### Speaker Talent Is Expected To Give Entertainment

Willie Landrum Post of Lockney Will Get Invitation

McDermott Post American Legion, Floydada, will be hosts Monday night to Chas. Whitacre, commander 19th district American Legion, and a group of his friends and entertainers.

Harry Morckel, commander of McDermott Post, said that Willie Landrum Post, Lockney, would receive special invitation to be on hand for the party, and that special guests other than Legionnaires, their wives, and members of the Women's Auxiliary would be invited.

Included in the group that will stop here are Judge J. A. Raley, Jr., A. C. Jackson, state chairman of Sons of Legion; Louis Murfee, commander of Allen Brothers post; Tangle Strange, Fifth Division American Legion chairman, and George Metzger, entertainer de-luxe and 19th district "one man band".

### Florence Jones Is Named Gold Star 4-H Club Girl

Outstanding Club Work During 1940 Is Basis For Choice

Florence Jones, daughter of Mrs. W. T. Hopper of the Lakeview community, has been named the Floyd county gold star girl for her outstanding achievements in 4-H club work during 1940.

The choice was announced this week by Miss Edith Wilson, Floyd county home demonstration agent, following the selection by the educational committee of the county council.

Each county is allowed one gold star girl annually, under the rules of the 4-H organization and the selection is made on the basis of all phases of club work.

Miss Jones was named president of the Lakeview club when it was organized in March 1940. She had previously been a member of the Baileyboro club where she had contributed considerable to 4-H club work and had won a number of awards for her work.

Since the organization of the club, Miss Jones has missed only one regular meeting and one club party. She attended the Texas A. & M. short course in July at College Station.

According to a report made for the council, Miss Jones has remodeled a bedroom closet, rearranged her bedroom, and furniture and otherwise improved her room.

Considerable of her time has been put in on making dresses, and other wearing apparel, as well as making over several old dresses.

Using an old wash tub as a basic part of a home-built hot house, she raised some 300 small tomato plants which were later transplanted into the garden and the field.

From these plants she helped her mother can up 60 jars of tomatoes, 20 jars of juice, and 5 jars of catsup. She also helped with the canning of peas, beans, cucumber pickles, turnip greens, peaches and other vegetables and fruits.

The garden and field furnished the family with fresh vegetables and melons, a substantial part of which belonged to Miss Jones. She and her brother, Henry, harvested the cotton this past fall.

Miss Jones said, "I think that it is at all possible and they have the opportunity, every girl should belong to a 4-H club. I think it makes them have more interest in things around them, their life, and other people."

Our farm and home plans take into consideration balance between livestock and cropping programs, soil improvement, home production, and preservation of foods for home use, family health and all other factors involved in sound farm and home management practices," Hays explained.

#### Local Board Names Selectees To Go On February 7

Four Boys Named To Fill Vacancies Of Calls 1 And 2

Three men will leave Floydada February 7 and be sent to Lubbock for induction, O. P. Rutledge, secretary of the local board, revealed this week.

The three men to go in the first February call are Ben Ayres, Aaron Dunn, and Walton Henderson, Rutledge said. This makes the third call on the Floyd county board.

Four men from Floyd county have met with rejection and the local board must send replacements to fill the deficiency, Rutledge said. The men selected to fill this shortage are Thomas King, Petersburg; E. G. Williams, Jr., Petersburg; Charles Denison, Floydada, and Willie B. Hall, Floydada. It may be that some change will be made in this selection before they leave on February 13.

Rutledge said that no other information as to calls had been made available, but that it was probable that calls would come regularly now as camps were rapidly nearing a state of readiness.

Central offices have issued information to selectees as to what to bring and what not to bring when they leave their homes for army life. Only a minimum amount of luggage should be brought, certainly no trunks or bulky baggage.

One pair of comfortable and serviceable shoes, athletic equipment of any nature, musical instruments (banjo, guitar, etc.), small photographs, toilet articles, towels, and a limited amount of clothing such as shirts, underwear, socks, and handkerchiefs should be carried by the army bound man, the information said.

It is not permissible to carry firearms, liquor, large pictures, or autos to the induction stations.

Uniforms and clothing will be issued to selectees within 24 hours after arrival at reception centers. It was said, and barrack bags would be furnished.

Well stocked libraries and reading rooms are available at reception centers and posts, and it has been suggested that no periodicals be forwarded to the selectee until they arrive at their posts.

Post cards are furnished selectees at reception centers and posts so that they may inform relatives and friends of their arrival.

