Roosevelt 'Busts' Third Term Tradition

Willkie Does Little Better Than Alf Landon In '36

Floyd County Goes To Democrats With Wide Majority


President Franklin D. Roosevelt busted" the third term tradition has hung over these United states for so many years into bits and buried the hopes of the Repuban party candidate, Wendell Willkie beneath a landslide of votes. It became evident early Tuesday night that the Republican hopeful, Willkie, was doomed to a lop-sided defeat when the "unpredictable' states in the East and Midwest beto go strongly democratic When New York, Pennsylvania, and Ohio went to the democratic ranks along with the still Solid South, it was evident that victory for the Republicans would be almost im-

number of states alternated from side to side on the issue as votes came in and were counted but some of the crucial states soon indicated that they were in the ranks of the democratic candidate.

Maine and Vermont stayed Republican as expected and added to their ranks the states of Colorado. Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Iowa and Wisconsin Alf Landon found in 1936 that Maine and Vermont would stand by the Republican party no matter what issue might be brought up and this held true in 1940, although for a time it looked as if Maine might swing over to the Democratic ranks by a small majority.

Late yesterday Roosevelt was still piling up a majority of popularity votes but was holding steady with 468 electorial votes to Willkie's 63. Final tabulations probably will not be made for several days as some late boxe, drift in in some of the unhandier places of the nation.

Classification To Be Determined From Answers

Temporary Quotas For Texas Through Next June Announced

Two hundred prospective draftees were mailed questionnaires Monday night by the Floyd county draft board, it was announced Tuesday. These blanks must be filled out and returned to the board not later than Monday, November 11.

The questionnaire is an eight page four sheet, affair that makes an income tax report look like a high school report card. The answers to the various questions in the questi-

onnaires will be used by the board to determine each registrants classification. If however, the answers in the questionnaire are not deemed in ahead of W. N. Corry, sufficient to determine or set a class write-in candidate for that of- ification, the board may search further or interview persons who are acquainted with the individual.

In turn, the registrant may clip McDonald's Republican stand any letters, or other information to the blanks that he believes will help the board determine his correct classification. These letters become a part of the questionnaire and must be sworn to when the blanks are returned to the board.

Four Classifications

Class I-Includes men who are available for induction into the armed forces of the United States. Class II-Includes those whose induction is deferred because of the importance to the nation of the service they are rendering in their civilian activities

Class III-Includes those whose induction is deferred because they have persons dependent upon them for support.

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EDITORIALS

How thankful we well may be for the health we have enjoyed in Floyd county the past decade or more is revealed by a reference to files of The Hesperian in December 1918, January, 1919. In that year there were no Christmas trees or Christmas exercises and programs, no public gatherings on Christmas day or Christmas eve. The officials proclaimed it that way, but those who were able to be up going were too busy waiting on the sick and burying those who had died to pay a great deal of attention to official proclamations. On Christmas day of 1918 there were two burials in Floydada cemetery and it was extremely difficult to find anybody well enough or not too busy waiting on the sick to dig a grave. Half a dozen or more would rush out to lay one away with what decency circumstances would permit, then rush back to their homes to care for those others who had to have attention. It was a sickening time for those who stayed well, and none of this is an exaggeration, old-timers declare.

Now that the registration has been completed and the young men set in the order they will take for military training, the next thing is to see how many will go and what will be their reaction to a year of military service. Very few will go immediately from a county the size of Floyd, it apears and to have four million men in service might not call for more than half a hundred from an average West Texas county. By next spring all the quotas will have been filled, it is predicted. Meanwhile, a man who feels he is likely to be eligible can wait with what patience he can command to see if he is chosen.
