## EDITORIALS

On account of the scarcity of Democratic newspapers in the country the Democratic National committee is having trouble getting their side of the present presidential campaign before the people in a favorable light. There are enormous areas in the United States which now receive little more than opposition news and news interpretations. The latest estimate is that 92 per cent of the newspapers in the United States are opposed to the administration and are looking for arguments against the candidates of Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Wallace.

Go on to school, urges officials to young men who are wondering whether it would not be better to go to work in a shipyard or enlist in the army or navy as a patriotic duty rather than go ahead to high school or college. A decision to do otherwise would be unfortunate, these officials think. "Young people should be advised that it is their patriotic duty to continue the normal course of their education, unless and until they are called, so that they will be prepared for greater usefulnes to their country," is the way the suggestion is worded. The universal service act will serve to judge whether or not one is most needed at one place or another.

Encouraging results are being obtained in Texas with the program of wild game conservation, says the monthly bulletin of the State Game, Fish and Oyster commission. Fortunately that branch of the state government has been able to prove its case to the governor, that it is not a political agency and is not a rich man's club. Aside from the fact the commission has promulgated a new theory in wild game preservation it has few vulnerable points of attack. Heretofore Texans have felt themselves entitled to hunt anywhere any time for anything. This policy has been ruinous, so far as game preservation is concerned. Some difficulty has been encountered getting people to see otherwise. Large landowners, however, have proved very reasonable in issuing permits to hunt on their lands, with the result that the hunters are coming around to the new point of view very graciously.

One of the most bold lies that has come out of Germany was caught by short wave on the boat American Legion that docked last week with over 800 refugees from continental Europe including several Germans. 

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### **Food Regulations Getting Stricter On Cream Buyers**

Creameries, Cream Buying Stations Warn Customers Of Possible Rejections

Ever more strict regulations under the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetact, which went into full force and effect on July 1, are becoming more and more strict, as creameries and cream buying stations are finding.

With many shipments of butter dumped after it had gone into interstate commerce by inspectors of the federal department, buyers of butterfat are warning their customers to expect more and more stringent inspections and tests. Absolute cleanliness and purity are the goals for which the inspectors are working. However, the regulations have been adopted slowly and with due regard to customs that have grown up in the butterfat handling industry, so as to give producers and manufacturers time to adjust their modes of operation to the new

through its division of bedding is intensifying its activities to secure proper sterilization of second-hand mattresses before resale and to supervise closely the manufacture and retailing of bedding products so as to minimize the potential infection of mattresses with the Mexican bed bug and other disease carriers.

Cooperation of the public is urged in buying new or used bedding products by demanding that each product purchased carry the regulation stamps and labels certifying the product as being approved by the Bedding Division of the State Health department. Compliance in purchasing only approved bedding products will insure that the bedding obtained will be as free as possib from the carriers of disease which may be harbored in mattresses
