IF YOU HAVEN'T enjoyed the weather we have had in this area for the past week or two, then you probably don't enjoy Christmas and the Fourth of July, either.

What an ideal stretch of weather, especially for the month of November. If you have lived on the Plains of Texas most of your life, then you know without our bringing up the fact that at this time of year you can have just about anything from the ideal summer-like conditions, to a howling blizzard.

In fact, it was pointed out that while Monday's high temperature was 78 in the area, exactly a year earlier, the high had been only 28 degrees, complete with a goodly amount of snow.

Cotton farmers are keeping their fingers crossed, hoping that the snow will hold off for awhile longer, so they may get their late cotton crop harvested. The weather so far in November has been just right, and at this point, farmers are working from early until late, taking advantage of the warm, dry conditions.

A cooler trend was being predicted for the middle of this week, but hopefully it will not include moisture, so that the work on the cotton harvest may continue.

It is still too early to tell, although it appears that the yield in some cases may be pretty good, all things considered. The grades on some of the earlier-stripped cotton were somewhat low, but seemed to be improving as the season progresses, and the conditions improve.

Mainly, the farmers are still needing a break from the marketplace, where the price for cotton, as well as other commodities, is just not what it needs to be, in order for the farmer to show a profit.

We have said it before, and it bears repeating--It is a sad commentary when the farmers can get everything going for them otherwise--having a much better than average year from the moisture standpoint--and have yields as high as they could expect, and not be able to come out with a profit on their crops.

Something is wrong with our system, to allow this situation to occur, year in and year out. And--even if the situation should correct itself, it will come too late for some farmers, who were depending upon a profitable year, in order to pay off their bank notes and get out of debt.

AMERICANS HAVE ALWAYS been a little gullible when it comes to fiction. We suppose that's why there have been so many novels, science-fiction books and movies made. It seems that the more way-out the premise, the bigger the audience appeal.

This week's television special on CBS, entitled "Goliath Awaits," certainly fit the mold for the "You've got to be kidding" premise for a story.

Well, maybe it wasn't too "far out." If you missed the movie, here was the general idea: An English ocean liner had sunk during a voyage in 1939. When it was discovered by modern-day divers with their equipment, guess what? The people had not only survived, but were living in their underwater environment on the giant ship.

Preposterous? Maybe so, but even though this writer had to shake his head, he never-the-less sat through both segments of the movie, "just to see what happened." We would wager that a lot of other people hooked on the tube did likewise.

The public has always been intrigued by ideas which are just a little off the beaten path: the curse of the un-dead, or aliens landing a ship from outer space, for example.

In fact, almost any time the term Unidentified Flying Object pops into the news, the newscasters seem to give a little more coverage to the event, because more likely than not, their viewers perked up their eyes and ears and took notice.

Postmaster Kicks Off Xmas Drive

This year, the Postal Service is joining forces with the business community of Friona in urging customers to shop early and mail early for Christmas.

Postmaster Richard Wilson has officially declared the start of the Christmas shopping season by asking shoppers to assist with the Christmas mailing crunch by shopping early and mailing early. Cards and parcels will reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays, if customers will start early, make certain that mail is addressed correctly and that packages are wrapped properly, the postmaster says.

"Normally, we handle about 8,000 pieces of mail a day--including cards, letters and packages, but during the holiday season, the volume goes up to about 12,000 pieces," Wilson says.

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Wilson says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates--including those for the armed forces stationed overseas--occur during this month. Mailers can get specific information on the international dates by calling us at 247-3080," Wilson said.

"Customers should also take care to write legible Zip Coded addresses for both the intended recipient and the sender. Since mail sorting depends on the Zip Code as well as the name of the particular city and state, the use of the correct Zip Code will aid us in processing the mail.

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season," the postmaster concluded.

Board Votes To Build Library

The Friona Library Board met Thursday afternoon and voted to build a new library building, rather than purchase a building.

It was pointed out by Kitty Gallman, board chairman, that the building which had been of interest to the library board, the Friona Consumers building, will not be available after all, as the cooperative plans to remain in business.

"Naturally, we do not wish anyone out of business, and if they can make it, that will be good news," Mrs. Gallman said.