### Mattress Program For 1941 About Ready To Start

200 Mattresses Made In 1940 Program And Distributed

Floyd county's 1941 mattress program is almost ready to begin, Miss Edith Wilson, Floyd county home demonstration agent, announced Monday.

The program for 1940 will be closed this week, according to the information, and will include the distribution of some 200 mattresses to needy families in this section.

The 1940 program prohibited more than one mattress to a family but the rules of the 1941 program will be changed somewhat so that a mattress may be provided for each two persons in a family, not to exceed three mattresses to each family.

Comforters will also be included in the program. A comforter will go with each mattress, it was said. Application for mattresses under the 1941 program should be made immediately, Miss Wilson said, as it is necessary to have an idea about the extent of needs.

Applications will be taken each Monday, Wednesday and Saturday afternoons by a club woman in the ACA offices, or Miss Wilson will take applications when she is in her office, also in the ACA building.

There will be four distribution centers this year. They are Floydada, Lockney, South Plains and Lone Star. Supervisors of those centers are Mrs. T. B. Wilkinson, Mrs. W. H. Nelson, Mrs. Memard Field and Mrs. Herman King.

A meeting on the 1941 program was held Saturday afternoon in the district courtroom with county council members, commissioners, and county committeemen, Alyce A. Hoots and Miss Wilson present to discuss phases.

Rules for eligibility have been outlined as follows: A family will consist of two or more persons living together as an interdependent economic unit. (2) Income must not exceed \$500 per year, plus \$50 for each member of the family, not to exceed four.

# EDITORIALS

Young Mr. Charles A. Lindbergh, who once flew the ocean blue and landed at Paris, too, is about as popular in the United States this week as a certain animal we have in mind that has a long tail and a stripe down its back. Mr. Lindbergh is making some unpopular statements. At the same time he is getting back at some of the Britishers he delights to dislike following his sojourn in England. Examining our own reactions we suspect that we are mad at him because he says some things we think might be so but that we are not going to believe until we have to. He knows that three years ago Germany had 10,000 first line planes and 50,000 pilots to operate them. He knows that England and Russia and France did not. At this time Germany could have 50,000 first line planes and 200,000 young men to operate them and 200,000 parachute troops, if they had a mind to do so. But we do not want to believe that and are not going to do so until we have to admit it sometime next March or April. Meanwhile England cannot have any such armada of the air. To cap it all Germany could have shipyards in a half dozen countries building ships. Instead of time working in favor of the English it might be working in favor of the Germans. Because the Germans are not worried by any time or time and a half and working conditions that suit the workers. Any worker who is not satisfied can raise Cain this week and be pushing up daisies next. Additionally Mr. Hitler has been able to disprove all the old adages about money and national economy, and gold and things of that kind. Of course, only where one man has all the pawns and pulls all the strings.

Among the beneficent representatives of Uncle Sam who will call on you this month or soon is Mr. R. A. Choat, who "will appreciate a little publicity." Mr. Choat or some other representative of the Collector of Internal Revenue is going to demand that certain conditions be met. This is the same department that sent Al Capone to prison after all the FBI fellows had done their best and could not. If you must commit murder, personally once or impersonally a hundred times, do so, if you are smart enough, but don't try to escape an income tax if you draw as much as \$800 per year unmarried, \$2000 a year married. Look up the law and bring your money with you if you wait too long. Otherwise a check will serve.

If Mr. Choat does not get around, Mr. Barkley or Mr. Bedford or some other gentleman may. The "district" has been cut up recently. The department has added some more collectors whose bills you will pay. Everyone of these gentlemen drives a good automobile and you pay for the gasoline he burns at whatever rate of mileage he makes as determined in Washington. Also his car must be serviced with greases and other lubricants. At so much per mile. These fellows are sons of Quantrell's band, descendants of Texans who saw horse thieves hanged to unorthodox trees in Hamilton and Bell county, descendants of men who fought Injuns in preference to crap grass in the spring and

with gusto enjoyed hating taxes and tax collectors. The sons are of another generation. If you protest you will get a bland suggestion that you take it up with your congressman—after you have paid.

The Social Security program, plus a heavy draft on income, plus other expenses incidental to business, is spelling disaster to many business establishments. But there will be others to take their places. All must give over to the changing times. Those who make good guesses will do well. To the small business man who has control of his own affairs and can "hole up", like a farmer who owns his place or a business man who has no overhead, the prospect is not terrifying. To others except those on government pay the outlook is a nightmare.

