We smiled at the old Mexican woman who had folks of young blood to put the eggs under the setting hens.

We saw an hombre sitting on a donkey, followed by his faithful wife and children on foot carrying heavy loads of pottery and carved pieces to the fairs. We saw him kick the donkey, light his cagarette, and hurry up the family trailing Indian fashion behind. We tasted the tortillas spread with hot tomato sauce, rolled up with one end turned up so that the sauce would not spill

We looked at the huge concrete stove covering one whole side of the kitchen, with its five furnaces topped with grills where the pottery bowls could bubble and boil the beans and other things. We even took a sip of the pulque made of the fermented juice of the maguay olant, Saw old Mexican women take thorn off this same plant, punch a hole in it, thread it with a long fiber pulled from the maguay plant and sew on cotton cloth spun and woven on primitive looms.

Strange things to us, our friends old us, as we sat in the ranch near Crosbyton, where we could look on the distant canyon hills. A race of people poorer that we can know leeping where night finds them on a roll of matting carried on their shoulders, eating beans, corn and rice for their daily fare. Mrs. Glass has clay pottery, lovely serafes, maguay plants and octillo which grew so high and so thick that it is grown around enclosed places for a fence.