The library has been offered the lot behind City Hall and Bi-Wize Drug, which has been used for a number of years as a parking lot, as a gift from Friona State Bank, on which to build a library building.

The lot, which is 100x105 feet, would provide ample space for a library building, and the downtown location is what the library board has wanted all along.

The board feels that with the money that has been raised for the project, plus donations it expects to get from area foundations, it can build a 3,000 square foot facility, which would be adequate for the needs of Friona.

The board has approximately \$29,000 on deposit, representing gifts from residents of the local area. It is slated to receive a sizeable gift from the Harrington Foundation of Amarillo, as soon as details are completed through the Internal Revenue Service.

In addition, a gift is anticipated from the Amarillo Area Foundation, whose representative, John B. Bingham, attended Thursday's meeting. "I am 99 per cent certain that your grant will be approved, but will not know for sure, and as to the amount, until our distribution committee meets in about three weeks," Bingham said.

Bingham, a Friona native, said that the positive reaction by the Harrington Foundation had encouraged the Amarillo Foundation to participate in the local library drive.

Members of the library board have met with local builders, Delton Lewellen and Ray Dean Fleming, and it is expected one of these builders will do the project.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland, meeting with the board, encouraged them to get a drawing of the proposed building, and a contract from the successful bidder. The building plans will have to be approved by the City Council.

Members of the board also discussed the possibility of visiting new libraries in the area to get ideas for their new building. Those at Tulia and Dimmitt were mentioned as good prospects.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1936

Bob Clements of Albany, who formerly owned the Clements Tailor Shop here, but who a few months ago purchased a larger shop at Albany, was here Tuesday and moved the stock of men's furnishings to his store in Albany. The shop here has been under the management of Roy Clements, and will continue so.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1941

Announcing an allotment of \$148,000 for the construction of 213 miles of new REA electricity lines in Texas, H.V. Hennen, project supervisor, stated that approximately 50 miles of this new allotment will be placed in Parmer County. When the new construction is completed, approximately 300 miles of REA line will be served through the Parmer sub station.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1946

Last Friday night at the football game with Tulia, the Chieftains crowned their football queen, Miss Marcia Luttrell of the junior class. The pep squad, dressed in their red and white uniforms, formed a heart on the playing field. The queen was dressed in a red evening gown and her attendants wore white. The queen was crowned by Dean Hall, captain of the football team. Tulia prevailed in the game by a score of 32-0.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1951

Survey work was commenced today on the new fire station for Friona, with actual construction to follow immediately. All bids recently were rejected by the city commissioners, and decision was made for the city to construct the building themselves.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1956

Texas agreed with the nation in returning President Eisenhower to his second term of office in the general election Tuesday, but it was a different story in predominantly-agricultural Parmer County. Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear cut victory. Democrats won in Friona by a 434-356 margin. Countywide, the count was 1372 votes for Stevenson-Kefauver and 1028 for Eisenhower-Nixon.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1961

An all-out drive to enroll the 20 additional members necessary before the construction of the Country Club House can begin will commence December 14, according to Andy Hurst, club president.

D.G. McClellan, local telephone maintenance man, received fractures in his ankle as a result of a fall from the top of the American Legion Building Thursday.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1966

Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in heavy numbers for a non-presidential voting year to help return Senator John Tower to Washington and to favor Congressman-elect Bob Price. City and county voters gave both of the Republican candidates a surprisingly heavy majority. Seven of the eight precincts voted for the two candidates. In Friona, Tower out-pollied Waggoner Carr, 446-226, and won the county vote, 1084-651. Price's margins were 476-179 in Friona and 1161-569 county-wide over Democrat Dee Miller.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1971

The procedure for purchasing right of way and making other necessary adjustments preliminary to the beginning of construction on the overpass for Highway 214 was discussed and outlined by right of way officials from the Texas Highway Department with city and county officials here last Thursday. The highway officials turned over to the City of Friona six tracts of land which have been approved by the State Highway Department for participation on the 50-50 right of way purchase, and two for the county.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1976

Clay Bandy moved to a commanding five point lead in the race for grand prize in the Friona Star's football contest, coming up with a score of 16 for last week to tally 158 for the cumulative ten week total.

