EDITORIALS

War and cotton do not mix unless the warmakers can be reached with success by water to give cheap transportation. It now appears that the cotton growers' two principal customers-England and Japan-are to have their ships too busy doing other things to haul a great deal of cotton for awhile. For, perhaps as long as the war lasts and for a time thereafter until a certain proportion of recovery has been accomplished. Not such a lively outlook for a man with cotton to sell.

Seventy-five thousand acres of feed in Floyd county that will be fed to live stock this winter if it rains, is now waiting for the rain to fall to make good feed and lots of it. Steady predicters of rain we expect the feed stuffs to do good where the moisture is falling during the showery week.

Live stock have tided Texans through many a serious economic spell and perhaps the industry is destined to do the job again. The oil business, taking it on the chin now with prorations shut downs, may not be the big pay off for awhile. Used to fighting hardships with the industry and interference from without, including all kinds of regulation and heavy digs for taxes, the oil business may not fare so well when markets begin to go glimmering. People have to eat and they may pay more readily for cow and hog flesh, milk and butter, than for some of the other things they can more readily do without.

In many Texas counties the run-off primary ballot will be an extremely light one and the vote will be correspondingly light. In Floyd county, with the possible exception of Precinct 4, there is expected to be plenty of interest in the commissioners race to bring out a reasonably heavy vote. Other than that the legislative race between Judge Mathews and Judge Deen may become warm enough to bring out some interest. There are only two state races. These are made up of the contest between Pierce Brooks, Dallas, and Olin Culberson of Jackson county, for the office of railroad commissioner, and Judge Lattimore and Alexander for the chief justiceship of the Texas Supreme court. Nobody in this generation has "warmed up" very considerably over a race for membership in the higher courts of the land, which leaves the railroad commission aspirants the job of drumming up a vote, so far as state offices are

Price changes in newspaper supply lines whether or not the public is going to absorb the additional costs either willingly or unwillingly. Perhaps, as in other wars, as people become accustomed to higher prices they will be taken for granted. Meanwhile the man who has something to sell which the public decides is too high has a man's size job. It may turn out to be the printer or it may turn out to be some man in some other line. Peculiarly enough the price list is not all headed in the same direction. Some things are going up, while others are headed down.


