to show the newspaper men how it is done. And stranger things have happened. Somebody needs to show us, for instance. Putting in this personal reference is somewhat in the form of a compliment for ourselves. The governor is after bigger game.

Away last year The Hesperian predicted the governor would have a "falling out" with the news writers, in just about the way it has occurred. Mr. O'Daniel wants to talk about the things he wants to talk about and he wants the news men to listen. The news-men have been in the habit of asking questions in which they think the public is interested. They want the governor to be the governor and let them be the writers. And a difference of opinion has arisen from the conflicting viewpoints. It is said the governor has not had a general press conference in several moons. We doubt if that is the way to make friends and influence people. Comparisons are odious, but we venture to mention that Mr. Roosevelt's bitterest political enemies in the newspaper field, and they are legion, have regularly accredited representatives at his bi-weekly press conferences looking for a gap that he may let down. After all, the presidency and the governorship belong to the people, enemies of the incumbents as well as the friends.

Delinquent taxes are always with us. The State of Texas and all its taxing subdivisions have the problem. On every tax roll there are chronic delinquent names that show up year after year and, seemingly, nothing can be done about it. Theoretically and lawfully, property can be seized and sold for the tax bill. As a matter of fact, it doesn't work out anywhere, so far as we know. Especially is

this true as regards personal property. The tax collector in good years gets about 85 per cent gross collections from his rolls and in bad year about 65 to 70 per cent. The other 15 or 30 per cent rides a free wagon. Sound and fury of the taxpayer who has to pay to keep his affairs solvent doesn't get him anywhere, except to an occasional increase in his tax bill to take up the slack if all the delinquent tax bills in Texas were collected there wouldn't be any deficits in any of the state's funds and there would be, in addition ample money for the immediate demands of the social security program. Furthermore, the school districts would have the money to carry on their schools on cash basis and the cities and counties would have funds to meet their interest and maturing principal as it comes due. A few exceptions but not more than enough to prove the rule.

Floyd county's fiftieth anniversary will be observed in fitting manner by the pioneers on May 28th. Since it is to be a birthday party they are going to ask everybody to join in and help celebrate. Plans made this week by them include a barbecue on the date. And days of celebration instead of one if the idea meets with approval. First indications point to the probability they will make one big day of it instead of two.

With the court house lawn and grounds undergoing a general re-doing the old settlers are going to ask the authorities to close one or more sides of the square and let them have their meeting out in the streets with improvised shades. Old-timers have a way of wanting to be "in the middle of things" and they don't want to meet in a picnic ground out somewhere on the edge. And they want to make their plans without regard to whether it rains or doesn't rain. They have the right spirit. Youngsters of the new day and time could well follow the patterns made by the pioneers, instead of whining about the opportunities all being gone. The kind of opportunities they have in mind, we fear, are opportunities to have a good-paying, secure soft job that won't call for too many hours away from "developing their personalities."

The idea that the census takers have a good, soft job is all wrong. They are going to have to work hard and fast to make a hard job pay them fair to good wages. In ten years times have changed in one way in particular—the "folks" are not at home any more. There'll be enough "call backs" to take up all the profit, and give many a census taker a headache.

**Amos Pleads For Justice**

Lesson Text: Amos 5:1, 10-15, 21-24.

Amos 5:1 Hear ye this word which I take up against you, even a lamentation, O house of Israel. 10 They hate him that rebuketh in the gate, and they abhor him that speaketh uprightly.

**Lesson Thoughts**  
The Prophet Amos. In our lesson today we study the prophet Amos, one of the most interesting men who ever lived. He was one of the twelve minor prophets, so called not because they are of less importance than the five major prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentation, Ezekiel, Daniel), but because their written works are much shorter.

**The Home and Occupation of Amos.** He was a native of Tekoa, a town in Judah about six miles south of Bethlehem. He was a shepherd, like Moses; also a farmer, like Elisha. Some of the apostles were fishermen, Paul was a tent-maker, and our Lord was a carpenter. "The Bible is the laborer's Book, teaching the value of hard work, and having no sympathy with luxurious idleness" (Amos R. Wells).

Amos was also a dresser of sycamore trees, a tree that bore small figs with a sweet, watery taste, eaten only by the poor. The fruit was urged to ripen by pinching or bruising, and that was the job of Amos.