Curtis Murphree brought the first bale of cotton which was ginned at Friona at the Co-Op Gin on November 2.

Child Welfare Board Has Meeting Here

Your Parmer County Child Welfare Board met on Tuesday evening, November 5 and dealt with a wide range of issues including "foster parenting" and a "clothes closet."

The clothes closet at the United Methodist Church is now "officially" at the group's disposal and a public appeal for clothing (children's sizes ranging from one month to 18 years-that is in good condition) will soon be made.

The case worker for Parmer and Castro counties, Mrs. Karla Majors, notes that other items are also needed in the closet. Often when a child is taken from a home it is without notice or preparation and nothing is taken but the child.

Foster parents often do not have all the necessities for this new arrival. The following is a list of items that will be sent to county churches and published again in local papers: a bottle warmer, disposable diapers (newborn to toddler), socks (infants to teens), baby crib, and activity toys for children, etc.

If you have any of these items and would like to donate them to the Child Welfare Board, please take them to any board member and they will see that the items are delivered.

The board, under the workmanship of Bessie Holt, has arranged for a booth at the Christmas in November Bazaar. The board will sell popcorn to raise money and will be handing out information to all who are interested.

Kaltwasser of Farwell and Joe Schilling of Farwell-Oklahoma Lane, were introduced and welcomed.

Debbie Ferriter, the foster parent placement worker, was present to give a program on foster parenting. After explaining the responsibilities, joys and tribulations, Mrs. Ferriter noted that Parmer and Castro counties were in need of foster parents.

Anyone interested in foster parenting or simply seeking information about foster parenting, can get information by contacting any board member.

"Seeking information does not obligate you in any way, but you may be able to help the need situation in our county," said a spokesman.

The board discussed various ways to meet the Christmas needs of those in conservatorship of Parmer County.

Finally, the board began to discuss projects that it will undertake in the new year.

Motorists Are Urged To Take Precautions

Major C.W. Bell, DPS Regional Commander, is asking drivers to be cautious during the Thanksgiving holidays.

"Thanksgiving is a time for us to rest and be grateful for many things. Each individual has his own feelings about Thanksgiving, but those drivers who practice good driving habits can be truly thankful that they were not involved in a traffic accident during the year," he said.

Major Bell pointed out that Texas is well on its way to a record number of traffic fatalities this year. "Last year 4,424 people were killed and 1981 is going to be another record year unless motorists take special precautions to protect themselves and others," he said.

"Many of these deaths could have been avoided if people would stay sober, drive at reasonable speeds and use their seat belts," said Bell. "Putting on a seat belt only takes a few seconds, but that simple act can add years to one's life," he emphasized.

DPS statistics show that last year, about 1200 lives would have been saved if all drivers and their passengers would have clicked their seat belts on. "It's better to be safe than sorry," Bell concluded.

During last year's Thanksgiving holiday period, 63 persons were killed in traffic accidents in Texas. The DPS regional commander said that the Operation Motorcade traffic death count is not conducted during Thanksgiving, but that doesn't mean that drivers should be less cautious. Bell said DPS Troopers would be active during the holiday trying to cut down on needless traffic fatalities.

Beef Market By Texas Cattlemen Pays Dividends

Since July 1, Texas cattlemen have been investing 25 cents per animal toward national beef programs of research, education and promotion coordinated by the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board.

Now Texas cattlemen are reaping the rewards of that investment.

During September and October, the Beef Industry Council conducted an extensive advertising and promotional campaign in six markets--Dallas/Ft. Worth, Cleveland, Denver, Minneapolis/St. Paul, San Diego and Sacramento--and preliminary reports indicate that the campaign brought more people into stores to buy beef. The campaign featured TV advertising and point-of-purchase materials tied to the general theme "Make Ends Meat--With the Great Taste of Beef."

Although detailed results from the promotion are still being tabulated, some markets have already reported a dramatic increase in beef sales during the campaign's flight dates compared to year-ago figures. Three supermarket chains in Dallas reported 5-24 per cent beef sales increases; San Diego and Sacramento reported 8-20 per cent increases; a supermarket chain in Denver reported a 36 per cent increase; and a large chain in Minneapolis reported a 24 per cent beef sales increase.

