### EDITORIALS

HOW TO PAY THE BILL

Now that the second primary has come and gone the state will settle back down to the old fight about who is going to pay the bill. Meaning who is going to shoulder the additional tax load which nearly everybody has agreed must come. The Hesperian along with a few other fogies has contended that the state could go a long way toward meeting present outstanding obligations by the simple process of pruning the budget. Be that as it may, all the legislators and the governor have agreed that we must have more taxes. But practically everybody has a huge load of taxes already and more coming from the federal government come January next.

So there is not going to be any enthusiasm for the increased tax load except from those who instead of paying are expecting to receive. And the bear fight will wax hot and hotter on into the spring. Everybody who doesn't want to be taxed more is going to be a "special interest" and they are going to get talked about in strong language.

Death by violence in his own home of Leon Trotsky near Mexico City last week is a fitting end for him. That the killer wormed himself into the confidence of the Trotsky household and killed him with an axe makes the picture all the more appropriate. Trotsky himself was an arch killer. He had had thousands murdered by his secret operatives after he left New York and went to Russia to help Mr. Lenin overthrow the czaristic regime. He would have done the same in the United States had he ever been able to work up the revolution he so fervently favored. Protected by the Stars and Stripes he spewed hate and murder through the rabid press for years here. Incidentally his name was not Trotsky and the name of the OGPU operative who hit him in the head with an axe was not named Jackson. And Joe Stalin who had him put to death is not actually Stalin, but is a brigand from the Ukraine with a name of several syllables. Incidentally Stalin is a czar in fact though not in name. Don't feel outraged over Trotsky's death. Feel outraged

Not that we are bragging on government in Texas so much. We think that millions and millions of dollars are spent in Texas that could be saved. But there are few czars and big shots who carry whole cities and towns and areas in their vest pockets and fatten on politics in that respect. And just to take the laws by and large-most of the basic laws - Texas has the eastern and northern states whipped by a mile. It is your inferority complex that makes laws and other things away off somewhere better than what you have in Texas. Some of the dumbest people are those who visit your state and talk bemeaningly of your laws and social cus-







### **Don't Confuse New Rules For Hunting Warns Commission**

Dove And Duck Seasons, Hours, Changed For Current Season

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 26-While the changes in migaratory bird hunting regulations were few, the execu-tive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission is warning sportsmen to become famihar with the new regulations and not to get conflused.

The greatest confusion is likely to come from the shooting hours on ucks and doves. Under the new federal regulations, with which Texas laws conform, duck hunting may now start at sunrise and must end at 4 p. m. Dove hunters can start shooting at sunrise, but must quit