**Amos' Call to the Prophetic Office.** While he was a native of Judah, God called him to prophesy to Is-

rael. It was during the reigns of Uzziah in Judah and Jeroboam II in Israel that he was called to the prophetic office.

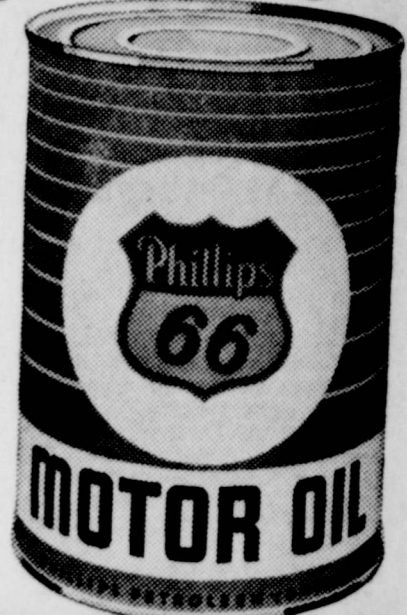

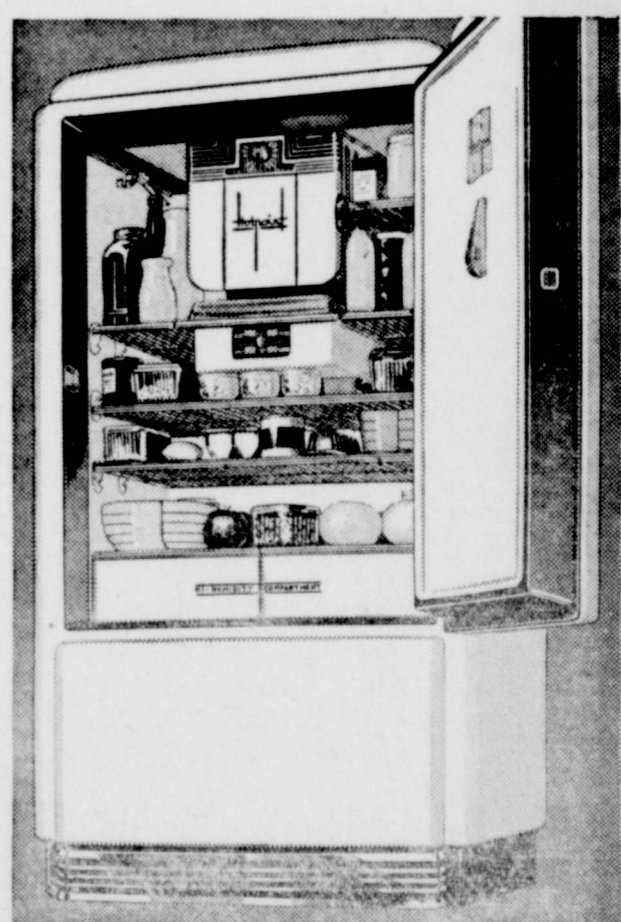

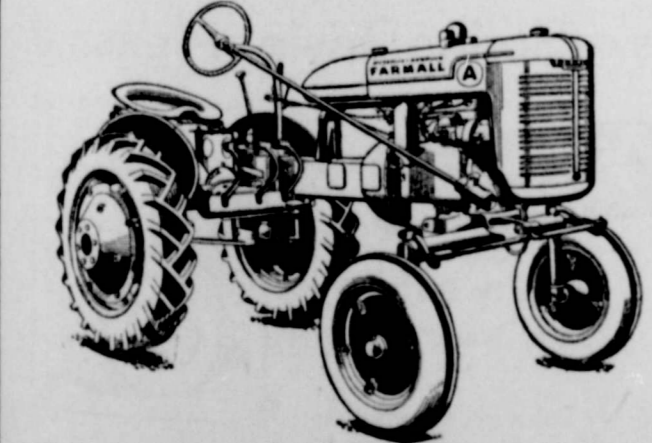

Experience has shown that motorists are much more careful about installing their winter lubricants and anti-freeze in the fall than they are about taking the reverse step when spring rolls around. "This is probably because they know that if the matter is neglected they are likely to awake some morning and find their engine frozen, or their transmission—case lubricant so thick that they can not shift gears."

There is no such worry to remind them to remove the winter lubricant and drain out the anti-freeze at warm weather's approach. But there is good reason why both of these details should be taken care of.