"We've had nothing but positive response from our customers since we posted 'Make Ends Meat' promotional materials," said Don Mobley, meat director for Affiliated Foods in Dallas. "Every store owner I've visited has been quite pleased with the amount of consumer interest this program has generated."

Jim McKenzie, meat merchandising manager for Safeway

stores in Denver reported that store managers in his area were particularly pleased with the quality of the "Make Ends Meat" promotional materials.

"I visited eight to ten of our stores last week and I happened to notice that every one of them had 'Make Ends Meat' materials in prime locations," said McKenzie.

"This is a good sign. Many times promotional materials sent to stores from outside sources get either thrown out or put in areas of low visibility. But not this material. Stores I visited had placed the material in excellent, highly visible locations."

Dick Root, meat buyer for Alpha Beta stores in San Diego agrees. "All

our managers were quite impressed with the quality of these promotional materials. One picture is worth a thousand words--and those 'Make Ends Meat' posters really seem to appeal to consumers."

In Cleveland, stores have tied-in heavily with the "Make Ends Meat" promotion. Bi-Rite Supermarkets, for example, have utilized the campaign's promotional materials in their newspaper food page advertising.

"This campaign has been very gratifying for us," said Earl Jackson, Bi-Rite meat merchandiser. "Our customer counts at the meat counter are way up and I've heard nothing but favorable comments from consumers. This campaign has been tremendous for us."

Beef Industry Council Promotion Manager Jim Olson is pleased with the promotion's results to date.

"Judging from reports we've received from all markets, the 'Make Ends Meat' fall campaign has generated much positive consumer response," said Olson. "The point-of-purchase materials coupled with the extensive television advertising campaign seem to have helped stimulate demand, which is exactly what we were aiming for."

According to Olson, beef tonnage figures in each of the test markets are now being compared with tonnage figures in Indianapolis and St. Louis, both previously selected as control markets. Final results on the campaign's effectiveness should be available in a matter of weeks.

Gene Newman Named President

Gene Newman, a San Angelo rancher and cattle feeder, has been named president of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. Newman is president of the Gene Newman Cattle Company and owns Kan Sun Beef, a feedyard at Leoti, Kansas. He replaces R.L. (Bob) Bliss, who has served as president of the association the last two years.

Charles E. Koontz, general manager of Olton Feedyard at Olton, was elected TCFA first vice president. Dick Waterfield, general manager of Canadian Feedyards at Canadian and Pampa, was elected vice president.

The new officers were elected at the conclusion of TCFA's Annual Convention, which drew nearly 900 cattle feeders and allied industry representatives to Fort Worth.

TCFA represents feedyard members in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Chieftains Blank Olton; Jackson In '1,000 Club'

Since it was to be the last football meeting between Friona and Olton for awhile, the Chieftains decided to make the game a memorable one.

Especially senior tailback Nelson Jackson, who was in quest of enough yardage to reach the 1,000-yard plateau for the year.

Jackson romped for 189 yards, enough to reach his goal, and scored two touchdowns to lead the Chieftains past the Mustangs, 20-0 in the last game of the 1981 season.

The win enabled the Chieftains to post a 5-5 season for the year, their best since 1977. The break-even mark had been a general goal for the team in pre-season, which achieved that and even remained in the thick of the district race until the next-to-last game of the year.

The winning margin of twenty points also turned out to match the biggest win over Olton. A similar score had been posted by the 1964 Chieftains.

And, the margin might have been even bigger, had not the Chiefs been so generous at times during the game.

It didn't take the visiting Chieftains long to get on the scoreboard. Mike Neill returned the opening kickoff to the Friona 30 to get things started.

Two runs each by Jackson and Richard Malouf advanced the ball to the Olton 43. At this point, Mark Tucker faded to pass, and spotted Neill wide open at about the Olton 20.

Neill gathered in the pass, and raced it in for the score. Mark Montoya's kick gave the Chiefs a quick 7-0 lead, as only 2:56 had expired on the clock.

A little later in the opening quarter, Friona had the ball at the Olton 38 following a ten-yard burst by Robert Osborn. An option pass thrown by Jackson was intercepted, however, and this ended a possible scoring drive.