What a small corporation would do under the circumstances or what an individual would do would be to trim the sails to meet the situation—that or take bankruptcy. But the State of Texas will not do that. Many more millions will be appropriated and many more millions in taxes raised. The condition of the general fund will be brushed aside as somewhat immaterial. If the legislature doesn't do it that way the sovereign electorate—the spenders in the majority—will get them a legislature that will. Similar to the congress which is spending its billions and let the devil get those who can't keep up.

Old newspaper friends are bobbing up in new places the past few weeks in Texas. Among these are two families for whom oil developments have made opportunities. They are E. S. Shoaf and son Jacob S. Shoaf of Wood county, and J. L. Suits. The latter is newspapering in Levelland where new oil is making riches overnight and the former at Hawkins, Wood county, where the giant discovery well in October has changed the oil picture in East Texas materially. The Shoafs have been making a good newspaper at Quitman for a good many years and are taking a flyer at Hawkins on the chance that it may be another boom city. Suits began his newspaper experience in Kent county and has been through all the various types of booms that have hit West Texas. We hope both have a million dollars each when they get ready to cash in their chips.

The biggest grocery business in Floyd county is not being done by your favorite grocery. Leastwise we think that is right. The biggest food volume is being done out of a room about 14x20 in the basement of the court house. Around 45,000 pounds of hams and flour, beans, potatoes, oranges, apples and whatnot are being distributed monthly from that place. If you are a customer all you do is to wait until an attendant gets ready to wait on you, present your slip and walk out with the best the country affords. A lot of folks who milk cows at 5 o'clock in the morning and again that night come rain or shine or snow won't believe this. Your groceryman knows it though.

## As A Farm Woman Thinks

Nellie Witt Spikes

Yesterday, Sunday, my husband's sister, Mrs. Temple Ann Ellis came and brought me a copy of a newspaper published at Kingston, (Ulster county) by Samuel Freer and son, Saturday 4, 1890. It is very interesting to read and if you will look over my shoulder we will see what is in it. Must have taken a long time to get news from Europe for "The Hamburg mail due on Sunday" last arrived this morning (Jan. 4) It brings accounts of the events which took place in Switzerland in the latter end of September.

We read John Adams (the president) reply to Congress on December 10, 1799 in which he says in part "This very respectful address to congress at this interesting and singular crisis of our public affairs."

Also Mr. Adams goes on to say about the death of General George Washington December 14, 1799 "His example is now complete, and it will teach wisdom and virtue to magistrates, citizens and men, not only in present, but in future generations as long as history shall be read as if a Trajan and Pliny, a Marcus Aurelius can never want biographers, eulogists of historians" A column is given to Washington entombed, which says, "A multitude of persons assembled from many miles around at Mount Vernon. His mortal part was there indeed, but ah how affecting? How awful the spectacle of such worth and greatness thus, to mortal eyes, fallen—Yes! fallen! fallen!" A plot was drawn of the procession and at the close of the reading is this:

"The sun was now setting. Alas! the sun of glory was set forever. No—the name of Washington—the American president and general—will triumph over death. The unclouded brightness of his glory will illuminate the future ages!" What a true prediction was made by the editors Freer.

Assortment of Do-Dads Go Into Construction Of Accessories

We are very proud to announce that enrollment in the Homemaking department has definitely increased this semester. The total enrollment to date is 111. We are glad that so many girls are interested in the work. All are enthusiastic about the work, and we feel much will be accomplished.

In the clothing department, the third year girls are busy with the unit "costume jewelry and accessories." They are finding this work very interesting, and are doing nice work creating unusual "do-dads." These are some of the things they are doing.

Attractive necklaces are being made out of round, shell and long macaroni; some are dyed and some are painted with fingernail polish. Chicken rings, thimbles, jacks, pecans, staples, walnuts, canteloupe seed, corn, keys, acorns, peanuts, corks, sea shells, small clothes pins and wood thread are being used quite attractively.

Bracelets are being made from safety pins, sea shells, and thimbles. Buttons and buckles made by screwing loop screws into "nigger toes" nuts are unusual and effective if worn on rough texture materials for sports and tailored wear. Ply wood sawed into various sizes and shapes and soaked in dye make interesting buttons. The edges have a rough surface which contrast with the smooth top surface. Remove, of course, when the garment is being cleaned or laundered.

Did you know that various sizes and shapes of good tough seed pods, when dipped into paint and tied into bunches make attractive button-toppers? Some materials suitable for this purpose are coxleahs, and acorns, peanuts, wooden beads, and yellow bells that grow on nettles. Some are pretty in natural color and do not need painting.

Washers, corks, colored rubber bands, harness buckles and many other things can be utilized in making belts that lend individuality to the right costume on the right person.