In the case of the lubricant, the reason is that lubricants are effective only under the conditions for which were designed. Winter demands a thin-bodied lubricant which will not solidify at low temperatures, but retain its lubricating quality no matter how cold it becomes. Cars operate at much higher temperatures in summer than in winter—temperatures at which the winter lubricant, already thin, would liquefy still further and lose much of its effectiveness. And even though the damage resulting from this thinning might not make itself apparent at once, it would be no less real and no less costly to repair.

In the case of anti-freeze, the situation is somewhat similar. Regardless of the type used, it should be drained in the spring. The varietal subject to evaporation vaporize very quickly in warm weather, and even a day's driving may reduce the cooling solution level to the point where the radiator steams. The non-evaporating type, on the other hand, sometimes develops acidity when left in the car all summer and acid, of course, tends to corrode the cooling system.

Many motorists make an annual practice of having their radiators flushed out at the approach of summer, and the old solution replaced with fresh water. This is one of the best ways to insure efficient cooling regardless of summer heat.

The battery should be checked at the start of spring, and at frequent intervals thereafter, for the level of the solution drops much more rapidly in warm weather than in cold. Battery terminals should be cleaned if they are corroded and cables and wiring checked. A little inexpensive attention to distributor points, spark plugs and ignition coil will be a good investment, and owners of cars not equipped with heavy-duty generators should have the charging rate set somewhat lower than it was through the winter months.

The fact that speeds will average substantially higher in summer than in winter suggests the wisdom of having tires gone over carefully, with a view to repair or replacement before the period of service wear begins. 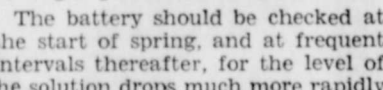

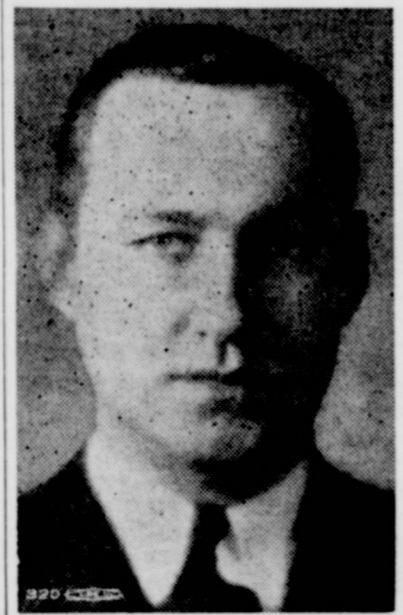

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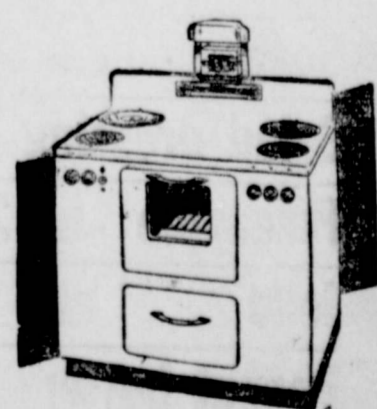

**Water Facilities Survey Start As New Crews Added**

Eight men to work with engineering crews were added to the staff of the Water Facilities area headquarters office here this week, Edgar H. Kemp, conservator, announced Wednesday, and a rush of applications for projects have been received.

Conrad Henderson, James Asher, Ralph Taylor, Marvin Siles, Wm. J. Burk, Forrest Fry and Gerald B. Phipps were employed this week and assigned to four engineering crews operating in Floyd county.

Approximately 40 applications for water facilities installations have been received in this county alone, and are being surveyed now, Kemp said.

Three engineers, Chalmers Terry, John W. Goodell, and Carmon Rhodes are working on the projects.

Also recently assigned to work in this county temporarily in facilitating the Water Facilities program as well as the co-operative program of the FSA and extension service, under which ten Floyd county farms will be used as demonstration units, are Don D. King, assistant range examiner, and W. S. Patrick, assistant conservationist.

In the Salt Fork watershed and Peace river watershed areas also included under supervision of the local office, more than 60 applications have been received and are now being worked on.

Any person in the watershed area interested in water facilities installations and conservation program may file applications now, either with the Water Facilities office or with the FSA office here, Kemp said Wednesday.