Olton took the ball and moved across midfield, then had to punt. The kick backed Friona up to its 17. Then, a holding penalty moved the ball inside the Chieftain 10, where

they faced second down and 17.

The team didn't stay in bad field position for long. Jackson took the pitchout and headed around the right side. He read his blocks well, cut back toward the middle, and soon found himself in a footrace to the goal-line, a footrace he won easily.

The 90-yard dash gave Friona a 14-0 lead after Montoya again split the uprights with his kick, with 1:45 left in the opening period. And at this point, Jackson had already gobbled up 107 yards in five carries. It began to look like a runaway for the Chieftains.

But the Mustangs, who were suffering through a winless season, did not want to roll over and play dead.

In fact, they came back with an impressive drive, that seemed almost certainly would end in a touchdown. Paced by the running of Blake Buchenau, the Ponies moved into Chieftain territory.

The Mustangs had a first down at the Friona 12, and then got a pass completion to the five, where they faced second and three. However, on third down a pitchout was fumbled and recovered by Rocky Nichols at the Olton 23 to thwart the scoring threat. Hence, the 13-play drive went without points.

The next time Olton got the ball, they again put together a drive. This came after their second pass interception, a pass which bounced off Jackson's hands and was grabbed by an Olton defender.

This time the Mustangs drove from their own 30 to the Friona 30. This ten-play drive was stopped on a pass interception by Friona. That came right at the end of the second quarter.

The Chieftains had a good scoring threat in the third quarter, following a pass interception by Jeff Lundy.

Robert Osborn broke for a 31-yard gain from his own 43 to the Olton 26. Jackson gained six, then eight yards, to give the team a first down at the Mustang nine.

An offside penalty against Friona moved the team back to the 14-yard line, and after a six-yard gain by Malouf, another five-yarder set Friona back. Jackson gained to the ten, and on third down a pass was incomplete.

Montoya came on to attempt what ordinarily have been an easy field goal. The ball was spotted at the 17—a 27-yard kick. But a high snap ruined the timing, and the kick failed.

A little later, Friona recovered an Olton fumble near midfield. Charlie Morgan, promoted from the junior varsity, ripped off gains of eight and nine yards in a brief sojourn, but two plays later Tucker had a pass intercepted to again stymie the drive.

Friona just couldn't crack the scoreboard when they were driving north. (And it had nothing to do with the weather, which was perfect for a final game of the season).

In the final quarter, Friona had the ball and was driving goal-ward, only to have the fumble bug show up. Jackson fumbled as he was tackled at the Olton three, and the Mustangs recovered, to turn back yet another

Friona scoring opportunity.

However, late in the game, Friona put together a drive which paid off. It was not without help, though, since Olton fumbled a Chieftain punt at their own 25 to keep the drive going.

Jackson got the call three times in a row, gaining seven, nine and six yards. The final six got the touchdown. The PAT try failed, but Friona had hiked its lead to 20-0 with only 1:28 left to play.

His final carry also put Jackson over the 1,000-yard mark for the season also. The speedy tailback finished the year with 1,003 yards, to join the exclusive 1,000-yard club at FHS.

Basketball Teams Win Season Openers

The Friona High School Chieftains and Squaws launched their 1981-82 basketball seasons at Farwell on Tuesday, and swept the doubleheader from the host teams.

The Squaws held on in the hard-fought opener for a 43-39 win, while the Chieftains rolled to an easy 57-37 win.

The girls' game was in doubt right up to the final buzzer. Farwell had a 9-8 lead at the end of the first quarter, but the Squaws rallied to take a 19-18 lead at halftime.

The score after three quarters was a three-point lead for Friona, 32-29. The Squaws would open the lead a little, but Farwell would close the gap.

The Friona girls still had only a two-point lead, 41-39, when a foul was called against Farwell at the buzzer. Rene Noland sank two free throws after time expired for the final margin of 43-39.

Friona hit 35 per cent of their field goal shots, and 43 per cent from the foul line. The Squaws had ten offensive rebounds and 33 on defense. "We didn't play real well, but well enough to win," said Coach Tom Johnson.

The Chieftains, paced by the shooting of Mark Tucker and Mike Neill, bolted to a 10-0 lead early in their game, and were never in trouble. They had an 18-4 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The team continued to pop the nets

during the second quarter, outscoring the host Steers 17-7, and took a 35-11 lead to halftime.

