Corn farmers have been waiting to get the last of their crop harvested. One estimate this week indicated that 80 per cent of the corn has been harvested, (another said 70), but those with the remaining 20 to 30 per cent of their crop in the field are still having to play a waiting game
The area received .75 inch of rain in a booming thunderstorm late last Saturday night. Then after having a reprieve from the moisture from Sunday through Wednesday, saw a repeat performance of the late-night boomers in the early hours of Thursday.
