HERE IS A BIT OF NEWS that probably will not be received with open arms by the Kodak Corporation. According to a national magazine, the Sony Corporation has announced the development of the first filmless camera.

Yep, you read it right the first time. We said **FILMLESS**.

If a camera doesn't use film, then pray tell, what does it use? Especially if you are a stockholder in Kodak, and even if you're not, you deserve an explanation. We'll try to give you one.

Sony officials say that their new camera will electronically record images on magnetic discs for viewing through a television set.

Users of the camera will insert a cassette into the back of the camera, aim at the subject and push a button. Light passes through the shutter to a special semi-conductor chip that converts it into thousands of electric impulses which are recorded on a small magnetized disc inside the cassette.

The cassette can then be removed from the camera and popped into a special adapter which is hooked into a television set. The adapter is programmed to reconvert the recorded impulses on the disc into pictures which are shown on the TV screen.

The company also plans to develop a printer, which will produce hard-copy photographs upon command from the adapter.

People owning video recorders could use the system to record several pictures into an "album tape." And, the story says, it may even be possible to transmit the pictures over great distances by hooking the adapter on your telephone.

Sound incredible? Well, what if you had told almost anyone 25 years ago that the United States would, by this year, send a robot to the planet Saturn, a journey in itself which would require four years, and that upon command, messages sent out over a billion miles would result in pictures being taken by the robot, and the photos, crystal clear, would be transmitted back to earth where they would be recorded?

That hypothesis would have sounded pretty "far out" and futuristic in the 1950s, yet it was accomplished this past month, and most of the residents of our country took a "ho-hum" attitude about the whole thing. It didn't even challenge their imagination.

So, the idea of having filmless cameras within five or ten years really doesn't sound too absurd. However, the system, if popularized, could revolutionize the picture-taking industry. But the revolution may only occur on a professional (newspaper-TV) level, as the projected cost of the camera is around \$900—about three times what a good 35mm camera costs today. And—Sony hasn't indicated what the magnetic disc cassettes will cost. It may be that you could go through scores of rolls of film for what one cassette will cost.

So, we're not scrapping our 35mm cameras yet, nor are we throwing away our bulk film loader we use for black and white pictures. Showing your pictures on a television screen may be a fad someday, but we hope that it will still be in fashion to want to clip your photograph from a newspaper page and send it to Grandma.

To Tackle '82 Budget

The City of Friona will approve its budget for 1981-82 at its regular meeting Tuesday, September 8. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. at the City Council meeting room.

The projected budget by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland is \$845,809. This is an increase of approximately \$165,000, and is due principally to take care of the bonded indebtedness involving adding to the city's water supply.

In addition, salaries of city employees will be increased approximately ten per cent, although city patrolmen will receive additional consideration to bring their pay in line with those of neighboring communities.

The ad valorem tax rate has been set at \$1.00 per \$100 valuation.

The public is invited to attend the meeting, to hear all aspects of the proposed budget, and make comments, if they wish.

Special Event Slated For Library Drive

Plans are underway by interested volunteers to continue with fund raising activities in the hope of securing enough money to purchase a more adequate location for Friona's Public Library. "We have simply outgrown our present facility," Jane Houlette a spokesman for the library executive board, was quoted as saying.

"We are extremely proud of our growth but we must acquire additional space if we are to continue to grow. Friona has been blessed with splendid library facilities and thanks to our many friends and patrons we have grown to the extent that our

present location is no longer adequate."

At the present time the library is housing 12,532 volumes and some 13,100 items are checked out each year. Last year more than 5,000 readers used the library's reading materials, and more than 2200 view the available films. "Our Story Hour alone brings in 336 children a year," says Mrs. Houlette. "We are growing and growing and we must not let these people down. What better gift can we give to an inquiring mind than the availability of a good book?"

Among fund-raising activities being planned is a ceiling fan raffle during Maize Days. The reversible, 38 inch Parlor Fan is being obtained through the generosity of Wilhelm T.V. and retails for \$264. It includes a five-year guarantee.

Tickets are being sold for \$1.00 each and may be purchased at the library or from Friends of the Library or board members. Tickets will also be available in the city park on Saturday during Maize Days.

Anyone wishing to make a donation to the building fund may do so by calling Kitty Gallman at 247-2549 or the library at 247-3200. All donations are tax exempt and plans are being made to erect a plaque at the new site listing all organizations, businesses and individuals contributing \$500 or more.

"We feel that the community is behind us in this endeavor," states Mrs. Houlette. "This is evidenced by the \$20,000 plus already donated to our fund." The funds were gathered this summer in an attempt to purchase the Friona Consumers building. The Junior High School girls alone raised more than \$500 for the fund through proceeds from bake sales. "These young people know the value of a healthy library," Mrs. Houlette adds.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."