During the second half, Coach Johnson was able to use his bench extensively, and everyone saw a lot of action.

The Chiefs hit a mid-season 41 per cent of their shots (25 of 60) from the field. "We never did that well all season last year. I was surprised at how well we played," Coach Johnson said.

Nine members of the team got into the scoring. Johnson pointed out that if the team had been hitting at the free throw line, their score would have been much higher. Friona made only nine of 26 from the free throw line.

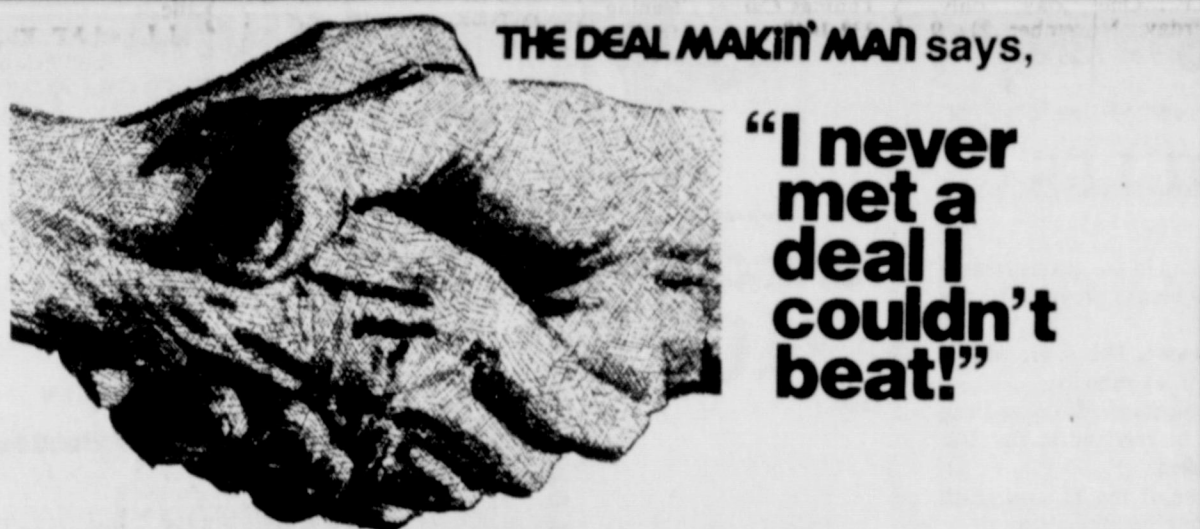

The community is invited to attend, says Martin Mercado, a spokesman for the church.

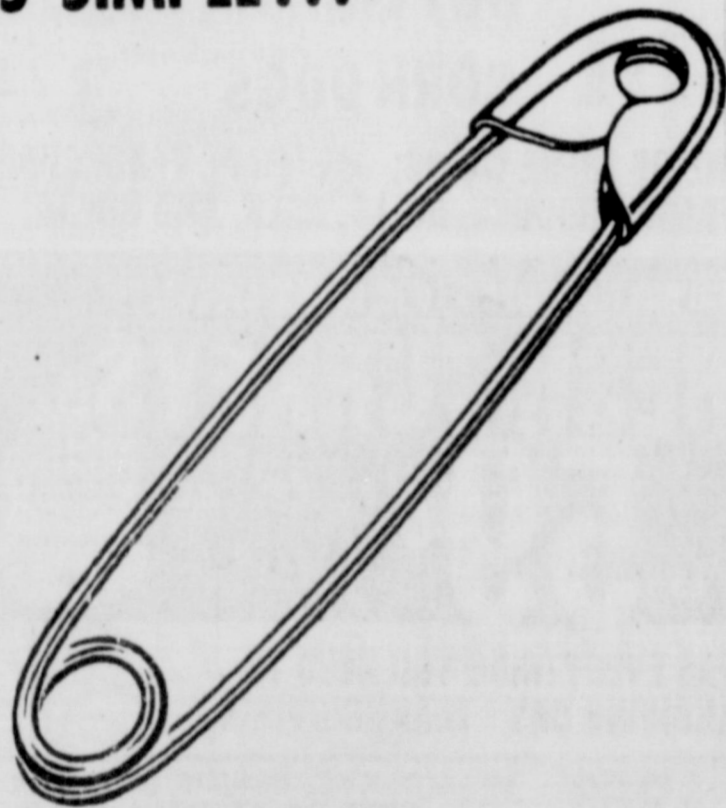
The Latinos are a group which has been together for the past 15 years,

