HERE IS A BIT OF NEWS that probably will not be received with open arms by the Kodak Corporation. According to a national magazine, the Sony Corporation has announced the development of the first filmless camera.

Yep, you read it right the first time. We said FILMLESS.

If a camera doesn't use film, then pray tell, what does it use? Especially if you are a stockholder in Kodak, and even if you're not, you deserve an explanation. We'll try to give you

Sony officials say that their new camera will electronically record images on magnetic discs for viewing through a television set.

Users of the camera will insert a cassette into the back of the camera, aim at the subject and push a button. Light passes through the shutter to a special semi-conductor chip that converts it into thousands of electric impulses which are recorded on a small magnetized disc inside the cassette.

The cassette can then be removed from the camera and popped into a special adapter which is hooked into a television set. The adapter is programmed to reconvert the recorded impulses on the disc into pictures which are shown on the TV

The company also plans to develop a printer, which will produce hardcopy photographs upon command from the adapter.

People owning video recorders could use the sytem to record several pictures into an "album tape." And, the story says, it may even be possible to transmit the pictures over great distances by hooking the adapter on your telephone.

Sound incredible? Well, what if you had told almost anyone 25 years ago that the United States would, by this year, send a robot to the planet Saturn, a journey in itself which would require four years, and that upon command, messages sent out over a billion miles would result in pictures being taken by the robot, and the photos, crystal clear, would be transmitted back to earth where they would be recorded?

That hypothesis would have sounded pretty "far out" and futuristic in the 1950s, yet it was accomplished this past month, and most of the residents of our country took a "ho-hum" attitude about the whole thing. It didn't even challenge their imagination.

So, the idea of having filmless cameras within five or ten years really doesn't sound too absurd. However, the system, if popularized, could revolutionize the picture-taking industry. But the revolution may only occur on a professional (newspaper-TV) level, as the projected cost of the camera is around \$900--about three times what a good 35mm camera costs today. And--Sony hasn't indicated what the magnetic disc cassettes will cost. It may be that you could go through scores of rolls of film for what one cassette will cost.

So, we're not scrapping our 35mm cameras yet, nor are we throwing away our bulk film loader we use for black and white pictures. Showing your pictures on a television screen may be a fad someday, but we hope that it will still be in fashion to want to clip your photograph from a newspaper page and send it to

To Tackle '82 Budget

The City of Friona will approve its budget for 1981-82 at its regular meeting Tuesday, September 8. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. at the City Council meeting room.

The projected budget by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland is \$845,809. This is an increase of approximately \$165,000, and is due principally to take care of the bonded indebtedness involving adding to the city's water supply.

In addition, salaries of city employees will be increased approximately ten per cent, although city patrolmen will receive additional consideration to bring their pay in line with those of neighboring communities.

The ad valorem tax rate has been set at \$1.00 per \$100 valuation.

The public is invited to attend the meeting, to hear all aspects of the proposed budget, and make comments, if they wish.

Last year more than 5,000 readers used the library's reading materials, and more than 2200 view the available films. "Our Story Hour alone brings in 336 children a year," says Mrs. Houlette. "We are growing and growing and we must not let these people down. What better gift can we give to an inquiring mind than the availability of a good book?"

All donations are tax exempt and plans are being made to erect a plaque at the new site listing all organizations, and individuals businesses contributing \$500 or more.

'We feel that the community is behind us in this endeavor," states Mrs. Houlette. "This is evidenced by the \$20,000 plus already donated to our fund." The funds were gathered this summer in an attempt to purchase the Friona Consumers building. The Junior High School girls alone raised more than \$500 for the fund through proceeds from bake sales. "These young people know the value of a healthy library," Mrs. Houlette adds.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitution al amendment that would allow the legislature to and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its de-The amendvelopment. ment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these

bonds or notes The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land the General Land Office under certain conditions Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the

taxes for at least 50 years. This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral

lease on the effective date of the amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitu amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, includng projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these pur-

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on autho rized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; au thorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guar antee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing

a program to retire state bonds."

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitution al amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987 and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,-000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.