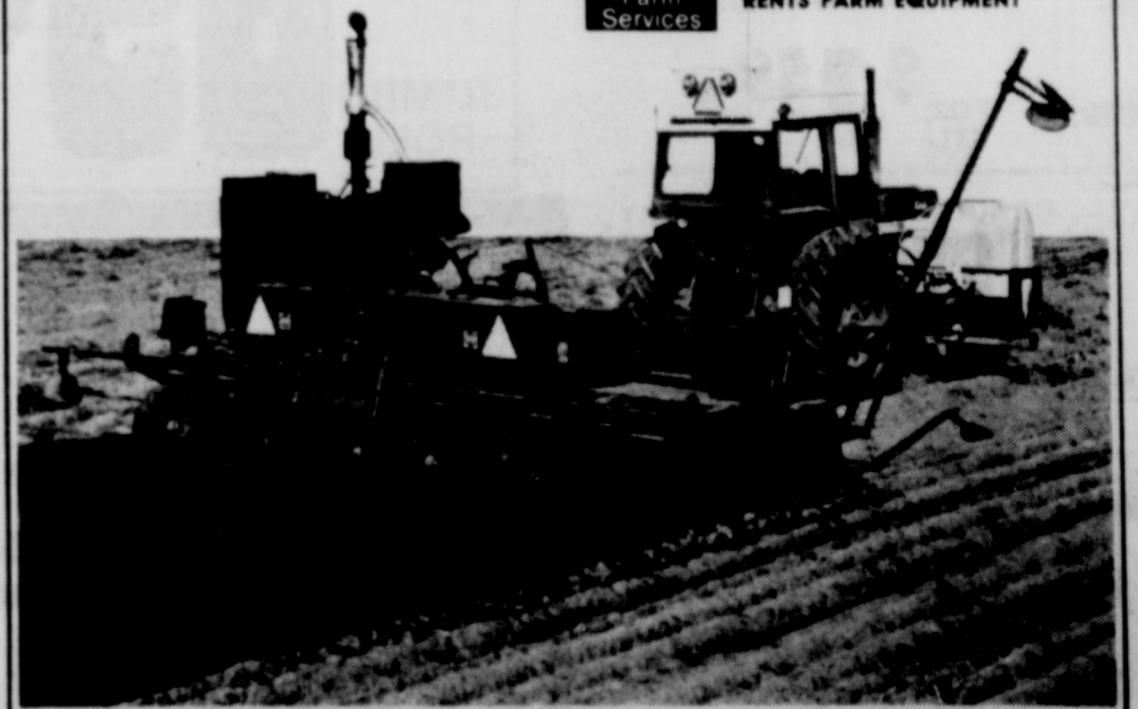

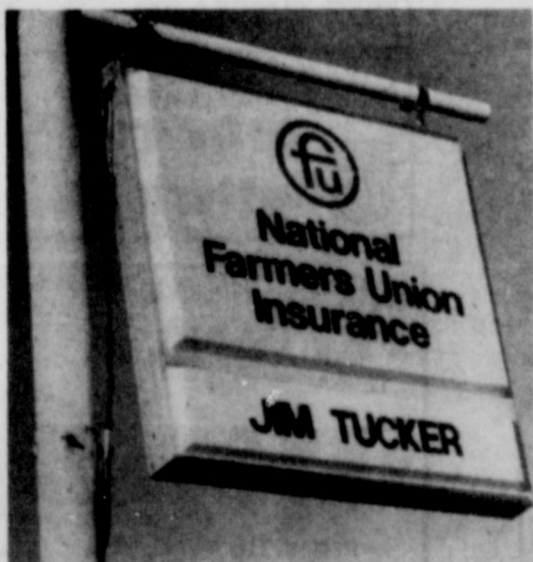
